# **SHROPSHIRE CAT RESCUE**

## **TRUSTEES' REPORT** **FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019**

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

#### **Objectives and aims**

The objectives of the charity are:

a - the prevention of cruelty and relief of cats and kittens who are in need of care and attention by reason of their ill health or abandonment, in particular by the provision of care, veterinary treatment and the provision of homes; and

b - the advancement of public education in the proper care of cats and kittens.

#### **Public benefit**

The Trustees have given due consideration to the Charity Commissions' guidance on public benefit and are satisfied that the charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

### **ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE**

#### **Charitable activities**

Details of the activities have been set out in the attached Chairman's report.

### **FINANCIAL REVIEW**

#### **Financial position**

The charity has made a surplus of £130,978 compared to a deficit of £12,320 in the previous year, which was due to considerable donations and legacy income. The current year figure does include a £65,110 increase in the market value of the investments, without which the accounts would show a £68,868 surplus.

#### **Reserves policy**

It is the policy of the charity to maintain unrestricted funds which are adequate to fulfil the objectives of the charity, subject to limitations placed on the use of funds which has resulted in reserves building up to the current level. Any surplus funds are held in investments or short term deposits to maintain the income levels for the future.

The free reserves at the year end were £119,523 (2018: £147,690) made up of unrestricted funds, less designated funds, less fixed assets held.

#### **Going concern**

After making appropriate enquiries, the Trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements.

#### **Governing document**

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust dated 3rd August 1998 and constitutes an unincorporated charity.

### **STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT**

#### **Recruitment and appointment of new trustees**

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the Trustees who are elected and co-opted under the terms of the Articles of Association.

The Trustees meet on an ad-hoc basis to consider issues. Day-to-day decisions in relation to the organisation and management of the charity are dealt with by the Chairman.

New Trustees are appointed by the Trustees with reference to the needs of the charity and the particular attributes of the individuals under consideration.

Induction and training of new Trustees is conducted by the Secretary.

#### **Key management remuneration**

The Trustees consider the Board of Trustees as comprising the key management personnel of the charity in charge of directing and controlling the charity and running and operating the charity on a day-to-day basis.

All Trustees give of their time freely and no Trustee remuneration or expenses were paid in the year.

### **TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITY STATEMENT**

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice) including Financial Reporting Standard 102 "The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland"

The law applicable to charities in England and Wales, the Charities Act 2011, Charity (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 and the provisions of the trust deed requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charity for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charity SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business.

### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### **Basis of preparing the financial statements**

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Charities Act 2011. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### **Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions**

The charity has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

- the requirements of Section 12 Other Financial Instruments paragraphs 12.26, 12.27, 12.29(a), 12.29(b) and 12.29A;
- the requirement of Section 33 Related Party Disclosures paragraph 33.7.

#### **Income**

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

#### **Expenditure**

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

#### **Taxation**

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

#### **Fund accounting**

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### **Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits**

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

## Chairman's Report 2019

### What we do

Our charity is set up to offer shelter, veterinary care and ultimately new homes to cats, kittens and occasionally other small animals throughout Shropshire that have been abandoned or are no longer wanted by their owners. In addition, we offer the following:

- Reduced rate neutering vouchers for anyone that is struggling to afford the costs of neutering
- Full cost FIV/FELV blood tests, neutering and necessary veterinary aid for feral colonies and stray cats.
- The loaning of our traps to the public for the purpose of trap, neuter and returning to site
- The loaning of large dog crates so that the public can provide cage rest for veterinary treated animals in their own home.
- Educational work experience placements for schools, colleges and universities
- Duke of Edinburgh volunteer placements
- Back to work confidence building programmes
- Volunteering opportunities
- Visits by contact groups who support the elderly who can spend time with our animals, reminisce and enjoy the company of our volunteers and animals.
- Partnerships with other organisations to provide a diverse public spectrum venue in the company of animals for social and educational visits.



## Our 2019 Achievements

- Our fundraising team raised over £2,600 most of which will go towards our PURR Project (Plan for Ultimate Rescue Relocation).
- Our Maintenance team gave the shelter a much-needed overhaul, painting the shelter in our logo colours turquoise and blue. In addition, they decorated and redesigned our shelter gift shop.
- After one of our village cats was found to have Ringworm, our shelter was shut down for several months to prevent risk of cross infection to visitors. Working closely with our vets we successfully controlled the spread, eliminated the spores and put into place Ringworm Awareness procedures for all cats entering and living at the shelter.
- Having learned much about Ringworm and how to recognise it, a supporter bought us a microscope and this along with Ringworm testing kits enabled us to set up a mini-lab, a much-needed addition to our shelter.
- Our Shelter Sponsorship scheme raised over £3,400 which supports the cats that live permanently at our shelter.
- The bi-annual International Cat Care conference was held in Birmingham and I was fortunate to have a two-day placement donated. The focus of this particular conference was Cat Friendly Solutions for Unowned Cats and information gained from the talks given by accomplished speakers in the world of cats was implemented into our shelter life to positive effect.
- Our Open Days, delayed due to the Ringworm outbreak, were a huge success, partly due to the dry and sunny weather, the dedication of our volunteers but also to the incredibly popular “Paws for a Cuppa” outdoor café with home-baked cakes donated by one of our volunteers.
- We held our annual vintage tea party in our staff room for Re-engage (formerly Contact the Elderly) Shrewsbury groups. As well as a delightful spread of food, our guests enjoyed the company of our cats, ponies, goats and chickens and chatted about times past and their own experiences with animals.
- Our Charity was chosen (by public vote) to appear on the Shrewsbury Monopoly board game. In addition, a cat counter would be created for the game. As one of four charities appearing on the board, this was an honour and privilege.
- We had two visits this year from a Runcorn Social Coms group of children who all need social and emotional support for a variety of reasons. The visits are an opportunity for the children to explore the needs of animals and the reasons they are admitted into shelter care as well as a chance to work together as a group/team and support the charity through a voluntary challenge.
- A donation for specific use in our Retirement Village enabled us to purchase a Veterinary Otoscope, a diagnostic tool that could benefit both the cats in picking up ear related problems, and also veterinary students.
- Work experience placements from schools, colleges and universities were in high demand and gave us an opportunity to show the work we do and how we do it. Our “hands-on” approach and use of diagnostic tools, enhances and expands on the experience gained.
- The Trustees decided it was time to take on a waged Shop Manager and after a lengthy process of understanding the responsibilities that this would bring, we welcomed Mel Smith who had volunteered her time for this role several years prior and had shown an artistic flair and surmountable enthusiasm for the shop as a whole.
- The charity won the prestigious title of Best dressed shop window for the annual Shrewsbury Flower Show and we went on to win other window dressing competitions too.
- Our quarterly magazine “The Cat’s Whiskers” has grown in popularity since its revamp a year ago. The magazine is free and available from our website, local vets, businesses, the shelter, shop, fundraising events and posted out to those who do not have on-line access.

## Statistics

- We admitted 312 cats. Out of those, 102 were abandoned or strays, 12 were born on site and 35 were admitted due to their owners moving house.
- The busiest month of the year for Admissions was October. Busiest rehoming months were July and October
- The maximum number of cats and kittens at the shelter at one time was 108 in September.
