<u>REPORT OF THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL</u> <u>for the Year Ended 31 December 2018</u>

The Parochial Church Council of the Ecclesiastical Parish of Walthamstow ("PCC") submits its annual report and financial statements for the year ended 31 December 2018. The financial statements have been prepared in the format prescribed by the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities (SORP2015) issued by the Charity Commissioners in 2017. The legal and administrative information set out earlier in this document forms part of this report.

The PCC co-operates with the incumbent in promoting the whole mission of the Church within its Parish and beyond. It also has responsibility for the non-stipendiary staff and the maintenance of its church buildings, the Rectory and other residential properties. In essence, the PCC is a consultative body that represents the views of the congregation as well as its own. It should communicate, where appropriate, any decisions of the PCC or its committees to the church; oversee and advise in the financial affairs of the church; pray and champion the vision for the church.

1. Structure, Governance & Management

1.1 Trustees

Governance in the parish brings together local operational leadership groups, with the Parochial Church Council (PCC), a parish-wide strategic body that is the sole legal entity. The PCC is a body corporate with perpetual succession. Members of the PCC are either ex officio or elected by the Parish Annual Meeting in accordance with the Church Representation Rules.

During 2018 the PCC met for five regular occasions (one of which was an away day) along with one special meeting held in April. Topics discussed were:

- February: We discussed the Parish's financial position along with staffing restructuring. The restructuring of our parish to be part of a Mission & Ministry Unit, The disbandment of Leadership Teams & the formation of Congregational Development Teams. The redevelopment application for St Mary's Western Patch.
- April: A special meeting was held to discuss our business plan.
- May: Discussion focused on our staffing restructuring, the future usage of St Stephen's building, St Gabriel's Nursery project & St Mary's Western Patch redevelopment project.
- July: Discussion focused on the future usage of St Stephen's building, St Gabriel's Nursery project & St Mary's Western Patch redevelopment project along with the Heritage Lottery Funded project for St Mary's Church.
- September: (Away Day) We grappled with our challenges as a church on visions and values. Our financial position along with St Stephen's building usage, St Gabriel's Nursery project & St Mary's Western Patch redevelopment project along with the Heritage Lottery Funded project for St Mary's Church.
- November: Discussions focused on our finance & a budget for 2018, communications within & outside the Parish. Changes to our worshipping patterns, St Stephen's building, St Gabriel's Nursery project & St Mary's Western Patch redevelopment project along with the Heritage Lottery Funded project for St Mary's Church.

In addition to this, it conducted all necessary legal business and continued to provide an overview and framework on strategy and finance.

In this year, the Parish explored new ways of meeting for leadership. St Luke's Time Team continued to meet as before. St Mary's developed the new Congregational Development Team exploring community organising practice as a means of growing and developing the missional and worshipping life of the church. At St Gabriel's, a small team of leaders met regularly with the Team Vicar to develop new leadership structures.

1.2 Standing Committee

This is the only committee required by law. It has power to transact the business of the PCC between its meetings, subject to any directions given by the PCC. The members of the standing committee were: The Team Rector, the Churchwardens along with the Parish Treasurer. The Standing Committee meets as agreed necessary by its members.

1.3 Staff

The Parish employs a number of staff in its own right in addition to the diocesan establishment of stipendiary/SSM (Self Supporting Ministry) clergy and a Title Post. In addition to the following, we benefit from the ministry of two licensed Readers, Mr. Robert Duddridge (St Mary's) and Ms. Helen Miller (St Luke's). During 2018, the paid staff comprised of the following:

1.4 Church Membership & Attendance

The updated Electoral Roll prepared for the 2018 APCM comprised 437 members (2017: 433). See also comment under section 3. Achievements & Performance, below.

The Church's primary concern and objective is the glory of God. Whilst it is the Church's policy to trust wholly in the Lord that He will work out His purpose to this end, the Church also acknowledges that it has a responsibility, both as individual members and as a body of members, for the identification and proper management of risks faced by the church in achieving its primary aim. The PCC has therefore assessed the major risks to which the church is exposed, in particular those relating to the specific operational areas of the charity, its investments and its finances. The PCC believes that, by monitoring reserve levels, by ensuring that controls exist over key financial systems, and by examining the operational risks faced by the church, it has established effective systems and procedures to mitigate those risks.

2. Activities & Strategies

Other Ministry Staff

The PCC gives due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit. To this end, the PCC organises various activities in order to enable ordinary people to live out their faith as part of our parish community.

The core of our activities is the weekly worship and discipleship of our seven congregations and their wider connections. Our clergy team has continued to respond to pastoral need and missional opportunity within and beyond the parish. In addition to regular hospital visiting, seeing people in distress or need, individual meetings for spiritual growth or organisational purposes and general ministerial leadership tasks we have conducted baptisms, funerals (in church and at local crematoria) and weddings within the parish.

As churches and as clergy, we seek to make a contribution to the life of our community. We are active members of Citizens UK, Waltham Forest Citizens (of which the Rector is Chair) and TELCO (the East London alliance). We are also committed to Forest Churches Emergency Night Shelter, Met Police Voluntary Chaplaincy, Waltham Forest Faith Forum, Walthamstow & Chingford Almshouses, School Governorship, Walthamstow Village Residents' Association, Farmers' Market Management, Waltham Forest Youth for Christ, Local Police Panels and Local Council Ward Panel meetings & Christians Against Poverty.

Many members of our congregations serve local charities, organisations, businesses and networks in voluntary and advisory capacities that contribute to the common good for all.

The Prayer House continued to resource and nourish the Parish, offering spaces of hospitality and prayer to members of the Parish and beyond. The Prayer House companions group continued to meet weekly and saw new members join. A number of people regularly use the prayer hut for contemplation and private prayer. A retreat to Pleshey Retreat House took place in August, giving a group an opportunity for deeper reflection and exploration of prayer.

We have a strong connection to the local Church of England Primary School and this relationship has developed significantly over years. The Rector serves as a Governor along with 3 other members of the church who serve on the governing board. Members of the clergy visit the school regularly to hold assembly. The Curate leads a Parent Prayer meeting fortnightly and we have been involved in developing and delivering RE curriculum.

To support and encourage church growth, our regular pattern of non-Sunday activities includes strong lay ministry in leadership and worship, Christians Against Poverty Debt Centre, smaller groups and courses (including groups for young adults, an LGBT group and a network of Life Groups for discipleship and learning). There is also provision for young people including a group for 14-18s on Sunday evening, a trip to Soul Survivor in the summer and a full range of schools ministry (visits to our churches from 8-10 different schools at Easter and over 1200 children during Christmas).

We have a number of outreach opportunities. St Luke's Café Stall at the Farmers' Market, and Bible Study in a local café over breakfast, Enquirers & Evangelistic courses (Pilgrim & Alpha), continued international relationships for mission and relief (particularly with Cambodia, Laos, Argentina and Brazil) and opportunities to partner with St Mary's Music Hall in developing a world-class programme of world, folk and jazz music have all enabled us to connect with a wide cross-section of our community.

In the last year, we have experienced a number of key staff changes. In July 2018, we said goodbye to Rev Frances Shoesmith as she took up a new position in Wigan, the Diocese of Liverpool. In August 2018, our Children and Youth Director, Donna Gwilliams, took a post with Faith in Schools, offering Religious Education to all schoolchildren in Newham. In September 2018, our Christians Against Poverty Centre Manager, Claire Donaldson took up the position as an area manager for CAP and we celebrated this promotion.

In the autumn 2018, we welcomed Sue Peacham to the role of CAP Centre Manager and thanked Claire Donaldson who left to be London regional manager for CAP.

3. Achievements and Performance

2018 was an important year of consolidation across the parish. Members of St Stephen's congregation joined with the congregations of St Gabriel's/St Mary's. St Gabriel's in particular welcomed many new members and there was considerable work and investment by the clergy and leadership of the team to build a new sense of unity and church identity. St Gabriel's were blessed by the experience, wisdom and contribution of St Stephen's members who have expressed their thanks for the warmth of the welcome provided.

In prayer and worship, we have experienced change and growth, with new people joining us at our early communion service at 8am, our midweek worship on Wednesdays at 10am and 7.30pm for Vespers. Our Christmas Carol Services were more highly attended than in the previous four years.

In advance of the Nursery opening, we opened Stay and Play - a group for parents, carers and children - on Tuesday mornings. From the first week, the group has been inundated, often having to turn people away when it had reached capacity. The group has given a valuable introduction to nursery staff and to the nursery space and built important relationships across the community. We intend to build on the success of this.

The Parish has continued to work in partnership with both Waltham Forest Citizens and the Centre for Theology and Community, training and learning community organizing methods to help us act with others for the Common Good. In April, Waltham Forest Citizens held the largest pre-election accountability assembly in London, with over 600 people gathering to ask prospective Council Leader candidates to support our agenda for more affordable housing and better provision for our young people. Five people have accessed Citizens training and four members of St Mary's have been participants on a new Urban Leadership School, organized by Centre for Theology and Community. A youth commission has been established to investigate the causes behind the increase in youth violence and the housing team has worked hard to campaign for increased affordability across council sites.

In St Mary's, the church has been working hard to complete the necessary work towards our Round Two Heritage Lottery Fund application. The year has seen many architectural drawings, surveys and consultation, culminating in a successful application for Planning Permission for both the church extension and the Welcome Centre housing project. The church has continued to work with partners to develop these schemes and to seek the necessary match funding to secure further NLHF support. We have also continued to undertake Heritage Activities to enable people to experience and encounter the stories behind the church – including very successful Candlelit Tales in November and a popular Burials in Bloom competition which ran from May to July, inviting local people to take care of untended graves and explore the stories behind them.

Our churches have seen both growth and transition. Across all congregations, we have said goodbye to individuals and families who are largely moving out of London or whose situations are vulnerable where they find themselves needing to be rehoused elsewhere. We have also continued to welcome new people and the electoral roll grew again across the Parish in this last year.

At the end of the year, the Parish learned it had been successful in applying for funds towards the establishment of a new worshipping community on the Attlee Terrace and Prospect Hill Estates. The coming year will see the creation of a lay community built around Benedictine principles.

The Parish continues to build strong connections across the community, particularly in the area of arts and culture and largely through the work of the Arts Collective and the Music Hall and through heritage and history. We were thrilled that Waltham Forest was successful in its bid to be the first London Borough of Culture and look forward to being a key participant in this programme.

4. Financial Review

4.1 Financial Activity and Financial Position

The PCC's main sources of funding comes from freewill offerings of church members, grants and lettings income.

The Statement of Financial Activities and Balance Sheet can be found on pages 10 and 11 respectively. The Church's reserves decreased by £137,180 during the year (2017: decreased by £76,766). The balance sheet shows total net assets of £3,949,240 (2017: \pm 3,904,517). The main reason for the increase in 2018 was funds granted by the Church Commissioners to the PCC.

Included in total funds are amounts totaling £153,099 (2017: £94,715) which are restricted (£10,041 of this was endowed fund in 2017). These funds have either been raised for, and their use restricted for specific purposes, or they comprise of donations that are subject to specific donor imposed conditions. Full details of the restricted funds can be found in note 15 to the accounts together with an analysis of movements in the year.

4.2 Reserves Policy

The PCC has examined the requirements for free reserves, i.e. those unrestricted and endowed funds not invested in tangible fixed assets. The PCC considers that, given the nature of the church's work, free reserves should be equivalent to approximately 4 months' routine general fund expenditure, plus committed future expenditure on other projects, where funds permit. The PCC is of the opinion that this provides sufficient flexibility to cover temporary shortfalls in income and will allow the church to cope and respond to unforeseen emergencies whilst specific action plans are implemented. At 31 December 2018 the church had net free reserves deficit of $\pounds 153,742$ (2017: free reserves deficit of $\pounds 16,562$) as follows:

The PCC is aware that the free reserves requirement is currently well in excess of the free reserves currently held and are considering ways in which our free reserves can be increased over the coming years and the reserves requirement reduced. Part of the role of the original Parish Operations Director was to seek new sources of grant income, run stewardship campaigns and review the Parish's lettings policies, together with an in-depth review of expenditure. The commitment to a major reduction in our staff costs was completed in 2018 along with continuously reviewing of our operating costs wherever possible.

4.3 Investment Policy

The team churches currently place funds, in excess of working capital requirements, on deposit with the CCLA.

5. Plans for Future Periods

The following areas, at the present time, are central to the PCC's planning:

- The development of a whole parish vision and strategy.
- Growing patterns of evangelism and nurture across the parish, as well as developing relationships both within and across our churches.
- Buildings and site development at St Mary's, including repair of St Mary's Church and redevelopment of the Welcome Centre site.
- Ongoing improvements are in progress to our financial systems that will eventually provide us with quarterly review information for the PCC meetings.
- The development of control and forward budgets to manage expenditure and identify potential areas of cost-savings.
- Significant stewardship campaigns to improve our financial position.
- The review of our governance processes and procedures.
- Ensuring that our assets are maximised to bring us revenue and exploring new opportunities to raise further funds from use of church buildings and sites.
- Implementing a robust business plan following the re-development of the St Mary's Church site.

Opinion

We have audited the financial statements of The Parochial Church Council of the Ecclesiastical Parish of Walthamstow (the 'charity') for the year ended 31 December 2018 which comprise the Statement of Financial Activities, the Balance Sheet, the Cash Flow Statement and notes to the financial statements, including a summary of significant accounting policies. 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of accounting

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

The financial statements have been prepared under the Charities Act 2011 and in accordance with the Charities Statement of Recommended Practice (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and Financial Reporting Standard 102 (FRS 102). The financial statements are drawn up on the historical cost basis of accounting except for the revaluation of freehold land and buildings which are shown at market value.

The financial statements include all transactions, assets and liabilities for which the PCC is responsible in law. They do not include the accounts of church groups that owe an affiliation to another body or those that are informal gatherings of church members.

The PCC meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

Going Concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern and accordingly the accounts have been drawn up on a going concern basis.

Income recognition

Voluntary income and donations (including legacies) are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the PCC has entitlement to the income, it is probable the income will be received and the amount of income receivable can be reliably measured. Income from the recovery of tax on gift aided donations is accounted for in the period to which the relevant donation is received. Grant income is recognised on a receivable basis.

The income from trading activities includes rental income from the letting of church premises and freehold land and buildings which is accounted for when earned. It is shown gross, with the associated costs included in fundraising costs.

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the PCC; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

Expenditure recognition

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the PCC to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources. Longer term liabilities are discounted to present value. The PCC is not registered for VAT and accordingly expenditure includes VAT where appropriate.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property	- not depreciated
Fixtures and fittings	- at varying rates on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Debtors

Debtors are included at the settlement amount due. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of opening of the deposit.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation arising from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are recognised at their settlement amount.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

TRANSFER BETWEEN FUNDS

During the year the investments relating to endowment funds were disposed of, with the written permission of the Charity Commission. These funds have then been transferred to various other funds in line with terms agreed with the Charity Commission, details of which can be seen in the fund descriptions above.

16. FINANCIAL COMMITMENTS

There was a quinquennial inspection of St Mary's Church building in October 2015. The repairs and maintenance work identified by the inspector is extensive, and some classed as urgent. The PCC got agreement from the Heritage Lottery Fund (HLF) for grant funding to cover the cost of the proposed works, together with some new build. The cost is expected to be in the region of $\pounds 1.8m$. HLF have accepted the project and will fund it to the value of $\pounds 1.67m$.

17. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

Donna Gwilliams, a member of the PCC, received gross remuneration of £19,113 (2017: £27,356) in her employed capacity of Director of Youth Work.

The aggregate unrestricted donations made by members of the PCC during the year was £25,865 (2017: £28,324).
