Trustees' Report for the year ended 31 March 2020

Objectives and activities

Shantona has been operating as a limited company since January 1998 and as a registered charity since 28th May 1999. Its charitable objectives are; "To promote the benefit of women in Leeds and the surrounding area by the advancement of education, relief of poverty, the preservation and protection of good health and the provision of facilities for recreation and leisure-time occupation in the interests of social welfare, in particular but without prejudice to the foregoing, for women of Bangladeshi origin."

The name Shantona means, "Comfort" in Bengali. Established in 1998 by local Bangladeshi women, the aim of Shantona is to provide a separate, safe centre for women, children and young people.

In 2018 Shantona celebrated our 20th year of operation. We have received various awards and recognition for the strengths, achievements and benefits to the community including the Duke of York community initiative awards 2007 and 2012, A1 Business Excellence and the Golden Owl for our Hope Film. In recognition of her contribution to the public and voluntary sector in Leeds our CEO, Nahid Rasool, was also awarded an Honorary Doctorate of the University by Leeds Beckett in 2017.

Shantona's diverse team reaches out to isolated women, building trusting relationships and empowering BAME women and families to be confident, independent and resilient, to tackle inequality and to participate in programmes to improve community cohesion.

Shantona challenges inequalities, discrimination and poor cultural practice. We address issues such as domestic abuse (DV), Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE), preventing extremism and provide parenting support within BAME communities. Through our work, women and girls have developed leadership skills and have become empowered to influence and challenge culturally sensitive issues within their community which would otherwise remain hidden and go unreported. As a result, women are now sharing their experiences around domestic abuse and child sexual exploitation publicly and influencing faith groups including mosques.

Shantona is highly regarded as a specialist organisation providing culturally sensitive support to BAME communities and over many years has developed resources to support professionals to adopt culturally sensitive services.

As a result of growing demand Shantona built an extension to its centre in 2011 and, since then, increasing numbers of women, children and families use the centre. Because of this increase, we are now unable to accommodate the needs of the community within the centre and are now using various other premises to meet the demand.

Shantona's services over the year include:

Domestic Violence (DV) Support: Supporting BME women and girls who are facing abuse including domestic (mental, physical, emotional abuse), forced marriage, honour based violence, Child Sexual Exploitation and isolation resulting from divorce or marriage breakdown.

Isolation Work – to work with victims of DV from marginalised BAME communities who may become socially excluded and lonely after leaving a violent relationship because of community pressure or their own lack of confidence and knowledge of what is available.

Child Sexual Exploitation (CSE) - increasing awareness and supporting young people to seek help and disclose any sexual exploitation they face within a culturally sensitive environment.

Healthcare Provision – Working with BAME women, children and young people to address health inequality, promoting healthy lifestyles, easing access to health services and meeting the health-related recreational needs of the community.

Older Peoples Project - creating opportunities for women aged 50+ (mainly from the South Asian Community) to meet new people, build friendships, socialize and obtain emotional support.

Community Cohesion Project - to build community resilience; protect vulnerable people who due to isolation, inequality and feeling oppressed within the community and wider society are at higher risk of developing extreme views. To focus on issues such as cohesion and integration, empowerment and women's rights, voice and leadership,

Women's Lives Leeds – working directly with women and girls with complex needs, providing one to one intensive support, and taking a holistic approach to meet their specific needs.

Youth Club - working with young people to facilitate their personal, social and educational development and supporting them during their period of transition from dependence to independence.

Mobile Crèche/ Childcare - Shantona seeks to generate income through providing mobile crèche and childcare facilities to external organisations and individuals. Through the provision we are creating job opportunities by employing local women and training them to upgrade their skills.

Early Years Provision: providing 30 hours free pre-school nursery education to children aged 2 and 3-4 years, by bilingual staff who have a good knowledge and understanding of the local communities' needs. Numbers have been increasing gradually.

Community Minibus: Shantona runs a community minibus for the community that it serves. The minibus has been vital for engaging local women, children and young people and enabling them to take part in wider activities, including swimming, play scheme outings, nature walks etc.

Role and Contribution of Volunteers:

Over the past year Shantona has benefitted from a team of 15 volunteers ensuring that we were able to deliver our services effectively. Our volunteers have actively contributed as part of the Health project, Young People's Services and DV project.

Achievements and performance

Over the years Shantona has provided unique services, not only to overcome barriers to access services, but also to help people become independent. From being a small community organisation providing social and recreational activities for the Bangladeshi community with the focus on a particular geographical area of Leeds, it is now catering for people from various ethnic minority communities. By advocating and meeting the needs of our target groups, we hope to benefit the whole of society by encouraging integration and community cohesion and reducing inequality.

Close to the end of the period under review Shantona, like many other agencies, was affected by Covid-19. An urgent assessment of risks to service users and staff was made and face to face services stopped, being replaced by telephone and digital support. Information about the situation was given in community languages. The nursery remained open for vulnerable children and those of key workers. Shantona also participated in community support services to vulnerable people such as food parcels.

The trustees confirm that they have paid due regard to Charity Commission guidance on public benefit in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

Financial review

Shantona has again been successful in attracting funding from various sources.

It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The trustees consider that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year. The charity has designated funds amounting to £46,057 which have been set aside out of unrestricted funds for specific purposes. Note 17 provides further details of the purpose of these funds.

Plans for future periods

Shantona is continuously involved in reviewing its service provision, bridging gaps, developing partnerships and strategies and taking steps to become a more self-sustaining organisation. We have joined various partnerships and consortia to work in collaboration with a range of partners, as well as exploring partnerships through which to bid for contracts to serve wider communities.

Future plans include:

- Reaching out to partners outside Leeds and engaging in further collaboration.
- Continuing to raise awareness around violence against women and girls and producing resources.
- Carrying out research and developing further services to meet the needs of the community and dealing with new emerging issues.

- Increasing the amount of young people's provision and improving community cohesion between young people from Harehills.
- Involvement in further partnerships with various domestic violence projects by bringing an integrated approach, to tackle issues around DV and CSE; our joint approach will be citywide to increase working with people who are not reporting violence, as well as working on child sexual exploitation through a targeted support service with Safer Leeds and the Domestic Violence Forum.
- COVID-19: BAME community was hugely affected by the Pandemic, and inequality and deprivation are the key factor behind it. We are witnessing that Shantona's service users were more affected by this. Therefore, Shantona will be focusing on increased development of social media platforms to engage service users. As well build and support communities skill around usage of information technology.

Structure, governance and management

The charity is a company limited by guarantee and registered as a charity on 28 May 1999. The charitable company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established its objects and powers and is governed under its Articles of Association.

Under the requirements of the Memorandum and Articles of Association the members of the Management Committee shall comprise of no more than twenty members of the community elected at the annual general meeting and shall meet at least six times each year. The company has created structures to ensure that there are agreed roles for members. The members of the board have managerial and business acumen, an understanding of the needs of the local community and awareness of local issues as well as an understanding of the requirements of charity law.

This year, we have strengthened the board to fill skills gaps previously identified and are now implementing our business plan which covers the period up to 2021.

The board of the company has the power to determine applications for membership and responsibility for the strategic direction and proper running of the charity.

Day to day management is delegated to the following key personnel: -

Nahid Rasool (CEO): manages and develops staff, finance, premises and other resources of Shantona in collaboration with the Management Committee. Responsible for ensuring and facilitating the participation of service users and ensuring a high professional profile for the Centre's work with relevant agencies, commissioners and other stake holders.

Harpreet Dosanjh (Finance & Monitoring Officer): deals with PAYE, book-keeping, managing the bank accounts, providing quarterly management accounts to the board, providing yearly financial information for the independent examination, evaluating user information for monitoring purposes and gathering information required by funders or partner organisations.

Ashia Akhtar (Administrator/PA to Director): Day to day administration of the centre and being the first point of contact for the organisation and service users via the telephone and face to face.

None of the trustees has any beneficial interest in the company. All the trustees are members of the company and guarantee to contribute no more than £1 in the event of a winding up.

Induction of new Trustees carried out after their appointment

New trustees are provided with organisational policies and procedures and the Memorandum and Articles as part of their induction. After the selection of Chair, Secretary and Treasurer, other roles are allocated to trustees. Through the skills audit we identify knowledge gaps and offer learning opportunities. We engage Trustees to observe Shantona's services and they take a full part in staff-trustee away days.

Risk Factors

The trustees have assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, regularly review the risk register and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Company status

The company is limited by guarantee and all members have agreed to contribute a sum not exceeding £1 in the event of a winding-up. The number of guarantees at 31st March 2020 was 9.

Statement of trustee responsibilities

The trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year. Under that law the trustees have elected to prepare the financial statements in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Entities (effective April 2008) (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice applicable to Smaller Entities). Under company law the trustees must not approve the financial statements unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and the income and expenditure of the charitable company for that period. In preparing these financial statements the trustees are required to:

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP;
- make judgements and accounting estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- state whether applicable UK Accounting Standards have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping adequate accounting records that are sufficient to show and explain the charitable company's transactions and disclose at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable it to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charitable company and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

1 Accounting policies

The principal accounting policies adopted, judgments and key sources of estimation uncertainty in the preparation of the financial statements are as follows:

a Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Shantona Women's & Family Centre Ltd meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

b Reconciliation with previous Generally Accepted Accounting Practice

In preparing the accounts, the trustees have considered whether in applying the accounting policies required by FRS 102 and the Charities SORP FRS 102 the restatement of comparative items was required. No such restatement was required.

c Preparation of the accounts on a going concern basis

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern. The Covid 19 pandemic has not, as of June 2020, had a significant negative impact on the charity's finances, although the charity has had to adapt some of its services during this time.

There are no key judgments which the trustees have made which have a significant effect on the accounts.

The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amount of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2020 (continued)

d Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item(s) of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

Income received in advance of a provision of a specified service is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

e Donated services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), general volunteer time is not recognised; refer to the trustees' annual report for more information about their contribution.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

f Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the Bank.

g Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of charity.

Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose.

Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

h Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

i Operating leases

Operating leases are leases in which the title to the assets, and the risks and rewards of ownership, remain with the lessor. Rental charges are charged on a straight line basis over the term of the lease.

j Tangible fixed assets

Individual fixed assets costing £1,000 or more are capitalised at cost and are depreciated over their estimated useful economic lives on a straight line basis as follows:

Motor vehicles: 25% reducing balance Fixtures equipment and toys 15% straight line Computer equipment: 33% straight line

m Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

n Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

o Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Notes to the accounts for the year ended 31 March 2020 (continued)

O Financial instruments

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

P Pensions

Employees of the charity are entitled to join the charity's defined contribution workplace pension scheme. The charity's liability to the scheme is restricted to the contributions disclosed in note 9, subject to the minimum legal requirement.

2 Legal status of the charity

The charity is a company limited by guarantee registered in England and Wales and has no share capital. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity. The registered office address is disclosed on page 1.
