Objectives and Activities

The objects of Fulham and Hammersmith Choral Society (the choir) are the study and practice and the concert performance of choral works, and the furthering of interest in choral music generally, and in particular:

- To rehearse and perform choral music of all kinds;
- > To extend the musical knowledge and technique of the choir by instruction and practice;
- > To foster and develop friendly relations between choir members;
- > To assist other charitable organisations.

These objects are met by:

- Weekly rehearsals, based on school terms, of defined programmes of music;
- Three public concerts each year of those programmes;
- Additional community events including 'Come and Sing' days and 'Awaydays';
- Fund-raising through singing, including Christmas carol singing.

Achievements and Performance

The choir performed its normal three public concerts during the year to 31 August 2019:

- At our Christmas 2018 concert we performed Hodie Christus Natus Est, Chilcott On Christmas Night and Vaughan Williams Fantasia on Christmas Carols, together with a selection of other carols, in St Stephen's Church at South Kensington;
- > In Spring 2019, we performed Mendelssohn: Elijah at St Gabriel's Church, Pimlico;
- The Summer 2019 concert, we performed Gilbert and Sullivan's Trial by Jury, together with 'Rodgers and Hammerstein on Broadway', a medley arranged by Mac Huff and "Andrew Lloyd Weber in Concert', arranged by Ed Lojeski, at St George's Church, Campden Hill.

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Charity fundraising took place via Christmas carol singing at Trafalgar Square, raising £253 for Coram - a charity supporting vulnerable children, young people and their families. An additional £255 was raised for Glass Door, the charity supporting the homeless, from a Christmas Concert collection.

In February, the choir held an extremely successful "Come & Sing" Day, open to all comers, singing excerpts from Elijah, attended by over 100 singers of whom half were not choir members. This event raised an additional £377 for Glass Door. There was an enjoyable "Away Day" concert, held in St. Michael & All Angels in Pirbright, near Woking in front of a small local audience.

The year saw a continuation in the decline in membership, with an average of 75, despite the expectation that the Elijah would be a draw. Summer Term numbers were however improved at 60. This compares with 95 and 63 respectively in 2016-17 and is again the lowest number for some years. Concert ticket sales were 12% lower than in the previous year, though not out of line with other recent history.

Financial Review

The trustees review the finances, budgets and spend against budget to ensure that there is sufficient subscription income to cover both rehearsal costs and the shortfall of income against expenditure normally seen for concert performances – taking into account the need to maintain reserves at the desired level.

Review of the charity's financial position at the end of the period

The choir ended the period with total reserves of £12,181 (£11,979 in 2018) after showing a surplus of £202 (£2,842 deficit in 2018) on annual expenditure of £35,760. This was £1,156 higher than the budget forecast of a £954 deficit.

The public concerts showed a lower than forecast deficit of £4,609. There was a surplus of subscription and rehearsal income, after rehearsal costs, of £4,505 and community singing events generated a surplus of £991 after an unexpectedly popular Come & Sing Day. Other expenses amounted to £685.

The Choral Scholarship fund has been wound up, as continuing support for engagement with, and career development of, choral soloists has proven increasingly difficult to sustain.

Reserves policy

It is the policy of the trustees to maintain unrestricted reserves equivalent to the costs of a public concert with orchestral support. This amount, in 2019, is assessed as £9,500.

Amount of reserves held

The unrestricted reserves at the end of the period were £12,181 (£11,796 in 2018).

The trustees recognise that the reserves fluctuate as the cost of concert musician support varies between concerts. The reserves position at the end of the period exceeded the reserves target, in part due to the better than forecast outcome for 2018-19. The increase in reserves is not significant and the trustees anticipate that the surplus reserves will be utilised in light of decreasing income.

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Principal sources of income

The choir does not actively raise funds from external grants and continued to raise income through two primary sources which contributed this year as follows:

- Membership income and associated Gift Aid Tax relief which together raised £18,225;
- ➤ Concert income with ticket sales of £8,150 and refreshment surplus of £1,233.

Membership and Gift Aid Income increased by 10% because the decline in membership levels was more than offset by an increase in subscriptions from £60 to £70 in January 2019. Concert income was 10% lower than the previous very good year (which was in line with expectations) but refreshment income was unexpectedly down by 15%

Structure, Governance and Management

The choir is an unincorporated association governed by its Constitution, dated 30th April 2007, which defines its objects, membership, administration and finance. This definition includes the arrangements for the election of its officers (Chairman, Vice Chairman and Treasurer) and other committee members, all of whom are trustees.

Notes to the Financial Statements

for the year ended 31 August 2019

1. Accounting policies

Basis for preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland', incorporating Update Bulletin 1 and 'FRS 102 The Financial Reporting Standard' (effective January 2015). The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements have been prepared, on an activity basis, under the historic cost convention.

Going concern

At the time of approving the accounts, the Trustees are of the view that there are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern and the accounts continue to be prepared on that basis.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statemet of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are expressed as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost relating to that category. Where costs can not be directly attributed to particular headings, they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the annual rate shown below in order to write off the asset over its estimated useful life.

Kitchen equipment - 20% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from Corporation Tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes in accordance within the ojectives of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
