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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2019

The Trustees have pleasure in submitting the Report and Accounts for the year ended 31 October 2019.

Objects of the charity

The charity was formed as a Trust on 30th May 1989, is a registered charity and is governed by its Declaration of Trust of the same date. The charity's principal objects, as set out in its governing document, are: the advancement of the Christian Faith, and relief of poverty, sickness and disabled persons and the advancement of education in Merseyside and elsewhere in the UK and other parts of the world.

Summary of the charity's main activities and achievements

To further the above objects, the charity's main activities and achievements were as follows:

Dave Latham continued as Senior Minister of City Church. Dave leads the Leadership Team with Sue his wife. James Earnshaw and his wife Cathy complete the leadership team. Dave and James are salaried leaders. The team works closely together as they seek the Lord to implement the way forward for the church. James Earnshaw completed the MIT Course with Elim and was ordained an Elim Minister on 8th June 2019.

Again, as per last year, James organised two open air events in The Kensington Fields area, which had a major impact on the area. The first event was a carol service called Kenny Carols, and was attended by over 300 local residents and church members. The second event was a summer festival called Kennyfest, which was held in near by Phythian Park. It featured donkey rides, face painting, sumo wrestling and bouncy castles. Dave Latham shared several short messages about the love of Jesus. Several people visited the Prayer Tent. Over 500 people attended, mostly local residents.

The work of the Trust has continued, and we have seen new people join the Church throughout the year.

We welcome all who attend City Church, and teach any who wish to know, more about the love of Christ. During the week, Home Groups (attended regularly by over 30 people) take place to support members of the church, and help them to learn more about the Christian faith.

In the year 2018/19 City Church has continued to meet every Sunday to worship God and hear the preaching of the good news of Jesus Christ. The average attendance at these meetings is about 120 people. The Pastoral Team has increased so that more people are supported and visited in their homes. Sadly we have had several funerals, meaning we have lost some dear friends.

Once a month Dave has ministered in other churches and there have been a number of visiting speakers at City Church.

City Church members continue to impact the local community, through their response to the Christian Gospel, by their involvement with one charity; The Crossing Point, which supports and protects abused people.

City Church Foodbank Team

This service has been discontinued due to lack of volunteers. Food parcels are still given to needy people in the area, on a one off basis, from an emergency store in the church.

Fountain Friendship Group

The Friendship group meets every two weeks at City Church. We have between 10 and 20 people attend, mainly but not exclusively over 50 age group. We pray together, watch Christian films and have various speakers, both from the church and outside Christian agencies. Our purpose is to encourage each other and reach out to the community with the love of God and the Christian gospel.

Café Connect

The Saturday morning Café Connect project continues to successfully serve the local community. 25 to 30 people, sometimes more, come to the cafe on a Saturday morning.

There have been opportunities for Church members to share the Gospel with them. The customers have been very open to this and one or two have attended our Sunday Service and Christmas Party. We have quite a few regular customers who really enjoy coming.

Children's Church 2017/18

Children's Church has seen a group of new children coming more regularly, adding to and solidifying the group as a whole.

There have been new members added to the Children's Church staff, which has strengthened and revitalised the team.

We've followed a new curriculum, which has taken more of a devotional focus, to which the children have risen, in terms of their maturity, and they have really enjoyed taking part.

In addition to children's church, there is provision for the spiritual and physical needs of younger children through crèche.

Youth Report 2018/2019

Bible Class is the name for the group of young people who meet during the Sunday morning service. We have up to 15 young people and four leaders. We talk about the Bible and related topics, and show media clips and have discussions and activities. We go away in the summer to Christian conferences, and take the young people to day and evening events. The young people are also involved in church services through media, sound and the worship team.

18 - 30s

The 18-30s have had a fantastic year with a number of people being added to our number, replacing a handful of people who left the city for university or work. We meet regularly to socialise and study the Bible.

City Church has a website at www.citychurchliverpool.org where contact information, current meeting times and programmes are advertised. At the present time sermons are posted on City Church's Facebook Page.

In planning the activities the Trustees have applied the guidance on public benefit issued by the Charity Commission.

Evangelism

One of the prime aims of the trust is to promote the Christian Gospel. This work has continued throughout this year, both through the visits to houses in the neighbourhood, through Sunday services and through youth and children's services.

Property

The work on the church building in Jubilee Drive has continued through the year as we seek to improve and maintain facilities.

This year saw the repainting of all the flat roofs at the side extension of the church and tanking/plastering to a section of wall in basement.

Investment policy

The reserve funds are held with the Skipton Building Society and CCLA Charities Deposit Fund. If funds are received which require longer-term and more complex investment to be made, the Trustees are aware that, under the Trustees Act 2000, they will need to seek independent financial advice.

Financial review

During the year income increased by £10,000, to £79,800, and expenditure increased by £5,100, to £89,900. As a result the cash held by the charity decreased by £10,100, to £121,100, of which £118,300 is unrestricted and can be used for any charitable purpose. The financial handling of salary payments and independent examination continues to be conducted by Stewardship Services.

Reserves policy

The trustees have determined that the charity should aim to hold unrestricted cash of no less than £45,000 (which equates to about six months' of unrestricted expenditure) so that the charity could continue to operate should income and / or expenditure vary adversely. At the year end, the charity held unrestricted cash of £118,300. The charity is holding excess funds for the purpose of offsetting the ongoing pattern of expenditure exceeding the church's income due to the changing staffing profile and it's unknown impact on the salary bill. Plans are currently being formulated to carry out some significant maintenance and improvement work.

Future plans

The Trustees plan to make some amendments to the governing document in the coming year.

In November 2019 the church received a legacy that was without condition/restriction. The intention is to place this in a designated fund, so that this money can be earmarked for various expenditure over the next

few months/years, and this will be kept separate from the day to day receipts and payments.

Due to Covid-19, the last Sunday morning offering was taken on 15/3/2020, and as such the church has received no cash offering since this date. The standing order gifts continue and some people are now making payments electronically. The Senior Minister has been on furlough since 09/4/2020, and a claim for 80% of his regular wage will be made through the Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme. The church has sufficient resources to continue operating for at least one year from the date of signing the accounts and can pay

liabilities as and when they are due.

Governance

Responsibility for setting policy and for making operating decisions rests with the trustees who meet regularly to monitor the activities of the charity. New trustees are recruited and appointed by the existing

trustees.

Risk management

The Trustees have reviewed the major strategic and operational risks that the charity faces. These are kept under review at Trustee meetings, which occur at least 4 times per year. Where possible we seek to insure major risks in respect of the building and employees. In addition, we have a Safeguarding Policy (for children and vulnerable adults) along the guidelines set out by the thirtyone:eight organisation formerly (CCPAS). This was reviewed and updated in 2019. This ensures that all those who work with children and young people and vulnerable adults on our behalf are cleared with the Disclosure & Barring Service (DBS) and receive suitable

training and support.

Responsibilities of trustees

Charity law requires us as Trustees to prepare financial statements for each accounting year which record the

receipts and payments of the charity for the year.

We are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable us to ensure that the financial statements comply with

the Charities Act 2011.

We also have a responsibility to safeguard the assets of the charity and to take reasonable steps to prevent

fraud or any other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE ACCOUNTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 OCTOBER 2019

1 Accounting policies

The accounts have been prepared on a receipts and payments basis and comprise a statement that shows the charity's receipts and payments, a statement that summarises the charity's assets and liabilities and related notes. The accountancy profession have determined that only accounts prepared in accordance with applicable accounting standards present a 'true and fair' view and, as these receipts and payments accounts have not (and cannot) be prepared in accordance with accounting standards, these accounts do not present (and are not intended to present) a 'true and fair' view of the charity's financial activities and state of affairs.

General funds are unrestricted funds which are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the general objectives of the charity. Designated funds comprise unrestricted funds that have been set aside by the trustees for particular purposes. Restricted funds are donations which are to be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by donors; they include donations received from appeals for specific activities or projects.
