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Report of the Trustees for the year ended 30 September 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 September 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Operations Update

The Dracaena Centre is operated as a registered charity, located between Falmouth and Penryn and serves the two towns of Falmouth and Penryn and the surrounding rural hinterland.

The Centre promotes sports, health, training, and restorative and social justice, and supports young people, early years, families, and the wider community.

We're aware that strong communities are built of empowered individuals. By providing guidance, support and understanding, all within an open and inclusive environment, we help residents and the wider community to develop and prosper.

We provide a restorative approach and an ethos & philosophy for making, maintaining and repairing relationships and fostering a sense of shared social responsibility, and believe that increasing individuals' health & wellbeing through activities, helps them become confident, outgoing, and ready to take on life.

Our Vision

Dracaena's vision is for an empowered, mutually supportive, and inclusive community within Falmouth & Penryn whilst also serving the surrounding rural hinterland.

While it is recognised Dracaena cannot bring this vision to fruition by itself, and that it will only ever be a work in progress'; it will continuously strive towards this goal in tandem with its partners and supporters.

Our beliefs

Dracaena believes that developing and empowering individuals together with providing a safe and supportive environment, fosters relationships and helps build a mutually supportive and inclusive community.

Increasing individuals' health and well-being through a variety of activities helps them become confident, outgoing, and ready to take on life. By offering a wide range of informal and developmental multi-sport activities, and supporting people in making regular sports participation part of their long term lifestyle, we can make a significant impact on their long term physical and mental health and well-being. We also believe that sport is a fantastic tool for young people to build their confidence, skills and abilities and improves opportunities for volunteering and employment.

We feel that providing a safe and supportive environment within the Dracaena Centre is key to our facilitation of activities that promote social and intergenerational interaction and builds community cohesion.

Supporting young people to form positive relationships and a sense of community in an inclusive, relaxed and fun environment, while developing skills in an informal educational setting, puts them on the road to being valued and making a positive contribution.

Through our restorative justice work, we provide an ethos & philosophy for making, maintaining and repairing relationships and fostering a sense of shared social responsibility.

Helping those not in training or employment by supporting them to gain recognised qualifications to improve volunteering and/or employment prospects builds individual self-confidence and self-worth, and helps build economic security for individuals and families.

Whilst we host over 45 community-based clubs, local organisations and statutory services at the Centre, we also account for 40% of all the delivery across our charitable aims. This Dracaena 'branded' delivery includes:

Community Café, Mediation, Youth Services, Youth Justice, Toy Library, Toddler Group, Special Olympics, Zumba, Basketball, Table Tennis, Older Peoples Fitness, Community Education programmes, 50 Plus Social Group and Early years support.

We host the following activities: Baby Yoga, Yoga, Kettlersize, Pilates, Addaction, Healthy Weight, Counselling, Slimming World, Capoeira, Youth Theatre, Table Tennis, Bongo Babes, Boxing and other Martial Arts.

Our activities change lives by producing intermediate outcomes in seven main areas:

Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty under Section 4 of the Companies Act 2006 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Through creating opportunities for individuals and groups to develop in a range of ways, the Dracaena Centre is committed to promoting open and equal access to its activities and strengthening the communities it serves.

The Dracaena Centre aims to increase the health, employability, skills, leisure opportunity and ultimately the long term quality of life for the residents of the community. We aim to achieve this by providing better access to services such as advice, guidance, youth activity, recreation, healthy eating, employment and training. The target group are those who are disadvantaged within our community. We are working with and delivering support to the vulnerable and homeless, returners to work, ex-offenders, young people at risk of exclusion, those recovering from substance misuse and those not in employment, education or training. We are also delivering programmes of positive activities to young people which directly supports those residents who are fearful of crime and anti-social behaviour. Participants benefit from increased self esteem and confidence as a result of their participation in the offered programmes, activities and events.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Financial position

Total income increased by £32,790 to £280,458 (2018: £247,668) primarily due to additional grants received in the year. The charity recorded a net surplus for the year of £35,441 (2018: £31,572).

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

Charity law requires any income received by a charity to be spent within a reasonable period of receipt. Reserves are that part of a charity's unrestricted income fund that is freely available to spend on any of the charity's purposes. Unrestricted income funds are income or income funds which can be spent at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of any of the charity's objectives.

The Dracaena Centre reserves policy takes into account the charity's financial circumstances and other relevant factors.

The finance sub-committee monitors the level of reserves held throughout the year and keep the policy under review to ensure it meets the charity's changing needs and circumstances.

The Dracaena Centre reserves policy explains to existing and potential funders, donors and other stakeholders why we are holding a particular amount in reserve. The policy ensures that the charity's finances are being managed and can also provide an indicator of future funding needs.

The trustees of The Dracaena Centre agree that the following reasons justify the setting up of an income fund reserve:-

- The risk of an unforeseen emergency

- Covering unforeseen day-to-day operational costs

- A source of income e.g. a grant may not be renewed. Funds may be needed to give the charity time to take action if income falls below expectations

- The need to fund short term deficits in a cash budget (e.g. money may need to be spent before a funding grant is received)

The level of Dracaena Centre reserves take into account any short term funding problems that the charity may encounter such as delays in payment of grants and having to pay up-front costs of salaries etc before claiming back from funders. It also includes enough funds to pay the charity's commitments in the event that the charity has to cease its activities.

With this in mind the trustees have set a policy of maintaining two tranches of unrestricted reserves.

Firstly, an amount equivalent to one year's anticipated unrestricted expenditure and, secondly, additional reserves to support the future enhancement of our site.

The trustees will continue to monitor the reserves held throughout the year.

The reserves held are for the general purpose of carrying out the Charity's objectives. As at 30 September 2019 the free reserves stood at £163,221 (2018: £158,804). This represents a increase of £4,417 for the year. At present the trustees believe the reserves are sufficient to enable the Charity to carry out its objectives.

FINANCIAL REVIEW COVID-19 PANDEMIC

The period for this set of accounts is for the financial year October 2018 - September 2019. This period precedes the Covid-19 pandemic. However, we are fully aware of the implications to our charitable activities and our financial position for the year October 19 - September 2020 and beyond.

The Covid-19 pandemic has meant that our charitable activities have continued to happen albeit in a different way.

Our wide range of projects are grant funded or commissioned. When lockdown commenced, we contacted all our funders and explained the new delivery model which demonstrated an alternative approach to supporting the vulnerable clients we work with. We received confirmation from the funding bodies that all funds will be released as per the grant schedules to enable us to continue with the work.

There is good morale in our entire team. Our part-time project delivery staff are paid through the various grant funds and so we have been able to keep them fully employed to continue to support our clients. We only have four core staff roles within the Charity. These are the Charity Manager (1.0), Finance Officer (0.5), Reception & Administration Assistant (0.5) and Caretaker (0.5). These roles are funded by two income streams: First, every grant fund has a management and administration allowance. Second, income from the wide range of statutory, non-statutory, private and community groups who pay an agreed fee for use of the Centre. It is this particular income stream that has been reduced through the pandemic to the tune of circa £2,500 per month during lockdown. As restrictions ease, we anticipate more groups coming back to the Centre to continue with their work. However, we have been successful in securing emergency funds to support our core costs and, as a result, at the end of June 2020 we anticipate a circa £1,500 per month reduction in income since the start of lockdown. The Dracaena Centre building is an asset of the charity and so we have had no concerns regarding our own rental agreements or mortgage. We have benefited from Cornwall Council's (zero rated) Retail Discount (Coronavirus) for the period April 2020 - March 2021. There has been no impact on fundraising as this is an activity the Centre does not currently engage with for unrestricted income.

The Dracaena Centre core aim is to support the community. We do this through a range of family services, youth services, legal advice, community education, youth justice and support for older people. Whilst our funds allow us to continue to support people, we are seeing an increase in the need for family legal support and mental health support for young people. It is in these areas that we are currently applying to secure funds to increase our capacity to help..

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The Dracaena Centre Limited is a charitable company limited by guarantee and not having a share capital. It was incorporated on 21 September 2004 and is governed by its memorandum and articles. The charity was registered with the Charities Commission on 7 October 2006.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

The trust is run on a voluntary basis by elected trustees. The company is run by the trustees with decisions being taken at bi monthly board meetings. All trustees are appointed by the board and approved at the AGM.

Organisational structure

Day to day management of the centre is delegated to the centre manager R May.

Induction and training of new trustees

New trustees are inducted into the work of the charity.

Risk management

The trustees have a duty to identify and review the risks to which the charity is exposed and to ensure appropriate controls are in place to provide reasonable assurance against fraud and error.

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Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 30 September 2019

1. INFORMATION

The Dracaena Centre Limited is a charitable company, limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales. The company registration number and registered office address can be found within the "Report of the Trustees".

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling which is the functional currency of the company. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest pound sterling.

Going Concern

The accounts have been prepared on a going concern basis. As explained in the trustees' report, the Board has considered the impact of the current Covid-19 pandemic on the charitable company's operations. The Board has considered a period of twelve months from the date of approval of the financial statements and whilst it is not possible to reasonably estimate the length or severity of the Covid-19 outbreak, the Board has a reasonable expectation that the charitable company has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. There are no material uncertainties which may create significant doubt over the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Governance costs

Governance costs are those incurred in connection with administration of the charity and compliance with constitutional and statutory requirements.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible assets are initially measured at cost. Such costs include costs directly attributable to making the asset capable of operating as intended. Subsequent to initial recognition, tangible assets are stated at cost less accumulated depreciation and accumulated impairment.

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property	-	Straight line over 50 years to its residual value; land is not depreciated
Equipment	-	20% or 25% on reducing balance

2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the company reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any). Where it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, the company estimates the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs.

The recoverable amount is the higher of fair value less costs to sell and value in use. In assessing value in use, the estimated future cash flows are discounted to their present value using a pre-tax discount rate that reflects current market assessments of the time value of money and the risks specific to the asset for which the estimates of future cash flows have not been adjusted.

If the recoverable amount of an asset (or cash-generating unit) is estimated to be less than its carrying amount, the carrying amount of the asset (or cash-generating unit) is reduced to its recoverable amount. An impairment loss is recognised immediately in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Recognised impairment losses are reversed if, and only if, the reasons for the impairment loss have ceased to apply. Where an impairment loss subsequently reverses, the carrying amount of the asset (or cash generating unit) is increased to the revised estimate of its recoverable amount, but so that the increased carrying amount does not exceed the carrying amount that would have been determined had no impairment loss been recognised for the asset (or cash-generating unit) in prior years. A reversal of an impairment loss is recognised immediately in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 "Basic Financial Instruments" and Section 12 "Other Financial Instruments" of FRS to all of its financial instruments.

Financial assets and liabilities are recognised in the charity's statement of financial position when the company becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are classified into specified categories. The classification depends on the nature and purpose of the financial asset or liability and is determined at the time of recognition.

Basic financial assets, which include trade and other receivables, and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method, unless the arrangement constitute a financing transaction, where the transaction is measure at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest.

Financial instruments

Basic financial liabilities, which include trade and other payables are initially measured at transaction price, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest and subsequently carried at amortised cost.

Financial liabilities are derecognised when, and only when, the charity's obligations are discharged, cancelled, or they expire.
