TRUSTEES REPORT

The Trustees present their report and the unaudited financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st December 2019.

Reference and administrative information set out on page 2 forms part of this report.

Structure, governance and management

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee, incorporated on 12th October 1995, registered under the Companies Acts (registration number 03112751) and its governing document is a Memorandum and Articles of Association. It was granted charitable status by the Charity Commission under number 1050202.

Following a resolution at the AGM in April 2017, changes to the charity's Objects were approved by the Charity Commission and the changes to the Memorandum & Articles were registered at Companies House and with the Charity Commission in September 2017. The principal changes were: to drop the word "Limited" from the charity's name; to update the language used in the charity's Objects; and to adopt Memorandum and Articles based on the current Charity Commission model.

By operation of law all trustees are directors under the Companies Act 2006 and all directors are trustees under Charities legislation and have responsibilities, as such, under both company and charity legislation.

New trustees are recruited with a mixture of advertising for specific roles or attributes and responding to unsolicited offers. The organisation has a clearly documented standard process prior to appointment which incorporates recommended good practice for safer recruitment. The process includes a pre-application informal one-to-one meeting with an existing trustee, followed by a written application on a standard application form; a requirement to attend a minimum number of trustee meetings as an observer; and taking up two references and a DBS check. After that a decision is taken by the Chair and one other trustee whether or not to recommend the applicant for approval by the Board. If the applicant is approved, they will be appointed as a co-opted trustee until the next AGM, when their appointment will be subject to election by members.

Objectives and activities of the charity

Bath City Farm is a community hub and green oasis in the heart of Twerton. An area of multiple disadvantage and high-density social housing in the South of Bath, far removed from the Georgian splendour Bath is renowned for. From the beginning our **Vision** has been to build a healthy community rooted in nature, food, farming and each other. As a welcoming urban farm, we use our unique setting and targeted projects to educate, improve wellbeing and transform lives.

Bath City Farm exists to:

- Support vulnerable people to develop new skills
- Improve community cohesion, reducing loneliness and isolation
- Boost health and well-being
- Inspire environmental awareness
- Increase the number of people to engage in their community
- Bring enjoyment and education in horticulture, farming and nature

Bath City Farm began to take shape in the early 1990's, growing and developing in response to demand and now supports over 800 people a year through a range of projects in animal care, horticulture and catering. Aimed at supporting adults with complex health and social needs and young people facing adversity, these projects enhance confidence, develop social networks and teach new skills. The farm is a free community resource and we welcomed 40,000 visitors to our site for recreation and education purposes during 2019. The farm has extensive facilities, including: a training kitchen, meeting rooms and 37 acres of green space and play a vital role for other local charities, education providers and organisations who benefit from using this unique outdoor space.

With over 25 years of experience in delivering projects for children, young people and adults we have developed generational connections with many local families and individuals and strive to offer care holistically, whether individual needs are practical, emotional or social.

Public benefit

In shaping the objectives for the year and planning activities, the trustees have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit, including the guidance 'public benefit: running a charity (PB2)'.

Main activities to further Bath City Farm's purpose for public benefit

We run regular weekly sessions for adults, young people and families across B&NES but with a particular focus on our local community of Twerton and Whiteway.

The Farm delivers 10 different farm-based projects under two separate programmes which are:

Roots to Health - Supporting adults with complex health and social needs.

Branching Out - Improving lives for children, young people and families facing adversity.

All of our projects focus around a different user group or activity such as horticulture, catering, animal care, conservation and crafting. We work closely with individuals, who each have a designated project co-ordinator; this encourages personal development and provides structured activity to suit their needs. We also offer supported training and progression opportunities when individuals are ready to take that next step.

Our major focus is supporting individuals with mental health conditions often experiencing other complex issues such as substance misuse, domestic abuse, relationship difficulties, unemployment and homelessness. We aim to give individuals the support they need to achieve a sustained recovery to rebuild their lives after a crisis or long-term period of mental illness. We support individuals to thrive in their everyday lives and discover the tools and confidence to fulfil their potential, better manage their mental health, contribute to community development and improve their quality of life. We provide non-medical psychiatric care within strongly evidence-based community mental health activities, aligned to our local NHS strategy to reduce dependency on medication and to reduce the length of, and at times completely avoid, psychiatric hospital admission.

We also deliver specialist work development placements for individuals with a learning disability and educational courses and activities for young people and families facing adversity. As a Community Hub, we enable marginalised groups to connect with each other and have countless interactions that improve well-being and community cohesion.

Main achievements and performance

Key achievements in 2019 included:

Increase in people reached through our work

The number of people benefiting from the Farm continued to increase and user numbers increased by an incredible 21% from 2018 figures:

- A record **41,862** people used the farm. This figure breaks down as follows:
 - 943 people attended projects to improve health, wellbeing and skills (679 adults and 264 children)
 - o 1269 children and young people spent time at the farm with school/group visits,
 - o **3650** people participated in community events and workshops.
 - 36,000 people visited the farm (based on visitor figures taken on an average day and considering seasonal variances)

Additionally, 30 other organisations used the farm site to run their own activities, events and projects.

Long Term Security for BCF

We worked hard on and were delighted to receive significant continuation funding for our Mental Health programme and Youth Programme from the Lloyds Bank Foundation and St James Place Foundation, with support from the other trusts and foundations listed below. In a very competitive climate, this ensures two of our key projects have security until 2022.

We also secured the majority of funding towards a new café through Community Infrastructure Levy and Power to Change. Our long-held dream of a larger indoor café will now be a reality and building work will start in autumn 2020. 'The Trough' café has grown to become a major focus for projects at the farm, with the fresh produce being grown by our Mental Health project and then turned into delicious dishes for sale, by our Training at the Trough project; a work development programme for people with Learning Disabilities. This significant development will enable our social programmes to expand at the same time as generating some income for the farm.

Going Concern

Following the announcement of Government restrictions due to the Covid-19 pandemic, the Trustees have been meeting regularly to monitor the Farm's financial position. At the end of March 2020 we had £190,000 of reserves and £178,000 of cash. These reserves represent over 8 months of expenditure in normal circumstances.

The trustees took the following steps –

- The Farm was closed on 22nd March.

- All but 5 members of staff, who are required to maintain the Farm and animals, were furloughed from 1st April under the Government's Coronavirus Job Retention Scheme.
- All expenditure that was not required for the continued running of the Farm was stopped.
- Grant bodies that had provided significant restricted funds were approached to see if they would allow us to be flexible in how we spent their funds during the Covid-19 epidemic.
- Applications are being made for additional grants from a number of emergency funds, including a £10,000 grant from Bath and North East Somerset Council, which has recently been received and a request for a £29,800 grant from Power2Change.
- We are launching a £50,000 crowdfunding appeal to ensure that we are able to maintain our reserves at an acceptable level.

The closure of the Farm means that we will lose the overwhelming majority of our trading income over the summer months, when most of it is earned. We have good working relationships with our main funders and have been updating them on the current situation.

Our latest financial forecast runs until the end of May 2021. It is based on what the Trustees believe is the worst-case scenario for grant income and shows that because of the substantial reserves that we had at the end of March, we are a going concern.

The Trustees do not believe that any asset values have been significantly impaired by the Covid-19 pandemic and that there is no material uncertainty about the Farm's ability to continue to operate.

Recognition for our work

2019 has been an incredible year for raising our profile both locally and regionally. We received recognition for the impact our work has through a variety of different ways.

- Bath City Farm was winner of the prestigious Bath Life Awards in Feb 2019. We won
 the 'Charity of the Year' category. The judges said the farm is "A remarkable
 environmentally-friendly urban community facility, providing a highly successful support
 system to those who need it. An inspiring and educational place."
- Our Training at the Trough team also won 'Volunteer Team of the Year' at the Bath and North East Somerset Council's Community Awards. The Training at the Trough Team are just one of the groups which help to keep the Farm going. They cook up all the lovely Farm produce into delicious dishes for the community café. The group is specifically for people with Learning Disabilities.
- We have been nominated to represent the County of Somerset for the Queens Award for Voluntary Service. The award is considered "the MBE for volunteer groups" and recognises exceptional service within communities and is the highest honour for volunteer groups in the UK.
- During a recent spate of vandalism in the summer, the Farm put out an appeal through the local media to raise £300 to install CCTV, to our surprise the local community rallied

and helped us raise over £5000 in four days! This demonstrates further the value the Farm brings to the local community and beyond.

Partnerships

As a Community Hub Bath City Farm worked in partnership and collaboration to affect positive change and improvements in local people's lives. We have developed specialised services with partner organisations, including: Southside Family Project, Avon Wildlife Trust and the Early Intervention Team for Psychosis to deliver targeted projects supporting people's recovery

The Farm also developed some strong links with local businesses and other third sector organisations in 2019 that enable the development of our site and projects.

- Bath Building Society Charity of the Year donated funds towards core and project costs
- HPH charity of the year. Donated funds and materials towards much needed infrastructural improvements around the animal enclosures.

Board of Trustees

The Farm's strategic direction is supported by 11 committed Trustees who provide and share a range of knowledge and expertise across a broad spectrum of business areas, this ensures the Farm has the required Governance arrangements in place to support the sustainability of the farm. Trustees also support and are involved in farm projects, including individual working groups focusing on areas of expertise e.g. finance, staffing related matters. This dedicated activity further supports the farm ensuring that the local community and people of B&NES have access to a resource that continues to thrive.

Difference made to beneficiaries

Our work with people of all ages with multiple and complex needs continues to be a core area of our provision.

2019 quantitative information

From the period the award covered we supported

- **109** individuals with a mental health diagnosis attending our **Grow it** Programme to support their recovery.
- **102** older individuals attending our **Feathered Friends** programme to address social isolation and loneliness.
- **55** individuals who have a learning disability attending one of our 2 **Work and Personal Development projects.**
- **36** vulnerable young people 5-16yrs attending one of our 3 **Environmental Youth projects.**
- **64** individuals attending our **Families at the Farm programme** for families facing adversity through domestic abuse.
- **86** individuals attending our **General Volunteering Programme** to help look after the animals/gardens and wilder spaces on the farm for the benefit of all

We also had 42,000 visitors connecting to nature, food and farming (an increase from 30,000 in the previous period) and using our site for recreation, therapeutic workshops, community events and educational visits

We gathered feedback from our beneficiaries about the impact it has made and below are some of the qualitative and quantitative outcomes.

Since attending the farm in 2019:

14% have reduced the amount of support they receive from Mental Health Support teams

10% have been discharged completely

13% report visiting their GP's less

12% have reduced the amount of medication they take

6% have stopped taking medication altogether

1% have increased their medication

"I honestly don't know where I'd be without the Farm. I truly think it's played a big role in saving my life on multiple occasions. The volunteers really are such a unique group of people and I feel so lucky to have found you all!"

"My mental health was pretty much at rock bottom before coming here. Everything in my life has improved since."

"While at the Farm my confidence and social anxiety has improved a lot. The team work and feeling part of a team has really helped."

Financial Review

2019 was very positive financially, as we were able to increase our Total Income by 25% from £252,344 in 2018 to £315,257 in 2019. This was achieved through continuing support from our key funders, who are listed below, as well as -

- An increase of over £18,000 in donations from individuals, in part because of one individual donation of £10,000 as well as a wonderful response from the local community last summer after our appeal for help after a spate of vandalism at the Farm.
- Donations from local corporate organisations increased by over £13,000, with a donation of £4,500 from Bath Rotary Club due to being Bath Building Society's Charity of the Year, £4,000 from HPH commercial property as we were their Charity of the Year and over £3,000 from Wessex Water.
- An increase of £4,000 (a 44% increase) in income from hiring out our Training and Community Rooms.
- A rise of over £12,000 (an increase of 48%) in café sales following improvements in the café menu, increased staffing levels, great weather and a lot of hard work by staff.
- £7,000 of fees from our new Training at the Trough initiative.

Thanks to a tight control of costs, which were essentially in line with the previous year, the higher levels of income meant we are able to turn a deficit of £33,726 in 2018 into a surplus of £29,420.

Fundraising activity

As well as having multi-year grants still coming in from previous years, in late 2018-2019 we applied for a total of 17 larger grants of which 9 were successful

- Lloyds Bank Foundation £86,689 over three years Mental Health programme
- Wates Foundation £10,000 for core funding
- Roper Family Charitable Trust £15,000 for core funding
- St James Place Foundation £9619 youth programme
- 29th May 1961 CT £9000 over 3 years Mental Health programme.
- Bathscapes Landscape on Prescription project with AWT £37,000 over 3 years.
- Bathscapes Community Skills Project £17,600 over 4 years.
- Community Infrastructure Levy £125,000 new café development.
- Power to Change £300,000 new café development.

We also applied to 16 trusts for amounts below £8,000, of which 3 were successful, 2 unsuccessful and 11 still awaiting decision.

Policy on Reserves

The Trustees have adopted a written policy on Reserves and Investments and aim to retain 3-6 months running costs held as Free Reserves. Our monthly average running costs are £20,000.

Responsibilities of the Trustees

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records that disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. The Trustee is also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The above report has been prepared in accordance with the provisions applicable to companies subject to the small companies regime as set out in Part 15 of the Companies Act 2006 and in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102).

Independent Examiner's Report to the Trustees

1 Accounting Policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015) - (Charities SORP (FRS 102)), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Change in basis of accounting or to previous accounts

There has been no change to the accounting policies (valuation rules and method of accounting) since last year and no changes have been made to accounts for previous years.

Fund accounting

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Tangible fixed assets and depreciation

Tangible fixed assets are carried at cost less accumulated depreciation and impairment losses.

Livestock

Livestock is included at the lower of cost or net realisable value.

Trade and other debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered.

Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents comprise cash at bank and on hand, demand deposits with banks and other short-term highly liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less and bank overdrafts. In the statement of financial position, bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings or current liabilities.

Trade and other creditors

Short term creditors are measured at the transaction price. Other creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

Pension costs

The charity operates a defined contribution plan for its employees. A defined contribution plan is a pension plan under which the company pays fixed contributions into a separate entity. Once the contributions have been paid the company has no further payments obligations. The contributions are recognised as expenses when they fall due.
