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The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

The report of the trustees also incorporates a directors' report as required by company law.

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives

The Makers Guild in Wales is a national applied art and craft membership organisation based in Cardiff, Wales. The organisation exists to engage and inspire audiences as a centre of excellence for craft and applied art and to champion Welsh craft makers. Our core purpose is to inspire, support and celebrate.

Inspiring craft engagement - The Guild inspires engagement and learning about contemporary craft by providing opportunities for audiences and artists to experience contemporary applied art and craft in Wales.

Supporting Welsh craft makers - The Guild is a membership organisation of Welsh craft-makers who all share in the Guilds strong co-operative ethos.

Celebrating craft excellence - Championing high quality hand-made crafts and applied art in Wales both of its members work and of invited National and International artists.

The galleries vision is to inspire, support and celebrate through innovative contemporary craft and to meet our Guild of 89 makers allowing our audiences to connect with artists working within a Welsh context in a stimulating, engaging, inclusive and welcoming environment.

The Guild has been successfully managing to sustain and maintain its charitable objectives for over 35 years, namely:

"The Objects are to advance education for the public benefit in the visual Arts and Crafts in particular but not exclusively by exhibitions of high quality hand made crafts and the provision of workshop programmes".

Mission Statement

"The Makers Guild in Wales is the National Craft Organisation for Wales; a membership body that engages and inspires through the promotion of excellence in craft."

Public benefit

The trustees of the charity are committed to providing a public benefit, and have taken into account the Charity Commission's guidance in this area.

The Guild provides the public with free access to high quality exhibitions of craft by maker members of the Guild along with an educational exhibition programme of National and International Craft and Applied Art. Linked with each educational exhibition is a programme of community workshops, usually taking place at Craft in the Bay, a unique Heritage asset and a Grade II listed building, a former Victorian Maritime Warehouse in the heart of Cardiff Bay.

Charitable activities

The Makers Guild in Wales was founded as a craft co-operative by a small group of craft-makers in February 1984, who were determined to create more opportunities for makers to exhibit and sell their work. Over time and as membership grew and the Guild progressed through a number of homes in Cardiff, 'The Old Library' to the 'Old Techniquest Building' to the 'The Cory's Building' on Bute Street, until successfully fund-raising £1.4 million in order to convert the 'D' shed, an old Victorian Transit Warehouse with a Grade II listed cast iron structure into our new purpose built gallery - Craft in the Bay. We opened the doors June 2002 and in 2005 The Guild concluded the purchase of the Freehold and Leasehold title from the former Welsh Development Association. In 2006 the Guild became an Incorporated Charity.

The Guild now exists to promote high quality craft work throughout Wales, by exhibiting and selling the work of its selected membership, and by creating and managing exhibitions and outreach educational programmes. The Guild is a registered charity, with a board of Trustees, some of whom are also makers, and employs a small number of permanent and part-time staff. Our activities are supported by a group of enthusiastic Friends. Both the Guild, and the gallery, now have a national and growing international reputation for excellence.

In addition to our educational programmes at our heart is our growing Welsh craftmaker membership which now numbers 89 (2018: 83), this gives the Guild a cumulative and united strength, allowing members to feel part of a group sharing a vision whilst members benefit from a multi layered programme of opportunities.

Our Gallery is open 7 days a week from 10.30 to 17.30 free of charge and received 58,560 visitors in 2018/19. In the cultural heart of Cardiff, our building was short-listed for a RIBA award and received a "highly commended" at the British Archaeology Award in 2004. In June 2012 the Guild was used as an exemplar study into co-operative consortia by the Wales Co-operative Centre. Craft in the Bay is recognised as one of the Capitals most significant Cultural and Heritage destinations.

In May 2018, The Guild attended Buckingham Palace at the invitation of The Garfield Weston Foundation to celebrate their 60th Anniversary of Funding. The event was hosted by HRH Prince of Wales and the foundation selected a small number of organisations that they had funded to attend this event in order to recognise the charitable work that they do. The Guild recognises the valuable assistance given by the Foundation to the Guild over many years.

After moving from a co-operative purely volunteer-led organisation to an Incorporated Charity employing staff, the 3 full-time and 5 part-time staff now supplement the 474 volunteer days given to the Guild in 2018. In June 2013 the Guild was awarded a Go Wales Excellence Award for our work volunteer placement scheme with Cardiff Metropolitan University over the last ten years. We have managed to sustain and grow our independent organisation for over 35 years. The Guild has a Friends scheme which now numbers over 80 and provides the Guild with a knowledgeable, supportive and committed group of 'Ambassadors'. Good Governance is seen as an important and valuable part of the organisation, the Guild Board consist of Trustees recruited for the skills that they bring to the organisation.

Educational Exhibition programmes

We have delivered a full programme of exhibitions and education events throughout the twelve months of this period. We have shown a total of seven major exhibitions in our gallery at Craft in the Bay as well as eighteen smaller showcases within the building in our Oriel 2 space on the first floor, the Guest Maker area and the Members Showcase area.

All of our exhibitions including the smaller showcases of Guest Maker, Members Showcase and Oriel 2 student showcases, have been supported with educational information. All our exhibitions are free of charge, we also regularly have many school and college groups visiting the gallery, both to see the exhibitions and visit the craft gallery and learn about Craft and the individual makers.

Our annual programme of educational exhibitions, feature 6-7 major exhibitions, plus 18 smaller exhibitions each year, usually all currently hosted and curated in house.

Exhibitions

Our Major exhibition programme features 6-7 exhibitions each year, highlights this year include:

Coronau (18 July to 11 August 2018)

A unique exhibition featuring Bardic Crowns created by members of the Guild for the National Eisteddfod of Wales. This featured 9 Bardic Crowns created by our Craftmakers and generously loaned to us by the owners. With an attendance of nearly 13,000, the highest figure of any exhibition that we have held!

Makers Merge (30 June to 9 September 2018)

A group exhibition celebrating collaborative working between members of the Guild and makers from South Tyrol.

I'r Byw (17 August to 22 September 2018)

Rhodri Owen - who was maker of the Bardic Chair for the National Eisteddfod 2017 brought this community based exhibition of furniture created in collaboration with communities across Wales.

Rooted in Practice (29 September to 4 November 2018)

An exhibition of creativity by tutors and staff from Coleg Sir Gar, Carmarthen.

Frankie Locke (26 September to 4 November 2018)

A special show of her new work featuring ceramics glass and photography.

Medals (19 March to 22 April 2019)

Project with Cardiff Met. Artist, Designer: Maker BA

We run craft workshops that are linked to our exhibition programme and over this year these were curated and delivered in our gallery, primarily by our Guild members but also by skilled artists who were involved in individual exhibitions.

Weekend workshops for adults throughout the year. Total of 42 sessions, 210 participants. Delivered by members of the Makers Guild in Wales and guest artists. Open to the general public.

Community Projects

'Young Carers Art and craft workshops project'

Building on our previous project partnering with Cardiff and the Vale YMCA Young carers project. This year we embarked on a funded project For Young Carers, in partnership with the YMCA Cardiff. The Makers Guild in Wales provided Young Carers living within Cardiff and surrounding Vale a programme of after school and school holiday craft workshops held within the workshop spaces at Craft in the Bay. Funded through The Community Foundation in Wales' The Children and Young People's Fund which seeks innovative projects that will work to improve and raise the aspirations of disadvantaged children and young people in communities across Wales. This project continues until the autumn of 2019.

STRATEGIC REPORT

Achievement and performance

During the National Eisteddfod which was held in Cardiff Bay in August 2018, we hosted a range of community craft workshops. These workshops were offered for free to the public but were also attended by Cardiff and the Vale Young Carers through our programme of community work with them. Drop-in sessions from 10:30 - 16:30 over seven days (14 sessions) four artists teaching assisted by volunteers/Friends of the Guild with 60 people taking part each day (total of 420 people).

. Hey Clay!

Hey Clay is a national celebration of ceramics, run by the Crafts Council giving everyone the chance to unleash their inner potter! We ran clay workshops as part of the National event. 144 sessions were run in total.

In addition to this programme we hosted individual craft sessions for Schools, Colleges and University groups. During this year young people taking part in activities including school groups totalled 2,066 sessions.

Meet the Maker

Free Artists talks

Our 'Friends' invite Guild Maker-members to talk about their work, career or processes through our 'Meet the Maker' educational programme. There were six free events organised throughout the year, all held at Craft in the Bay, although organised by the Friends they are open for all to attend.

There were 6 sessions with 108 participants this year.

Craft Demonstrations

Our Craftmakers volunteer their time in the gallery, this year they gave us 391 days, this makes us unique in that every visitor to our gallery can meet at least one of our makers everyday. In addition, many of our makers give demonstrations for our audiences, last year we had 21 sessions attended by 945 participants.

Financial review

Principal funding sources

Commissions from the sale of Maker Members' work displayed in the main gallery space, rental income from the café, income from educational activities and the letting of meeting rooms produce the bulk of the Charity's income.

Investment policy and objectives

Under the Memorandum and Articles of Association, the Charity has power to invest in any way the Trustees wish. The Trustees regularly review the investment funds to ensure that they are the most appropriate for the Charity.

Financial review

Review of finances

The Guild set a robust financial target in order to generate an improved surplus in 2018/19 over the £3,271 surplus made during 2017/18. This is a significant result considering the deficits made in the preceding two years. The Guild recognises that external market conditions remain very challenging and there appears to be no let up on the horizon. It is therefore significant that a strong set of financial results have been delivered during this period, which reflects the contribution made by all within the organisation.

With the positive impact of the events summarised below, the Guild managed to deliver a surplus of £6,315 during 2018/19. This is nearly double the surplus made in the previous year and illustrates the robust financial management in place and provides a platform on which to build on.

The National Eisteddfod took place in Cardiff during August 2018 and it was proved to be very successful, with footfall exceeding 14,000 for the 8 days of the event, this was the most successful event ever held here. The resultant significant extra sales of Craft contributed to the Guilds finances for the year.

This success can be attributed to the Guild curating and exhibiting a unique collection of handmade Bardic Crowns, all created for the National Eisteddfod by our own Guild members. This was the largest gathering of historic crowns that we are aware of. The 'Coronau' exhibition featured 10 National Eisteddfod Crowns created between 1999 and 2018. Accompanying this unique exhibition was a makers craft market with the crown creators (all Guild members) who were on hand throughout the event.

Significantly, the Guild embarked on a Heritage Lottery Fund Resilient Heritage Project during this year. This was a 12 month project that was specifically created for organisations who have previously been funded by the Heritage Lottery Fund.

The project includes a root and branch review of our organisation which aims to see the Guild improve its resilience by becoming more sustainable, reviewing costs and looking to enhance our future income streams. The project started in July 2018 and in this year a significant number of reports will be made, all contributing to a final Business Plan which we can then take forward to funders to undertake the project findings. This project has contributed significantly to the Guilds income for the year.

Unfortunately, the Guild's last annual application for Arts Council of Wales grant to support project funding was declined in December 2017, this meant that the Guild was without ACW project funding for the first time since opening the doors to Craft in the Bay in 2002. Whilst this loss of funding was unexpected and resulted in a significant reduction for this programme, the resulting outputs we felt were of the highest quality.

The Guild managed to continue its Educational Exhibition programme during this period, and the Guild would like to thank all those exhibitors and curators who took significant steps to ensure our programme remained on track for the period.

The Guild recently completed the re-letting of the café space to a new operator early in 2019, this was as a result of the previous tenant handing back the lease at the end of their break-clause in September 2018. This led to a significant period without a tenant, which had a detrimental effect to footfall and corresponding sales in the run up to Christmas 2018, our most crucial trading time of the year. The previous tenant had been recruited as it was felt that they offered particular synergies with our own organisation. This sadly was not the case, but the new operator has made a significant investment and with a long lease agreed we feel confident that this relationship will prove to be mutually beneficial in the long term.

The Guild benefited from grants from both The Foyle Foundation along with The Garfield Weston Foundation for core costs during this period. This was supplemented by a grant from the Oakdale Trust. The Guild was also fortunate to receive funding from the Davies Sisters Charity and Peter and Teresa Harris Charitable Trust. The Guild would like particularly to thank these funders who recognise and support the Guilds plans and have been and continue to be supportive through this period of transition.

Review of finances

Reserves policy

The Trustees ensure that the disposition of restricted funds is in accordance with donor requirements. A strategic reserve is a key aim for the next four years.

Factors affecting the Charity

The Guild is aware that a number of both external and internal factors may influence the Guild over the next few years, in light of the Heritage Lottery Fund Resilient Heritage Project, further planning to mitigate these factors have been incorporated into the programme outputs. The Board are confident that this will ensure the future resilience of the organisation.

Future plans

A successful application for the Heritage Lottery Funds Resilient Heritage programme means that a consultant led review of the organisation will conclude over the next year, the aims of the project are to ensure the ongoing sustainability of our organisation and building.

The project will be completed by October 2019 and from this, a business plan will be created. The Guild is then committed to take this costed plan to funders to continue onto the next stage. We are confident that this project will offer significant opportunities for the organisation over the coming years.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Constitution

The Charity is a company limited by guarantee and was registered with the Charity Commission on 6 April 2006, although The Makers Guild in Wales was first established by a group of makers in 1984. The Governing Documents are held at Craft in the Bay. In October 2006, the Guild agreed to the establishment of the current Charity. There are two categories of membership; Maker-Member and Supporter-Member. In order to become a Maker-Member, craftmakers who live and work in Wales are entitled to apply and submit their work to the Guilds rigorous artistic selection procedure.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

Trustees, who are either Maker or Supporter-Members of the Guild, are appointed at the Annual General Meeting. A maximum of 25% are Maker-Members and the remainder are recruited externally as Supporter Members according to the differing skills which are seen to be appropriate.

Trustees are now recruited via a formal interview and then selected according to ability and suitability for the role. A formal induction process is to be introduced in due course.

Organisational structure

The governing body is the Board of Trustees who are non-executive, unpaid and meet six times a year. The Board have now formally established five standing committees who report directly to the Board; a Finance Committee, an Education and Exhibitions Committee; a Membership Committee, a Marketing Committee and a Buildings Committee.

Each committee is made up of at least two Trustees and a staff member, with further personnel recruited as and when required. The Board have also reviewed and updated staffing and internal communication structures. The Board delegate the general day to day running of the Charity to Mr S Burgess, the General Manager.

Induction and training of new trustees

There is as yet no formal induction or training process for trustees as the skills and knowledge of trustees varies. However, vacant positions are advertised and a short list are interviewed for each post. Trustees are chosen for the specific skills that they bring to the Board. A formal induction process is to be introduced in due course. A full review of a training plan and a formal induction will be completed in 2019.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Risk management

The Trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error. Risk assessment and the management of risk is a continuous process with all areas being addressed as required and the Trustees are satisfied that appropriate action has been taken to mitigate any impact of these risks.

Staffing

The Guild employs 3 full-time staff and 4 part-time staff, which has remained constant for a number of years. With the introduction of the Heritage Lottery Fund Resilient Heritage programme, one new member of staff has been recruited and employed on a one year contract in order to free up the General Manager to oversee this programme. Volunteering has since the Guilds inception in 1984, been seen as vital to ensuring that the Guild can operate effectively. Volunteering is seen as a valuable resource allowing the Guild to call on the skills, time and energy of a large dedicated and determined volunteer base when required.

The staffing of the gallery area is supplemented by a volunteer each day. The Guild operates a programme of volunteer opportunities in association with VCS Cardiff Volunteer Centre. The Guild operated with the help of 474 days given by volunteers in 2018, which include maker-members, school pupils, students, volunteers and Friends of the Guild. The Guild is grateful for the support it has received in this area from Careers Wales, Go Wales, Voluntary Community Service (Cardiff), Wales Council for Voluntary Action and especially to the Friends of the Makers Guild for the help that they provide.

1. STATUTORY INFORMATION

The Makers Guild In Wales is a private company, limited by guarantee without share capital, registered in England and Wales. The registered office address can be found in the report of the trustees.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The Makers Guild In Wales meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

The Guild reviews the charity's forecasts, budget projections and working capital requirements at regular trustee and Finance Committee meetings throughout the year. The trustees therefore have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. The charity therefore continues to adopt the going concern basis in preparing its financial statements.

Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemption in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Donations and voluntary income are accounted for when receivable.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Costs are allocated between direct charitable and support expenditure according to the nature of the cost. Where items involve more than one category they are apportioned between the categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets other than freehold land are stated at cost less depreciation. Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the cost less estimated residual value of each asset over its expected useful life, as follows:

Fixtures, fittings and equipment

Stocks

Stocks consists of cards, magazines, books and videos and are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from Corporation Tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds may be used in accordance with the charitable objectives, at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds may only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and a short term deposit account that are subject to an insignificant risk to changes in value.

Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.
