<u>President's Report</u> for the Year Ended 31 December 2019

Organisation and administration

Membership of the BTS has continued to increase, with over 900 members as of Dec 2019. More detail will be provided in the General Secretary's Report. Over the last 4 years there has been a noteworthy increase in the number of student members: from 77 at the start of 2016, to 226 as of Dec 2019. It is a key goal of the BTS to support Members in the early phases of their career.

The Society's finances are sound, due to prudent management by the treasurer, Dr Elizabeth Martin, and the finance subcommittee. More detail will be provided in the Treasurer's Report. The good health of the Society's finances is, to a large extent, influenced by the scientific appeal and therefore the financial success of the Annual Congress. The 2019 Congress was particularly well attended, with over 400 participants.

The BTS Memorandum & Articles (M&A) of Association are being further updated - as will be described later during the AGM. Also, in the past year a Statute (terms of reference) has been produced for the BTS Exec Committee. The M&A and statutes for all of the BTS sub-committees are available on the website.

Administration of the BTS continues to be effectively provided by Executive Business Support (EBS) Litchfield and EBS are working with the Executive Committee to identify and implement operational efficiencies.

Evolving Membership Benefits - What is new?

" It is a pleasure to report that the most recently established Specialty Section: Computational and in silico Toxicology, which is ably led by Dr Andreas Bender, has a large membership and is thriving. Two of the other 4 specialty sections: Clinical and Human Toxicology, Regulatory Toxicology, Risk Assessment and Mechanistic and Discovery Toxicology, have organised symposia for this year's Annual Congress.

" Regional Meetings for local networking are promoted and organised by BTS Ambassadors. A successful networking meeting was held at Public Health England, Chilton, near Oxford (50 participants) on the 28th Nov 2019. Additional local meetings will be organised in the coming year and grants of up to £250 are available from the BTS to cover meeting costs and refreshments.

" The Official Journal of the BTS, Toxicology Research, is now published by Oxford University Press (OUP). We are delighted to work with OUP who have a very strong background in biomedical publishing. OUP also publishes Toxicological Sciences, the official Journal of the American Society of Toxicology and they have offered to provide online access to Toxicology Research for BTS Members at a substantially discounted rate. Details will be available shortly.

"We are keen to promote BTS mentoring scheme - which is free. Senior toxicologists who are willing to provide individual career advice to other members are listed on the website. It has been suggested, that some senior members might also benefit from being mentored by more junior members too!

" The eligibility criteria for Travel Grants, Bursaries and Prizes are reviewed at intervals to maximise the number of members who can apply for subsidised attendance at scientific meetings. As a reminder, travel awards are not limited to those working in academic departments.

Continuing Professional Development

" Audio recordings from the most recent BTS Continuing Educational Programme (CEP) are now available on the BTS website. Those who registered for the CEP session have free access. Others are welcome to purchase access via the website, to hear the recorded CEP lectures.

" A series of basic training Webinars have been produced by the BTS in conjunction with the American College of Toxicology (ACT) and are available via the BTS website. Occasional signature webinars are also available without payment.

" The BTS co-sponsors the Practical Application of Toxicology in Drug Development Course (PATDD) at the University of Cambridge. The Programme Committee includes representation from the BTS, ACT and the University of Cambridge.

" Royal Society of Biology Careers Fair - each year members of the BTS Education Training and Career Development Sub Committee attend careers fairs to advertise career opportunities in Toxicology. An important role of the BTS is to promote toxicology as a profession, to interest and attract highest quality students.

A number of UK academic centres provide training opportunities in Toxicology. It is encouraging to report that toxicology research at the University Cambridge continues to grow. Inevitably for a subject as diverse as toxicology, collaborations exist between the established academic centres, Imperial London, Birmingham, Liverpool, Leicester, Manchester, Newcastle, Aberdeen, Cardiff. The BTS supports the communication of research from academic departments via Travel Grants and Bursaries.

<u>President's Report</u> for the Year Ended 31 December 2019

Interactions with other Scientific Societies

One of the strategic objectives of the BTS is to promote interactions with other scientific societies and organisations. The following list indicates that this is being achieved

1. UK Register of Toxicologists - the BTS is a sponsoring organisation and we are in the process of clarifying the working relationship between the UK Register and the BTS, via a written Memorandum of Understanding. Understandably, there is strong overlap between Membership of the BTS and Membership of the UK Register. The Chair of the Panel of the UK Register is an ex officio member of the BTS Executive Committee and provides an annual report to the Annual General Meeting of the BTS. The UK Register also provides a bursary to support the cost of attendance at the BTS Annual Congress.

2. The Royal Society of Biology (RSB) - the BTS is a Member Organisation. This facilitates communication and the BTS is able to contribute to consultation papers and policy documents which are coordinated by the RSB. The RSB also hosts an annual pre-Xmas Parliamentary Reception, at which the BTS is represented.

3. EUROTOX - as the UK National Toxicology Society, the BTS participates in the Annual Business meeting of EUROTOX which is held at the annual congress. Despite recent political changes in Europe, links between the BTS and other European Toxicologists remain strong and active. The current president of EUROTOX, Prof Heather Wallace - is a former president of the BTS.

4. IUTOX - represents more than 25,000 members and the BTS is one of approximately 60 different member societies. IUTOX organises a scientific congress at 3 yearly intervals. Along with other member societies, the BTS contributes financially to IUTOX via levy, which is based on the number of BTS members. The BTS is represented at meetings of the IUTOX General Assembly, can nominate candidates for appointment to committees and can vote at business meetings.

5. American College of Toxicology (ACT) co-sponsors the PATDD Course, in Cambridge.

6. Royal College of Pathologists (RCPath) - the BTS has a representative on the RCPath Specialty Advisory Committee on Toxicology. The RCPath offers professional examinations in Toxicology and BTS Members are able to participate in the RCPath scheme for recording and accreditation Continuing Professional Development.

7. Royal Society of Chemistry - Toxicology Interest Group have organised a symposium on Experimental Data and Uncertainty Modelling, at this year's BTS annual congress.

8. The BTS continues to work closely with National Centre for 3Rs (NC3Rs) to promote the reduction, refinement and replacement of experimental animals. The BTS is grateful to the NC3Rs for kindly allowing the use of their offices in London for meetings of the BTS Executive Committee.

9. In Vitro Toxicology Society - awards a poster prize at the BTS Annual Congress and this year they have organised a joint symposium on the Predictability of in vitro Methods for Toxicology.

10. UK Environmental Mutagen Society - co-hosted their 2019 Annual Congress in Cambridge with the BTS and continues to provide scientific training for genetic toxicologists.

11. The British Society of Toxicological Pathologists - regularly organise symposia at the BTS annual congress and on the 18 and 19th October, a jointly organised scientific meeting on Epigenetics, was held in Newcastle.

Communication and Engagement with the Public

In the past year, the BTS has produced several public Position Statements: each is a short, 2-3 page document, which provide authoritative, educational comment on a toxicology related topic of interest. The initial position statements are listed below, and the first 3 documents are available on the BTS website.

- **1. Distinguishing Hazard and Risk**
- 2. Use of Animals in Toxicology & Safety Science
- 3. Air Pollution Toxicology
- 4. The safety of Genetically Engineered crops
- 5. Safety assessment of cell & gene therapy Medicinal products

- 7. Exploding the myth: Natural Products are Safer than Synthetic Chemicals

Dr Phil Botham has very effectively led the Steering Team. Proposals for further documents include: What is Toxicology? Application of Microphysiological systems in Toxicology, the Microbiome, Ethics in safety studies.

Operating and Financial Review for the Year Ended 31 December 2019

General Secretary's review

The major activities of the Society are documented in the reports from the President and other Officers and Subcommittee chairs so this report will highlight some of the developments I have been involved in over the past year, ably supported by EBS.

The Executive Committee met on four occasions in 2019/20. In addition, the Officers held one physical meeting one meeting by teleconference. Until 2018, the minutes of our meetings were available only to the Executive Committee, but we have now made them available in the Members area of the website at http://www.thebts.org/membership/minutes-2/.

The member directory has recently been extended to allow you to search by affiliation as well as name: http://www.thebts.org/membership/directory/. So far 243 few Members have given permission to have their contact details available to other members. The directory will be more effective if even more of you could sign up. You can also update your preferences for communications, including Specialty Sections on this webpage: http://www.thebts.org/membership/preferences/.

I am pleased to report that the papers in the BTS archive have now been transferred to the Wellcome Library, and to thank Ted Lock for his work on the archive. It will take the Wellcome Library a while to digitise all the documents, but ultimately you will be able to access the documents and I hope you will find them as interesting as I have. The officers were particularly interested to see the documents relating to establishment of the BTS from the Toxicology Club in 1978.

The BTS membership has again increased over the past year, as shown in the table below. At the time of writing there are 116 members who have yet to renew their membership for 2020, who are being followed up. We are again especially pleased to have so many student members and hope that many of them will progress to other membership categories.

Financial review

1. Financial Performance for 2019

The BTS made a profit of approximately £3,000 during 2019. Significant efforts were made by the Finance Sub-Committee (FSC) and the Executive Committee to prudently manage the BTS finances during 2019.

2. BTS monetary Contribution to Meetings and Events

The 2019 congress was a joint meeting with United Kingdom Environmental Mutagen Society (UKEMS), and each Society agreed to contribute up to a maximum of £15,000 towards the Congress. The final contribution made by each Society was £12,546.

The BTS provided financial support to the Practical Application of Toxicology in Drug Development (PATDD) Course in Cambridge, which was jointly organised with the American College of Toxicology (ACT). The BTS and ACT both donated £804.40, which was significantly less than that provided by both Societies in 2018.

During 2019 the BTS also contributed £1,228 to a joint meeting with the British Society of Toxicological Pathology (BSTP) on "Epigenetics in Toxicology and Pathology"; and £500 to an "In Silico Toxicology" Network Meeting at the University of Cambridge.

The BTS also contributed a total of £810 to two networking events, organised by the BTS Ambassadors. One event was held in Cambridge and the other in Oxford. These were very successful events, and next year the Executive Committee encourage BTS Ambassadors to organise similar events in their areas. If you are interested in undertaking this, please contact the Chair of the Communication Sub-Committee (CSC), Professor Paul Baldrick.

The BTS also exhibited at the Royal Society of Biology's Bioscience Careers Day (£660).

3. Donations to BTS

Operating and Financial Review for the Year Ended 31 December 2019

The level of donations attracted in 2019 (£5,000) was unfortunately lower than received in 2018 and 2017 (approx. £7,500). I would like to take the opportunity on behalf of the Society to thank all those institutions who continue to support us in this way. 4. Advertising Income

Advertising income generated from employment opportunities advertised on the BTS website, totalled £9,750, which is approximately £1,500 more than received in 2018.

5. Fellowships and Training

The BTS offers a range of travel awards including the Gay Hawksworth and Gordon Gibson Fellowships, and the Meetings Travel Support scheme, as well as bursaries offered to students to support attendance at BTS meetings.

During 2019, £1000 was given from the Meetings Travel Support scheme to support two BTS members attend the IUTOX Congress (£500 each); and £1000 was given from the Gay Hawksworth Fellowship to support a third BTS member attend EUROTOX Congress.

The BTS provides funds for two Summer Project Scholarships, for students or new graduates to experience working in the field of toxicology. Each scholarship covers living costs for 6 - 8 weeks (approximately £1,500). In 2018 only one scholarship was awarded, therefore in 2019 the Executive Committee decided to award three scholarships to the Universities of Liverpool, Cambridge and Newcastle. From 2020 there will be three scholarships available and the Executive Committee encourage members to apply.

6. Membership Subscriptions

The BTS membership subscription fees were increased in 2019 by approximately 5%. Full membership is £94 per annum when paid by direct debit. Membership fees for students, early career and retired members is free or substantially less. There was no increase in membership fees in 2020. The Executive Committee will be reviewing fees this year and if appropriate will bring a proposal to increase fees to the AGM in 2021 for implementation in 2022.

7. Accountancy

The BTS accountants, Bullock Woodburn, and the Finance Executive at Executive Business Support (EBS) have continued to assist the Treasurer throughout 2019. I would like to thank Bullock Woodburn and EBS on behalf of the Society for the support they have given myself and the FSC during the year. As in previous years, the accounts have undergone an Independent Examination by Bullock Woodburn (a form of external scrutiny of accounts specifically designed for charities) rather than a full annual statutory audit, which saves the Society some expenditure compared to a full audit.

Reserves Policy

The trustees review reserves on an ongoing basis and are confident that at current levels they are sufficient to honour commitments to studentships, bursaries and meeting subsidies, whilst allowing for changes in the budgeted income streams, as detailed below. During 2010 the Society invested some of its reserves in either 1 or 2 year Treasury bonds, whilst leaving sufficient reserve funds in the lower interest bank deposit account to conduct all Society business. This has been continued in 2018 as this still represents the most advantageous rates available to us as a Society.

Funds materially in deficit

No funds were in deficit during the year.

<u>Report of the Trustees</u> for the Year Ended 31 December 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and significant activities

The Society is established for the promotion and advancement, for the public benefit, of education in the science of toxicology. In deciding the aims and activities of the society, the trustees have paid due regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit. Toxicology is the science of disease induced by chemicals present in the diet, medicines, and in the environment. The British Toxicology Society (BTS) is a leading international toxicology society, based on the highest quality science, and promotes the advancement, communication and understanding of the scientific disciplines necessary to foster public health and environmental safety.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The Society is a company limited by guarantee and the liability of members is limited to an amount not exceeding £1. It is exempt under Section 60 of the Companies Act 2006 from the requirement to use the word "Limited" in its title. The Society is governed by the Memorandum and Articles of Association. It is registered with the Charities Commission, number 286197, and no liability to taxation arises.

The Executive Committee are Directors for the purpose of company law and Trustees for the purpose of charity law. Directors/Trustees are appointed by the Society's members at the Annual General Meeting. When a Trustee retires, the Executive Committee nominates new Trustees. Additional nominations may be made by the membership, provided they are signed by six members of the Society.

Informal induction procedures are in place for new Trustees, conducted by an existing member of the Executive Committee and they are also provided with relevant documentation to formally advise and inform them of the Society's constitution and objectives and also their duties and responsibilities as a trustee.

One third of the Executive Committee ordinary members retire each year in rotation but are then eligible for re-election. The society is organised so that the Trustees, in the form of the Executive Committee, meet regularly, usually on a quarterly basis, to manage its affairs. There are also sub-committees which are responsible for advising and researching the various activities and development of the Society, who report to the Executive Committee.

Statutes for the workings of the various sub-committees are continually being revised and updated to ensure that the terms of reference are clearly defined and the ways of working are consistent. This also enables transparency of committee elections and duration of membership, while allowing the committees to work to agreed aims, backed up by comprehensive set of Standard Operating Procedures for the Society.

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the Society is exposed, in particular those related to the operations and finances of the Society, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to major risks.

All of the officers and members who serve on the Society's committees are unpaid. They are entitled to be reimbursed for any out of pocket expenses incurred in attending meetings.

No related parties, related party transactions, beneficial relationships or conflicts of interest requiring disclosure by the Charities' or Companies' Acts existed during the year.

Attendance by Executive Committee members has been reasonable throughout the year. The co-opted members continue to provide liaison with the relevant Sub-Committees and Speciality Sections.

The day to day administration of the Society is undertaken by an outside agency on a fee basis.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31 December 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charitable company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

- the requirements of Section 12 Other Financial Instruments paragraphs 12.26, 12.27, 12.29(a), 12.29(b) and 12.29A;
- the requirement of Section 33 Related Party Disclosures paragraph 33.7.

Income

All incoming resources are included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity; it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

. income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.

. legacy income is recognised when receipt is probable and entitlement is established.

. income from donated goods is measured at the fair value of the goods unless this is impractical to measure reliably, in which case the value is derived from the cost to the donor or the estimated resale value. Donated facilities and services are recognised in the accounts when received if the value can be reliably measured. No amounts are included for the contribution of general volunteers.

. income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

. expenditure on raising funds includes the costs of all fundraising activities, events, non-charitable trading activities, and the sale of donated goods.

. expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Expenditure

. other expenditure includes all expenditure that is neither related to raising funds for the charity nor part of its expenditure on charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apportioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
