Trustees Annual Report from 1st June 2018 to 31st May 2019

It was a significant year for Yeleni as we celebrated our Macmillan Quality Environment Mark, awarded in February 2018 and officially recognised, with a plaque unveiled by Lady Darnley in September 2018.

Governance

We welcomed Mr Peter Rowland as a new trustee. He has long term experience of working with Macmillan; he brings with him a wealth of relevant knowledge of fundraising and charity work. We feel privileged to have gained Lady Darnley as a Patron.

Outcomes

We had a 54% increase in cancer clients coming to us for assessment and therapies, which was largely due to the community liaison work taken on by Beth Hudson. Our clients all gave positive feedback about their experiences here at Yeleni. We are working on compiling more outcome-related data as funders ask for this more and more.

Projects

Our collaboration with St Michael's Hospice, who had approached us with a view to running Wellbeing Self-Help Skills Workshops, was a great success. Our "pilot" course of 6 weeks, a workshop every week for patients and carers, was very popular with the attendees who all gave good feedback. We provided the tutors, course structure, course materials and venue. St Michael's are unable to fund future workshops, so we are looking to fund and run these ourselves. We have a skilled team of therapists and a centre of excellence (reference the MQEM) from which to offer this extended service in our community.

Outreach and Events

We worked with many other organisations this year to raise the profile of our charity and form better supportive networks to benefit those living with cancer in our community. We had promotional stands at the community Reach Out event, Hereford's March for Men, Brain Tumour Support Awareness event, Crohns and Colitis Charity fund-raiser, Co-op branches, Asda, Santander and Nationwide. We delivered therapies at Leominster Surgery during Carer's Week and at the Macmillan Skin Cancer Awareness event. Services for Independent Living selected Yeleni as their Charity of the Year and held events to raise funds. National/local cancer supporting charities were contacted e.g. Yeleni's information now appears on the Target Ovarian Cancer website.

Beth regularly represents us at business networking events/charity forums and visits businesses in Herefordshire. This is bringing us vital benefits and connections. We worked in collaboration with other cancer support organisations in Herefordshire to produce a leaflet and poster, complementing the NHS initiative, Living With and Beyond Cancer. Nicky headed the project and Macmillan funded it. The intention was to get concise and comprehensive information into GP surgeries, hospital departments and other public areas. It has been welcomed, as it demonstrates cooperation in working for best outcomes for those living with cancer.

Funding

We continue to have secure funding, with a strategy of applying to many trusts, not depending on fewer larger donations. Grant funding applications, carried out by Kate, account for 30-40% of our income a year at present.

This year we were fortunate to receive from varied funding sources:

Nicky Heath and her partner Peter both shaved their heads, having first had very colourful hair in order to attract maximum sponsorship. This also invited debates and awareness around the hair loss experienced by cancer patients having chemotherapy. We dubbed it the "Bald is Beautiful" campaign. The head shaves raised a very healthy £4300.

Mike Chandler, whose daughter had cancer and came to Yeleni for support, ran the London Marathon for us, raising a stunning £26,260.

Sarah Bayley and Guy Sloan started a schedule of running a race each month during 2019. We are very grateful to them both.

Shane Llewelyn raised £550 selling T shirts he had designed. He chose to donate the money to Yeleni which was appreciated.

Beccy and Andy raised £230 by walking from Land's End to Cape Wrath.

Friends of Yeleni, Cliff and Oremi, donated £5000 which was very generous. The Aviva Community Fund Crowd-funder raised £1020. The Barrels Pub donated £750. £765 was raised in memory of a dear client. Donation Reiki offered by our volunteer Sheila raised £1055 and face painting by Nicky raised a further £909.90.

Grants were given by the EF Bulmer Benevolent Fund, The Eveson Trust, St James's Place Foundation, Pink Ribbon Foundation, The Sobell Trust, Gillian Bulmer Trust and more. We are very appreciative of the support of these trusts.

Kate has started work on a bid to the Big Lottery. We are through to Stage Two; the proposal will require refinement. A decision will be made in late 2019.

Staffing

This year, Nicola Rowland joined the team on a part time basis to cover reception and administration. This allows Beth more time to do valuable community work. Jenny Edwards, our Bowen Therapist, also does reception work.

Nicky (CEO and founder) remains responsible for the overall running of the centre, supported by our Trustees.

Kate is our Funding Co-ordinator - undertaking grant applications, contributing to governance and evaluating feedback to support applications.

Beth is the Community Liaison Co-ordinator – promoting Yeleni and raising awareness of this valuable resource in Herefordshire. Establishing mutually beneficial relationships is bearing fruit, as footfall increases and fund-raising opportunities, linked to connections, present themselves.

Structure, Governance and Management

Objectives and Activities

The objectives of the charity are to help relieve sickness and preserve and protect the good health of people with cancer and their carers by providing or assisting in the provision of complementary therapies, information, education, advice, support & counselling.

The company was incorporated on 17th May 2006 and received charitable status on 26 April 2007.

The centre opened on 1st April 2010.

Reserves Policy

It is intended to maintain sufficient reserves to cover three months expenditure and management support costs.

Notes to the financial statements for the year ended 31 May 2019

1. Accounting policies

a. Basis of preparation

The financial statements have prepared under the historical cost convention. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice – Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP 2005) issued in March 2005, applicable accounting standards, and the Companies Act 2006. The principal accounting policies adopted in the preparation of the financial statements are set out below.

b. Incoming resources

Voluntary income including donations, gifts and legacies and grants that provide core funding or are of a general nature are recognized where there is entitlement, certainty of receipt and the amount can be measured with sufficient reliability.

Investment income is recognized on a receivable basis.

c. Volunteers and donated services and facilities

The value of services provided by volunteers is not incorporated into these financial statements. Further details of the contribution made by volunteers can be found in the trustees' annual report.

Where services are provided to the charity as a donation that would normally be purchased from our suppliers, this contribution is included in the financial statements at an estimate based on the value of the contribution to the charity. Donated services and facilities are analysed in note 6.

d. Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised when a liability is incurred.

- Costs of generating funds are those incurred in attracting voluntary income.
- Governance costs include those incurred in the governance of the charity and its assets and are
 primarily associated with constitutional and statutory requirements.

e. Irrecoverable VAT

The charity is not registered for VAT and accordingly irrecoverable VAT is charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred.

f. Funds structure

All funds are unrestricted income funds.

2. Legal status of the Trust

The Trust is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of winding up is limited to £1.

3. Turnover

The total turnover of the company for the year has been derived from its activity wholly undertaken in the UK.
