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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 June 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Objectives and aims

The Brendan Ingle Foundation was established as charity to continue and develop boxing trainer Brendan Ingle's community work. Since the establishment of St Thomas' Boys and Girls Club in 1963 Brendan Ingle worked tirelessly on a voluntary basis with socially excluded young people and has been instrumental in turning their lives around. This includes keeping them out of prison, being a key part of their rehabilitation post prison and coaching them in life skills to help them become better citizens. He was awarded the MBE in 1999 in recognition of his community work. In the process he produced 17 World, Commonwealth and British boxing champions. The Gym currently has 150 members with 85% from an ethnic minority background.

The aim of The Brendan Ingle Foundation is to address the needs of socially excluded individuals or those at risk of becoming socially excluded, by pursuing the following objectives 1) promoting social inclusion; 2) realising the needs of the socially excluded and 3) helping the socially excluded reintegrate into society using a combination of sport, mentoring, education and training.

From a more formal perspective the charity's purposes as set out in the company's objects contained in the company's memorandum of association are:

To promote social inclusion for the public benefit by preventing people from becoming socially excluded, relieving the needs of those people who are socially excluded and assisting them to integrate into society, in particular but not exclusively by:

- Providing facilities for sport and physical education with a particular emphasis on boxing and other active sports, and
- Mentoring and education and training.

For the purposes of this clause "socially excluded" means being excluded from society, or parts of society, as a result of one or more of the following factors: unemployment; financial hardship; youth or old age; ill health (physical or mental); substance abuse or dependency including alcohol and drugs; discrimination on the grounds of sex, race, disability, ethnic origin, religion, belief, creed, sexual orientation or gender re-assignment; poor educational or skills attainment; relationship and family breakdown; poor housing (that is housing that does not meet basic habitable standards); crime (either as a victim of crime or as an offender rehabilitating into society).

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

During the year the received a grant of £9,990 from Sport England for a project called Outreach and Youth Development. The project delivered the motivational boxing taster sessions with three local secondary schools and boxing and multi-sport sessions during the school holidays. The sessions were very well attended and received and resulted in a number of students joining the boxing club as members.

Other projects and activities in the year included

- 1. Setting up the Brendan Ingle Scholars programme. This was for a group of Y11 students from Hinde House School that were at risk of exclusion. It involved completion of a boxing programme and achievement of Ingle Boxing Awards and mentorship on education and life skills. This has been delivered from November 2018. All students on the programme completed their GCSEs and went on to obtain an apprenticeship or a place in further education. The programme was funded by a grant of £25,000 payable over two years from Charities Trust. Amer Khan resigned as a trustee in order to lead the programme and is remunerated from the fund. He is a former amateur and professional boxer and was a former pupil from one of the school the charity works with. He is now a qualified boxing coach. He was coached and mentored by Brendan Ingle and benefitted enormously from his guidance. The trustees are very grateful that he is leading the programme and is able to give back what he learnt from Brendan Ingle.
- 2. Completion of the Active Wincobank project The completion of this project involved providing affordable holiday sports activities for local children from 5-11 years old. The charity worked with a local dance club to provide boxing, dance and gymnastics classes. The trustees are very grateful to Big Lottery for enabling The Brendan Ingle Foundation to meet the need for affordable and high quality school holiday activities.
- 3. On 28th June 2019 we were awarded £10,000 Awards for All grant from the National Lottery. This is to fund the setting up of a youth club to deliver multi-sport activities. This is to broaden what the charity offers to young people.
- 4. We received funding of £1,000 from the Let's Build Health fund to set up the Ingle Runners. Ingle Runners is a women's running group. The level of physical activity of women in the area is low and Wincobank has one of the highest obesity levels in Sheffield. The funding was used to train run leaders. The group has been a major success with the over 60 women taking part in the 3 weekly runs. The group is inclusive and is for all levels of runner from beginner to advanced. We also received a further grant of £1,000 to engage an advance running coach to develop interval training and technique sessions and a physio therapist who was also a strength and conditioning coach to help develop on injury prevention programme.
- 5. Masters students from Sheffield University's School of Architecture were engaged to design the Ingle Way. This is a project to develop a memorial to Brendan Ingle and a walk from the Ingle Gym that will help celebrate Brendan's contribution to the local community and encourage physical activity and help re-generate the local area. A fund raising campaign during the year raised £8,269 towards the Ingle Way.
- 6. Various fund raising events took place during the and these included:
- a. A fund raising walk by Tara Ingle raised £1,663.
- b. A sky dive by Steve Culf raised £530
- c. A sky dive by Dominic Ingle raised £3,897
- d. The Jamie McDonnell Foundation raffle raised £1,520.
- e. A charity walk by teachers and pupils of Wickersley School raised £1,000.
- 7. We engaged masters students from Sheffield Hallam University's Sports and Physical Activity Faculty to undertake research of what activities local children would want to do on the outside playground adjacent to the Ingle Gym. The report they produced will be used to help provide guidance on future activities.
- 8. Continued to fund coaches to deliver boxing development sessions to young boxers and adult boxing sessions.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

FINANCIAL REVIEW

During the year the received income of £64,081 (2018 - £12,379) and had outgoings of £35,532 (2018 - £12,739), resulting in a surplus for the year of £28,549 (2018 - deficit of £360). At the end of the year the charity had funds of £103,353 (2018 - £74,804). Of these funds £28,586 were restricted funds (2018 - £nil). The majority of the restricted funds relate to grants that were awarded during the year and which will be completed in the following year.

FUTURE PLANS

The activities of The Brendan Ingle Foundation charitable work focuses on four main areas:

Education - delivering The Brendan Ingle Scholars programme to local schools. Students are take part in a boxing programme that develops life skills and where they are mentored and supported to achieve improvements in behaviour and academic attainment. The programme targets those students who are at risk of underachieving at school and/or getting involved in anti-social activity. We have received the second instalment of £12,500 of funding from Charities Trust to contribute to the development of The Brendan Ingle Scholars. The local schools have asked us to extend the programme to other year groups.

Community Well-Being - this includes activities to improve the physical and mental well-being of members of the community. This includes the work of the Ingle Runners and the provision of other sport and youth activities including after school and school holiday provision. During July and August 2019 the charity completed the delivery of the Youth Outreach and Youth Development project funded by Sport England. On 19th June 2020 the charity was awarded a grant of £22,460 from the Sheffield Safer Community Partnership. This grant is to provide activities and support to victims or potential victims of hate crime and those suffering from poor mental health. On 28th June the charity was awarded an Awards for All grant from National Lottery. The project is called Safer Together and is to establish a new youth group for children with additional needs and will be delivered over the next year.

Boxing - we support the Ingle Boxing Academy which is the amateur boxing gym that delivers boxing classes every day of the week at all levels from beginner to competitive amateur.

Buildings and infrastructure - the trustees have set up a designated fund for the future development of St Thomas'/Ingle Gym at Wincobank Sheffield. This is the location for the majority of the charity's activities. The objective for the charity is either to buy the building or obtain a long lease. The fund may be used as a contribution to the purchase of the property or to help fund its development should it obtain a long lease. At 30 June 2019 the fund was £50,000 (2018 - £50,000).

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Governing document

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 5th June 2008 and registered as a charity on 10th February 2012. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association.

Organizational structure

Management Committee

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law.

The charity is managed by the Management Committee. At present members of the Management Committee include the trustees and volunteers who are selected on the basis of their commitment to the objectives of the charity.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 JUNE 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Plant and machinery - 20% on cost

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Designated funds represent money set aside that can be spent on anything, designated by the trustees which furthers the objectives of the charity. This includes all funds held for working capital, initiatives and development, and contingent liabilities.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus, the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.
