Annual Report for the Year Ended 30th June 2019

Structure Governance and Guidance

The Guide Association nationally is incorporated under a Royal Charter which gives the powers to form area Associations. Durham North County Guides Association (which now operates under the name of Girlguiding Durham North) is one of 17 such counties in North East England. The accounts comply with the current statutory requirements and the requirements of the constitution. The ultimate responsibility for the management of Guiding in Durham North is vested in the Executive Committee.

Girlguiding Durham North County forms part of Girlguiding North East England, which is in turn part of Girlguiding.

Objectives and Activities

Girlguiding, as part of a worldwide movement, enables girls and young women to fulfil their potential and to develop emotionally, mentally, physically and spiritually so that they can make a positive contribution to their community and wider world through its distinctive, stimulating and enjoyable program of activities delivered by trained volunteer leaders. Its vision is to have sufficient adult volunteers to enable every girl and young woman to have the opportunity to join Guiding.

Finance

The executive Committee regards the financial performance of Girlguiding Durham North and its financial position to be satisfactory.

The executive's policy is that unearmarked reserves should not exceed the average of one years expenditure.

The income is used to deliver guiding to our members via mentoring and training of new and existing leaders, plus the funding of fun but purposeful events and opportunities that help the girls and young women develop their full potential.

It should be noted that Capitation subscriptions are now paid direct to national HQ instead of via the "County" accounts. The County allocation of these funds are received between March and June annually and are to cover a period forward until March 2020

Annual Report for the Year Ended 30th June 2019

Girlguiding Durham North provides a varied and active programme for girls and young women which includes Rainbows, Brownies, Guides, Rangers and Adults

It is girl centred, girl led and thriving in Durham North. We have just under 3000 active girls and 675 volunteers.

This year our County turned 30. We celebrated by having an afternoon of party games, a Ceilidh and afternoon tea. Lots of fun was had by Leaders of all ages including Trefoil members who also had a cake for their 75th Birthday celebrations. Thank you to all those who helped organise, prepare and support the event.

There have been many celebrations throughout the County at Unit, District and Division level. Washington Division had a great Thinking Day celebration. Brownies took part in a Badge Day event at the Aircraft Museum. 1st Washington Brownies, Guides and Our Lady's Brownies held a fundraising day, which The Mayor of Sunderland visited. They raised £1500 towards their Dukeshouse Wood residential. Well done girls, and we hope you enjoy the trip. Nissan have been working with some Guides in Washington to get them interested in engineering. Nissan provide a bus to pick up the girls and have given them a tour of the factory. The girls have really enjoyed it.

Sunderland North Division have held two programme socials, their Division Review and a summer fundraiser for Camp House throughout the past year. The Division has provided personalised hessian bags for each volunteer with the Division logo on. This was part of the Our Plan Strategy and had a celebration for the Exec on completing the Our Plan Strategy. They went to see the Rock Choir. They used some of the Sir John Priestman Trust Grant to provide each girl with resources for the new programme.

The last NEE BP Challenge was held at Durham Cathedral. Some Guides from our County slept overnight in the Cathedral, as did I. We all had a fabulous time. The following morning was an early start as the weather was being reported from the Bell Tower, however, we didn't meet the reporters or get to be on TV. The Guides then completed a trail around Durham in the pouring rain, before heading back to the Cathedral for the presentation of their certificates.

At Camp House we have seen further improvements to the house itself and maintenance of the woodlands. They have had their annual Bluebell Day, a bucket collection at the Stadium of Light which raise just over £2000; thanks to everyone who helped at both events. The Brownies and Guides at the bucket collection were great at getting the fans to donate.

During the year we have also offered a wide variety of trainings in the County. These have included First Response, Safeguarding, New Programme trainings and Trainings for New Leaders. We have 2 trainers in our County, Christine and Alison, thank you for delivering the sessions. Thank you also to Beatrice who after many years has given up her Trainer role, I enjoyed many a training session, gaining lots of new ideas to use in my units when I first became involved in Guiding. We also use trainers from other Counties especially for Safeguarding, thanks must also go to those. My huge thanks go to Brenda Day for all her support, time and energy she has given to organising the trainings for you all, her role came to an end in May, but she stayed on for an extra 7 months. I appreciate everything she has done enormously. I've enjoyed working so closely with Brenda and a lasting friendship has been formed. Christine Mantle has taken over now and I look forward to working with her again, I'm sure it won't take long for her to get in the swing of things.

I'd like to thank Mary who always attends our meetings and keeps us informed of all the wonderful adventures Trefoil have, and is always on hand to help with any events. Thank you to Sonia, our County President, who always has a good listening ear and offers her hand of friendship at any time. She's always there to lend a hand when needed, thank you. We are again very grateful to the Sir James Knott Trust whose financial support has enabled members of Guides and Rangers to take part in International trips organised by NEE. We have 6 girls going to Gdansk next year.

Many thanks to Claire Hindmarch, our member of staff in the County Office. Claire has again been an invaluable resource ensuring once again the smooth running of the administration within the county.

A huge thank you to everyone who has continued to support the County in any way. Their efforts continue to enable girls to experience new and exciting activities in a safe girl only space where they can enjoy making new friends and having fun developing their potential. I hope you and the girls are enjoying the new programme, many of the girls have achieved their Gold Awards. Fantastic, keep it up!

I would like to extend my grateful thanks once more to Shaun M Lowery for reviewing our financial records and to the Sir James Knott Trust for their continued support, which has helped us to provide such a diverse programme of events for our young people and relevant training for our adult volunteers.

1. Accounting Policies

These Financial Statements have been prepared on a receipts and payments basis in accordance with the S133 Charities Act 2011, the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008. The Charities Statement of Recommended Practice (SORP 2005) does not apply to receipts and payments accounts.

It summarises the transactions and net assets of the charity.

The principal accounting policies adopted are:-

Accounting For Income

Cash donations, income from the craft shop and other income are treated as income in year in which they are received. Voluntary help is not included in the accounts.

Expenditure

All revenue expenditure is accounted for when incurred. Charitable donations are accounted for when the payment is made.

Fixed Assets

Some fixed assets are stated at the written down value because of the impossibility of reconstituting original cost price and accumulated depreciation. Depreciation is provided to write of the cost less estimated residual values of all fixed assets over their expected useful lives at the following rates on net book value

Equipment

20% Reducing balance per annum

Standard

20% Reducing balance per annum

Stock

Stock is valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value.

2. Funds

During 2018/19, all funds received and expended were unrestricted in nature, with no restricted or endowment funds carried forward. There were no grant incomes to report.
