Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 December 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in the notes to the accounts and comply with the charity's governing document, Companies Act 2006, Charities Act 2011 and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Objectives and aims The objectives of the charity are:

To relieve poverty and the distress caused thereby, including but not by way of limitation through the gathering and distribution of food, clothing, medical supplies and relief items in local communities in such parts of the world as the Trustees may from time to time think fit.

To advance the Christian faith in such parts of the world as the Trustees may from time to time think fit and other such purposes which are exclusively charitable according to the law of England and Wales and are connected with the charitable work of the Charity.

#### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

Significant activities

The vision that shapes our annual activities:

- Feeding those communities in greatest need
- Helping our established projects towards self-sufficiency
- Providing environments and facilities to educate the young
- Providing clothing, relief packs and medical supplies to those displaced by disaster or conflict
- Assisting in the provision of ministry and pastoral care to those in need

The strategies employed to achieve the Charity's aims and objectives are:

- To collect donations from individuals and organisations through appeals using radio, newsletters, website, social media and packing events.
- Working with churches nationally to promote appeals
- Networking with local business communities
- Attending schools to give presentations; raise awareness and encourage involvement/identification with our projects
- To develop partnerships with other charitable organisations such as Samara's Aid, Sal's Shoes, Knit for Peace, His Food, Team Rubicon and Rise Against Hunger (RAH).

Meal Packing Events are held in various locations within the UK and Europe, organised by RAH, working with FTH UK and supported by multi-national companies to raise awareness at the same time as packing the high nutrition meals that FTH UK will then ship to one of its Project sites. Our Projects are operational in Kenya and Zimbabwe, where meals from the UK are sent mainly to Kenya and Zimbabwe as Europe is the only source of GMO free meals which both these countries require, having legislation in place preventing food products containing GMO from entering the country.

Meal packing events, under the label Hand to Hand, were also started aimed at Schools and Churches and meals from these events will be aimed at supporting projects in Burkina Faso.

Other packing events have been held which collated Medical equipment, clothing and health and sanitary supplies sent out to: Athens, Romania, Nicaragua and Albania.

Financial Assistance was also provided to projects in Zambia, Nepal, India, Kenya and Zimbabwe.

The Food and Aid is shipped to the Project and distributed, by local Pastor or ministry, to those known to be in need. We also support Community Farms, Schools, Orphanages and Feeding Centres and provide refugee aid.

#### Public benefit

In shaping our objectives for the year and planning our activities the Trustees have considered the Charity Commission guidance on public benefit including the guidance "Public Benefit: Running a Charity (PB2)". The Charity relies on donations, both financial and Gifts in Kind, to cover its operating costs and to provide the food and other goods to the end beneficiaries. The public benefit is to the people who live in areas where hunger occurs due to famine, conflict, natural disasters or poverty, be that in the UK, Europe, Africa or other areas of the world.

Volunteers

During 2019 Feed the Hungry UK was grateful to receive help from over 120 active volunteers with over 1,000 volunteer hours. The volunteers

- Helped in the collation and packing of food and clothing
- Assisted the Feed the Hungry staff at Packing Events
- Accompanied Feed the Hungry staff to provide ministry at a project site in Kenya and Zambia.

In 2019 we also had Tony Vino, a stand-up comedian, become a volunteer ambassador who visited one of our projects in Kenya and will be looking to do some fundraising events for Feed the hungry in 2020.

# OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES Chair's report

2019 has also been a year of maintaining the impact seen in 2017 and 2018 for Feed the Hungry UK. In 2019 our focus has been growing our events program both with Rise Against Hunger and our own events program, under the name of Hand to Hand, as well as ensuring that we remain cost effective in our delivery of goods, in maintaining low overheads whilst maintaining a stable resource to those in need, whilst also looking forward to avenues of growth for the future.

In 2019 we had no major campaigns but looked at different opportunities to bring in a more diverse income stream which is currently an ongoing process.

During 2019 Feed the Hungry UK maintained its partnership with Rise against Hunger; which began towards the end of 2014, receiving gifts of high nutrition meals to be distributed to our programs across Africa, providing a total of 3,000,000 meals during the year as well as Gifts in Kind from Italy.

Feed the Hungry's own established brand of High Nutritional food, under the label Hand to Hand, increased in size from doing 5 start up events in 2018 to 36 events in 2019. These are marketed towards schools and Churches, an area not covered by Rise Against Hunger in the UK.

We also continued to support the Every Child Every Day program, receiving Gifts in Kind, which enabled us to supply supplementary food, clothing, bedding and educational materials to Romania, Kenya, Malawi, Zimbabwe, Nicaragua and Burkina Faso, and financial support to projects in Zambia, Nepal and India.

We were also able to respond to the need for assistance to the European and Middle East refugee migration and internal displacement in 2019, contributing a number of containers of food and clothing to projects in Athens Greece and Albania.

Through 2019 we saw changing patterns to our income and donor support, especially in the second half of the year whilst our gifts in kind remained steady for the third year after expanding exponentially during 2016. The number and types of projects we support has been maintained and we are constantly humbled by the generosity of our donors.

In conclusion, I would like to thank the donors, staff and supporters for their huge contributions towards making our task of relieving poverty and the distress caused thereby possible. This work advances the Christian faith in every community that it touches.

Achievement and performance

We were very pleased with the progress of the Hand to Hand Program in 2019 growing from 5 events in 2018 to 36 events in 2019 and as part of that growth we were able to trial various event scenarios which enabled us to do events with multiple schools in the same venue; Community engagement events in cafés and restaurants, and combined schools and church events enabling children from as young as 5 and adults of various ages and ability to partake.

During the drought in Zambia we managed to drill 12 bore holes which provided water to over 2,000 families and also started a water harvesting project with the help of 2 water engineers from the US.

Also during the year Feed the Hungry was pleased to be able to provide support and food to refugees in Athens and Earthquake relief in Albania, looking at new projects in Eastern Europe and in extending our own High Nutritional Food packing program called Hand to Hand.

Financial review

Income from donations, gift aid and legacies have seen an overall drop from £637,308 in 2018 to £482,529 in 2019. The drop in the income is mainly the result of the Premier Christian Radio Appeal ending during 2018.

Gifts in Kind remained steady for FTH direct projects with the meals provided reaching 5 million meals. Gifts in Kind consist of packed meals, clothing, medical and school supplies which are then shipped to our various project sites for distribution to those in need. Increased receipts have, of course, meant that Feed the Hungry UK has seen a corresponding increase in outgoings in terms of costs for the transportation of these goods to the beneficiaries.

Feed the Hungry has also made monetary donations to various project either through LeSea Global or directly to the projects and these again were at a high level at £102,199. These donations were to provide for direct feeding costs to projects that were unable to receive packed meals, or to cover Customs fees and taxes on shipments to the projects. Monetary donations were also made to disaster relief projects such as with Storms in Malawi and Drought in Zambia.

Whilst receiving and shipping the increased donations and putting in place plans to handle these over the longer term, we recognise that there are increased risks in taking on additional commitments such as the warehouse and increased staffing levels, and whilst 2019 was a year of containing costs, during 2020 we will keep developing our financial risk assessment together with a strategy to broaden our donor base.

Our intention is to develop a strategy that will in 2020 bring in support that is equal to, or great than, that we receive from the partnerships with Premier and UCB, through investigating other opportunities on a local, national and international level.

#### Reserves policy

In addition, whilst the Trustees have, in the past stated that their aim was to maintain minimum reserves in order to keep a contingency fund in the bank to cover the ongoing operational costs of the Charity, it is now recognised that the increase in commitments in recent years require a Reserve Policy. This was established in 2018 and the reserve fund is being increased, at a manageable rate, to reach minimal acceptable reserves.

It is the aim of the Trustees to hold in general reserves sufficient cash to equate to two months' running costs plus an additional month of salary costs.

At the year end, free reserves, being unrestricted funds of £49,653 less fixed assets of £2,138, totalled £47,515 (2018: £62,384).

Future plans

In the current financial climate it is clear that in 2020 we will need to broaden the way that the activities of Feed the Hungry UK are funded, e.g. approaching Trust Funds, seeking grants, establishing Legacy Policies and seeking new ways to maintain and deepen our connections with our donors so that we are not dependent upon just one form of fund raising. In order to achieve this FTH UK will continue to look at the core fundamentals of information materials to give to donors and trusts, developing new general brochures, introductory flyers describing who we are, and have also improved our digital imprint on social media, and our website.

We also continue seeking to establish greater partnerships with other charities in order to create "Impact Projects" which not only change the lives of individuals but also change communities and regions for the better.

Our policies in terms of appeals and donor care are of primary importance to Feed the Hungry UK and we have never had policies or practices in place that would cause distress to any individual or organisation. Where any misunderstanding has occurred, we have taken immediate steps to rectify the situation and will continue to do so whilst complying with any new legislation to protect donor data and privacy.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

Feed the Hungry UK is a non-profit Christian Mission Organisation dedicated to feeding the hungry around the world and reaching those in desperate need.

It is a Company Limited by Guarantee, registered in England and Wales, and a charity registered in England and Wales, governed by its Memorandum and Articles of Association. Date of Incorporation 16th August 2005.

#### Organisational structure

There is a requirement for a minimum of three Trustees, and there is no maximum. There is no requirement for rotation of the Trustees. The Trustees plan to meet face-to-face annually at the AGM. Due to the international mix, locations and occupations we are endeavouring to format a system of conference calls in addition to the face-to-face meeting, as well as having individual conversations with the Trustees on an ongoing basis. Where Trustees need to be advised or consulted outside of a planned meeting then electronic communications are implemented.

The Trustees have appointed the Operations Director to have day to day control and have given him delegated authority to operate all areas of the charitable business.

The charity pays for administration work in order to be able to raise funds, the Trustees oversee this work.

#### Induction and training of new trustees

Newly appointed Trustees are provided with a copy of the governing document and the latest set of published accounts. Questions regarding the charities activities, assets or funding can be asked at any time or at the next Trustees meeting.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT Key management remuneration All Trustees give their time freely.

The pay of the senior staff is reviewed annually and normally increased in accordance with average earnings and the level of responsibility required. In view of the charitable nature of the company the Trustees remuneration benchmark is determined through comparative research into similar local salaries with the living wage as the minimum hourly rate.

#### Related parties

None of our trustees receive remuneration or other benefit from their work with the charity. Any connection between trustees or senior manager of the charity and any contractual relationship with a related party must be disclosed to the full board of Trustees.

The charity supports the activities run by LeSea Global by providing funds to particular projects run by Lesea Global across the world. More details of these can be viewed on www.feedthehungry.org.uk.

There has been a special emphasis this year on helping to grow the work in Zimbabwe, Zambia, Kenya and Nepal; with assistance to projects in Athens and Albania with the influx of refugees into Europe.

LeSea Global has increased its feeding program Every Child Every Day from 178,000 to 280,000 2019.

### Risk management

The Trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular, those relating to operations and finances of the charity. They are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

The Trustees have a risk management strategy which comprises:

- An annual review of the principle risks and uncertainties the charity faces.
- The establishment of policies, system and procedures to mitigate the risks identified in the annual review and
- The implementation of procedures designed to minimise or manage any potential impact on the charity should those risks materialise.

This work has identified that financial stability is the major financial risk for Feed the Hungry UK. A key element in the management of this risk is to plan a budget for the coming year and to regularly review performance against that budget. In addition to managing the cash flow, we recognise the need for the broadening and deepening of connection with our donor base to ensure a diverse and regular source of donation income.

#### EVENTS SINCE THE END OF THE YEAR

Information relating to events since the end of the year is given in the notes to the financial statements.

#### **FUNDRAISING**

Feed the Hungry has not hired in the past, and does not intend to hire, any external fundraising companies. FTH UK fundraising is controlled directly by employed staff who adhere to strict guidelines, to ensure that the donor experience is a clear, fair, enjoyable and unobtrusive experience. Every possible measure is taken to ensure that personal data is stored correctly to comply with current legislation and, in so doing, has signed up to receiving suppression under the Fundraising Preference Service.

#### POST BALANCE SHEET EVENT

Over the past 12 months Feed the Hungry has been continually looking at how it has to adapt to a changing market place which has been affected very much by Brexit as well as Covin 19

Through looking at developing a more proactive relational events strategy where passive donors become participant members of Feed the Hungry through volunteering and being involved in participative events in Schools, Communities and Businesses.

In 2019 we saw a distinctive fall off in Donations due to worries and concerns to Brexit and a distinctive change in giving to more UK based charities which was mitigated by a higher activity in participative events.

However, we recognised that the underlying income through donations was reducing and made changes to staffing levels in early 2020 to mitigate some of the effects of this reduced income, and a proposal set before the trustees to make further reductions was made in early March to reduce the staffing levels further.

With schools now closed and event booking delayed we had no immediate work for 3 of the staff but with the furlough scheme coming into being, we took the opportunity not to lay off these experienced staff until we understand the long-term effect of Covid -19 on events and are assessing the situation on a weekly basis.

In the mean time, donation levels over April, May and moving into June have shown an upward trend, and we have new avenues to be able to acquire new donors. We have also been awarded a number of grants and food provision through the Fairshare government scheme and Edible links who manage food for Ocado as we become more proactive in being involved in supporting local vulnerable people and are working in partnership with Hinckley and Bosworth Borough Council to provide Emergency Support food and Care packs to vulnerable and isolated people in the community.

We are also reviewing our long term strategy of increasing our involvement in the UK and are in consultation with a number of key National and local partner organisations together with local authorities on how to provide a national food resource to foodbanks and other food distributing community groups.

In short, we have been able to reduce our overall cost base in the short term, with income increasing and cost reducing has put us in a positive position going forward and enable us to look strategically to build for the future. 2020 will be a tough year with income greatly affected with the loss of the majority of Gift in Kind but the indications are that this will return in 2021 once the movement of goods and CSR events in Commercial company's churches and schools are sanctioned by the government

In Conclusion the Trustees consider that the charity will be able to continue as a going concern for the foreseeable future.

#### 1. STATUTORY INFORMATION

Feed the Hungry UK is an incorporated charity, limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales. The company's registered number and registered office address can be found on the Company Information page.

#### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

## Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Fixtures and fittings - 25% on cost Motor vehicles - 25% on cost

#### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities. Expenses are inclusive of VAT where applicable.

#### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

## Foreign currencies

Assets and liabilities in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rates of exchange ruling at the balance sheet date. Transactions in foreign currencies are translated into sterling at the rate of exchange ruling at the date of transaction. Exchange differences are taken into account in arriving at the operating result.

## Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

### Donated goods

The charity receives donations of food and clothing which are then distributed as part of a relief program.

Donated goods are valued at their fair value to the charity.

#### Going concern

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis as the trustees believe that no material uncertainties exist. The trustees have considered the level of funds held and the expected level of income and expenditure for 12 months from authorising these financial statements. The budgeted income and expenditure is sufficient with the level of reserves for the charity to be able to continue as a going concern.

## Debtors and creditors receivable/payable within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in expenditure.

#### Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash in hand and cash on deposit.

#### 20. RELATED PARTY DISCLOSURES

The following transactions occurred during the year with LeSea Global, a charity in which Mr S Radelich is a trustee. A total of £38,878 (2018: £6,911) was received in donations from LeSea Global. A total of £684 (2018: £1,432) was donated to LeSea Global.

Donations of £2,620 (2018: £150) were received from trustees without conditions during the year.

All transactions were carried out at arms length and in the normal course of business.

# 21. POST BALANCE SHEET EVENTS

As more fully explained in the Trustees Report, the charity has had to adapt to the changes resulting from Brexit and Covid 19.

Revised budgets have been produced that reflect a drop in some sources of income but costs have been managed accordingly.

Furthermore some of the gifts in kind income and expenditure will have fallen because of the lockdown in travel. However, new opportunities have arisen in the UK since the year end.

As a result, the trustees consider that the charity will be able to continue as a going concern for the foreseeable future.
