Report on the year

2018-19 was a year of change and challenge for SMHF as many of our staff adapted to new responsibilities and we piloted several new projects.

We took a fresh look at the way we identify and respond to the needs of people who present themselves to us for the first time. As the only organization in Sutton dedicated to the needs of adults with severe mental health problems, we recognise a responsibility not only to provide direct support ourselves when we are able to do so, but also to provide signposting to other services. During the year we took steps to put this on a more systematic footing and to build relationships with other organizations to support cross-referral and working together. This has led to growth in the number of referrals we have received, especially from Sutton Uplift, so that we have been able to support more people to gain access to other services.

During the year a total of 174 people made use of the Connect service. We ran at least 280 activity sessions and provided 5000 hot lunches. Visiting advisers from Sutton CAB and Surrey Law Centre held a total of 55 sessions on our premises. (Surrey Law Centre closed in November 2018.) The premises were also used on 48 occasions by other organizations paying a nominal rent.

Our team of peer support workers continued to make regular, weekly visits to the acute psychiatric ward at Springfield Hospital to provide non-clinical support to inpatients and some of these relationships continued after discharge from hospital.

We ran three pilot projects, extending peer support into new areas. We gained valuable insights from attending the Accident and Emergency Unit at St Helier Hospital twice a week on Monday and Thursday evenings to offer support to people awaiting clinical attention and we are grateful to St Helier Hospital and the Psychiatric Liaison team based there for making this possible, as well as to Sutton Clinical Commissioning Group for funding this work. The service is continuing pending longer-term decisions on how to deploy peer support in this environment.

As part of a wider project co-ordinated by Homestart Sutton we ran a perinatal peer support group funded by the Sutton Community Fund and the charitable fund of Sutton Community Commissioning Group. Four people from SMHF received training in perinatal mental health, thus broadening the expertise available within our organisation. Our peer support workers then took part in a wider project to improve perinatal mental health for women and their families, offering both group

sessions and one to one support. Whilst the pilot project has now been completed, the service will be maintained as part of our general peer support arrangements.

With funding from the Sutton Community Fund, we also established a Polish speaking peer support service which assisted 17 people in the course of the year.

In July, we were joined by Lisa Lancefield who took up a new post as User Engagement and Co-production Adviser. Lisa will be supporting the work of Sutton 1in4 Network and the Commissioning Advisory Group, which acts as a sounding board amongst people who use mental health services for Sutton's mental health commissioners, both at Sutton Council and in the NHS.

We continued to work with Community Action Sutton to promote the Time to Change initiative and co-facilitated a conference during Mental Health Awareness Week attended by about fifty people, including many from Sutton Council and other local organisations. We provided a mental health awareness session at Sutton Nightwatch and made presentations to the BME Forum of Community Action Sutton and to a womens' group at Sutton Mosque.

Two of our trustees retired in early 2019. We thank Doris Richards and Steve Francis for their contributions to the work of SMHF over many years.

Structure, Governance and Management

Governing Document

The Company is a charitable company limited by guarantee. Its governing documents are its Memorandum and Articles of Association.

Trustees

The directors of the Company are also charity trustees for the purpose of charity law. They are elected at the Annual General Meeting of the company and one third of them retire in rotation each year.

The Board seeks members who understand the needs of people who use mental health services, who reflect the diversity of the community and who can contribute to the business needs of the Company. People with direct experience of mental distress are actively welcomed to serve on the Board.

During the year the board had a broad mix of skills drawn from commerce, administration, social work, human relations, teaching and psychiatry. Several Trustees have direct experience of mental health problems and of using mental health services. All made contributions to the work of the company by sharing their expertise with staff and in other ways.

In the event of the Company being wound up Trustees are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

Organisational Structure

The Board of Trustees meets at least bi-monthly and is responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the Company. The Secretary also sits on the Board but does not vote.

The managers are responsible for the day to day running of the Company's activities and for the supervision and development of its staff.

The Board of Trustees is responsible for the management of the risks faced by the Company. Risks are identified, assessed and reviewed throughout the year. The Company's risk management processes are reviewed annually.

The key controls used by the Company include:

- Formal Board agendas
- Strategic planning, budgeting and management accounting
- · Established organisational structure and lines of reporting
- Formal written policies
- Clear authorisation and approval levels
- Vetting procedures as required by law for the protection of vulnerable adults.

The Board of Trustees is satisfied that the major risks identified through the risk management processes established for the Company have been adequately mitigated where necessary. It is recognised that systems can only provide reasonable but no absolute assurance that major risks have been adequately managed.

The Company recognises the importance of its relationships with its main funders, the Sutton Clinical Commissioning Group (NHS Sutton) and the London Borough of Sutton. It also seeks to work closely with statutory service providers, particularly the

South West London and St George's Mental Health NHS Trust and with Community Action Sutton and third sector funders and charitable trusts.

Objects, Aims, Objectives and Activities

Charitable Objects

The Company is established "for the benefit of people with mental health problems and their carers resident in the London Borough of Sutton, in particular, but without prejudice to the generality of the foregoing, by providing facilities for recreation or other leisure-time occupation in the interests of social welfare and with the object of improving their conditions of life; and for other charitable purposes as the trustees, in their discretion, shall from time to time determine.

Public Benefit

Within these Objects, the Company's public benefit aim is to provide high quality support to residents of Sutton who have experienced mental distress or who are at risk of doing so. Most services are provided free of charge to users, subject to capacity, although a charge may be made for services which provide direct benefit to individuals or small groups.

The Trustees seek continually to review the services provided and to adapt them to changing needs. In particular, the trustees seek to involve the people who use the Foundation's services in developing, delivering and evaluating these services to ensure that they meet the relevant needs as fully as possible.

Accordingly the Board of Trustees has complied with the duty in Section 17, Charities Act 2011, to have regard to the Public Benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

Activities

The Company's principal activities are as follows:

Belmont Connect

Belmont Connect is a drop-in service commissioned and paid for by the London Borough of Sutton. It is open on four weekdays and on Sundays to offer a safe and welcoming environment and social support to people who have experienced severe

mental distress. A cooked meal is available for a reasonable charge at all sessions. Activities include physical exercise, arts and crafts, games and outings. Some activities, including drama and music sessions, relaxation and mindfulness are peer led and Sunday sessions are entirely user-run. Informal support with practical issues of daily living and signposting to other services are offered by staff and volunteers. The Connect service has a strong ethos of community and mutual support.

Advice services

The Foundation does not offer advice directly but Sutton Citizens' Advice Bureau makes regular visits and its services are open to our users.

User engagement and co-production

The Foundation supports the Sutton 1in4 Network, a community organisation for people in Sutton who have experience of mental distress, with the intention of improving local mental health services and providing mutual support. The Foundation also supports the Commissioning Advisory Group, a group of people with experience of using mental health services which is consulted from time to time by service commissioners of the London Borough of Sutton and the NHS Sutton Clinical Commissioning Group on the design, commissioning, performance and review of mental health services in the borough.

Peer support

The Foundation supports a team of peer support workers who provide peer support in a number of different contexts, including the acute psychiatric ward at Springfield Hospital and the Accident and Emergency Department at St Helier Hospital. Individual appointments for peer support are arranged at various locations in the local community and for particular client groups, including people seeking perinatal support and support in the Polish language. The telephone "Hope Line" was discontinued in March 2019.

8 new peer support workers were trained in the course of the year. A total of 71 people received individual peer support during the period.

We were able to meet with Shery Mead and Chris Hansen, the American founders of Intentional Peer Support, during their visit to the UK, thus consolidating a long-standing relationship.

Achievements and performance

- 1. Providing support. The Foundation provided direct support to 174 people through its Connect service
- 2. Building relationships and resilience. Efforts were made to build stronger relationships with other local organisations. We seek to ensure that beneficiaries have access to all the services we offer and can also be referred elsewhere for services we do not provide.
- 3. Information and advice. Three to five people each week benefited from CAB's advice surgeries on our premises.
- 4. Sutton 1in4 Network The Network's activities were limited by the absence of a support worker for most of the period. Lisa Lancefield joined us towards the end of the year to take up this role.
- 5. Training. We did not conduct external training during this year following a decision to concentrate our efforts on other activities.
- 6. Peer support. 71 people received individual peer support in the course of the year and our pilot projects with the Polish community, in the Accident and Emergency Ward at St Helier Hospital and with Homestart Sutton were all completed.
- 7. Funding. We are grateful to several generous donors who supported our work. We have experienced a gradual increase in personal, charitable and corporate donations which give us a degree of freedom to supplement the services which we are contracted to provide and to explore new possibilities.

Plans for 2019-20

Our plans for 2019-20 include:

- Strengthening our relationship with local commissioners and playing our part in the development of the new Sutton Mental Health Strategy
- Seeking continued funding to support people experiencing mental distress within programmes of work funded by the London Borough of Sutton and NHS Sutton
- Plans to diversify our income and encourage financial support from business and private donations
- Further development of peer support projects in new environments, in partnership with Sutton CCG and other organisations
- Building our capacity to offer support through staff training, improving our procedures and integrating our services to provide the best possible experience to the people who use them

Financial Review

The results of the Company for the twelve months to 30 September 2019 are set out on pages 15 to 26.

The gross income of the company for the period was £201,222. 42% of income came from the London Borough of Sutton and 55% from NHS Sutton.

Gross expenditure amounted to £203,215 giving a net deficit of £1,993.

The residue of a grant of £7,000 received to set up hearing voices groups for younger people. With the agreement of the donor, this funding is now being used for similar purposes.

Commissioning Advisory Group administrative support: Balance: £368 This represents the balance of provision by NHS Sutton for administrative support to the Commissioning Advisory Group.

Belmont Connect Learn Support Centre as well as the Sunday Drop In were funded by a contract with the London Borough of Sutton. Any deficit has been funded by the General Reserve.

Client and Community Development work is funded by NHS Sutton for work undertaken in the community rather than in the centres, and the annual surpluses have been transferred to the General Reserves.

Investment Policy

Apart from the Building Fund, which is represented by the depreciated value of the Freehold Property, its original improvements and the 2011 refurbishment, fund balances are held in bank current and deposit accounts or as cash and as such are immediately available. To increase returns on funds which are not expected to be spent in the short term, the decision has been taken to invest some of the funds on the money market with first class banks for periods of up to one year.

Reserves Policy

The reserves policy calls for reserves to be held in the general funds in the range of three to six months operating expenditure. Based on the last period expenses this would be a financial range of between £51,490 and £102,980. Unrestricted general funds amounted to £87,966 at 30 September 2019.

The Trustees have continued to seek new opportunities for the Foundation, whilst seeking to reduce costs where possible. The current costs of most activities were fully met during the year. The Trustees continue to keep costs under regular review.

These unrestricted reserves are held in readily realisable assets which the Trustees consider to be assets that are easily converted into cash.

Statement of Trustee Responsibilities

The Trustees (who are also Directors of Sutton Mental Health Foundation for the purposes of Company Law) are responsible for producing the Trustees' Report and the Financial Statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom accounting standards (United Kingdom General Accounting Standards)

Company Law requires the Trustees to prepare Financial Statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the Charitable Company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure of the charitable company for the year. They are responsible for safeguarding the assets of the Company and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a) Basis of Preparation

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014 (as updated through Update Bulletin 1 published on 2 February 2016), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102), the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006 and UK Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The financial statements are prepared on a going concern basis under the historical cost convention. The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

b) Income Recognition

Income is included in the Statement of Financial Activities when the charity is legally entitled to the income after any performance conditions have been met, the amount can be measured reliably and it is probable that the income will be received.

Grant income is recognised in accordance with agreed budgets and timeframes. Amounts received but which relate to future reporting periods are accounted for as deferred income. In the case of multi-year grants, the aggregate amount of future instalments not yet received and which are subject to satisfactory performance is disclosed as a contingent asset.

c) Expenditure and Irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Expenditure is recognised where there is a legal or constructive obligation to make payments to third parties, it is probable that the settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Expenditure on charitable activities comprises the costs of running the various activities and services for the charity's beneficiaries

Expenditure includes those costs of a direct nature which can be allocated to a specific activity. It also includes indirect costs, including governance costs that do not relate to a specific activity but are necessary to support them.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the associated expense heading.

d) Fund Accounting

Unrestricted general funds are those funds which are freely available for use in furtherance of the objects of the charity and which have not been designated for specific purposes.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds which have been set aside by the trustees for specific purposes.

Restricted funds are funds which can only be used in accordance with specific restrictions imposed by the donor or which have been raised for a particular purpose.

e) Fixed Assets and Depreciation

Depreciation is provided so as to write off the cost of each asset over its estimated useful life at the following annual rates:
