STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing Document

Inclusion Hampshire was formed on 17th July 2015 and is governed by written constitution. Inclusion Hampshire is a Charitable Incorporated Organisation (CIO) registered with the Charity Commission. There were no activities until 31st August 2015, it commenced its charitable activities from 1st September 2015.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Objects of the Charity

To promote for the benefit of the inhabitants of the County of Hampshire, without distinction of sex, sexual orientation, race or of political, religious or other opinions, by associating together the said inhabitants and the local authorities, voluntary and other organisations in a common effort to advance education and to improve facilities in the interest of social welfare for the recreation and other leisure time occupations with the objects of improving the conditions of life of the said inhabitants.

Organisational structure

The Trustees are responsible for governance, including setting the Charity's strategy and overall policies and reviewing progress against objectives. The Chief Executive, working closely with Trustees, carries out the day-to-day management of the Charity. However, all Trustees are encouraged to take an interest in the Charity's project work and take an active part in the management thereof.

Appointment of Trustees

Trustees are appointed by a resolution passed at properly convened meeting of the Trustees. Each new Trustee is appointed for a minimum of three years.

Trustee Induction and Training

Trustees are formally inducted in the work of the Charity and their own responsibilities as a trustee over a period of months. This initially involves discussions with other Trustees, briefing by the Chairman and Chief Executive, a review of the latest Annual Report, Annual Accounts, and current projects. Any training or education the new trustee needs is scheduled as required.

Related parties

The only related parties are the Trustees. They receive no remuneration, but expenses reimbursed are as shown in the notes to the Financial Statements.

Risk management

The Trustees have a risk management strategy, which comprises:

- An annual review of the risks the Charity may face

a) The establishment of systems and procedures to mitigate those risks identified- The implementation of procedures designed to minimise any potential impact on the Charity should those risks materialise

b) On-going reviews carried out during the year to ensure continued awareness particularly with regard to specific projects.

Trustee Responsibilities

Law applicable to charities in England and Wales requires the Trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the Charity's financial activities during the year and of its financial position at the end of the year. In preparing those financial statements the Trustees are required to: - Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently; - Make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;- State whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements; and - Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the Charity will continue in business.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Charities Act 2011. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

The objective of the Charity is:

For the public benefit to promote the education (including social and physical training) of people under the age of 25 years in Hampshire in such ways as the charity trustees think fit, including by: Providing their education (including the study of music or other arts), to undertake travel in furtherance of that education or to prepare for entry to any occupation, trade or profession on leaving any educational establishment.

Inclusion Hampshire meets its charitable objects by developing and managing projects and services

that will increase engagement with vulnerable young people living in Hampshire. In particular, the Charity seeks to engage with young people aged 13 - 25, who are at risk of disengagement or exclusion from school or have left school with minimal or no qualifications. The charity works with them and their families in the aim of helping them make a positive change in their lives. In achieving these objects, the Charity has due regard for its duties in respect of public benefit.

The charity focuses on delivering the following services:

Alternative Education Provision (AEP)

During the period, Inclusion Hampshire worked with secondary schools and pupil referral units across Hampshire to provide educational packages for young people aged 13-18 who face challenges in accessing or coping with mainstream school. Many of those who are referred to us experience or have experienced, at least one or more of the following situations:

- Mental health issues
- Poverty
- Being/been looked after by the Local Authority
- Substance addictions
- Bereavement of a parent/sibling
- Special Educational Needs
- School refusal/phobia

As part of its AEP, Inclusion Hampshire manages provisions in Chineham, Basingstoke and Hook, Hampshire. Both sites are self contained where young people can safely engage in individually tailored educational activity, supported by a multidisciplinary team of trained staff, for part of their school timetable.

Our AEP has evolved to become specialised in mental health support and works with some of the most vulnerable young people in the North Hampshire area identified and referred by schools and the Local Authority.

As an accredited Oxford, Cambridge, and RSA (OCR) Examination Centre, young people are able to achieve nationally recognised qualifications:

Functional Skills English entry level 3 - level 2 Functional Skills Maths Entry level 3 - level 2 Functional Skills ICT entry level 1 Employability Skills Award or Certificate level 1/2 Life and Living skills entry level 3

The qualifications are supplemented with work experience opportunities where appropriate, careers information, support with applying to college and/or Apprenticeships and Traineeships. Everything possible is done to support enable learners to progress to college or into work including accompanying learners to open days and interviews.

All students have access to bespoke mental health support in the form of counselling, mentoring, art and/or music, plus enrichment activities such as group games, table tennis and crafts.

Wider skills are taught through the OCR Life and Living curriculum, modules include SRE, keeping safe, anti-bullying work, online safety, emotional well being, employability and healthy lifestyles. Teaching takes place in small groups with group activities and discussions taking place weekly. Group sessions help learners to develop their social skills and knowledge of wider issues through their peers. Teaching is tailored to meet the needs of individual learners, with an appropriate mix of challenge and support to encourage critical thinking and debate.

50 young people benefitted from the AEP programme and attended Inclusion Hampshire during this period. 19 of these young people were in Yr11 and took exams with us.

Inclusion Hampshire offers teaching and support to learners and schools for those sitting GCSEs.

10 Year 11 learners returned to sit their GCSE exams, Inclusion Hampshire managers collaborated closely with schools to develop special arrangements to ensure that learners were given the best chance of success.

Post 16 Education Provision

Inclusion Hampshire supports young people from our AEP Programme reaching the age of 16 who require further mental health support, these learners have an EHCP in place which enables them to be funded by the Local Authority. During 2018/19 we received more referrals from Hampshire County Council of young people finishing school who have mental health issues and SEN who do not have a college or further education placement. 14 young people were supported in total.

The curriculum delivered for Post 16 learners mirrors our AEP curriculum with the opportunity to gain national qualifications. All learning is tailored to the individual and centred around the targets set within their EHCP.

Key achievements 2018/19

- In the academic year 2018/19 50 learners were supported Pre 16 and 14 learners were supported Post 16.
- Of these learners, 7 pre-16 learners reintegrated back into mainstream schools and 19 learners were year 11 who achieved a 77% pass rates across Functional Skills Maths and English.
- In Year 11 learners and 5 Post 16 learners moved on from Inclusion Hampshire this year and 91% Successfully transitioned to college or another mainstream training opportunity.
- In Year 11 learners and 5 Post 16 learners moved on from Inclusion Hampshire transitioned to college or another mainstream training opportunity.this year and 91% Successfully
- Successful application and DfE number received for Post 16 provision.
- 100% of new referrals engaged and attending, including those who were school refusers at referral.
- All learners access Life and Living curriculum and RSE.

The learners were able work at their own pace to explore and achieve goals.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial Review

There was a surplus on the general fund of £109,525 for the period ended 31st August 2019. Total funds carried forward at the period end were £191,294.

Essentially all restricted funds are externally funded and do not impose a charge on Inclusion Hampshire's own funds.

Reserves Policy

The aim of the reserve policy of the Charity is to build up and maintain sufficient reserves so that any shortfall in funding, which would result in a reduction in the organization's activities and its inability to meet immediate financial commitments, can be covered. The Trustees believe it is in the interest of the Charity that where unrestricted funds exceed the annual running cost of the Charity, such excess should be held as unrestricted reserves.

Risk Assessment

A formal risk assessment programme is in place using the Charities Commission guide. The Trustees review the major risks and their implications and steps are taken to mitigate potentially adverse effects. The procedures continue to be maintained and monitored on an on-going basis.

Incoming resources

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.
