Report of the trustees

For the year ended 31 March 2020

Reference and administrative information set out on page 1 forms part of this report. The financial statements comply with current statutory requirements, the Memorandum and Articles of Association and the Statement of Recommended Practice - Accounting and Reporting by Charities (effective from January 2015).

Structure, governance and management Governing document

Transform Drugs Policy Foundation is a charitable company limited by guarantee (company number 04862177) and registered as a charity (charity number 1100518). The company was established under a Memorandum of Association and is governed by its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1. Its registered office is 9-10 King Street, Bristol, BS1 4EQ.

Risk management and assessment

The trustees are aware of their responsibilities to conduct a thorough risk assessment of the charity's activities.

Currently risks are identified and controlled through a process of management overview of financial, managerial and strategic issues, coupled with frequent staff discussion and maintained in a risk register.

Appointment of trustees

The trustees who are directors for the purpose of company law and trustees for the purpose of charity law, who served for the year and up to the date of this report are set out on page 1. New trustees are appointed upon the recommendation of existing trustees and may involve external recruitment efforts using pro bono professional advice.

Organisational structure

Day to day responsibility for the provision of services rests with the chief executive officer James Nicholls.

Objectives and activities for the public benefit

The trustees have had regard to the guidance issued by the Charity Commission on public benefit.

The charity's activities during the year were the advancement of the education of the public and organisations in drug policy by research and dissemination of information, with a view to increasing the effectiveness of such policy and to preserve and safeguard the interests of the public. All our work is driven by the need to improve policy so that it better protects people according to reputable evidence.

Achievements and performance

Transform has gone from strength to strength this year. Interest in and support for Transform's work grew noticeably, with more governments considering fundamental reform to parts of their drug law and policy. Cannabis law reform has been receiving widespread attention from policy makers and demonstrates how effective it is to redirect precious resources from punishment to health treatment and education. We were pleased to advise the Luxembourg government on the reform of their cannabis law. Transform has convened many events through the year for experts to exchange ideas, policy makers to develop new initiatives at local level and for individuals to learn more about our mission.

Report of the trustees

Aid from our funders has continued to grow, with vital grants from Esmée Fairbairn, the Tudor Trust and the John Ellerman Foundation as well as increased funds from the Linnet Trust, to name but a few. We also enjoy backing from a host of small and medium individual donors.

This support allowed us to create two new research posts this year, establishing a stronger regional network for collaboration at local government level as well as producing substantial new reports on the impacts on drug law reform both in the UK and internationally. We also welcomed additional expertise to our board with new trustees Dr Yewande Okuleye, Rowan Miller, Victoria Unwin and Hannah Slater.

The year ended with the Covid lockdown bringing renewed focus from Transform on drug users in the prison system who with other non-violent offenders should be considered for early release. The virus obviously curtailed our calendar of live events including lectures, conferences, exhibitions and speakers and saw our staff move swiftly to extend our existing digital communication platforms and envision a rapid transfer of all our outreach work to digital media. It has accelerated the rate at which economic and social policy are likely to change and added relevance to Transform's mission to increase the effectiveness of drug policy. Our strategy through this time will remain under constant review.

Our Anyone's Child campaign continues to grow in size and influence. We now have 30 families bringing their unique lived experiences to the campaign for better drug policy. Anyone's Child led a successful lobby of Parliament in June and have plans in place for an even larger event this year. They continue to hold regional events which attract large numbers of participants, and Anyone's Child families are regularly the subject of national media features.

The endorsement and encouragement of Transform's work from families involved in the Anyone's Child campaign, all of whom have experienced at first hand the tragic consequences of punitive drug policy, remains both a key driver and a pillar of support for what we do.

Financial review

During the prior financial year we successfully increased our income and while this was received and recognised in the 2018/19 accounts, a significant proportion of this income was budgeted for use in 2019/20 – either because it arrived late in the 2018/19 financial year or because it was part of a multi-year grant which was fully recognised on receipt in 2018/19. Therefore, while income received during the year is down on 2018/19, we believe we have been successful in maintaining our funding base.

We have invested in a small expansion to our team this year while also keeping a focus on financial stability in the long-term. This has significantly increased our output and capacity to manage public events. We remain financially secure in the short term, but a number of our larger grants come to an end towards the end of the year ahead, and we will be focusing on seeking out both continuing support and new sources of investment going forward. While current funders have been very loyal and supportive under COVID-19, we are aware that future funding priorities may shift and that we have a responsibility to ensure donors continue to recognise the critical importance of drug policy reform in creating a better society.

Volunteers

During the year volunteers donated their services to the charity. The trustees estimate that these services in kind had a value of the order of £13,120.

Funders

Funds are received via grant-making trusts and from donations made by a wide range of individuals in the form of monthly direct debits, one-off payments, gifts in kind and larger donations made annually or several times a year. Donations are also collected at special events.

Reserves policy

The trustees have examined the charity's requirements for reserves in light of the main risks to the organisation. It has established a policy whereby a designated fund should be established to meet: the working capital requirements of the charity for a period of 3 months in case future grants are not forthcoming; statutory payments liabilities for all staff; other liabilities. An amount of £132,000 has been maintained from unrestricted funds for this purpose, held in cash at the bank. Full details are set out in our Reserves and Investment Policy.

Plans for future periods

This year, we implemented a new two-year strategy. This sets out our core principles, theory of change and strategic focus for the years ahead. In the light of Covid, this will be kept under constant review. The pandemic has implications for how we deliver a number of our activities; however, it does not change the underlying goals we seek to achieve or our view on the best strategic means to achieve those outcomes. We are confident that our strategic approach will remain robust in the face of medium-term challenges.

- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The trustees are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The trustees confirm that to the best of their knowledge there is no information relevant to the examination of which the independent examiners are unaware. The trustees also confirm that they have taken all necessary steps to ensure that they themselves are aware of all relevant examination information and that this information has been communicated to the independent examiners.

Members of the charity guarantee to contribute an amount not exceeding £1 to the assets of the charity in the event of winding up. The trustees are members of the charity but this entitles them only to voting rights. The trustees have no beneficial interest in the charity.

Independent examiner's report

I report to the trustees on my examination of the accounts of Transform Drug Policy Foundation (the charitable company) for the year ended 31 March 2020, which are set out on pages 7 to 22.

Responsibilities and basis of report

1. Accounting policies

a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities in preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Transform Drug Policy Foundation meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note.

b) Going concern basis of accounting

The COVID-19 pandemic is likely to have a profound impact on the global economy, and may in turn affect the charity. The trustees have considered the impact of this issue on the charity's current and future financial position. The charity holds unrestricted, general reserves of £55,532, designated reserves that can be drawn down if necessary of £209,355, and a cash balance of £370,762. The trustees consider that the charity has sufficient unrestricted reserves and cash flow to continue as a going concern for a period of at least 12 months from the date on which these financial statements are approved. For this reason, the accounts have been prepared on the going concern basis.

c) Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the item of income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from the government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

d) Donated services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item, any conditions associated with the donated item have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item, is probable and the economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102), general volunteer time is not recognised.

On receipt, donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the period of receipt.

e) Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity: this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

f) Funds accounting

Unrestricted funds are available to spend on activities that further any of the purposes of the charity. Designated funds are unrestricted funds of the charity which the trustees have decided at their discretion to set aside to use for a specific purpose. Restricted funds are donations which the donor has specified are to be solely used for particular areas of the charity's work or for specific projects being undertaken by the charity.

g) Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

h) Allocation of support and governance costs

Support and governance costs are those functions that assist the work of the charity but do not directly undertake charitable activities. These costs have been allocated in full to expenditure on charitable activities which is deemed to be reflective of the activities of the charity in this period.

i) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

i) Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

k) Creditors

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

I) Financial instruments

The charitable company only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value with the exception of bank loans which are subsequently recognised at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

m) Pension costs

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme for its employees. There are no further liabilities other than that already recognised in the SOFA.

n) Foreign currency transactions

Transactions in foreign currencies are translated at rates prevailing at the date of the transaction. Balances denominated in foreign currencies are translated at the rate of exchange prevailing at the year end.

o) Accounting estimates and key judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying values of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and underlying assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised if the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods if the revision affects both current and future periods.

There were no sources of estimation uncertainty that have a significant effect on the amounts recognised in the financial statements during the year.

Open Society Foundation

The Open Society Foundation grant was received to fund charitable operations from 1 September 2018 to 31 August 2020. The trustees have budgeted for expenditure of this grant on a systematic basis by August 2020, with plans to expend the remaining £35,736 by August 2020.

Network for Social Change and Vanguard Charitable Trust

These funds represent grants received towards the end of March 2019 which were requested to fund activities that did not commence until after 1 April 2019.

Esmee Fairbairn Foundation

The Esmee Fairbairn Foundation grant funds the charity's core work in the UK, i.e. education, research and advocacy.

CAF America

This fund represent a grant received towards the end of March 2020 which was requested to fund activities that did not commence until after 1 April 2020.

Reserves fund
