Annual Report of Trustees for the year-ended 31 December 2019

The Charity is governed by a Trust Deed and registered by the Charity Commission as charity number 1117955. The Trustees administer the charity. Vacancies are filled and/or additional trustees appointed by seeking people with relevant skills and experience and who are in sympathy with the Charity's purposes. The Trustees make decisions on the grants that are given to support projects in Pietermaritzburg, South Africa.

The Charity's purposes are:

- to advance the education of children up to 17 years old, in particular by supporting Gateway Christian School;
- the relief of sickness and the preservation of health among people residing permanently or temporarily in KwaZulu Natal, in particular by supporting the nonprofit making organisation Project Gateway;
- the relief of financial hardship among people living or working in KwaZulu Natal by providing such persons with shelter, business development training, mentoring and ongoing follow-ups, in particular by supporting Project Gateway.

Annual Report

During the year, a total of £37,933.00 was transferred to support projects in Pietermaritzburg, South Africa, at Project Gateway. The advantageous exchange rate from £ to ZAR meant that the money distributed to various projects in South Africa has helped more people. The income in donations from individuals and church groups totalled £38,174.00 for the year – (including Gift Aid),

 $\underline{\mathbf{Education}}$ – 19 people continue to support or part sponsor 15 students at the Gateway Christian School, and one student is being sponsored in his post graduate work.

<u>IT Training</u> – Computer Literacy classes are now held solely in Gateway Christian School, with learners in Grades 3-7 receiving training from a specialist teacher.

<u>Food Support</u> – Emergency food parcels are distributed as needed, and help is given for rural crèches to start up community gardens, which helps provide fresh vegetables for the children

<u>Gateway School of Fashion</u> – A second year programme has now been added to the very successful one year programme. The new programme focuses on menswear, bridal wear and

more complicated womenswear. In 2019 there were 21 students in year 1 and 9 students in year 2.

<u>Early childhood development</u> – Funding was used for the Singakwenza (We can do it) 'Waste2Toys' training programme. The workshop teaches parents, educators and community workers how to make toys and teaching resources using throw-away household packaging. 15 crèche helpers were trained in how to make the toys need for developing Gross Motor, Fine Motor, Maths, Language Development and Puzzle skills.

<u>Team Visits</u> - Two teams and several individuals visited and helped out Project Gateway during 2019. A team from the Canadian Mennonite University renovated part of the very high, old prison wall and a team from Northamptonshire built a fence at Gateway Christian School and painted the wall of the Gateway School of Fashion. The individuals spent some time training the teachers at Gateway Christian School.

General Funds - The money in this fund pays for the central office functions (e.g. accounting, utilities, insurance, HR management, cleaning etc), and also partly funds a person in the UK to undertake the publicity, social media, website, annual reports and related functions for Project Gateway. Some of the general funds help to support the Empowerment programmes which train students in work related new skills.

The Trustees have complied with the duty in Section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission.

Reserves Policy

All donated monies are expended to fund the charity's activities at Project Gateway in Pietermaritzburg within 3-4 months of their receipt. The charity has no non-cash assets, nor staff that they would need to fund in the event of a sudden drop in income.
