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REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

The trustees present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 December 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

Cardiomyopathy UK is the national charity for people affected by the heart muscle disease cardiomyopathy. The charity exists to ensure that people with cardiomyopathy can live longer and fuller lives. This is achieved through:

1) Providing support and information services for people affected by cardiomyopathy to increase their understanding of the condition, provide skills and motivation to cope day to day and limit the damage to psychological well-being.

2) Working with healthcare professionals and clinical experts to enhance their ability to make appropriate diagnoses and improve treatment outcomes.

3) Raising awareness of cardiomyopathy amongst the general public to reduce the number of sudden and avoidable cardiac deaths through early diagnosis.

4) Campaigning to encourage policy makers and health service commissioners to improve access to quality treatment.

5) Increasing understanding of cardiomyopathy and its impact so that the charity can support the search for new treatments and ensure that its own work is effective.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Trustees are pleased to report that during 2019, significant progress has been made across all areas of the charity's activity and that the charity continues to grow and develop in-line with its strategic plan. Trustees would like to highlight the following achievements:

Providing support and information

In 2019 the charity's nurse lead helpline continued to be a vital source of support and information helping over 1,500 people during the year over the phone, online and via email. The Trustees are pleased to see that that the quality of this service remains exceptionally high with 95% of helpline callers reporting that they feel better able to cope after speaking to one of the charity's helpline nurses.

During the year, the charity was able to expand its helpline service to do more for people who are struggling to navigate the benefits system or whose personal independence payments had been reduced, stopped or denied. The charity worked with 47 people to overturn personal independence payment decision and was successful in every case.

The charity's work with children and young people continued during the year and was strengthened by funding from Max's Foundation. This enabled the charity to recruit a part time youth project manager towards the end of the year and will help to ensure that the charity can continue to grow its youth services in 2020.

In November, the charity welcomed a record number of participants to its National Conference with over 85% of attendees reporting that they felt more confident about their ability to manage living with cardiomyopathy after attending the event.

During the year, the charity's peer support services were busier than ever. There were 1,120 support group visits, 496 people helped by our hospital volunteers and 116 people helped by our telephone peer support volunteers while our Facebook support group grew to 6,000 members.

The charity's peer support work continues to expand and Trustees were delighted that the charity was successful in securing further long-term funding for this work from the National Lottery Community Fund. This additional funding will enable the charity to open up more local support groups and extend its in-hospital peer support work to more clinics nationwide.

Improving diagnosis and access to guality treatment

In 2019 the charity was able to continue its healthcare professional education work focusing on the theme of "hidden in heart failure". The Midlands healthcare professional education day was well attended with 95% of attendees reporting that they had more confidence in their ability to diagnose and treat cardiomyopathy after attending.

The charity continued to develop plans to provide online learning opportunities to sit alongside and complement the charity's existing face to face educational events. Trustee are pleased to report that sufficient funding for this work has now been secured and online learning will be available in 2020.

During the summer the charity undertook a nationwide survey of its service users looking at their experience of diagnosis and treatment. The findings from this survey were publicized in the media and relevant medical societies. The survey showed that only 9% of people with cardiomyopathy had experienced the ideal journey from diagnosis to treatment and long-term care. Information from this survey will continue to shape the charity's strategy and underpin its national advocacy work.

Trustees were pleased that the charity was able to launch a new collaboration with researchers at Imperial Collage. Heart Hive is an online platform that aims to match researchers with individuals who are interested in participating in research trials. Trustees believe that Heart Hive has the potential to remove barriers to research participation and encourage researchers to focus attention on improving treatments for cardiomyopathy and myocarditis.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

During the year the charity met its commitment to fund two research nurses under the supervision of the Royal Brompton Hospital who have been focusing their efforts on developing our understanding of myocarditis.

Campaigning and raising awareness

Increasing awareness of cardiomyopathy and myocarditis is a key aim and the charity worked to increase its reach through both traditional and social media platforms by using an external media agency and focusing staff time on social media activity.

Towards the end of the year the charity ran a national campaign focusing on myocarditis, a condition that can lead to sudden cardiac death and is often a precursor to cardiomyopathy. This was the first campaign of its kind in the UK and be targeted at both GPs and the wider public. The campaign was launched during the 2019 winter flu season, an especially difficult time where myocarditis can often be masked by more common flu like symptoms.

Trustees are pleased to report that the above activity resulted in the charity securing 55 pieces of media coverage, a 22% increase in website visitors, a 26% increase in social media followers and over 290,000 visits to its website.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Income

Total income for the year was just under £850K, around £250K less than the previous year which had seen funds transferred to the charity following the merger with The Alexander Jansons Foundation and the receipt of two large legacies. Accounting for these windfalls; Trustees were pleased to see the underlying income continue to rise in 2019 driven by increased support from companies and charitable trusts as well as an increase in the number of individuals taking on fundraising challenges and events during its 30th anniversary year.

Reserves policy

The charity aims to maintain unrestricted reserves at a level that equates to around six to nine months of normal unrestricted expenditure. Trustees believe this to be a prudent amount given that we operate in a competitive environment and, as the leading specialist provider of support services for people affected by cardiomyopathy, there is a duty to ensure that we can maintain our core services for individuals in need.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

FUTURE PLANS Providing Support and Information

In 2020, Thanks to funding from the National Lottery Community Fund, the charity plans to continue to expand its peer support network of local groups, hospital and phone volunteers.

Trustees continue to recognise the need to do more to support individuals who are not responding to treatment for cardiomyopathy and who are approaching the end of their life. A range of new services and information for these individuals will be available in 2020 with the aim of ensuring that their specific practical and emotional needs are met

Improving diagnosis and access to quality treatment

The charity is now on-track to launch its online learning platform providing learning opportunities to a greater number of healthcare professionals. Online education provides a more convenient way for healthcare professionals to access training and is a more cost effective way for the charity to reach healthcare professionals, many of whom would be unlikely to attend face to face meetings. The charity also aims to provide a face to face educational meeting for clinicians as in previous years.

During 2020 the charity will continue to work with the team from Imperial Collage on The Heart Hive project bringing together researchers and people with cardiomyopathy who wish to support research. The charity will also provide patient insight for the European Union funded CRUCIAL project and work with a wide network of researchers to ensure that people with cardiomyopathy can play a significant role in shaping research efforts.

In addition to this, the charity will be working with the Arrhythmogenic Cardiomyopathy Trust to provide a grant of up to £120K to fund research into arrhythmogenic cardiomyopathy. The funding process will be managed according to the guidelines set out by the Association of Medical Research Charities.

In 2020 the charity also plans to launch a local advocacy programme that will empower volunteers to work with clinicians, commissioners and the providers of NHS services to improve access to quality treatment for people with cardiomyopathy. This project will work across all UK nations and play a significant part in collating the evidence needed to set the charity's national policy.

Campaigning and raising awareness

In 2020 the charity plans to run a national campaign focusing on peripartum cardiomyopathy, a condition that can affect mothers in the month before and the five months after giving birth. This campaign will aim to raise awareness of the condition amongst expectant mothers and their families and change best practice for health visitors and midwives so that they are more likely to identify the condition and seek specialist help.

COVID-19

The COVID-19 pandemic has been a difficult time for everyone, yet the charity has continued to deliver a range of services, thanks to the efforts of the volunteers, staff and the community pulling together in this time of crisis. The Trustee would like to heartfully thank everyone for their efforts.

REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The charity is controlled by its governing document and constitutes a charitable incorporated organisation. The charity is governed by its constitution adopted on 5 November 2015.

The charity continues to review and, where necessary, improve its trustee induction and training resources to ensure that new trustees are equipped to support the work of the charity to their maximum ability.

Appropriate policies and procedures have been put in place to ensure good governance including financial management, data protection and employment practice. Trustees maintain a risk register and work with the Chief Executive to ensure that strategies are in place to mitigate against identified risks.

Related parties

Throughout the year, trustees closely monitored the impact of the charity's merger with the Alexander Jansons Foundation that was completed at the start of 2018. Trustees felt that this merger had brought considerable benefit to service users by enabling the charity to support people with myocarditis and to actively support research work focused on improving treatments for people with cardiomyopathy and myocarditis.

Towards the end of the year, the trustees reached agreement that The Alexander Jansons Fund would be separated from Cardiomyopathy UK, that Mr Andy Jansons would leave the board and establish a new charity. The de-merger process was completed by the end of the year and funds held by Cardiomyopathy UK for the purpose of supporting research into myocarditis were transferred to the newly established independent charity; Alexander Jansons Myocarditis UK (charity registration no. 1186345) to be spent for the same purpose. The two charities have agreed to work together on future projects and support each other's activities.

The charity works closely with expert clinicians from a number of NHS Trusts to help ensure that its work is clinically appropriate and that it is able to reach as many people with cardiomyopathy as possible.

The charity has a positive relationship with The British Heart Foundation, The Pumping Marvellous Foundation and a number of other charities that provide support and information relating to heart diseases. Where possible, the charity works in collaboration with these charities. During the year, the Charity's Chief Executive continued to act as co-chair of the Heart Failure Alliance, a collaboration between medical colleges, pharmaceutical and health technology companies, charities and other stakeholders working to improve accesses to quality treatment for heart failure.

During 2019 the charity received funding from four pharmaceutical companies (Shire, Sanofi. Akcea, Pfizer and Alnylam) the total income from these companies was £24,000, less than 3% of the charity's total income. The charity limits the total income that it can receive from pharmaceutical companies and healthcare technology manufacturers to 10% of total income in a given year. A full copy of the charity's policy on working with these companies is available on its website.

Public Benefit

Cardiomyopathy UK confirms that in setting its programme of support, it has had due regard to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit. The programme of support also conforms to the charity's charitable objectives and aims. No persons are excluded from the work of the charity on grounds of gender, race or religion.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charity, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Cardiomyopathy UK is a charity limited by guarantee and incorporated in England and Wales. The charity's principal address is Unit 10, Chiltern Court, Asheridge Road, Chesham, Buckinghamshire, HP5 2PX. The registered charity number is 1164263.

The presentation currency of these financial statements is Sterling (\pounds) , being the currency of the primary economic market in which the entity operates. All amounts in these financial statements have been rounded to the nearest pound unless stated otherwise.

The significant accounting policies applied in the preparation of these financial statements are set out below. These policies have been consistently applied to all years presented unless otherwise stated.

In light of the rapid global spread of the Coronavirus "COVID-19" in early 2020, the trustees have reviewed and stress tested projections and budgets for the next twelve months. Following this review, the trustees consider there to be little impact on the Charity's ability to act as a going concern.

The trustees have reviewed the fundraising possibilities and the capital resources available and consider that the company has adequate resources in place to continue trading for the next twelve months.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Grants offered subject to conditions which have not been met at the year end date are noted as a commitment but not accrued as expenditure.

Allocation and apportionment of costs

Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources.

Salaries have been apportioned in accordance with the duties to which they relate.

Premises costs have been apportioned on the basis of percentage of floor space used.

Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Tangible fixed assets

Computer equipment - at variable rates on reducing balance

Taxation

The charity is exempt from tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charity operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charity's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

Financial instruments

The charity has applied the provisions of Section 11 "Basic Financial Instruments" and Section 12 "Other Financial Instrument Issues" of FRS 102 to its financial statements.

Financial instruments are classified and accounted for, according to the substance of the contractual arrangement, as either financial assets, financial liabilities or equity instruments. An equity instrument is any contract that evidences a residual interest in the assets of the company after deducting all of its liabilities.

Debtors and creditors due within one year

Debtors and creditors with no stated interest rate and receivable or payable within one year are recorded at transaction price. Any losses arising from impairment are recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities in administrative expenses.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents in the Statement of Financial Position comprise cash at bank and in hand and short term deposits with an original maturity date of three months or less. Bank overdrafts are disclosed within creditors on the Statement of Financial Position.

Heart Hive - Online platform that aims to match researchers at Imperial College with individuals interested in taking part in research trials. The objective is to seek ways of improving treatment for cardiomyopathy and myocarditis.

Max's Foundation - Three year grant to fund the position of Youth Support Manager.

Community Peer Support (National Lottery Community Fund) - A five year project partly funded by the National Lottery Community Fund to develop an innovative face to face and phone peer support service for people with life limiting heart muscle disease throughout England.

Building Capabilities (National Lottery Community Fund) - National audit pan England of those NHS trusts and service providers providing clinical care and treatment to people affected by cardiomyopathy and myocarditis.

Online Medical Education - Towards the development of an online learning program which will improve diagnoses of cardiomyopathy and access to treatment by upskilling clinical knowledge of patient facing clinicians.

16. POST BALANCE SHEET EVENTS

Since the reporting date, the growth of the COVID-19 pandemic across the world has caused us to consider whether the charity can continue as a going concern for the next twelve months.

The charity has responded to the global pandemic by ensuring that its core services can be accessed online and that it is able to provide appropriate support and information to service users in line with government guidance. As with all charities, the pandemic has impacted on funds chiefly through the cancellation or delay of mass participation events such as the London Marathon that accounts for a large part of the charity's income. Although some of this impact can be mitigated through diversifying fundraising and identifying cost savings, it is likely that the charity will need to call on its free reserves. At present under a pessimistic scenario, Trustees predicts that free reserves at the end of the financial year will equate to around 4.5 months of unrestricted expenditure, and continue to monitor the situation closely. The Trustee are optimistic that whilst the changing operating environment brings new challenges, the organisation can continue to quickly adapt and find innovative ways of raising funds and delivering our services to the benefit of the community.

The trustees have performed stress tests and applied these to budgets and forecasts and although there is an impact on the 2020 performance, this will not significantly impact going concern. Given the level of cash held by the company and high levels of reserves, the charity is in a position to continue as a going concern for the next twelve months.
