As the weeks dragged on, we explored new ways to provide more meaningful social contact with each other to help combat isolation. Maggie Edgington, our Families Lead, worked extremely hard supporting individual families remotely with various issues, as well as liaising with Leicester Libraries to arrange for families to receive books, delivered to their door. We also worked with partners to arrange deliveries of toys, seeds and children's clothes.

In late July we were finally able to start regular face-to-face activities thanks to the Leicester Unitarians who allowed us to use Great Chapel Garden as a safe outdoor space for our work – and it felt so good to see each other again after so long.

Over August we focused on the distribution of toiletries, PPE, cleaning products and household goods, relishing the chance to meet in the garden each week, and running other outdoor activities alongside, such as walks and Soccercise. So far since April, we've provided more than 400 toiletry/cleaning packs both to our own group and more widely to new arrivals being accommodated in local hostels and hotels. We've also given out £2000 from our Emergency Fund.

As September approaches our sewing classes are scheduled to restart, and the football group will follow. We will be returning to the Bridge, although our drop-in can't be the same for now – we will have to run with much smaller groups, an appointment system and social distancing in order to keep everyone safe.

LEICESTER CITY OF SANCTUARY

This report covers the period of our financial year which ends on 31 March 2020, but it would be impossible to write without noting the extraordinary situation we, along with the whole world, have faced since then following the Covid-19 pandemic. As a result, life divides into 'before and during' Covid-19 – as none of us yet knows when 'after' will arrive or what it will look like. Our coordinator's report will tell more about what we have been doing before and during the pandemic. This part relates to how trustees have managed the charity through this period.

Trustees are legally responsible for ensuring we operate both lawfully and with the best interests of our beneficiaries in mind. We have met seven times since our last AGM in June 2019. The names of Trustees for the year are below - Sam Javid resigned in April 2020 due to other commitments, and we thank him for his service over a number of years.

We measure our activity against the Strategic Plan 2019-22 presented to the last AGM, and last November we also held Open Forum meetings where we were able to consult members, volunteers and users as to how they saw things and this has influenced our priorities in the months since. Trustees also worked through three sub-groups during the past year – a Funding Group made up of staff and trustees, and since June 2020, a Restart Group, overseeing our plans for emerging from the Covid-19 lockdown, and a Nominations Group looking at potential trustee names to put to this year's AGM.

FINANCIAL REPORT 2019-2020

At the end of the 2019/20 financial year our funds stood at 2015 ver £31,000, a decrease of nearly £12,000 on the end of 2018/19. Income during the previous year had been boosted by a grant of nearly £15,000 from Enable and although we were awarded some grants during 2019/20, they were all under £5,000. However, donations held up well, which was encouraging.

The scale of activities during the year was maintained, yet overall expenditure fell by over £5,000. This was partly the result of the one-off consultancy costs in 2018/9 associated with the Enable grant. The decision to employ an assistant coordinator meant an increase in our regular employment costs. Other costs were broadly in line with the previous year.

Late in March we heard the good news that we had been awarded a significant grant from the National Lottery Reaching Communities fund which will bring us nearly £30,000 a year for the next 4 years and secure our ongoing work - for which we are extremely grateful.

This means that we will not now need to dip into reserves during 2020/21 which is good news. However, we cannot be complacent and need to continue to ensure that our income from other sources is maintained, especially as our long-term grant from the British Red Cross comes to an end early in 2021.

A full financial report is available on our website and we're very grateful again to John Orridge for providing the Independent Examiner report on these figures.

OORDINATOR'S

We enjoyed a busy and fruitful period leading up to March 2020. During 2019, 408 asylum seekers and refugees received help via one or more of our services.

Our new Assistant Coordinator,
Shabana, has been a great asset and
the additional capacity allowed us to
expand our activities and make new
contacts. We also benefitted from our
partnership with Leicester City in the
Community (LCitC), which resulted in
Sarah Jones attending our drop-in at
the Hub each week, not only to deliver
Soccercise but also to help us more
widely. Sarah's involvement has also
brought some fantastic new
opportunities.

We've built on our Strategic Plan and have been working on how we measure and report impact. We've developed a Model of Change which shows how all of our activities map to our strategic aims. We've also developed an Impact Report for 2019 highlighting what we delivered during the year. All of these we were finalists for the VAL City Small Charity of the Year award (2019), a great recognition of all that we do.

DROP-IN AT THE HUB

Loneliness is a big problem facing many asylum seekers and refugees. Therefore our activities focus on bringing people together and creating community.

New developments at the Hub include a conversation table, where people can practice English and build confidence speaking in a relaxed, informal setting. Our volunteers Margaret and Phil started running this table in the summe of 2019 and it has proved very popular.

We also developed new partnerships around health and wellbeing. LifeLinks became regular visitors providing wellbeing activities, along with Haymarket Health, who are experts in sexual health. In terms of first aid training, the Joe Humphries Memorial Trust showed 20 service users what to do if someone suffered a cardiac arrest and how to use a defibrillator. Volunteers in the family corner enjoyed a short training course on paediatric first services.



One of the highlights of this period was a visit from ex-Leicester City player Matt Piper, organised by Sarah. LCFC made a film of our drop-in, lavailable on their website), and later that day we enjoyed a ground tour of the King Power stadium where we got a glimpse behind the scenes, including the changing rooms and communal hot tub. We gave mock interviews in the press room, enjoyed refreshments in a private box, took endless photos and had an unforgettable afternoon out!

UNIVERSITY OF SANCTUARY

207 English classes were delivered in partnership with Leicester University during 2019. 63 students benefitted from a scholarship for the pre-sessional English programme run by Leicester University's Centre for International Training & Education (CITE). 21 of them moved on to academic degrees either at Leicester or at other universities.

RIPS

There were 13 trips in 2019, including the Central Fire station, an afternoon at Joel's allotment to see where the organic vegetables are grown, and a rather blustery outing to the seaside.



One particularly memorable trip was the visit to Billesdon. Villager Bill had arranged horse and carriage rides – providing his four beautiful highstepping English Hackney horses and a trap. Everyone enjoyed a thrilling 30 minute ride out of the village, through a lovely patchwork of fields - definitely a high point of the year!

SEWING/I.T.

48 sewing/I.T. classes were provided in 2019. There are 10 regular attendees, and two members of the class are now helping to run the group, supporting the sewing tutor and sharing their skills.

FOOTBALL

There were 46 sessions with an average of 35 young men attending in 2019, and between four and five teams playing each week. The group won a tournament in Doncaster in December.

NEW EVIDENCE SEARCH TEAM (NEST)

NEST helps refused asylum seekers to understand the reasons for their refusal and helps them gather new relevant information. 27 NEST cases were handled in 2019.
