#### (B) STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The branch is constituted as an unincorporated association. The branch operates as an autonomous branch of the National RSPCA subject to its rules for branches (as updated 2009). A Committee, elected at the AGM governs the branches, who are Trustees of the branch. All Trustees are briefed on their responsibilities as trustees prior to their acceptance of the role. The trustees hold bi-monthly meetings at which decisions are made. The branch operates within a national network of organisations that pursue the same objectives and which are known collectively as the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals.

The network comprises independent branches operation within a defined geographical area for the purposes of fundraising and the provision of animal care facilities and treatments. A regional structure also exists that is overseen on a national basis. This structure provides a team of specialist Inspectors and co-ordinates the policies and objectives of the branches. Representatives of the branches, regional and national organisations meet on an annual basis as a forum to consider all issues affecting animal welfare; and to develop policies for the future pursuit of their common aims. The branch also has links with other organisations committed to the same objectives. The trustees actively review the risks, which the branch faces on a regular basis through regular meetings of the trustees that cover operational and financial reviews. The trustees also examine other operational and business risks which the branch face and confirm that they have established systems to mitigate the significant risks, which have been identified as:

- Loss of reputation through error or fraud;
- Loss of income through error or fraud;
- Insufficient funds to cover the costs of animal welfare activities.

#### (C) OBJECTS, OBJECTIVES AND PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The objects of the Branch are to promote the work and objects of the National Society of the RSPCA – to promote kindness or to suppress cruelty to animals by all lawful means – with particular reference to the area of the Branch, in accordance with the policies of the Society. The key aim is to find suitable new homes for as many animals as possible,

and to provide proper care for those who have been mistreated or abandoned. The Trustees have reviewed the outcomes and achievements of the Branch's objectives and activities for the year to ensure they remain focussed on the charity's aims and continue to deliver benefits to the public. The Trustees have complied with the duty under the Charities Act 1993 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission which can be illustrated as follows:

- The Branch supports the local Inspectors by taking in mistreated or abandoned cats whose owners suffer ill health or financial difficulties or pass away. The Branch provides education, information and advice, benefiting the public by promoting compassionate human sentiments towards animals.
- The Branch provides subsidised veterinary treatment for animals which are sick or injured and belong to local people on low incomes. This is achieved through a voucher scheme. During 2019 some 135 pet owners were helped with vouchers amounting to £17,841.
- The Branch offers subsidised neutering and microchipping of companion animals for owners on low incomes. This helps to control dog and cat populations and promotes responsible pet ownership. Animals in the care of the Branch receive veterinary treatment, vaccination, neutering, and microchipping and are assessed for rehoming.
- Free animal care advice is offered to pet owners, and talks are given by invitation to local school children about caring for pets.
   These activities benefit the public through the promotion of responsible pet ownership.
- The branch area is rural so Trap Neuter Release (TNR) is practised wherever possible, to safeguard and reduce feral and semi feral populations of cats.

The main activities to achieve this are the operation of an animal rehoming programme and active street and store collections, undertaken by a loyal team of volunteers.

#### (D) ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE.

The Committee met 7 times during the year and have recently increased the number of Trustees to 9.

We have continued to offer low-cost neutering of dogs to low income households, and this has been extended to include Downes Vets in Aberystwyth. We continued to support Rabbit awareness week. We have again sponsered the Rescue Horse & Pony Class at Cardigan Show and raised monies from the sale of cards made by 'Libby's Art', (trustee).

We rehomed 44 cats and continue to work with Llys Nini, with 8 cats being rehomed by them. We have a new cat fosterer, Janet Rowlands.

Janice and Steve raised £2218.46 from street collection during 2019, and the collection boxes and dogs raised £786.67. We continued to carry out collections at Pets At Home and Tesco. Mark & Marilyn raised £80 at the Aberporth Boxing Day dip.

Sally Learoyd continues to attend the Wales Board meetings, with 3 meetings per year.

We have employed a book-keeper, Debbie James.

A visit to Jane Davies' facilities by RSPCA Field Officer went very well. The branch bought a hygrometer for the pens, which have undergone repairs and a face-lift.

Around 135 pet owners were helped, with £17641.00 being spent on vets bills for owners.

The branch sent £2000.00 to Llys Nini for entropian surgery for 'Whizz', the jug puppy.

#### (E) FINANCIAL REVIEW

Total income amounted to £44,832 consisting of £25,361 from the Society's collection, £11,214 from 2 legacies and £2218.46 from street collections. Expenditure £49,714 increased a little with more spent on vet bills and improving and repairing one of the cat fostering facilities in line with Society requirements. The surplus for the year was cash funds £45,072 and the Julian Hodge Bond of £31,366.

A book-keeper is helping with the accounts paid on an hourly basis.

The reserves policy is to maintain free reserves equal to one year's unrestricted expenditure.

Investment policy remains unchanged with the fixed rate bond earning 1.5% interest and maturing in April 2022.
