# BEAVERS WILLOW COLONY

Willow Beaver colony has been very busy over the last 12 months. We have welcomed many new beavers and said goodbye to others who have gone up to Cubs. We have 6 leaders and 2 young leaders.

We currently have 22 beavers, 7 of which are girls. The maximum we have as a colony is 24, so we will continue to take children from the groups waiting list.

Our beavers have been able to experience many exciting and new activities. We had a visit from Owls about Town, this was an amazing experience for the Beavers as they got to hold the owls and learn all about them. We visited Horsham Fire Station, this had to be the highlight of our year. Learning about the fire engines and being able to play with the hoses – until they got called out on an emergency and we got to see them leave with lights and sirens! We did some community work litter picking in Horsham Park, visited Clip and Climb and the Cermaic Shack in the town. We made pancakes for Shrove Tuesday, learnt all about Chinese New Year and had a drumming lesson from a local samba band. This has all been accompanied by lots of craft evenings, knots and scouting skills.

Looking at the achievements the beavers have made over the year is amazing and this is recognised by the number of badges that we have given out. This has included:

25 x Challenge badges

130 x Activity badges and staged Activity badges

### BEAVERS AKERWOOD COLONY

Akerwood currently has 22 beavers, 3 adult leaders and 4 young leaders. One adult leader left us during the year, we gained 2 young leaders and one of our existing young leaders became an adult.

Until lockdown we had good attendance with a full compliment most Thursday evenings. During 2019 we had a nights away trip to the campsite where the beavers enjoyed camp crafts, den building and an adventure course constructed in the forest. We also had a treasure hunt in the woods as well as a glow stick in the dark trail adventure. The beavers all thoroughly enjoyed the 1<sup>st</sup> SLF paddling day with one beaver then also coming to the Powell white water trip to the Nene Valley artificial course. In preparation for Cub camps the beavers learnt how to pitch a simple tent as well as assemble a campfire and basic map reading. 1<sup>st</sup> aid was also covered over a couple of evenings with the beavers learning how to make an arm sling as well as bandage their arms and heads. Archery and Nerf Gun alley shooting is also a beaver favourite with us running 2 sessions in the year.

For March awards ceremony we had 8 beavers eligible for their Bronze award.

After lock down we have been running Zoom virtual meetings with games, cooking, personal skill development, quizzes and challenges. We regularly have 12 beavers attending these virtual sessions.

### CUBS KIPLING PACK

Kipling has reduced slightly in numbers but have taken new cubs from the waiting list. We are currently sitting between 18-22 on a regular basis. We are currently at 22 cubs

Since the cancellation of scouting in March (due to the COVID 19) we have adapted our running of cubs. We have been running sessions through Facebook and Zoom. On average we have half of the cubs attending. They have completed Athletes, Games, and Cooking etc

The cubs were due to attend a camp In April with Willow and Baden but this was cancelled instead we offered a 2 night virtual camp, the cubs loved this, they was set challenges like a scavenger hunt, hike, cleaning and other chores. At the end of the camp a quiz.

On the leader front there is a change but as always we cannot run the pack without the dedicated team of volunteers. Stacey (Raksha), Ross (Rama) and Paul (Shere Khan) have remained, we said cheerio to Cara (Kaa) who decided to take some time off. We have welcomed two new section assistants Ellen (Keego) and Luke (Bagheera) and a young leader Nathan (Dizzy). A challenge we continue with is only having 2 warranted leaders and with Stacey working and Ross now in full time work. This will cause difficulties in running some evenings, but I will in advance try and source help.

As for badge work I have to commend both the cubs and their parents, carers and family who continue to support their cubs through the maze of badges. Whilst as leaders we try to develop a strong programme that supports the badges we inevitably have to send some work home to finish.
