1 Objectives and Activities

The purposes of the Methodist Church are and shall be deemed to have been since the Date of Union the advancement of:

- a) The Christian faith in accordance with the doctrinal standards and discipline of The Methodist Church;
- b) Any charitable purpose for the time being of any Connexional, District, Circuit, local or other organisation of The Methodist Church;
- c) Any charitable purpose for the time being of any society or institution subsidiary or ancillary to The Methodist Church;
- d) Any purpose for the time being of any charity being a charity subsidiary or ancillary to The Methodist Church.

The District meets in Synod twice a year and in other groupings more regularly. It supports the training of ministers, both presbyteral and diaconal and provides the means for continuing training.

The District encourages all in the circuits and churches to have a vision that is greater than the local area.

The District employs people to work on its behalf in areas such as chaplaincy, evangelism and youth work.

We confirm the trustees have had regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

2 Achievements and performance

The District has produced and circulated a booklet for members to consider regarding Transforming Lives and Communities. It encourages them to look at how this matches "Our Calling", the key objectives of Methodism. In this way, the District has encouraged Circuits, Churches and members to review their priorities. The District has purchased and adapted / equipped a doubledecker Bus to be used

as a mobile Godly Play Classroom.

North West Region. The District has continued in discussions with other Districts to see how we can work together in a region.

The District has monitored the changing of ministerial appointments in the District and those involved with training.

The District has increased it's team of lay-workers in Circuits to support the ministerial staff where it has not been able to appoint a minister in Stationing. 2.1 Plans for future years

The District plans to continue with Transforming Lives and Communities and to develop the work of the Godly Play Bus.

There will be continuing work in the North West Region.

There will be continuing work with ministerial appointments.

3 Financial review

During 2018/19, the Lancashire District received total income of £348,079 (£388,652 in 2017/18) and expended £333,055 (£240,193 in 2017/18). The resulting surplus was reduced by an unrealised net loss on

investments of £867, producing a net surplus of £14,157 across all Funds.

The Trustees of the Dstrict are confident that the District is a going concern, principally because Circuits

continue to meet their Assessments and the District has adequate reserves to cover any shortfall in

anticipated income that may arise.

3.1 Investment policy and performance

To comply with Methodist Standing Orders, monies for long term investment are lodged with the Trustees for Methodist Church Purposes (TMCP). TMCP acts as custodian trustee for all real estate held by Districts and for all large (over £20k) bequests and for the proceeds of sale of any property formerly owned by the District. These sums are invested in unities of investments or held on deposit. The investment returns are close to tracking the movements in the FTSE100 index. The deposit income mirrors the deposit rates available elsewhere. The Lancashire District Trustees' investment policy is aligned with that of the CFB and TMCP because these organisations take into consideration the social, environmental and ethical considerations, both negatively and positively, that make investments uitable for the Methodist Church.

Short term deposits are lodged directly with the Central Finance Board (CFB) and attract good rates of interest.

There are no bench marks for the expected returns or appreciation on investments at TMCP and CFB. It is the District's policy to manage the cash and investment resources of the District so that a rate of return on Investment – both by way of dividend and capital appreciation – is obtained at least as good as market rate considering the District's low appatite for risk. The total return achieved in 2018/19 on Lancashire District's TMCP invested funds was 1.26% for the year.

The two undesignated Funds, (Methodist Church Fund and General Expenses Fund) work together by collecting Assessments from Circuits and funding the District's main activities, including paying the Connexional Assessment. They combine to be classified as the District's General Fund with the purpose of being available to the Trustees in the furtherance of the general objectives of the District.

All monies are invested with the CFB or TMCP with a certain amount kept in the Current Accounts for week by week expenses. The Trustees have agreed a Reserves Policy for each Fund, the key policies relating to the Methodist Church Fund and the General Expenses Fund, as follows:-

The Reserves Policy for the Methodist Church Fund is to hold a reserve equal to 25% of one quarter's Assessment payments received from the Circuits, thereby allowing for late quarterly payments by one or more Circuits. The quarterly payments for 2019/20 are £128,084, so the actual reserve of £45,546 at 31st August 2019 is £13,525 more than the minimum reserve of £32,021. This additional reserve will be used to help to minimise the increase in District Assessments for 2020/21 and beyond.

The Reserves Policy for the General Expenses Fund is to hold sufficient in reserve to cover six months' expenditure, ie £88,000 based on the 2019/20 Forecast. The year-end balance of £120,814 results in an excess of £32,814. This sum is held to fund additional work on the Chairman's manse, including work arising from the quinquennial reviews, and also to minimise the increase in District Assessments for 2020/21 and beyond.

The Reserves Policy for the District Advance Fund is to ensure that the amount in reserve is always at least equal to the sum of all approved and anticipated grants for the current and future years. At 31^{st} August 2019, the Fund held a balance of £565, 185, of which the sum of £429,191 was committed to future grants, leaving £135,994 uncommitted. The District Youth Fund is used to grant fund projects which encourage and develop work with young people across the District and has a similar policy in that the reserve must always be at least equal to the sum of all approved and anticipated grants for the current and future years.

3.3 Collaborative arrangements with connected charities

The District's main source of funding was the assessments obtained from each Circuit within the District based on the staffing levels of the Circuit and this was used to fund most of the cost of administering the District. This sum amounted to £51,667 (£51,572 in 2017/18).

The District also obtained from each Circuit with a reserve, known as a Circuit Model Trust Fund (CMTF), a levy based on the value of each Circuit's CMTF at the start of the Connexional year (01 September). In 2018/19 this sum was £58,206 and this was credited to the District Advance Fund (£57,936 in 2017/18).

The District holds no funds as custodian trustee. It does, however, quarterly receive from Circuits within the District the Circuits' contributions to the Connexion's Methodist Church Fund (MCF). These sums are collected as agent for the MCF and are passed to the MCF later in the same month as collected. Funds received by the District as agent are not recognised as an asset in the financial statements because the funds are not within its control. No fee is earned in respect of this agency arrangement and the District incurs no costthrough this arrangement. A sum of £450,469 (£112,617 per quarter) passed through the District's Methodist Church Fund in 2018/19.

4 Trustees' responsibilities

For each financial year ending on 31 August the Trustees are required to prepare financial statements that give a true and fair view of the District's financial activities during the year and of its financial position at the end of the year. In preparing these financial statements, the Trustees must select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently using the accruals method
 make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent

- follow applicable accounting standards 3.
- prepare accounts to comply with the Charities SORP 4

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the District and enables them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the law. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the District and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The Trustees are responsible for the maintenance and integrity of the corporate and financial information included on the District's website. Legislation in the United Kingdom governing the preparation and dissemination of financial statements may differ from legislation in other jurisdictions.

In addition to the above, the Trustees are responsible for Health & Safety. Training in the responsibilities of Trustees is offered to all new trustees soon after their appointment.

4.1 Risk

The District is largely risk averse, but especially in making grants to entities embarking on new and imaginative initiatives, the District is prepared to underwrite considered risks.

The District manages risks by being aware of them, quantifying their impact not only in cost terms but in possible reputational or structural damage, laying them off through an insurer and minimising them by not taking them or by setting up control systems which timecusly report any significant change in the risk.

5 Structure, governance and management

The District is an unincorporated association and is governed by the Methodist Church Act 1976, the Deed of Union and the Model Trust Deeds of the Methodist Church and was registered with the Charity Commissioners on 1st March 2010

5.1 Structure

Circuits are the coordinating charities for local groups of Churches; Circuits pay the stipends of the ministers and employ lay staff to serve the Churches in the Circuit; most decisions are made at or ratified by the four-/six-monthly Circuit Meetings. A District is the coordinating charity for a group of contiguous Circuits and makes its decisions at the half yearly. Synods. The Methodist Conference meets once each year as the supreme denominational body for all Methodist Churches .

Overall regulatory authority rests with the Methodist Conference.
 The Connexional Office implements decisions made by Conference and is also responsible for the stationing of presbyters and deacons (collectively known as ministers) in individual Circuits within the District.
 Connexional decisions are passed to the Chair of the District and the appropriate officers of the District for implementation.

implementation.

The District passes control down to Circuit level for local implementation by the Superintendent Minister, ministerial staff and Circuit Stewards, and authority is delegated to the Circuit Meeting for certain matters.
 The Circuit Meeting passes regulatory control down to Church Councils for local implementation by the presbyter, the Church Stewards, and other officers, and this regulatory authority is then exercised by Church Councils as Managing Trustees of their charity.

5.2 Purpose of the District

The District is an expression, over a wider geographical area than any Circuit, of the Connexional character of the Church.

The purposes of the Methodist Church are and shall be deemed to have been since the date of the union the advancement of

a. the Christian faith in accordance with the doctrinal standards and the discipline of the Methodist Church, and any charitable purpose for the time being of any connexional, District, Circuit, local or other organisation of the

Methodist Church, and c. any charitable purpose for the time being of any society or institution subsidiary or ancillary to the Methodist Church, and

d. any purpose for the time being of any charity being a charity subsidiary or ancillary of the Methodist Church.

The primary purpose of this District is to advance the mission of the Methodist Church in Lancashire 1. by providing opportunities for Circuits to work together and support each other 2. by offering to Circuits resources of finance, personnel and expertise.

The District serves the Local Churches and Circuits and the Conference in the support, deployment and oversight of the various ministries of the Church, and in programmes of training.

5.3 Governance

The District operates within a statutory framework of regulation and seeks to ensure that it follows Methodist Standing Orders. It relies on the Connexional Office at 25 Marylebone Road, London NW1 5JR to provide guidance on changes that could affect the District.

The members of the District Policy Committee (DPC) are the Trustees of the Lancashire Methodist District.

The members of the DPC are appointed annually by a vote of the Synod for a continuous term not normally exceeding six years. The Chair of District is *ex officio* chair of the DPC. When a position becomes vacant on the DPC, nominations are invited from ministers and lay members of Circuits within the District. The Chair of the District then shares with nominees what the roles involve. If they wish to be considered for a role, their names and reasoned statements are taken to the DPC and the District Synod for appointment. Members may be either ministers or lay people attending Churches in the area covered by the District.

The DPC normally meets four times per year and deals with routine and exceptional matters. It oversees the work of the Grants Committee, the Nomination Committee for District Chair, the University Chaptain Management Group, the Child Friendly Church Group, the Recordilation Group, the Complaints Support Group, the Lay Workers Support Group, the Ministers' Development Review Group, the Property Consent Panel, the Property Management Group, the Review Group, the Safeguarding Group, the World Church Links and the Methodist Schools Visitors.

5.4 Responsibility of the District Policy Committee

(i) to formulate and promote policies which will advance the mission of the Church in the Circuits and Local Churches and, in particular, to supervise the use of resources of personnel, property and finance and to assist Local Churches and Circuits having exceptional problems; (ii) to encourage inter-Circuit and ecumenical co-operation;

 (ii) to act in an executive capacity in matters remitted to the Committee by the Synod;
 (iv) to keep within its purview all District concerns not dealt with elsewhere;
 (v) to contribute and respond to the development of Connexional policies as reflected in the work of the Conference and the Methodist Council, and to carry out its other responsibilities with any such development in mind (vi) to be aware that the stipend of the Chair of the District is set - currently by reference to the change over a

year in the Consumer Price Index and to the annual change in the Average Weckly Earnings Index – using a formula that was agreed by the Methodist Conference for all ministers within the Connexion; (vii) constantly to be aware of and to take account of the public benefit guidance issued by the Charity Commission.

1 Accounting framework and accounting policies i Accounting framework

The financial statements have been prepared under the Charities Act 2011 in accordance with the 2014 version of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of freland (FRS 102), effective from 1 January 2015 – the Charities SORP (FRS102 as amended by Update Bulletin 1) – in replacement for the SORP's 2005 version specified in its related 2008 Regulations and in accordance with the 'true and fair override' provision contained therein.

ii Public benefit entity

The Lancashire District meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s) below.

iii Basis

These accounts have been prepared on the basis of historical cost except that investments are shown at their market value at the end of the year, on the accruals basis to show a true and fair view of the District's financial position and activities.

iv Content

The financial information presented is relevant, reliable, comparable and complete. Where estimates are used these are based on experience, research and judgement. The accounts are expressed in £Sterling, rounded to the nearest pound.

v Going concern

Based on the monetary assets and human resources available at 31 August 2019, the Trustees believe that the District is a going concern.

vi Consolidation

The District oversees the work of ministers and lay workers in Churches and Circuits within the District but does not have control over those Circuits or Churches, ministers or lay workers except in extreme circumstances, none of which were applicable. For this reason, the financial statements of the Churches and Circuits within the District are not consolidated into these financial statements.

vii Income recognition

Income is brought into account when it is more likely than not that the economic benefit of the income will accrue to the Lancashire District. No attempt is made to measure the value of services donated by volunteers. Details of how the contribution to the cost of the District Chair has been determined appears in Note 3. A similar figure appears in the Expenditure at Note 6.

Individual amounts categorised as Other income in the SOFA will be shown separately if they are considered material

The District acts as agent in three matters:

- the collection of quarterly assessments from circuits which are paid to the Methodist Church Fund
 the payment of expenses of representatives from the District to the Methodist Conference
- 3. the collection taken at the spring synod on behalf of the Methodist Minsters' Children's Relief Fund

In all these matters the transactions are not reflected in the SOFA because there is no obligation on the District to make up any shortfall in assessments from Circuits. Sums received as Circuit assessments cannot be recognised as income in the District as they are the income of the MCF.

In accordance with the Charities SORP(FRS102), the time of volunteers is not recognised.

vili Expenditure

This is recognised when a liability is incurred, or a constructive obligation arises, that results in the payment being unavoidable. Liabilities are recognised as soon as an outflow of economic benefit is considered more likely than not under the legal or constructive obligation committing the District to pay out resources.

ix Grants

Grants are recognised annually only as and when any performance conditions attaching to the award are met, even when the award is for a recurrent grant over more than one year. All grants awarded for payment in future financial years are conditional on the Grants Committee being satisfied, on the basis of progress reports from the grantee, that the grant's achievements to date justify the payment of further instalments of that grant. Such commitments are noted as contingent liabilities and included within the District Advance Fund in these accounts.

x VAT

Since the District is not VAT registered, all input VAT is charged with the expenses to which it refers.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

xi Tangible fixed assets

These are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and individually cost at least £1,000. The freehold property is shown in the accounts at 2015 deemed values, of which the land component is deemed to be £111,943. No depreciation is provided on the building because the trustees consider the current residual fair value of the manse buildings to be not less than their current value. Any depreciation would not be material. The property has been reviewed for impairment.

xii Investments

The investments of the Lancashire District are held by the Trustees for Methodist Church Purposes (TMCP) as custodian trustees. The valuations, at market value, are those provided by TMCP. The unrealised gains arising on investments at the end of the year are shown in the SOFA.

xili Debtors and creditors; bank and cash

Debtors are stated at the amounts owed to the District or prepaid. Creditors are initially recognised at settlement amount after any trade discounts, where normal credit terms apply, or amount advanced to the District. Subsequently creditors that are current liabilities are measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid. The liquid funds of bank balances and deposit account balances are shown at the realisable values.

xiv Methodist Church Fund

The District acts as agent for the Methodist Church Fund (MCF) by collecting its assessments on Circuits and does not, therefore, include the assessments in the SOFA. If a Circuit is late in paying its MCF assessment to the District but such sum is received before the quarterly transfer to the MCF, the amount paid late will be shown as a debtor in the District's accounts. The sums received and paid in 2018/19 are shown in note 23 below.

xv Transition to FRS 102

Other than some reclassification of expenditure between categories and the inclusion of the District Chair's remuneration and associated costs, no re-statement of items has been required in making the transition to FRS102.

xvi Ministers' manse costs

The District is required to provide accommodation for each Minister and his / her family. The District bears the cost of repairs, maintenance, building insurance, Council Tax and water charges. These costs are not shown separately as benefits-in-kind for Ministers as HMRC does not seek to tax these receipts in the hands of the Ministers.

2 Assessment on Circuits

All Circuits (see list given below in this note) paid their assessments to the District and to the MCF during the year. An assessment on Circuits is annually determined by District with reference to the number of ministerial and lay staff in the Circuits.

Contribution to Methodist Church Fund (MCF)

In addition to the assessments on the Circuits to help defray the costs of running the District, the District acted as agent for the Methodist Church Fund which levied assessments on the Circuits in this District totalling £450,469 (2017-18: £456,700) all of which were collected before the end of the year and paid over to the MCF in the year. No balance was held at the end of the year, no fee is received for this service which is performed at no cost to the District. These sums collected for and remitted to the MCF do not appear elsewhere in these financial statements.

3 Cost of Chair and trustees

The Chair of District chairs meetings of the District Policy Committee (DPC). The members of the DPC are the trustees of the District. The stipend, employer's NIC and employer's pension contributions of the Chair of District are paid by the Methodist Connexion. The Chair's other costs are met by the District.

Since the stipend-related costs above (*I.e.* £39,556; (2017-18 £38,728) are borne by the Connexion, they appear both in the Income of the District and the Expenditure of the District (See Note 6). It should be noted that the chair is required to occupy the District manse. The manse is provided by the Lancashire District and the District maintains the property. The Chair of District is the sole paid key management person and is supported by members of the DPC.

No accrual is made for the Chair's entitlement to a sabbatical as his functions are undertaken by a Deputy Chair at minimal extra cost to the District.

Payment to Trustees

It is District policy to offer to reimburse members of the District Policy Committee and others involved in the administration of District affairs for expenditure properly incurred in carrying out their duties. The Chair of the District undertakes the primary executive role within the District. Apart from the Chair of District and the District Safeguarding Officer, no member of the District Policy Committee was in receipt of any payment for work undertaken on behalf of the District, although certain travelling and administration costs were reimbursed whenever this was requested.

The only Trustee who is an employee of the District is the District Safeguarding Officer.

No employees received employee benefits that totalled more than £60,000. There is no accrual for holiday pay as it is immaterial; the holiday year ends on 31 August. All staff are paid at or above the living wage.

One part time employee was engaged exclusively in safeguarding matters, and the other provided secretarial / office management assistance in the District Office. Two part-time employees worked in South Fytde Circuit. It should be noted that line 13 of the SOFA (Salarles and associated costs) includes travel, telephone and other expenses paid to staff which are not included in the above table.

Pensions

Most ordained presbyters and deacons are members of the Methodist Ministers' Pension Scheme (MMPS). This is a defined benefit scheme. The Supreme Court held in 2014 that Methodist ministers (which term includes presbyters and deacons) are not employees of the Church. For simplicity, however, when dealing with National insurance Contributions and pension contributions, the terms 'employer' and 'employee' are used as they would be in an employing body.

On the other hand, lay employees are contractually employees and have the option of joining the Pension and Assurance Scheme for Lay Employees of the Methodist Church (PASLEMC), The Pensions Trust or some other arrangement. PASLEMC is a defined benefit scheme and the employing Churches and Circuits contribute as employers to this scheme.

The Connexion accounts for both the MMPS and PASLEMC pension schemes and shows the figures in the annual Methodist Church in Great Britain accounts. The MMPS is in deficit but a plan for removal of the deficit has been proposed and is being implemented. Details of the deficits on these schemes can be found in the Annual Report and Accounts of The Methodist Church at <u>www.methodist.org.uk</u>.

15 Trustees for Methodist Church Purposes

The funds that support the District Advance Fund and the District Chair's manse are held by TMCP in Trustees Interest Funds on which interest is credited to the accounts each month. These are regarded as medium and long term investments.

TMCP is the legal owner and Custodian Trustee of all Methodist Model Trust property, including Legacies, Endowments and Accumulated Funds. Trust property is held for and on behalf of local Managing Trustees who are responsible for the day to day management of trust property. TMCP ensure that, through providing guidance and acting under their direction, the Managing Trustees comply with charity law and Methodist law and policy as determined by the Methodist Conference.

16 Central Finance Board (CFB) and cash at bank

The District has three current accounts which are held at Natwest Bank PLC (two accounts) and at TSB plc (one account), both authorised institutions. The sums held on those accounts are immediately available. In addition, the District has six deposit accounts at CFB, a common deposit fund. Interest is earned on these accounts and credited monthly; the sums deposited can be withdrawn without notice and without loss of interest. These sums are viewed as being liquid.

In 2016/17, only four bank accounts were held at CFB, but with two new Funds being placed under the management of the District, it was appropriate to open a new CFB Deposit account for each, the District Schools' Support Fund and the North West Training Forum Fund.

19 Unrestricted Funds

19.1 General Fund

Balance of £614,133 at 31st August 2019 (£ 622,034 at 31st August 2018)

As the District's MCF and General Expenses Fund work together to collect Assessments from Circuits and fund the District's main activities, they combine to be classified as the District's General Fund. Their net movement in funds for 2018 /19 of -£ 7,901 is attributable to a deficit on the District's mainstream bulness. The purpose of the General Fund is to use at the discretion of the Trustees in the furtherance of the general objectives of the District. 73% of the value of the General Fund is now held as the property which is the District Chair's manse.

19.2 Other Designated Funds Balance of £206,728 at 31st August 2019 (£212,337 at 31st August 2018)

The funds are to serve specific purposes but are not restricted by any document or deed to that purpose alone. These funds comprise:

District Youth Fund - balance £47,732 at 31st August 2019 (£50,941 at 31st August 2018) is used to fund projects which encourage and develop work with young people across the District, including a contribution to young people's events.

Chaplaincy Fund - balance £18,102 at 31st August 2019 (£17,427 at 31st August 2018) will be used in the near future to help fund the Lancaster University Chaplain post following the cessation of grant funding.

Benevolence Fund - balance £140,894 at 31st August 2019 (£143,969 at 31st August 2018) The Fund is available for use across a range of cases of hardship, including ministers, lay-staff, lay-people and anyone in the community suffering hardship. It can also be used to support the consequences of national or global disasters. The sum in reserve is well in excess of the sums normally required and the District Team is reviewing the Fund and how it could be used. In particular, there is a need to work with TMCP to find a way to release the constraints on the use of this Fund.

20 Restricted Funds

The Restricted Funds are the newly established Schools' Support Fund (£10,406 at 31st August 2019), the Fund for the NW Training Forum which is being used to fund the Children and Youth Worker Enablers' training project across the North West region (£20,501 at 31st August 2019) and a "Connected Organisation" which is the "Lancashire District World Church Fund". This Fund is managed by a Committee reporting to the District Policy Committee, but its accounts are separately maintained and audited, before being brought into the District accounts. The balance on the Fund was £7,995 at 31st August 2019 (£6,463 at 31st August 2018).

24 Volunteer contributions
