Structure, governance and management

The District's governance documents are those of the Scout Association. They consist of a Royal Charter, which in turn gives authority to the bye laws of the Association and the Policy, Organisation and Rules of the Scout Association.

The District Scout Council is a trust established under its rules which are common to all Scouts. The Trustees are appointed in accordance with the Policy, Organisation and Rules.

The District is managed by the District Executive Committee, the members of which are the 'Charity Trustees' of the District Scout Council which is an educational charity. As charity trustees they are responsible for complying with legislation applicable to charities. This includes the registration, keeping proper accounts and making returns to the Charity Commission.

The District Executive Committee exists to support the District Commissioner in meeting the responsibilities of the appointment and is responsible for:

- The maintenance of District property;
- The raising of funds and the administration of District Funds;
- The insurance of persons, property and equipment;
- District public occasions;
- Assisting in the recruitment of leaders and other adult supporters;
- Appointing any sub committees that may be required;
- Appointing District Administrators and Advisors other than those who are elected.

Recruitment and appointment of Trustees

The Trustees are appointed by Kennet District Scout Council in accordance with Policy, Organisation and Rules of The Scout Association.

Risk and Internal Control

The District Executive Committee has identified the major risks to which they believe the district is exposed. These have been reviewed and systems established to militate against them. The main areas that have been identified are:

Injury to leaders, helpers, supporters and members. The District through the Annual Membership

- Subscription fees contributes to the Scout Associations national accident insurance policy. Risk Assessments are undertaken before all activities.
- Reduction or loss of leaders: The District is totally reliant upon volunteers to run and administer the activities of the District. If there was a reduction in the number of leaders to an unacceptable level in a particular section or group as a whole then there has to be a contraction, consolidation or closure of a section or Group/Unit.



Objectives and activities

The Purpose of The Scout Association is to actively engage and support young people in their personal development, empowering them to make a positive contribution to society.

The Values of Scouting are:

- Integrity We act with integrity; we are honest, trustworthy and loyal.
- Respect We have self-respect and respect for others.
- Care We support others and take care of the world in which we live.
- Belief We explore our faiths, beliefs and attitudes.
- Cooperation We make a positive difference; we cooperate with others and make friends.

Scouting takes place when young people, in partnership with adults, work together based on the values of Scouting and:

- enjoy what they are doing and have fun;
- take part in activities indoors and outdoors;
- learn by doing;
- share in spiritual reflection;
- take responsibility and make choices;
- undertake new and challenging activities; and
- make and live by their Promise.

The District meets the Charity Commission's public benefit criteria under both the advancement of education and the advancement of citizenship or community development headings.

Achievements and performance

Covid-19

The end of this financial year saw the mandatory suspension of all face-to-face Scouting due to the Covid-19 pandemic. As this situation continues, we hope that our members are able to return safely in the near future. This situation has presented all organisations with difficult situations. So far, we have been supporting the District and our Groups and Units through a number of approaches:

- 1. Encouraging Groups and Units to ask parents to continue making subscription payments to support their incoming, either in full or in part. Scout HQ provided some helpful wording around this area, and for the Summer term most Groups appear content to have sufficient resources in place.
- 2. Providing support for all Groups to claim Gift Aid on all subscriptions and other donations, including offering support through webinars organised by Berkshire Scouts and Scout HQ.
- 3. Strongly encouraging all Groups with property to apply for the £10,000 Retail, Hospitality and Leisure Grant operated by West Berkshire on behalf of HM Government.
- 4. In addition to the £3.50 reduction in the 2021 membership fee announced by Berkshire Scouts from £16.80 to £13.30, the District has undertaken to reduce its levy by £1.50 per young person from £4.50 to £3. These reductions are initial reductions and both may be able to go further as further measures are put in place.

Trusteeship

The District Executive has welcomed a number of new members during the year. Tom Seward is Assistant Group Scout Leader at 3rd Newbury and Hilary Kelly is Group Secretary at 1st Hungerford. Both joined during the year and have already made very valuable contributions in their role as trustees. Brian Soulby has completed his first full year as our District Treasurer and his efforts and insight have helped to drive us forward in a number of areas of financial management, including migration of bank accounts, greater use of online payments, and clearer oversight of the Explorer Scout accounts.

The Minibus has presented us with challenges during the year, principally with an unanticipated repair bill. This forced trustees to review all aspects of its operation and we are now in a clearer position in relation to it. This is an area that we will continue to monitor closely and may need to take further action to limit financial exposure.

Development work on the woodland campsite at Angel's Corner continues apace, and we are particularly indebted to Alan Askey, Ivan Osborne and Laurence Parker whose expertise and vision for the area continue to shape the site. We have been fortunate to receive a number of donations to support the ongoing work at Angel's Corner, and we are particularly grateful to The Good Exchange amongst others.

Leadership and Management

Prior to the suspension of face-to-face Scouting, we have seen another successful year across Kennet. We have been pleased to appoint Conor O'Neill as District Explorer Scout Commissioner. Conor brings a wealth of experience as a Scout Leader from 1st Newbury as well as having led a Unit of Explorer Scouts to the World Scout Jamboree in America last summer. Conor is working closely with volunteers in all Explorer Units to build on their strengths across a range of areas. We are also pleased to have opened a new Explorer Unit, Summit, in partnership with 1st Wash Common Scout Group, early in the Autumn term as we look to provide opportunities for even more young people to join an Explorer Scout Unit.

We thank Nigel Sayers for his many years of service, most recently as Group Scout Leader of 4th Newbury, a

role which he stepped back from in September of this year. Nigel has given almost 30 years of service to Scouting in the area and as he plans to move house out of the area, we wish both him and Ali all the very best. We are pleased to have welcome Jane Davenport and Gerard O'Neill to the shared role of Group Scout Leader at 4th Newbury and we look forward to them working together to build on the strong successes of the Group to date.



Volunteers

We have made a particularly concerted effort to make better use of the Good Awards' Scheme from Scout HQ this year, and we are grateful to Diana Wheatley, Rob Daniels, and Alan Askey for their support in forming an Awards Advisory Group to work through this area. We were very pleased to have brought together many awards recipients for an Awards Reception at the beginning of March during which we gave a few words of thanks to each and warmly welcomed them and their families to join us for light refreshments.

Efforts to continue to recognise the excellent contribution of adult volunteers will continue, and the Awards Advisory Group welcomes applications from all.

The number of active Training Advisers has grown over the last year, and we are thankful to the support provided by Induction Mentors in most Groups and Units who provide a friendly and supportive face to adult taking on a new role. A combination of these two roles, along with proactive line management has resulted in a healthy number of Wood Badges being awarded to recognise volunteers completing their leadership training, as an improving number of people completing mandatory ongoing learning.

Programme

We are pleased that regular meetings for all Sections in the District are now happening, and that in some cases engagement is increasing. Providing opportunities for coaching and peer support remains a focus, both in targeted approaches and in open forums. We are encouraged that the number of Top Awards recorded has increased across the District from 75 last year to 102 this year. Individually these are all fantastic achievements for the young people, and collectively they represent much effort from many volunteers.

Groups and Units in the District remain active. In the last year we recorded 40 nights away experiences totalling 66 Beavers, 313 Cubs, 3056 Scouts, 207 Explorers, 4 Network and 344 adults. In addition, there were 62 activity notifications made for 235 Beavers, 827 Cubs, 351 Scouts, 37 Explorers and 317 adults. This showed a

healthy increase on the previous year, which is encouraging given that we have worked with Group Scout Leaders to ensure there is clarity around when a notification should be recorded.



The District supported a number of programme events during the year:

- Alamo inident night hike for Scouts and Explorers.
- Cub Join-In Jamboree to expose young people to activities from a range of different countries.
- Cub Christmas parcel packing to prepare parcels for over 80s in the community.
- Cub handicraft competition and workshop.

Reserve Policy

The District's policy on reserves is to hold sufficient resources to continue the charitable activities of the District should income and fundraising activities fall short. The District Executive Committee considers that the District should hold a sum of £2,500 in unrestricted reserved to meet annual needs, in addition to £3,500 designated for the minibus, £2,000 for Angel's Corner, and currently £3,600 in a designated fund to support international opportunities, with this last item under active review. Given the current financial situation surrounding the Covid-19 pandemic, these levels remain under continual review.

The District held uncommitted reserves, not including the Explorers' funds, of £6,449 at the year end.

Investment Policy

The District's net Income and Expenditure is very small and as a consequence does not have sufficient funds to invest in long-term investments such as stocks and shares. The District has therefore adopted a low risk strategy to the investment of its funds. All funds are held in cash using only main stream banks or building societies or The Scout Association Short Terms Investment Service.

Future plans

The Trustees plan to continue to support the development of the delivery of Scouting throughout the District to the benefit of all the current and future members of the Scouting Movement.
