REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

The trustees present their report and audited financial statements for the year ended 5th April 2016. They have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective 1st January 2015).

The Trustees confirm that the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit has been considered in relation to the objectives of the Charity. The report below sets out those objectives and describes how they have been met in the current year.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The Chapman Charitable Trust was established for general charitable purposes on 30th October 1963 by the late Mrs. Marjorie Chapman, one of whose two sons, one of her grandsons, a granddaughter and a great grandson, served as trustees throughout the year.

The trustees met twice formally during the year on 7th October 2015 and 10th March 2016.

Statement Of Trustees' Responsibilities

Law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the charity's financial activities during the year and of its financial position at the end of the year. In preparing financial statements giving a true and fair view, the trustees should follow best practice and:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with applicable law and the trust deed. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

Risk Assessment

The trustees have considered the risks to which the Chapman Charitable Trust is exposed and believe that these will be mitigated by:

- A body of trustees with the necessary experience and competence to supervise all the aspects
 of the Trust's work;
- Regular trustees' meetings with effective reporting to ensure proper review of grant making coupled with the consideration and approval by trustees of all grants made;
- Retention of competent investment managers who have not been delegated dealing discretion but regularly attend trustees' meetings; and
- An effective system of internal control to ensure the correct operation of the Guidelines for Grant Making, together with the signature by two trustees on all cheques.

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OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The trustees have powers to apply the income and capital of the Trust Fund in or towards the furtherance of such charitable purposes and objects as they from time to time think fit.

The trustees continued with the long established policy of distributing income as it arises since the administration and operating expenses are low and do not require a reserve to be maintained. The level of income achieved in 2016 was considered satisfactory and consistent with the income target established by the trustees.
