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## **Objectives and Activities**

#### Why we exist: Our purposes and objectives

The object of the CIO is to provide disabled children and adults in the Oxford area with new social interaction and activities, including sporting and recreational. We seek to close the gap between the variation of social interactions and opportunities available to such children and adults compared to their non-disabled peers.

#### What we do: Our activities

KEEN runs a wide range of weekly sessions for participants of all ages, in addition to regular KEEN Plus sessions which give participants other opportunities around Oxford and further afield. These include:

- AllSorts consists of our two Saturday sports sessions for young people aged 4-25. Our Allsorts sessions are inclusive and cater for all abilities and disabilities.
- Zig-Zag is our creative arts and drama session. It is aimed at younger athletes with each session comprising of a mixture of music, dance, craft and games. Activities follow a different theme every term, covering anything from adaptations of children's books to arts and crafts.
- KEEN Teens is our social club for teenagers and young adults. The aim is to provide age appropriate activities, which have included cooking, science experiments, a multitude of games and a murder mystery night.

- GrEAT Social provides a range of social and recreational activities for adults.
- GrEAT Sports is a weekly sports session for adults with additional needs.
- **INK** is an arts based workshop and social enterprise project for adults
- KEEN Gardening is an inclusive project at an Allotment in East Oxford
- After-School Club is a weekly term time project ran in partnership with Mabel Prichard School.

### **Director's Report**

KEEN developed in at least three significant ways in 2018-19. Firstly, delivery of our core programme of sessions and projects significantly expanded, reaching 100% more participants with additional needs, and providing 80% more total contact hours.

Secondly, a successful pilot of our Community Sports Partner Programme has opened up an exciting path towards more inclusive opportunities for physical activity in Oxford, and opened us to working in much deeper partnership than in the past.

Finally, we've taken up the baton as a youth-led movement that is starting to celebrate and promote inclusion more widely than ever.

Behind the scenes, no area of KEEN was untouched as we sought improvements across all areas of our operations and management. KEEN enters what will be an exciting 2019-20 as a resilient, sustainable organisation, still occupying a central place in the community we have now served for 34 years.

## **Financial Review**

#### **Reserves Policy**

KEEN understands that Charity law requires any income received by a charity to be spent within a reasonable period of receipt and that trustees should be able to justify the holding of income as reserves. As a result, our reserves policy is as follows.

KEEN will maintain sufficient reserves to enable it to meet its short-term financial obligations in the event of an unexpected revenue shortfall and to allow KEEN to be managed efficiently and to provide a buffer that would ensure uninterrupted services.

Our main short term obligations are to our employees and rent; we estimate that we need to retain £35,000 of reserves to meet these liabilities in the event of a shortfall in our income.

While we expect to reduce our costs in response to falling income before we need to consider accessing our reserves, a majority of trustees can agree to release some or all of this reserve against specific circumstances. These might include:

- To fill a gap in available funds on a defined short term basis against an agreed process to fill the identified funding gap.
- 2. To meet an unexpected one-off cost.
- 3. To provide a 'bridging loan' in support of an agreed expansion activity in advance of identified new funds becoming available.
- 4. As part of the process of running down the charity.

In the case of items 1 to 3 above we expect the money that is released to be replaced within a reasonable period of time.

This policy is reviewed annually.
