THE 33RD (OXFORD) KIDLINGTON SCOUT GROUP

In 1942 Kidlington started its own Scout Group with just one Cub pack and one Scout Troop. One of our founder members went on to be a leader, Group Scout Leader and was material in getting the new section of Beavers off the ground, his name is John Amor and has only fairly recently retired from scouting some 70 years later.

At its peak the Group had two Beaver Colonies, four Cub packs, two Scout Troops and a Venture Unit. The Group also had, apart from the Executive (Management) Committee, a group of parents who supported the whole Group with fund raising and general support. It would be wonderful to get back to that kind of membership.

Those of course were the halcyon and fortunate days of having enough adult support and possibly a time when parents and people felt they had a little more time for volunteering.

Why are we called 33^{rd} (Oxford), because at its inception the Group was the 33^{rd} group to be formed in Oxford, the Groups numbers go from 1 – 54, out of that 54 only 14 Groups remain.

The Group is part of the larger Oxford Spires Scout District, which in turn is a part of the Oxfordshire County Scout Council and then of course we are all a part of the world wide scouting movement which is now well over 100 years old.

GROUP STRUCTURE:

At the present time we are structured in the following way:

2 Beaver Colony – Age 6-8 yrs 2 Cub Packs – Age 8-10.5 yrs 1 Land Scout Troop – Age 10.5-14 yrs 1 Sea Scout Troops – Age 10.5-14 yrs

Attached to the Group although managed by Oxford Spires District, we have an Explorer Unit – Age 14-18 yrs.

Chairman's Report

In scouting terms, the Group have had another very successful year. The refurbishments are virtually completed and we are still solvent.

All of the sections have, up until this term, had a busy and fun filled year, sadly of course the dreaded virus has interrupted our usual scouting activities. Quite rightly the Scout Association have called a halt to all face to face meetings and activities. Thanks to the modern electronic age and the sheer inventiveness of our amazing leaders, lots of fun and badgework is being had.

Our Troop

Boating Season

We had another successful boating season -weather and river levels were perfect, allowing every troop evening between May & September on (and in) the water. Two weeks at the beginning of the season were also spent sailing at Dorchester Sailing club allowing senior Scouts to achieve their stage 2 Sailing award.

Our leadership qualifications and boating equipment allow every member to be on the water -sometimes up to 74 members at the same time.

We have also been able to purchase 4 new kayaks and paddles (to replace our aging fleet of boats), thanks to Royal Navy funding.

Mowgli's report starts from May last year and we have had a really busy time since then. With the number of Cubs at our capped maximum number of 30 for the last few years we have been incredibly busy. We have had a great year with the Cubs earning lots of badges, 524 up to the writing of this report (1st of March).

17th to 19th of May 2019 was the group camp. All the sections of the 33rd camped at the 24th Dry Sandford. Each section ran bases of different activities and we also had a climbing wall, archery and a mobile cave. We had a convoy of mini buses to take everyone to the boat base for water activities. It was a really busy, fun weekend.

We made wind turbines as part of alternative power. We went on a nature walk behind St Mary's Church, one of our leaders Rikki and her husband Nick spent a weekend walking around the course to find plants, trees and other points of interest for the Cubs to find using a map of the area. They even came across a Snakeskin?

We made 3D maps, did Backwoods cooking and took part in the District Football competition, we won't talk about that other than to say we were robbed! We had our normal visit to the boat base where the Cubs had loads of fun on and in the water.

On 12 - 14th July 2019 Mowgli Cubs joined with our other Cub section and about 1,100 other Cubs from around the District at the water park,
Dorchester on Thames, where the Cubs had a fantastic time with 3 areas
Land, Air and Sea, the Cubs were put into groups and were given a chance to



go on land zorbs pedal go- karts, fun fair with land based activities. In the Air activities area, the Cubs had a go in a flight simulator of a

modern fighter jet and make model gliders and other air activities, kite making. We also had a fly by from a Spitfire on the Saturday and a Hurricane on the Sunday. The water activities were most popular with dragon boat racing, pedalos, kayaking and of course the Inflatable bouncing water course.



We ended the term with our end of term BBQ.

The start of the autumn term 2019 was with a 7 mile long bike ride nearly all the Cubs took part in the ride around Kidlington. We also went to Rebound Revolution in Bicester to bounce off some energy.

Later in the year we had 7 Cubs who went to JOTI/JOTA which stands for Jamboree On The Internet and Jamboree On The Airwaves. This gave the Cubs the chance to safely talk to Scouts from all over the world via the internet or via radio transmissions.

During the half term break someone thought that it was a good idea to have our Halloween sleepover a great sleepover with lots of messy games and fun. November we had a parent who came and showed Mowgli Cubs why we have to remember all of the wars. She showed us her collection of Poppies and a video of the ship that her father was on during the Falklands crisis. This gave the Cubs a real sense of purpose during the Remembrance parade.

We had some very intelligent and inquisitive questions from our Cubs which took the speaker from the Grace Church a bit by surprise.

We have had a great start to this spring term 2020 with a trip to ClipnClimb a newly opened climbing centre in Bicester the Cubs just loved it. If you are ever stuck for an idea this place is great fun and it gets the Cubs really tired!








We have had Chinese new year, teaching the Cub promise from Hong Kong and trying some Chinese food. One of our parents made and brought in some "Pandan" cake, absolutely delicious (a green sponge cake).



We have just recently had a visit from the Police who came to talk to the Cubs about knife crime.



We were also very lucky to be able to learn emergency aid level 3. This was with the help of mannequins from IMPS to do CPR. Mowgli Cubs then did a fundraiser to help keep the Injury, Minimisation, and Prevention for Schools (IMPS) open. The Cubs did a 200 challenge in one night, activities including folding a towel, doing a small jigsaw, finding a Cub who has blue eyes etc. We managed to raise £421.90 plus some more donations still not in yet. A fantastic effort from everyone.



We continue the rest of the term with a nature based night. We are going to have a go at Circus skills and finally we are going to finish the term with a chocolate based night.
