Trustees are appointed or reappointed annually at the Annual General Meeting held in August with the exception of the 2020 Annual General Meeting being held in Kingston, Jamaica on the 7th of March 2020 for practical reasons (all members were present for the construction of the Freedom Skatepark).

Objectives and Activities



<u>Mission:</u> To empower disadvantaged individuals and communities worldwide through fostering and sustaining the positive values inherent to skateboarding.

The objectives of the charity are:

- 1) To empower disadvantaged individuals and communities worldwide through fostering and sustaining the positive values inherent to skateboarding.
- 2) To promote community participation by building socially active spaces which provide positive outlets and opportunities for the underprivileged in habitants of those areas.
- 3) To provide skateboarding facilities in the interests of social welfare for rec reational use of individuals who have need for such facilities by reason of their youth, disability, financial hardship or social circumstances with the object of improving their conditions of life and well being.

In shaping our objectives for the year and planning our activities, the trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and have followed it to the best of our abilities.

The strategies employed to achieve the charity's aims and objectives are:

- a) To construct professional quality skateboarding parks, within impoverished communities, that otherwise lack adequate social and community spaces.
- b) To run free-of-charge youth-based programming aimed at personal development and transferring vocational skills to local adolescents

Putting these strategies in action we are active in 3 countries; Peru, Angola and Jamaica.

Peru:

Started in April 2017, the Alto Trujillo Skatepark in northern Peru is Concrete Jungle Foundation's first full-scale international project. Funded by individual private donations from all over the world, the 150m² skatepark was constructed on the grounds of a local school by some 40 international and local volunteers. The Edu-Skate programme is part of the school's curriculum, giving students the chance to be part of the programme instead of having general physical education classes.

Angola:

The Luanda Skatepark is a 750 m² community skatepark located in the Golfe 2 district of Luanda, Angola. The grassroots project was conceived and realized in partnership with Angola Skateboarding Union (ASU) and New Line Skateparks. A dozen international and 50 local volunteers took part in the build in November-December 2018. The Edu-Skate programme is given by our local partner ASU.

<u>Jamaica:</u>



The Freedom Skatepark is a 1300 m² community skatepark located in 8 Miles, Bull Bay, Jamaica. The grassroots project was conceived and realized in partnership with Flipping Youth, Seprod Foundation, Sandals Foundation and Tmrw Tday Culture. 27 international and 23 local volunteers took part in the build in March and April 2020.

Achievements and Performance

Peru

March 2019 - Our local partner organization SKIP-Supporting Kids in Peru closed its door after 15 years of outstanding work in the disadvantaged neighborhoods of Trujillo.

June 2019: New partnership in place with the local organization Espanglish in Trujillo September 2019: Re-start of Edu-Skate programme in our location of Alto Trujillo after 1 season off.

November 2019: Project visit by the Executive Director and donation of 20 new completes by The Skateroom.

January 2020: Project visit by the Programme Director leading to a redesign of the structure of our work in Peru, in which we don't rely on other organisations for housing and coordination of our international volunteers, but in which we rent our own CJF apartment and coordination by our local team. This way the international volunteer contributions can sustain both rent and salary for the local staff.

February 2020: Employing 8 local people in Peru to work on our programming.

February 2020: Making a partnership with Otra Cosa Network, providing us with a new project location in another disadvantaged area in Trujillo to work ('La Rampa').

Angola

February - June 2019: Edu-Skate programme ran by Angola Skateboarding Union (ASU)

24 June 2019: End of Edu-Skate competition and handover to the local partner organization ASU which is now running is own programme Skate for Growth.

On the 14th,15th and 16th February 2020, the Luanda Skatepark hosted the first African Skateboarding Championship with 6 African nationalities represented.

Jamaica

May 2019: Pre-trip from the Executive Director and Operation Director to meet and greet the local partner, visit the proposed land and evaluate the sustainability of the project.

August 2019: The Skateroom committed to providing \$51,000 for programming and construction.

October 2019: Pre-trip by the Development Director and Programmes Director

February 2020: Finding a new location in 8 Miles, Bull Bay due to the lost of the initial plot of land in Harbor View.

February 15th to April 9th, 2020: Construction of the Freedom Skatepark.



March 1, 2020 to April 1st 2020: The first rendition of the Planting Seeds Apprenticeship Programme focused on skatepark construction skills and was implemented in partnership with New Line Skateparks and Flipping Youth during the construction of the Freedom Skatepark in Kingston, Jamaica, between March 1 April 1. During the 4-week programme, six skateboarders and BMXers from the Kingston area shadowed our professional skatepark builders while also working as a group to plan, budget, source materials for and ultimately construct their own skate obstacle at the Gully DIY. Construction skills provided to beneficiaries encompass universally sought-after proficiencies in budgeting, planning, coordination, design work, foundation-laying, wood forming, bricklaying and concrete shaping.

March 5, 2020: CJF successfully crowdfunded 15,584€ for the skatepark construction.

- Successfully running the first edition of the Planting Seeds Apprenticeship Programme

The year in numbers:



- 33 international volunteers were involved in our activities.
- 30 local volunteers were involved in our activities.
- 8 locals are receiving a stippend for their work in Peru.
- 6 locals received a stippend for the apprenticeship in Jamaica.
- 150 children aged beween 7 and 12 years old have benefited from our activities.
- 113 Edu-Skate classes has been given.
- Our activites had an average attendance of 37% female and 63% male.

Challenges 2019-2020

March 2019: Losing our original partner organization in Peru.

June 2019: Stopping Edu-Skate programming in Angola.

January 2020: Losing the land we were originally aiming to build the Freedom Skatepark 4 weeks before the build.

Starting March 2020:

- All programming on hold due to the COVID-19 outbreak.
- Having volunteers stuck in both Peru and Jamaica due to travel restrictions related to the COVID-19 outbreak.
- Prematurely losing about half of the construction volunteers of the Freedom Skatepark build, significantly increasing the workload on the people staying behind.

Concrete Jungle Foundation held unrestricted funds of £2,686 and restricted funds of £9,069 for a total of £11,755 at the year end.

The reason for this amount of held funds is due to finishing the construction of the skatepark after the end of the financial year and therefore, having remaining funds for the educational programme coming when the COVID-19 situation improves.

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended 1st April 2020

a) Nature and purpose of funds

Unrestricted funds are those that may be used at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of the aims and objectives. The trustees maintain a single unrestricted General fund for the day-to-day running of the charity. Restricted funds may only be used for specific purposes. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are received for specific purposes.

b) Restricted fund: The Skateroom

The Skateroom fund were restricted for the Freedom Skatepark project in Jamaica, and part of it were accordingly spent on volunteers and materials incurred during the build. All receipts were approved by The Skateroom and the remaining funds of £24,156 are to be used for the Edu-Skate programme and programme development (administration) as per the MOU signed with The Skateroom.

Due to the COVID-19 pandemic, The Skateroom was unable to meet the original deadline of February 2020 for the completion of their donation. It was agreed that the remaining payment of £15,087 will be donated by June 2020.

c) Related party transactions

None of the trustees receives payment of remuneration.

The Trustee Lisa Jacob has donated the equivalent of £2250 (2500 euros) to Concrete Jungle Foundation over the course of the financial period through the sales of her magazine "Out of the Blues".

d) Currency use

Concrete Jungle Foundation manages 5 different currencies (GBP, EUR, USD, PEN, JMD).
