

Barrow Farm Riding for the Disabled Limited

Report and Financial Statements For the year ended 31 December 2019



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The trustees (who are also directors of the charity for the purpose of the Companies Act) present their annual report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2019. The trustees confirm that the financial statements of the company comply with the Charities Act 2011, the Companies Act 2006, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102).

a. ACTIVITIES FOR ACHIEVING OBJECTIVES

The charitable purposes of Barrow Farm Riding for the Disabled (also known as Barrow Farm RDA) are to promote the objects of the Riding for the Disabled Association by providing disabled people with the means to ride or carriage drive at the level of their ability, choice and ambition. We also encourage disabled people to occupy positions of responsibility within the charity.

During the year under review, the principal activities undertaken to deliver these purposes were:

- ~ Providing people with both learning and physical disabilities, the opportunity to ride and carriage drive through weekly riding and driving sessions. Research shows that these activities not only improve physical well-being, but also develop self-confidence and provide participants a level of independence.
- ~ Providing support and coaching to participants who wish to pursue RDA grade tests, show jumping assessments, or to compete in riding competitions.
- ~ Providing social and fundraising events that bring together the wider Barrow Farm RDA community of riders, staff, volunteers and supporters.
- ~ Providing work experience opportunities for disabled people as both volunteers and trustees for the charity.

The trustees have taken due regard to the public benefit provisions of the 2011 Charities Act and the guidelines issued by the Charities Commission and consider that through the delivery of these activities and the impact they have on the wider community, the charity continues to provide a public benefit.

b. ACHIEVEMENTS AND PERFORMANCE

i. REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES

The charity continues to provide weekly riding and driving sessions in support of its main charitable purpose. We have up to 140 riders and drivers each week, from schools, group-homes and individuals. We have been able to increase the number of carriage driving sessions offered each week, and the dry weather allowed these to continue until late October.

During the year, our riders completed 20 riding and 17 horse care RDA tests at grade 1, and 5 riding and 9 horse care tests at grade 2. There were no show jumping assessments completed during the year.

Some riders used their lessons to practice for the musical ride competition which is videoed and judged at RDA regional level. Several of our entries qualified, and and we won at national level for the third year running, coming 1st, 3rd and 5th in one class, and 2nd in another.

Riders and their families, three ponies, staff and volunteers went to the RDA Regional competition at Milton College and successfully competed in Countryside Challenge classes and Dressage, six qualifying for the National Championships.



We held an Open Day in May, and our third annual Horse Show for Riders in June giving our riders the opportunity to take part in Countryside Challenge and Dressage classes, and gave our Championship qualifiers the opportunity to practise for the National event. At the end of the Summer term riders were able to attend pony days, where as well as riding, they learn about stable management and caring for the ponies.

We had a great weekend at the RDA National Championships at Hartbury with all six riders receiving rosettes supported by staff, volunteers, trustees and their families. Boycie went to the Championships for the first time, was well-behaved all weekend and helped his rider win their Countryside Challenge class, and with another rider came 4th in a large dressage class. Boycie, Oural and their riders also took part in the new Endurance class. Rafferty, already an experienced Hartpury horse, made his debut in the Saturday evening costume dressage to music class. Held in the grand arena in front of a large audience, it has been an ambition of ours to take part and this year we had a suitable horse and rider combination. Our theme was "The Wizard of Oz" and all the practice, the costume and prop making came good on the night and we were thrilled to win at our first attempt.

The Jack Petchey Award Scheme, recognising the achievements of riders and volunteers, remains popular. Young riders and volunteers who have demonstrated considerable improvement in either riding, volunteering skills or behaviour are nominated and then the winner voted for by their peers. The money awarded has allowed us to buy items chosen by the winners who were also nominated for the Mayor of Chelmsford's Community Awards.

The charity has continued to provide a valuable public benefit to the wider community. We enjoy excellent links with Writtle University College, and we also provide work-based learning placements for local school students. In their time at Barrow Farm RDA, they learn all aspects of horse care and gain valuable experience helping with the rides and interacting with people with varying disabilities. They learn teamwork and communication skills and we gain satisfaction from seeing them develop. Young people also volunteer as part of their Duke of Edinburgh Award programme.

Through our fundraising activity, we educate and inform members of the local community and societies about the benefits of Riding for the Disabled and riding as a sport in general. We have held many fundraising events, including our popular annual barn dance, tribute nights, quizzes and social evenings.

Our Carol Service, where riders and ponies retell the Nativity story, was attended by our President, Lord Petre, the Bishop of Chelmsford, and local dignitaries and is an opportunity to invite and thank the individuals and organisations who have supported us throughout the year.

We have hosted equine training days and clinics throughout the year and our premises provide a useful venue for local clubs, including archery and dog agility.

In 2017, the trustees agreed an Action Plan of the strategic priorities for developing the charity over the four years to 2020. By the end of 2019, five of the six priorities set had been delivered, with the final priority to improve the storage areas due to complete in 2020.

The focus groups run in 2018, were repeated this year with an independent researcher concentrating on riders with autism. Professional documents were produced, showing clear outcomes that will be very useful for future grant applications and follow-up reporting. Feedback received included the following comments;

- Barrow Farm has helped my son (in too many ways to mention here) and my entire family and made a difference for all of us
- Our son now has his own activity outside of school. For a child that struggles academically and doesn't enjoy school
 this has been a huge benefit to his emotional well-being as it gives him something to look forward to every week.
- Love Barrow Farm cannot imagine being not part of this wonderful organisation.
- The staff and volunteers are always friendly and helpful and always make sure the children have a fun lesson.
 I really appreciate the time, patience & skill of all the staff and young people who work and volunteer here!



ii. ACKNOWLEDGEMENTS

We thank James Kearney who, after 5 years in post, stepped down as Chairman at this year's AGM. James remains a Trustee. We welcome Trustee Martin Wood as our new Chairman.

In October, at East Region's 50 Years of RDA Celebration, Anne Mitchell, Trustee, received an Exceptional Contribution award from Gay Redman, Chair of East Region.

We are very grateful for the grants and donations received this year, We appreciate the contribution of many individuals and groups who have raised money for us by organising fundraising days and participating in sponsored events.

We are indebted to our 100 volunteers who give their time and commitment on a regular basis and new volunteers are always welcome. We also appreciate the volunteer days provided by companies, including Valero Energy, QBE Insurance and Direct Line, who this year have helped with property maintenance, decorating and clearing pathways.

A big thank you to our team of staff for all their dedication and hard work in all weather conditions. We appreciate their knowledge and experience used in providing safe, well-trained ponies and horses for our riders and carriage drivers.

Finally a huge thank you to our wonderful team of ponies and horses.

c. INVESTMENT POLICY AND PERFORMANCE

The charity holds funds in low risk instant access bank accounts.

d. FINANCIAL REVIEW

i. GOING CONCERN

After making appropriate enquiries, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. For this reason they continue to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Further details regarding the adoption of the going concern basis can be found in the Accounting policies.

ii. RESERVES POLICY

The trustees aim to hold sufficient funds to meet 6 months running costs as reserves. This is to provide sufficient working capital to meet day to day needs, with reserves held in the charity's current accounts and an interest bearing account. The trustees consider that the level of reserves available at 31 December 2019, are sufficient to cover the running costs of the charity for more than 6 months and will cover any immediate funding shortfalls arising from the irregular income received from grants and donations.



iii. REVIEW OF FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

<u>Income</u>

Total income for 2019 was £176,184 which was down compared to 2018 when £225,963 was received. This was primarily due to a reduction in the donations received in 2019 compared to 2018 when specific donations were received to fund improvements to outdoor arena and purchase a new tractor and grader. There were no capital projects in 2019 and at £90,036 donations continues to be the largest source of income for the charity.

The income from riding and carriage driving fees increased from £57,189 in 2018 to £60,119 in 2019, due to fee increases, and growth in the number of carriage drives held, which we aim to continue to grow going forward.

Income from other trading activities after fundraising expenses was down in 2019 with net income of £22,597, compared to £24,713 in 2018. This was due to reductions in both income from fundraising events and from the hire of facilities.

Expenditure

Expenditure on charitable activities reduced to £173,115 in 2019, from £186,204 in 2018. The reduction was mainly due to a one-off depreciation adjustment charged in 2018. Partly offsetting this reduction, the charity has seen an increase in headcount and payroll costs, plus an increase in horse related expenditure following the new horses added in 2018 and 2019.

Surplus and reserves

A small reduction in funds of £261 resulted for the year that was in line with the expectations set by the trustees. This compared to a surplus of £34,021 in 2018. Total reserves at the end of 2019 are £315,611 of which £178,095 is restricted funds. Within this, the cash reserves available to the charity have increased by £20,234 in the year, to £129,111 at the end of 2019. This comprises unrestricted reserves of £99,671 and restricted reserves of £29,440.

f. STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

CONSTITUTION

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and was incorporated on 20 October 2010.

ii. METHOD OF APPOINTMENT OR ELECTION OF TRUSTEES

Individuals wishing to become trustees of the charity attend an informal interview. If accepted the new trustee is then proposed and appointed at a trustee committee meeting. Newly appointed trustees are assisted in undertaking the responsibilities of their post by existing post holders and other trustee members and provided with a new trustee pack on joining.



iii. ORGANISATIONAL STRUCTURE AND DECISION MAKING

The trustee committee meets at least quarterly to set strategies and monitor the performance and finances of the charity. In addition they hold an Annual General Meeting. The trustees have set up a number of sub committees to oversee specific aspects of the charity, and to make recommendations to the main committee for decisions. The day to day running of the charity's activities is delegated to the Equestrian Manager/Senior Riding Coach, who also attends and provides reports for the quarterly trustee committee meetings.

Risk Management

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, in particular those related to the operation and finances of the charity and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

g. TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES STATEMENT

The trustees (who are also the directors of Barrow Farm Riding for the Disabled Limited for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice. Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and for that period.

In preparing these financial statements the directors are required to:-

- 1) Select suitable accounting policies then apply them on a consistent basis,
- 2) Observe the methods and principles in the Charity SORP,
- 3) Make judgements and estimates that are prudent and reasonable,
- State whether applicable UK accounting standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements, and
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the the charity will continue in business

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records, which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

This report has been prepared in accordance with the special provision of Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006 relating to small companies.

Notes to the Financial Statements for the year ended 31 December 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

1.1 Basis of preparation of financial statements

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland (FRS102) (Effective I January 2015), the financial reporting standard (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Barrow Farm Riding for the Disabled Limited meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction values unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policies note.

1.2 Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The trustees' review of the financial incoming and outgoing resources has been considered for a period of 18 months and have concluded on this basis the charity has adequate resources and is a going concern.

1.3 Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item of income have been met and it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

The value of donated goods for resale are accounted for on sale at the sale price.

1.4 Donated services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be be measured reliably. In accordance with Charities SORP (FRS102), general volunteer time is not recognised.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would be willing to pay to obtain the services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market: a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

1.5 Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity, this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

1.6 Fund accounting

The unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations and grants which the donor has specified are to be used solely for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects undertaken by the charity.

1.7 Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal requirement or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

- Costs of raising funds comprise the cost of organising fundraising activities and costs associated with the sale of sweatshirts and charity clothing.
- Expenditure on charitable activities includes the costs of running the riding sessions and care of the charity's ponies and the overhead costs of providing the facilities to run the riding sessions.
 Other expenditure represents those items not falling into any other heading.
- Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

1.8 Allocation of support costs

Support costs are those that assist the work of the charity but not directly to the charitable activities. These include governance costs and have been allocated to expenditure on charitable activities as set out in note 7 to the Financial Statements.

1.9 Tangible fixed assets

All horses owned by the charity are capitalised at cost and depreciated over their working lives which is taken to be until they are 20 years old. Other fixed assets costing more than £1,500 are capitalised at cost and depreciated over the estimated useful economic lives as follows:-

Leasehold Improvements - 10 years or 20 years, straight line
Plant and Machinery - 10 years, straight line
Horses - On a straight line basis over their working lives taken to be until age 20
Equipment - 5 years and 10 years, straight line
Fixtures and Fittings - 5 years, straight line

1.10 Stock

Stock is included at the lower of cost or net realisable value. Donated items of stock are recognised at their fair value which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay for the items on the open market.

1.11 Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts.

1.12 Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with immediate access from all accounts

1.13 Creditors and provisions.

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts.

2. LEGAL STATUS OF THE CHARITY

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. The liability of each member in the event of winding up is limited to £1.
