1. Our aims and purposes as a charity

The PCC has the responsibility of cooperating with the Reverend Ashley Evans (incumbent) in:-

- the promotion of the Gospel of the Lord Jesus Christ according to the doctrines and practices of the Church of England.
- promoting in the parish the mission of the church, pastoral, social, ecumenical and evangelistic.
- practical support and care for all people in the parish irrespective of age, need and ability to pay.
- providing financial support to those in need and to other organisations with similar objectives.

2. What we planned to do to achieve our charitable objectives

To enable as many people as possible become part of our parish community:-

- teaching, baptism and nurturing new and existing believers
- keeping the church open during the daytime for the community to visit, use for prayer and meditation

To offer services of worship to God:-

- maintaining an overview of worship throughout the parish
- considering how services can involve the many groups that live within the parish
- putting faith into practice through prayer and scripture, music and sacrament
- being as receptive as possible to those wanting baptism, weddings and funerals at St.Mary's.

To promote the Gospel and pray that the unchurched may find the fullness of life in Jesus Christ:-

- assisting people from all walks of life to develop their knowledge of and trust in Jesus
- holding courses to advance discipleship, theological understanding and education.
- establishing small groups at which we learn about the Bible and faith with study worship prayer and fellowship.
- witnessing the good news of Jesus Christ by pursuing the mission of God in its different forms

To engage in Evangelism and Outreach to the parish

- reaching out to those who do not come to church at events such as a strawberry tea, the summer village fete, holiday club, the Christmas Fayre, Christmas tree festival, and at the Annual Village assembly.
- promoting Harvest Festival, providing refreshments and distributing food gifts to the local food bank.
- encouraging care for the environment, God's creation through our Eco Church status and initiatives
- reaching out to the community by advertising seasonal events and celebrations
- seeking to grow our church through our 'Future Acts' initiative aimed especially at the younger generation and developing our links ("Open the Book" assemblies and worship) with our village C of E primary school.

We provide a special building and churchyard for people to enjoy:-

 enabling an appreciation of church building in the history and archaeology of the area by being open from 8am until 4pm for everyone to use.

We provide tangible pastoral and financial support to the poor and needy:-

- providing pastoral care for people whether part of St. Mary's Church or not
- providing financial assistance to those in need in the parish
- spending the income of our parish trusts according to the objects established by their donors.

We consider the needs of people served by other charities and overseas:-

- giving grants to wider Christian charities
- giving grants to missionary organisations that show God's love in the poorest nations.

When planning our activities for the year the PCC and our incumbent have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and in particular the specific guidance on charities for the advancement of religion.

The PCC has complied with the duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016, fully recognising its duty to have due regard to House of Bishop's guidance on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults.

3. What we achieved and how the activities of the church affected the beneficiaries lives

Attendance at worship

The church welcomes visitors from the parish as well as those coming from outside. So we welcome all who visit our church and we feel that this and attendance at worship is a major demonstration of our activities providing spiritual and pastoral support to the community.

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The average regular weekly attendance counted for the diocese records during October 2019 was 69. There was good attendance on all major festivals during the year, 187 came to worship at Easter and 644 (109 were children) attended over Christmas Eve and Christmas Day. In addition to regular services we held a quiz in the village hall, an Eco strawberry tea in the churchyard, lunch party in the vicarage garden with activities for children and music provided by a local band, a holiday club in the summer provided activities for younger children and the local primary school has held regular end of term services in the church as well as a Harvest Festival service.

A pet service was held which was very well attended by many with small and larger animals.

A service of Remembrance which started around the War Memorial in the village was attended by over 300 people of all ages and 297 went on to attend the subsequent church service.

Teaching, baptising and nurturing new and existing believers

- small group meetings every Wednesday with special courses in Lent and Advent
- prayer meetings, e.g. prayer breakfasts, weekly hour long vigils
- we hold weekly church led assemblies/collective worship at the village school following 'Open the Book', a national Bible stories drama scheme run by the Bible Society
- All Age Services with teachings that children and enquirers can appreciate

Evangelism and outreach

Our church has several pages in the very popular monthly village magazine in which our Vicar writes to the community about the Christian season at hand or on current issues from a Christian perspective.

We held an Eco Fair Trade coffee morning, a party in the vicarage garden with refreshments and a local band which attracted non churchgoers as well. Games were organised for the children.

We provided a buffet lunch for all who attended our all age Harvest Festival Service. We held a bi-monthly talk Entitled 'Out of the Ordinary' to encourage non churchgoers to use church facilities

The Church had a stall at the village summer fete and a presence in the procession which was led by the Vicar who also opened the fete.

We organised a very popular Christmas Fayre with a live stable scene, 'Living Crib' We held a lovely one day holiday club open to all children of primary school age in the area on which the feedback was very good.

Provision of the church building and churchyard for people to enjoy Our church continues to be appreciated by our parishioners and many others as a space where life events are celebrated with joy and thanksgiving.

During 2019 we celebrated the baptism of seven infants, eight weddings, we held seven funeral services and held a service of Confirmation for seven candidates from the area. The church is always open during the daytime and visitors and parishioners regularly call in to pray and enjoy the peace. A fourteenth century church has many beautiful and interesting architectural aspects which are regularly commented on by visitors. The churchyard is a well kept place by a group of volunteers who have adopted trees keeping brambles, ivy and weeds at bay. Trees are replaced that die, the grass is mowed by the district council under contract and we have a volunteer who cares for the burial ground. We have formed an Eco Church Working Group and in January 2019 joined A Rocha UK, a Christian charity with a remit to mobilise Christians and Churches to care for the environment. We have involved people from the village in our project to care for God's acre and have installed bat boxes, bird boxes and a bug hotel as well as a hedgehog home in the churchyard. In addition we have pledged to reduce our carbon footprint and in working towards the A Rocha Awards we were delighted to receive the Bronze Award in April 2019.

Music is an important part of our worship and we have a good choir which sings weekly. There are regular comments from the congregation on the choice of anthems and canticles as well as the hymns. Our service of nine lessons and carols during Advent was well attended by 134 people, a mixture of parishioners and others. We hold a Songs of Praise service in the summer when the hymns and readings are chosen by the congregation.

A concert by a local choir, The Tongswood Choir was held in the church and well attended by local people as well as many from neighbouring towns and villages. Our youth choir sing once a month at our main All Age Service and on other appropriate dates such as Mothering Sunday. They performed a very challenging 'Carol of the Bells' at our Christingle service on Christmas Eve which was attended by 287 adults and children.

Spatial reordering of the church building and future projects.

One project that will need to be considered is the very old heating system so that we cannot only extend a warm welcome to visitors but in a warm church. We are reviewing our energy source as part of this project which also includes working towards Eco Church Silver Award status.

Provision of pastoral care for people living in the parish

The Vicar makes hospital visits and home visits. He takes communion in two local care homes monthly. The church choir sings at carol services at the care homes. St. Mary's Fellowship, an open meeting, is held most months in a local sheltered home providing entertainment and companionship for residents and other parishioners.

Provision of tangible support to the poor and needy

The church donated the non perishable gifts at harvest time to the Family Support WorkCharity set up originally by the diocese and during the year we collect groceries, toiletries and clothing items for this charity. The Vicar is a founder member of The Ticehurst Community Network which meets periodically to consider especially how to reach out and help those in our community who need our support. In addition the Vicar is a committee member of the local GP Surgery's Patient Participation Group.

The PCC also made donations to The Children's Society (from the Christingle Service), Royal British Legion (from Remembrance Sunday Service), Family Support Work (Chichester Diocese), Church Mission Society, Bible Society, Diocesan Harvest Appeal and Friends of Nakuru (Chichester Diocese).

Financial review

Incoming and outgoing resources

The total receipts were £84,641 and are detailed in the Financial Report.

Sharing the Ministry costs of the Diocese of Chichester

The largest expenditure of the PCC was the sum of £45,320 paid to the diocese for our share of all churches' Parish Ministry Costs. This amount covers house, stipend and pension costs of the clergy and a standard sum for diocesan central costs, clergy training and a contribution to general church funds.

Staff costs

The PCC paid for Bookkeeping services, a Parish Administrator, occasional Clerical duty, and the expenses of an organist. Details are provided in the accounts.

Trustee payments and expenses.

The PCC also supported the clergy by paying Council Tax, water charges, a share of the telephone bill and travelling expenses.

Office costs.

These were just day to day running costs this year amounting to £2573

Repairs to the fabric of the church building.

Despite the age of the church building there have been no significant repairs this year. Next year our Quinquennial Inspection is due and additional items including repairs and renewal to our rainwater goods will be completed having been delayed during the year.

Structure, governance and management of the charity

The Parochial Church Council of the Ecclesiastical Parish of St. Mary the Virgin Ticehurst has been entered onto the Register of Charities, registered number 1180171. Its governing document is the Parochial Church Council(Powers) Measure 1956. During the year the following served as members of the Parochial Church Council:

donation.

Dora Luckin Fund -

It should be noted that although the fund increased by £30,602 across the year, £12,000 of this was the re-investment of funds previously withdrawn to facilitate cashflow during the Tower

Project.

Building Repairs

It should be noted that despite the age of the Church building, and therefore the ongoing financial requirements for its upkeep, no significant repairs or improvements have been undertaken in 2019.

The Field

The value of the field has historically not been included as an asset on the accounts. As at 23.02.2009 the field was valued at £40,000.00.
