OUR AIMS AND OBJECTIVES

Purpose and objectives

Our charity's purpose, as set out in the objects contained in the company's Memorandum of Association, is to advance the education of young people of exceptional musical ability or potential who are aged between six and 18 years in all aspects of music and musicianship. In short, Sheffield Music Academy (the Academy) exists to help young musicians fulfil their potential.

We are part of a network run under the auspices of the Department for Education's (DfE's) Music and Dance Scheme, which includes Centres for Advanced Training in music and dance, Specialist Residential Schools and Conservatoire Junior Departments.

Our aim is to raise aspirations for young people passionate about any form of music in which they show above average aptitude, not necessarily for a career in music and the performing arts, but in order that they may make the most of their skills and talents, develop their self-confidence and in their turn contribute to the musical activities of their schools, areas and communities. Our aim fully reflects the purposes that the charity was set up to further.

Ensuring our work delivers our aims

We review our aims, objectives and activities each year. This review covers the year ending 31 July 2019 and looks at what we achieved and the outcomes of our work during that period. The review looks at the success of each key activity and the benefits they have brought to those groups of people we are set up to help.

Our review also helps us to ensure that our aims, objectives and activities remain focused on our stated purposes. We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities. In particular, the Trustees consider how planned activities will contribute to the aims and objectives they have set.

The focus of our work

As well as providing education for talented young musicians, we have focused on finding additional ways of funding that education. The strategies we used to meet these objectives included:

- Ensuring that every student receives individual support, choosing from a number of core and optional classes at our Sheffield-based Academy which runs for 30 Saturdays during term time;
- Employing highly skilled tutors in a wide range of classical instruments;
- Providing regular opportunities to play in orchestras and ensembles;
- Organising workshops, from specialist masterclasses to intense ensemble training, welcoming experts in a range
 of instruments, music and health, folk music, rock, jazz and music production;
- · Supporting and encouraging performance as a way of developing self-confidence and positive mental health;
- Participating in external workshops that enable students to benefit from the Academy's close partnerships with various music organisations in Sheffield and the surrounding area;
- Raising additional funds to supplement the grants made available through the Music and Dance Scheme. Grants
 are means tested using the Department for Education's criteria.

HOW OUR ACTIVITIES DELIVER PUBLIC BENEFIT

All our charitable activities focus on the education of young people of school age of exceptional musical ability or potential and are undertaken to further our charitable purposes for the public benefit.

Who used and benefited from our services?

Our objects and funding enable us to provide services to students who reside mainly in a geographical area that includes North East Lincolnshire, North Nottinghamshire, South Yorkshire and Derbyshire.

Our main achievements that delivered public benefit in 2018-19 included:

- Providing weekly lessons to 113 young musicians who attended the Academy, through a programme of individual lessons, aural, theory and musicianship classes, choral and chamber groups and orchestral ensembles;
- Continuing our successful Student Ambassador Scheme, which this year provided opportunities for our graduates to mentor students, assist in the office and develop their arts administration and leadership skills;
- Expanding the Sheffield Music Academy Infants scheme, now in its second pilot year with 27 six to eight-year
 old students; studying foundation strings and wind on violin, cello and recorder, and fundamental musicianship
 classes;
- Increasing the number of concerts in city centre venues to expand both our audience and the accessibility of our offer to students from across the city region;
- Raising our profile and inclusivity within the local community;
- Broadening our teaching provision, welcoming experts in new musical fields from outside the region;
- Taking on additional teaching space at Birkdale to accommodate the expanding brass and wind tuition;
- Continuing to diversify income through increased grant funding and sponsorship;
- Enhancing the administrative team, focusing on marketing and digital output in order to grow audiences, potential donors and student applications.

ARTISTIC HIGHLIGHTS OF 2018-19

During 2018-19 we welcomed 18 new students and said farewell to ten former students at the end of the previous year. We were also joined by six new members of staff who helped us to further raise our standards of musicianship and teaching.

We increased our formal collaboration with other music education delivery partners in the region – particularly our relationship with The Halle Orchestra:

- More than 100 members of the SMA community attended its opening concert of the 2018-19 season, and we
 have performed in the foyer of the City Hall at every Halle concert in the season. Our students were also invited
 to attend some of its rehearsals;
- We have also worked on a number of projects with Music in the Round, Sheffield City Hall and regional music hubs.

We made a significant contribution to Classical Sheffield 2019 Festival, being invited to give three performances. The first two consisted of chamber performances including students of all ages, and the third involved musicians from the Halle Orchestra joining the SMA Chamber Orchestra for an inspiring performance of Brahms' First Symphony and a virtuosic performance of Grieg's Piano Concerto given by one of our senior piano students.

Other highlights included:

- Continuing the 'SMA Professional Series' where professional musicians are invited to perform on a Friday night, followed by a masterclass and workshop at Academy the following day;
- The successful auditions by a number of our students at music conservatoires and universities, including the Royal Academy of Music, the Royal Northern College of Music, the Birmingham Conservatoire, and the Universities of Oxford and Cambridge;
- Taking our best performing string players on a short tour of Tuscany, where students gave four inspirational performances, with a different programme for each concert;
- The many fabulous performances, including concerto performances, at our annual Graduation Concert;
- Our collaborative end of year project the Sheffield Cathedral Concert, performing Beethoven Mass in C and Mozart Sinfonia Concertante with student soloists, staff and students and parents from SMA; and performers from our local community;
- One of our students achieving a lead role in School of Rock, the musical on the West End.

OTHER HIGHLIGHTS OF 2018-19

The Harmony Works Project

In 2018 the Sheffield Music Academy joined forces with the Sheffield Music Hub to explore the creation of a permanent home for music education in the city. Both organisations are serving increasing numbers of children and young people but each relies on renting temporary spaces, spread across the Sheffield City Region; none of which are designed for music or fit for expansion.

Harmony Works is a bold and compelling vision to create an inspirational new centre for music education and performance which will touch the lives of thousands of children and young people in the Sheffield City Region. A permanent home would provide a highly visible, accessible, physical focus for music education, open to the public and with a full array of practice, rehearsal and performance spaces not available elsewhere in the region.

While Harmony Works is an ambitious vision for a small organisation, much has already been achieved by the highly skilled and committed team of trustees, staff and partner organisations:

- Our first step was to work with the Faculty of Architecture at The University of Sheffield to test our idea and produce an initial set of drawings and vision document;
- We have undertaken significant stakeholder engagement, locally and nationally, e.g with Sheffield City Council, the Arts Council, and the Castlegate Partnership, and have sought advice and input from organisations and individuals who have expertise and track record in running significant capital projects;
- We have identified a suitable building in the heart of Sheffield city centre and secured an option to purchase it;
- We have completed a fundraising feasibility exercise to identify ways to secure the funds necessary to acquire the building, to refurbish it and to pay the associated professional fees and costs;
- Our scheme is supported by a Heritage Statement and we have had a positive response to our formal Pre-App from Sheffield City Council. The Heritage Statement considers our use 'extremely appropriate', enabling it to perform the 'semi-public, semi-civic function it did when first built';
- We have secured initial funding from the Architectural Heritage Fund to undertake viability work including the planning Pre-App, independent valuation and survey work.

Next steps

Although we have benefited from early stage financial support from the Architectural Heritage Fund, covering vital viability and survey work, we have significant urgent workstreams to undertake for which we require an injection of core funding to employ additional staff and freelancers.

Only then will we be in a position to establish Harmony Works as a new limited company and registered charity through which the capital programme will be delivered. In 2020-21 we hope to deliver Phase One of the fundraising plan to purchase the building by December 2020 and to assemble a professional team to submit a Planning Application.

In a City Region where creativity thrives, Harmony Works has the potential to instigate something truly transformative, bringing back into use an historic building and creating a place where outstanding music education and performance can touch the lives of thousands of children and young people.

FINANCIAL REVIEW OF 2018-19

Our total income for the 12-month period was £378,120, some £39,336 more than we received in 2017-18. The increase was mostly due to restricted funds for the Harmony Works project that we received from the Sheffield Music Hub and the Architectural Heritage Fund, and additional fees from parents and guardians of students, including those joining the second year of the Infant scheme.

Expenditure was £387,769, some £60,874 more than we spent in the same period last year. The increase was mostly due to planned additional investments in teaching provision to strengthen and widen the musical offer, increased depreciation charges on our growing collection of instruments, new tuition packages for all our students (sweatshirts, bags and practice diaries), and fees associated with the Harmony Works project that were met by the specific grants received.

As a result of these year on year increases in income and expenditure, the overall net movement in our funds for the period after the revaluation of our Steinway piano, was a surplus of £5,351. This surplus can be further broken down into the following:

The underlying shortfall of income compared to expenditure in the year related to unrestricted core activities of £8,363 is broadly in line with the budgeted deficit, as agreed by the Trustees, of £5,425.

The Trustees are optimistic that the Academy can continue to live within its means, while increasing its student numbers year on year, with no adverse impact on the quality of its activities. The Academy has continued to offer financial support to students to supplement the grants made available through the Music and Dance Scheme, and to further improve and expand our collection of musical instruments for use by students, by purchasing instruments totaling £24,615 in the year, £4,000 of which was funded by a grant from the D'Oyly Carte Charitable Trust.

Principal funding sources

The principal funding sources for the charity are grants from the Department for Education's Music and Dance Scheme, and fees paid by parents and guardians of the Academy's students. While we remain heavily reliant on income from the Scheme (64% of our income in 2018-19, before donations in kind are included), we continue to diversify our sources of voluntary income and other grants. We are extremely grateful for the continued support of the Friends of Sheffield Music Academy, our business sponsors and local grant giving trusts.

Investment Policy

The donations we receive enable the Academy to maintain its reserves at a prudent level. As yet we do not have sufficient funds for long-term investment, but our reserves are split between two separate banks to ensure they remain protected by the Financial Services Compensation Scheme. A proportion of our reserves has once again been invested in the purchase of several key instruments for use by students at the Academy that should hold or increase in value over the next five years.

Reserves Policy

The Trustees are risk averse as regards the Academy's reserves, and aim to maintain sufficient free reserves in general funds (net current assets and assets that can be readily converted to cash) to ensure that the Academy's main operations can continue for a period of at least six months, or 26 weeks.

At 31 July 2019, annual operating costs were £373,622. General net current assets amounted to £91,434 and £76,662 was held as fixed asset instruments considered to be readily convertible to cash, giving a total of £169,096, which is equivalent to 23.5 weeks. In addition £5,316 was held in a designated fund at 31 July 2019, being the unused element of matched funding set aside by the trustees for the Harmony Works project.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

The Academy is a charitable company limited by guarantee. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association that established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association which are based upon the Charity Commission's model with only very slight modification. In the event of the company being wound up its members are each required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1. In November 2019 the Charity Commission approved revisions the Articles to permit meetings of the Trustees to be held either in person or by suitable electronic means, and to clarify the ways in which the Chair may to take urgent action subject to retrospective approval of the Board.

Patrons

We have two Patrons supporting Sheffield Music Academy:

- Elizabeth Watts is one of Britain's leading sopranos and is much in demand throughout the world as a recitalist
 and concert singer. She was a chorister at Norwich Cathedral and studied archaeology at Sheffield University
 before attending the Royal College of Music.
- Ryan Wigglesworth is a pianist, conductor and composer and Principal Guest Conductor of the Halle. He was born in Wincobank, Sheffield and attended King Edward VII School and was a Cathedral choirboy.

Recruitment and Appointment of Board of Trustees

There must not be less than three Trustees but there is no maximum number. Trustees must retire after three years' service but may offer themselves for re-election or further co-option.

A person qualified and wishing to become a trustee must be aged 18 years or over and must either be recommended by the Trustees or be nominated for election by a member of the Charity. The Trustees may co-opt individuals to the Board during the year for their particular expertise (e.g. financial or legal advice) through an ordinary resolution of the Board, but a co-opted Trustee holds office only until the next AGM.

Every Trustee must sign a declaration of willingness to act as a charity trustee before he or she is eligible to vote at any Board meeting.

The Trustees of the Charity for the year ended 31 July 2019 are listed on page 1.

All Trustees give of their time freely and no trustee remuneration or expenses were paid in the year.

Trustees are required to disclose all relevant interests and register them with the Academy's Music Director and in accordance with the Academy's policy withdraw from decisions where a conflict of interest arises. Two trustees who are also parents of students of the Academy withdrew from decisions about student fees during the year.

Organisational structure

The Board meet four times during 2018-19. At its meetings the Trustees agreed the broad strategy and areas of activity for the Charity, including consideration of grant making, investment, reserves and risk management policies and performance.

During the year, the Board established a Working Group to oversee the Harmony Works project. Its membership included two trustees (Ian Falconer and Emily Pieters) and the Music Director. The Group was advisory, with no delegated powers except the permission to approve expenditure within budgets already determined by the Board.

The day-to-day administration of the Academy's activities, including its curriculum, staffing and student recruitment is delegated to the Music Director and his small administrative team.

Risk Management

The Trustees have considered the major risks which the charity is exposed to and have reviewed those risks and established systems and procedures to manage them.

The Trustees consider that the Academy's greatest financial risks are the possible loss or reduction in its major source of core funding (i.e. the grant provided by the Music and Dance Scheme), its over-reliance on one source of funding and any unfunded liabilities arising from the Harmony Works project. Loans and donations received during the year and the Academy's restrictive budgetary control procedures helped to mitigate these risks and the Trustees continue to review alternative future funding strategies.

The most significant non-financial risks are that the Academy fails to meet its legal responsibilities concerning safeguarding, data protection and employment law, and that it fails to protect its IT systems and data. The Board includes trustees with practical experience of safeguarding and legal and data protection issues and has commissioned independent IT advice that will help mitigate these risks.

Finally, as its pupil numbers continue to grow, there is a growing risk that the Academy's teaching premises are not fit for future purpose, in terms of capacity and quality. These risks are being addressed by the Harmony Works project, which has its own Project Risk Register. The Trustees have sought advice and input from organisations and individuals who have expertise and track record in running significant capital projects and are establishing a new charitable entity and trading subsidiary for the delivery of the project, with the relevant expertise and track record.

PLANS FOR 2019-20 AND BEYOND

Looking to the future, the Sheffield Music Academy has plans to:

- Build on our relationship with Music in the Round:
 - o Performing in Music in the Round's May Festival;
 - o Welcoming players from Ensemble 360 to give workshops and masterclasses;
 - o encouraging students to attend concerts;
- Celebrate the 250th anniversary of Beethoven's birth in 2020 with performances of:
 - Beethoven Symphony No.5, joined by players from Ensemble 360;
 - Beethoven Symphony No.9 with Alumni and singers from the community.
- Create a New Music Ensemble with Composer in Residence, Daniel Saleeb;
- Introduce a composition competition;
- Introduce a scales competition for instrumentalists;
- Trial sponsored practice;
- Continue to grow the standard and numbers of student applications, and to further strengthen our teaching staff to include new instrumental offerings in brass, composition and strings;
- Welcome the first year of SMA Infants to the main Academy, providing our first real opportunity to assess its' achievements and scope.

TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES IN RELATION TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

The Trustees (who are also directors of Sheffield Music Academy for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Annual Report and financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each accounting period, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- State whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- Prepare the financial statements on a going concern basis unless it is appropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in operation.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence for taking reasonable steps or the prevention and detection of fraud and irregularities. The Trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the charity and financial information included on the Academy's website.

The Trustee's Annual Report has been prepared in accordance with the special provisions of Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies. The company is currently exempt from a statutory audit because its annual gross income does not exceed £1 million.

1 Accounting Policies

(a) General

Sheffield Music Academy is a charitable company in the United Kingdom limited by guarantee. In the event that the charity is wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity. The address of the registered office is given in the charity information on page 1 of these financial statements.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 (as updated through Update Bulletin1 published on 2 February 2016), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS102), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice. The financial statements have adopted Charities SORP (FRS102) Bulletin 1 and taken advantage of the exemption to the prepare a Statement of Cash Flows.

Sheffield Music Academy meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. The financial statements are prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity and are rounded to the nearest £.

(b) Income

Income is recognised when the organisation has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

(c) Donated goods and services

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

(d) Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

(e) Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash on hand and call deposits, and other short-term highly liquid investments that are readily convertible to a known amount of cash and are subject to an insignificant risk of change in value.

(f) Assets

Depreciation has been calculated to write down the cost or valuation, less estimated residual value, of all tangible fixed assets over their expected useful live, as follows:

Musical Instruments of significant value

At valuation

Other Musical Instruments

20% Reducing Balance

Office equipment

20% Reducing Balance

The Trustees have undertaken to carry out an impairment review of the musical instruments of significant value each year, to ensure no significant factor has affected the value during the year. In addition to this the instruments will be revalued by an expert every 3-5 years with any move in the valuation being reflected in the asset valuation. Any increase or decrease in value will be reflected in the asset valuation and the revaluation reserve.

(g) Trade debtors

Trade debtors are amounts due from customers for merchandise sold or services performed in the ordinary course of business.

Trade debtors are recognised initially at the transaction price. They are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method, less provision for impairment. A provision for the impairment of trade debtors is established when there is objective evidence that the company will not be able to collect all amounts due according to the original terms of receivables.

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Notes to the Accounts - continued For the year ended 31 July 2019

1 Accounting Policies - continued

(h) Trade creditors

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of business from suppliers. Accounts payable are classified as current liabilities if the company does not have an unconditional right, at the end of the reporting period, to defer settlement of the creditor for at least twelve months after the reporting date. If there is an unconditional right to defer settlement for at least twelve months after the reporting date, they are presented as non-current liabilities.

Trade creditors are recognised initially at the transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

(i) Funds

Unrestricted funds are donations and other income receivable or generated for the objects of the organisation without further specified purpose and are available as general funds.

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the funder.

(i) Taxation

As a charity, Sheffield Music Academy is exempt from tax on income and gains falling within the available tax exemptions to the extent that these are applied to its charitable objects. No tax charges have arisen in the charity.

(k) Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.
