Objectives, activities and public benefit

The objects of the charity are to promote any charitable purposes for the benefit of children in the UK and abroad with particular regard to the provisions relevant to those purposes in the United Nations Convention on the Rights of the Child, including, but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing, the relief of poverty, sickness and distress; the safeguarding and maintenance of health; the provision of care, protection from abuse and all other injurious, humiliating or degrading treatment and the advancement of education, training and public knowledge in all matters concerning those charitable purposes.

How our activities deliver public benefit

One of CRIN's primary contributions to public benefit is through information delivery. CRIN provides information on children's rights and issues affecting children, in the UK and overseas. This information is collected through its members and disseminated widely, in five languages.

All of the services CRIN provides, including reports and other resources, are entirely free as CRIN strongly believes that information should be freely accessible.

CRIN has produced a number of toolkits made available widely through the website for different audiences, both non-governmental organisations (NGOs) and media (for instance a guide on reporting on children for journalists) and is currently developing educational materials on children's rights.

Increasingly, CRIN is also taking a lead in advocacy and campaigning for children's rights internationally. Working with national, regional and international bodies and organisations, we monitor new and emerging violations and work in coalitions to challenge these through using the United Nations and other Human Rights Systems. We also respond directly to inquiries from the general public about various issues on children's rights.

The Trustees confirm that they have had regard to the public benefit guidance issued by the Charity Commission in considering the activities of, and future plans for, the charity.

CRIN has regularly undertaken both quantitative and qualitative research to measure its impact and user satisfaction. This is then used to modify or adapt existing services and to develop new services.

Structure, governance and management

Governing document

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 22 July 2008 and registered as a charity on 17 September 2008. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding \pounds 1.

Recruitment and appointment of Members of the Council

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's Articles are known as members of the Council. The trustees are appointed by recommendation and invitation from current trustees and the charity's management. Invitations are extended to those well known to the sector in which the charity operates. The members of the Council shall be elected at each Annual General Meeting and shall hold office from the end of the meeting at which they are elected. Members of the Council shall hold office for up to two years and will be eligible for re-election for a further two terms.

Organisational structure

CRIN has a Council of up to 12 members who meet quarterly and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. At present the Council has 5 members (listed on page 1) from a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity.

A scheme of delegation is in place and day to day responsibility for the management of CRIN's work rests with the Director who line manages a team comprising of a senior child rights officer, two child rights officers, two policy officers, a communications officer, an operations coordinator, a news and contents editor and regional coordinators for Eurasia, the Middle East and North Africa and French speaking countries.

Arrangements or setting pay and remuneration are determined by our Pay Review Policy, which includes a cost of living review and an annual increment. This is subject to funds being available. For benchmarking we refer to annual salary surveys produced by "CharityComms" and "Harris Hill".

CRIN's strategy 2014 - 2018

CRIN aspires to a world in which children's rights are recognised, respected and enforced, and where every rights violation has a remedy. This vision is grounded in the UN Convention on the Rights of the Child. For 20 years, CRIN has formed part of a global movement, propelled by the Convention, to monitor violations of children's rights by sharing information and encouraging advocacy.

CRIN's current strategy uses the information, expertise and contacts we have gathered over 15 years to lead the charge in forcing change across all areas of children's rights. We want children's rights to be at the forefront of all global, regional and national policy discussions, we want to be able to support children and their advocates in accessing justice for violations they have suffered, and we want to work with them to develop an authoritative collective voice on all children's rights.

We are doing this by:

- 1. Monitoring children's rights violations globally;
- 2. Advocating for change by:

a) initiating policy discussions and

- b) challenging violations of children's rights through campaigns and legal advocacy;
- 3. Engaging relevant professionals in our work and documenting processes and experiences for others to replicate;
- 4. Strengthening staff and technological capacity.

Impact

CRIN regularly conducts monitoring and analysis of its activities and their outcomes across a variety of fields, both to directly inform ongoing policy and advocacy and in order to evaluate the impact of monitoring, advocacy methods and adjust and/or further develop practice.

Achievements and performance

If anything, we have probably over-achieved in 2016. This is a result of the culmination of two big research projects that we had been working on for years: an analysis of persistent violations, and access to justice. Our 2016 year of partnerships succeeded in building new relationships and consolidating established relationships from a range of international, regional and national experts, from United Nations agencies and regional human rights systems, as well as with grassroots organisations and law firms. Our capacity has increased and we are excited to be at a position to take forward new strategies that will increase our impact over the coming years.

1. Find ways of challenging ongoing violations of children's rights and accessing remedles for these abuses

Significant progress was made in 2016. This is mostly due to the completion of two large multi-year research projects: analysis of persistent violations, and access to justice. The first consists of collecting and analysing all recommendations from UN bodies on children's rights by country. The second consisted of analysing how every country's justice system can be used to challenge any child rights violation. Access to justice is the largest project CRIN has carried out, collaborating with a large number of other non-governmental organisations and law firms working on a pro bono basis. Comprehensive worldwide research has never been undertaken on access to justice for children so the project was primarily focused on putting together in depth reports on access to justice for children for 197 countries and publishing this information as a free resource for individuals and non-governmental organisations to use as a tool to improve access to justice for children and to inform our own advocacy work. This research was completed and launched throughout 2016 (see https://www.crin.org/en/home/law/access).

2. Specific violations of children's rights are increasingly challenged through policy debates, campaigns and legal advocacy

This work is done through our policy and advocacy work, both in reacting to external events, and in proactively challenging thinking on issues that relate to children. As a starting point, we systematically respond to calls for input from UN bodies and experts to ensure they always include a children's rights element, and we proactively develop policy discussions on new areas.

We made significant progress in 2016, with the publication, so far, of:

- A paper on minimum ages, which discusses a number of difficult issues in relation to children and their rights, including those that divide the children's rights community such as child labour and compulsory education. The paper was drafted with input from a number of external experts. We are working with UNICEF and the EU on global research of minimum ages.
- We contributed to the UN Committee on the Rights of the Child (CRC) discussion on the environment through a submission, by being on the panel and coordinating social media coverage.
- A joint paper with Child Soldiers International to the Office of the Prosecutor (OTP) of the International Criminal Court (ICC) on their Policy on Children.
- A joint statement to the UN discussion on drugs and youth calling for a rights based approach to dealing with drugs and children.
- A submission to the first UN Forum on Human Rights, Democracy and the Rule of Law calling for in depth discussions on children's right to freedom of expression and assembly, the right to vote and access to justice. We will participate in the Forum in November.

- A submission was made in response to the call for input for The Office of the United Nations High Commissioner for Human Rights (OHCHR) report on terrorism and human rights, the effects of terrorism and counter-terrorism measures on children's rights.
- A submission to Protection of the Rights of the Child and 2030 Agenda for Sustainable Development.
- Submissions for our inhuman sentencing campaign to the UN Secretary-General (SG) on children and the death penalty, and country specific submissions to the CRC and the Universal Periodic Review (UPR). Our recommendations were fully represented in the SG's report and taken up by the CRC and States during the UPR.

- Submission on children in situations of migration to the Migrant Workers Committee;

Submission for OHCHR's report on climate change and the enjoyment of child rights.

3. Our network is broadened to encourage mutually supportive action and the involvement of everyone who can play a role in helping to fulfil children's rights

Over the past year, our work has been supported by a range of international and regional experts, from United Nations agencies and regional human rights systems, as well as other professional sectors, in particular law firms and independent lawyers, but also academics and translators. We continue to reach out to existing organisations and networks to identify new ways of collaborating, in particular with human rights organisations working thematically, including on privacy, freedom of expression, digital rights, LGBTI, health, the environment and climate change, to name but a few.

A few new and significant partnerships include:

- To lay the groundwork for the UN's global study on children deprived of liberty, we continued our work on juvenile justice generally, including collecting data on children in detention around the world, calling for higher ages of criminal responsibility for children in a newly formed advocacy group on justice for children. We are also actively participating in the coalition of NGOs working alongside the UN Independent Expert who will lead the UN Study.
- To follow up on our work on sexual violence by peacekeepers, we are reaching out to different actors to identify joint advocacy opportunities. A strategy is currently being drafted with partners.
- A new Legal Advisory Panel is being formed to support our recently adopted legal strategy;
- We have formed a new partnership in the Middle East with the Emirates Human Rights Association (EHRA), with whom we are organising a regional workshop in 2017. Issues that will be addressed include: access to justice, such as national human rights institutions and complaints mechanisms, as well as specific regional issues such as recruitment of children by state and non-state armed groups.

In order to ensure the impact of our work reaches NGOs and activists beyond our network, we continue to produce guides and toolkits for others to replicate our strategies and tactics.

Some progress was made:

- We published an advocacy guide on sexual abuse by peacekeepers which maps opportunities for joint advocacy. We have received positive feedback from both international NGOs and governments who have been using this guide to help inform and guide their work.
- We are working on our guide to legal advocacy. The aim of this guide is to capture the experiences from our workshops, with practical steps for how to replicate the workshops, and more importantly, how to develop a national legal advocacy strategy on children's rights. This is something we want to develop more in the coming two years. We envisage NGOs being able to use a template strategy and adapt it to their country situation.

4. Strengthened staff and technological capacity

CRIN are excited to be developing new areas of our work:

- A Caribbean strategy was developed in 2016 and a new member of staff based in the region is conducting a regional analysis of children's rights violations and will organise a legal advocacy workshop in 2017;
- We have our first digital strategy and accompanying roadmap in place. We have been working over the last 12 months on moving towards this new vision with our partners, Code Positive.

Funding

There has not been much progress. Despite a narrowing pool of human rights donors, in particular to those that speak out and want to change the system, we continue to apply for funding, both for core, project and regional work. Core funding for children's rights-based work is particularly scarce and donors' funding criteria is increasingly focused on child welfare. While no new funding has been approved, we have at least begun discussions with new donors, both in the environment and legalistic fields. The new fundraising strategy will be in place by summer 2017.

Plans for future periods

- Il All the latest children's rights news and analysis as usual;
- Continue to develop new interactive sections on the website;
- Collect case studies on successful campaigns;
- Expand CRIN's work in new regions including the Caribbean, and continue to increase the information provision in CRIN's current working languages (Arabic, French, Russian and Spanish);
- E Facilitate and document legal advocacy workshops;
- A campaign on children's right to information;
- Continue to campaign to challenge sexual violence against children in religious institutions;
- Continue to call for transparency in UN and regional human rights systems through joint campaigns;
- B Push for broader debate and action on children's rights and the environment;
- Look at the growing privatisation of education to benefit the privileged few at the expense of the many;
- Consider children's rights in the digital domain.

Financial review

Total income for the year amounted to £591,986 (2015: £615,875). Our main funders during the year to 31 December 2016 include the Norwegian Ministry of Foreign Affairs, Oak Foundation, Save the Children Sweden and the Swedish International Development Agency (SIDA). We have also received funding from a private donor.

Total expenditure amounted to \pounds 599,308 (2015: \pounds 666,612) resulting in a small deficit for the year of \pounds 7,322 (2015: \pounds 50,737).

The charity's assets are held primarily in cash on deposit which at 31 December 2016 amounted to $\pounds 627,239$. Approximately $\pounds 400,000$ of this balance represents funding received in advance towards the next financial year and which has been treated as deferred income.

Total funds at 31 December 2016 amounted to £218,266, all of which is unrestricted.

Principal risks and uncertainties faced by CRIN include withdrawal of funding and the impact this would have. As mentioned on page 6, we continue to fundraise and look for new donors to broaden our funding base. We also need to regularly review our reserves policy to ensure we are able to meet commitments and planned objectives.

Factors likely to affect future financial performance are exchange rate fluctuations. We have seen in the last three years the impact the strength and weakness of sterling has had on the donations we receive. To counter this, we have decided in 2017 to hedge our foreign currency receipts. This will allow us to manage our funds more efficiently.

Fundraising

CRIN is revising its fundraising strategy to safeguard CRIN and provide as far as possible a continuing secure financial base. Fundraising activities are part of the core work of staff, mostly undertaken by the CRIN Director with support from all staff members.

Reserves policy

The CRIN Council has agreed to continue the policy of maintaining free reserves in unrestricted general funds to cover three months running costs. As these costs change frequently, this is reviewed and updated at every board meeting. Unrestricted reserves at 31 December 2016 amount to £218,266 and this represents approximately four months of total expenditure.

Risk management

CRIN has been operational as an independent organisation since January 2009. At this time, the Trustees established a number of policies and procedures to minimise the risks that the charity may be subject to. CRIN is developing a detailed risk register, to be approved by the CRIN council.

Trustees' responsibilities statement

The trustees (who are also directors of Child Rights International Network for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

In so far as the trustees are aware:

there is no relevant audit information of which the charitable company's auditor is unaware; and

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2016

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Basis of Preparation

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 (as updated through Update Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Practice as it applies from 1 January 2015.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

b) Fixed Assets

Tangible fixed assets are stated at cost less depreciation.

Depreciation is provided on fixed assets at rates calculated to write off the cost of each asset, less any estimated residual value, over their expected useful lives as follows:-

c) Income Recognition

Income is recognised on an accruals basis having regard to the charity's entitlement to the income, its probability of receipt and whether the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability. Income is deferred when there is a donor imposed condition specifying the time period in which the income may be expended or in accordance with agreed budgets.

d) Expenditure and Irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is included under the heading 'Charitable activities' which includes all costs directly associated with meeting the charity's objectives and also those costs necessary to support such activities.

The charity does not currently expend any resources purely for the purpose of raising funds.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the associated expense.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES/contd...

e) Funds

Unrestricted general funds can be used at the Trustees' discretion for any of the activities carried out by the charity. Unrestricted designated funds are earmarked by the Trustees for activities in future periods. Restricted funds must be used in accordance with the wishes of the donor.

f) Pensions

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme open to employees with an Employer's Contribution fixed at 5.5% of gross salary. Employees can voluntarily contribute to the scheme at a level decided by them. Employees wishing to opt-out may do so. The board of trustees has agreed to allow staff members to operate an alternative pension scheme to be agreed with the management at a Council meeting. Contributions payable to the scheme are charged as an expense in the period to which they relate.

g) Operating Leases

Operating lease payments are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities over the period of the lease.

h) Foreign Currencies

Transactions in foreign currencies are recorded at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of the transaction. Monetary assets and liabilities denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rate ruling at the balance sheet date. All exchange gains and losses are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities.
