Objects and activities of the charity

The Minster PCC has the responsibility promoting in the ecclesiastical parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical. It also has maintenance responsibilities for the Minster Church. The terms of the lease with Bills Café mean that the responsibility of maintenance for St Mary's Church House is theirs. However, should they default then this responsibility falls to the PCC.

The PCC has a Standing Committee which meets when necessary between full meetings of the PCC. This is the only committee required by law. It has power to transact the business of the PCC between its meetings, subject to any directions given by the Council.

The main activities undertaken in relation to those purposes during the year.

Electoral roll report and church attendance

The electoral roll forms have gone out and we should be able to produce a figure based on the loss of few members of the congregation (3 core members died in 2019) and the gain of some. 42 is a number we would be happy to coninue with for now.

The average Sunday attendance during October was 74 adults and 12 children.

Review of the year - church and PCC

PCC:

The general pattern has been to hold quarterly reviews and then supplement these with brief, focused meetings when additional decision-making was formally required. In 2019, the PCC held a total of six meetings

Staff Team:

- The Revd Stephen Pullin (Vicar and Assistant Archdeacon). In July, Stephen became Acting Archdeacon and was then appointed Archdeacon of Reading and in November announced his resignation as vicar of Reading Minster, beginning a period of vacancy.
- The Reverend Sarah Pullin (Associate Vicar) announced that she too would be leaving the Minster.
- The Reverend Andrew Bond (Associate Vicar).
- The Reverend Judith Sumner (Curate in training) completed her curacy training in July 2019 and was licenced as Associate Minister in December 2019.
- Niall Collier (Churchwarden).
- Trevor Slack (Churchwarden) stood down as church warden in April 2019 but remains on PCC
- Richard Ashfield (Verger and Buildings Manager)
- Tamsin Phipps continued the role as Office manager and PA to Stephen.

Following a placement in March 2019, Ann Cogle, an Ordinand at St Millitus Theological College, joined the team in September 2019 as part of her two year training. She is involved in leading worship, the Pilgrim courses, preaching, pastoral care on a Monday and Wednesday in addition to Sunday mornings.

Safeguarding:

First line responsibility for safeguarding rests with Radha Gnanaprakasan (Safeguarding Officer), Tamsin Phipps (DBS verifier) and Judith Sumner (pastoral).

In 2019 there was a significant investment in training. At the time of writing, the Minster's staff and volunteers are fully compliant with all necessary training.

Fabric of the Church:

Continuation of minor repairs and decoration to both the church and offices continued, with some extra practical support for Richard from Owen. This included the John Allen monument, repairs to the gallery, repairs to the heating system and the church doors and vestry.

Mission:

Sanctuary remains a key missional project for the Minster working alongside a range of service-providers (South Central Ambulance Service, Thames Valley Police, Reading Borough Council, and the Street Pastors). In 2019 we began Minster Tots, run by two members of the congregation each Monday afternoon between 1.30 and 3.30pm.

Our work with Faith Christian Group (FCG) continued to help meet the needs of people who are homeless and hungry continued by providing the Minster as a location for FCG's Readistreet ministry. between 8.00pm and 9.00pm, Tuesday-Friday every week. Following on from the success of last year, we teamed up with other agencies supporting the homeless and with the chefs and staff from Orwells restaurant, held a second Christmas meal together with warm clothing, much of which was donated by Orwells customers.

The work of our daytime volunteers to welcome and support people visiting the Minster during the day has continued. In 2019, we joined with 'Food for families' in supporting the work of the community garden in Lavendar Place once a month and continued the popular monthly art and craft morning.

We ran three pilgrim courses during the year, which continue to be popular and well attended.

In February and August, the Minster offered a further two services for LGBT+ people. This has developed with a team of people from involved in planning and leading worship and a strengthening of relationships between the Minster and the LGBT community and organisations.

The Minster continues to offer distinctive choral worship and we are very thankful to Andrew Stafford (Master of the Choristers), Ian Hillier (Master of the Music) and the Choir for their hard work and dedication.

There were four services for local nursery schools – Easter, summer, Harvest and Christmas.

Hillsong has been holding services at the Minster monthly, on a Saturday evening with two 'Sisterhood' evenings for women, with plans for weekly services beginning in April 2020.

The Minster continued to support the town and diocese by offering a wide range of special services and events including: services to mark Bishop Andrew's retirement and Bishop Olivia's installation. Reading Heritage Day, the Judicial Service to mark the beginning of the legal year, Bach to Baby (introducing young children to classical music), Mini Me's a charity venture involving childrens' and adults' concerts, Reading Lifeline annual remembrance service (back with us after Greyfriars last year), numerous musical and choral events (with special thanks to the A440 choir, Reading Phoenix choir, and BBC Radio Berkshire who donated some or all of the proceeds to Sanctuary), the ordination of priests and confirmation services on behalf of the archdeaconry, the Walkers' Commemoration service, and charity and civic carol services.

Social

Social events included the Easter Day breakfast, Harvest lunch and the Volunteers' lunch. We also had a trip to Christ church cathedral for Stephen Pullin's installation as a canon of Christ church cathedral.

Events

There was a significant increase in the number and frequency of events and hires in 2019. This has put additional pressure on the staff team but has yielded a significant financial benefit.

Arts

Reading Fringe used the church for 3 weeks and offered a variety of Acts, many based on the refugee situation and climate change. Reading Between the Lines theatre company brought Macbeth to the Minster in October. Jelly Art group made poppies with groups of children at the Minster for remembrance.

Deanery Synod meetings have included a second, 'Try something new' opportuity for parishes to be offered grants to use particularly for multi generational events. Becky Hannam and Judith Sumner did a presentation for the Synod in February 2019, giving information about 'First Stop' on a Friday and Saturday night at the Minster. In September, we had a very interestin meeting about 'Creation Care' including practical ways in which churches can get involved in environmental issues both practicallty and theologically.

The main achievements and performance of the charity during the year.

The charity continued to serve the people of Reading and Berkshire in its role as an Urban Minster.

In partnership with Reading Borough Council, South Central Ambulance Service and the Police, the Minster continued to provide integrated pastoral and medical care to people participating in Reading's night time economy. The charity continued to offer a safe, reflective space for people in the town centre and to provide spiritual care.

People who were anxious, distressed, and suicidal found reassurance and were connected with specialist services. People who were hungry and homeless were fed. People who were isolated and alone found community and were listened to. The vulnerable and injured were given a safe place to be and were offered medical treatment, as appropriate, by qualified clinicians. People were assisted by the provision of spiritual and pastoral support and guidance.

Financial review of the position at the reporting date, 31 December 2019.

Total Receipts on ordinary unrestricted funds were £145,039 and are detailed in the financial statements (£82,500 is rental income from Bills Café).

£170,061 of ordinary unrestricted funds was spent to provide Christian ministry from Reading Minster of St Mary the Virgin, including the contribution to the diocesan parish share, which largely provides the stipends and housing for the clergy.

The ordinary total result (restricted and unrestricted) for the year was an excess of income to payments by £26,916. This included an exceptional income charge of £26,254 which was the reimbursement from Bills Cafe of prior period building insurance premiums. Adding the bank and deposit balances at 31 December 2019 for unrestricted funds totalled £187,632.

In April 2010 St Mary's House was let to Bills Café. The rent review takes place every 5 years, and the last review took place in 2015.

The number of subscribers to planned giving through standing order totals 15. Planned giving during 2019 totalled £6,485 of which £2,905 was gift aided. The income from the wall box was £1,803 and the pricket stand was £1,683.

The Parish Share of £18,218 was paid in full.

During the year £260 was spent on maintenance relating to St Mary's Gate, and £9,000 was incurred due to the lease.

Policies on reserves.

It is PCC policy to maintain a balance on unrestricted funds (if possible), which equates to approximately 6 months unrestricted payments, to cover emergency situations that may arise from time to time. The balance of £188,441 on unrestricted funds at the year-end did match this target.

It is our policy to invest our funds balances with the CCLA Investment Management Ltd.

Availability and adequacy of assets of each of the funds

The PCC are satisfied that the charity's assets in each fund are available and adequate to fulfil its obligations in respect of each fund.

Plans For the Future

The main focus of 2020 will be to appoint a new incumbant, of which the process has already begun. Hillsong Licence granted (February 2020) to enable them to use The Minster on a weekly basis (Sundays). The initiative to engage with the Business Professional and Retail Community will be revisited in 2020 with a series of talks and semi social events.

Statement of PCC's Responsibilities

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts in accordance with the terms of the Charities Act 2011 and the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008. Notwithstanding the explicit requirement in the extant statutory regulations, the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008, to prepare the financial statements in accordance with the SORP 2005, in view of the fact that the SORP 2005 has been withdrawn, the PCC determined to interpret this responsibility as requiring them to follow current best practice and prepare the accounts according to the FRS 102 SORP (Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting by Charities) 2015 (as amended by the Bulletin issued in February 2016).

In particular, charity law requires the PCC, if they prepare accounts on an accruals basis, to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity as at the end of the financial year and of the surplus or deficit of the charity. In preparing those financial statements the PCC are required to:-

- to prepare the accounts in accordance with United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice (United Kingdom Accounting Standards and applicable law).
- select suitable accounting policies and apply them consistently;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in business;
- state whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;

The law requires that the trustees must not approve the accounts unless they are satisfied that they give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and of the surplus or deficit of the charity for the year.

The PCC are also responsible for maintaining adequate accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charity and which are sufficient to show and explain the charity's transactions and enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with regulations made under the Charities Act 2011. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

The PCC are also responsible for the contents of the PCC' report, and the statutory responsibility of the Independent Examiner in relation to the PCC' report is limited to examining the report and ensuring that , on the face of the report, there are no material inconsistencies with the figures disclosed in the financial statements.

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended 31 December 2019

1 Accounting policies

Policies relating to the production of the accounts.

Basis of preparation and accounting convention

The accounts have been prepared on the accruals basis, under the historical cost convention, and in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard 102, (effective 1st January 2016) and 'FRS 102 SORP (Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting by Charities) 2015 (as amended by the Bulletin issued in February 2016) published by the Charity Commission in England & Wales (CCEW) ,effective January 2016, (The SORP), and in accordance with all applicable law in the charity's jurisdiction of registration, except that the charity has prepared the financial statements in accordance with the FRS 102 SORP (Statement of Recommended Practice for Accounting and Reporting by Charities) 2015 (as amended by the Bulletin issued in February 2016) in preference to the previous SORP, the SORP 2005, which has been withdrawn, notwithstanding the fact that the extant statutory regulations, the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 refer explicitly to the SORP 2005. This has been done to accord with current best practice.

The charitable activities are entirely dependent on continuing grant aid and voluntary donations as well as trading revenues. As a consequence, the going concern basis is dependent on the future flow of these uncertain funding streams. Accordingly, the Trustees have obtained forecasts and, after reviewing the financial forecasts for future periods to 31 December 2019, the Trustees are satisfied that, at the time of approving the financial statements, it is appropriate to adopt the going concern basis in preparing the financial statements. Other than these matters, the Trustees are not aware of any material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue as a going concern.

Risks

The PCC has reviewed the risks to which the church is exposed and has put controls in place to mitigate these risks.

Accounting for deferred income and income received in advance

Where terms and conditions relating to income have not been met or uncertainty exists as to whether the charity can meet any terms or conditions otherwise within its control, income is not recognised but is deferred as a liability until it is probable that the terms or conditions imposed can be met.

Any grant that is subject to performance-related conditions received in advance of delivering the goods and services required by that condition, or is subject to unmet conditions wholly outside the control of the recipient charity, is accounted for as a liability and shown on the balance sheet as deferred income. Deferred income is released to income in the reporting period in which the performance-related or other conditions that limit recognition are met.

When income from a grant or donation has not been recognised due to the conditions applying to the gift not being wholly within the control of the recipient charity, it is disclosed as a contingent asset if receipt of the grant or donation is probable once those conditions are met.

Where time related conditions are imposed or implied by a funder, then the income is apportioned to the time periods concerned, and, where applicable, is accounted for as a liability and shown on the balance sheet as deferred income. When grants are received in advance of the expenditure on the activity funded by them, but there are no specific time related conditions, then the income is not deferred.

Any condition that allows for the recovery by the donor of any unexpended part of a grant does not prevent recognition of the income concerned, but a liability to any repayment is recognised when repayment becomes probable.

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended 31 December 2019

Income from legacies

Income from legacies is recognised when the charity has sufficient evidence that a gift has been left to them, that where required, probate has been granted, the executor is satisfied that the property in question will not be required to satisfy claims in the estate, that it is probable that the amount will be received by the charity, and the amount to be received can be estimated with sufficient accuracy, and that any conditions attached to the legacy are either within the control of the charity or have been met.

Where a payment is received from an estate or is notified as receivable by the executors after the reporting date and before the accounts are authorised for issue but it is clear that the payment had been agreed by the executors prior to the end of the reporting period, then the amount concerned is treated as an adjusting event and accrued as income in the accounting period if receipt is probable.

Where the charity has established entitlement to a legacy but there is uncertainty as to the amount of the payment, details of the legacy are disclosed as a contingent asset until the criteria for income recognition are met. Where a legacy is subject to the interest of a life tenant, the legacy is not recognised as income until the death of the life tenant.

If it is doubtful that full settlement of a legacy debtor will be received, then an adjustment is made to reduce the amount of the legacy debtor and legacy income rather than charging the adjustment as expenditure in the Statement of Financial Activities

Donated goods, facilities and services

Donated fixed assets are recognised at the current fair value. All such donations are recognised as donation income, and debited to fixed assets.

Donated goods that are not fixed assets are accounted for at a fair value, unless it is impractical to reliably measure the value of the donated items.

In the absence of any direct evidence of fair value of donated goods, then a value is derived from the cost of the item to the donor or, in the case of goods that are expected to be sold, the estimated resale value after deducting any anticipated costs of sales.

If it is impracticable to measure the fair value of goods donated for resale, or the costs of valuation outweigh the benefits, the donated goods are recognised as income when sold, with an equivalent amount being recognised as an expense.

The costs of goods donated for distribution to beneficiaries is deemed to be the fair value of those goods upon receipt. When the goods are distributed freely or for a nominal consideration, then the carrying amount is adjusted at the time of sale, to the value at the point of distribution and the adjustment is shown as a cost of donations made.

Donated services and facilities (including seconded staff and use of property) are included in the accounts on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity.

All donated services and facilities are recognised as donation income when received, (provided the value of the gift can be measured reliably) and recognised as an expense with an equivalent value.

Membership subscriptions

The income and any associated Gift Aid or other tax refund from a membership subscription received by the charity in the nature of a gift, is accounted for on the same basis as a donation.

The income from a membership subscription received by the charity where the subscription purchases the right to services or benefits is recognised as income from charitable activities.

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended 31 December 2019

Recognition of liabilities and expenditure

A liability, and the related expenditure, is recognised when a legal or constructive obligation exists as a result of a past event, and when it is more likely than not that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement, and when the amount of the obligation can be measured or reliably estimated..

Liabilities arising from future funding commitments and constructive obligations, including performance related grants, where the timing or the amount of the future expenditure required to settle the obligation are uncertain, give rise to a provision in the accounts, which is reviewed at the accounting year end. The provision is increased to reflect any increases in liabilities, and is decreased by the utilisation of any provision within the period, and reversed if any provision is no longer required. These movements are charged or credited to the respective funds and activities to which the provision relates.

Allocating costs to activities

Direct costs that are specifically related to an activity are allocated to that activity. Support costs are allocated to an administrative activity.

Volunteers

In accordance with the SORP, and in recognition of the difficulties in placing a monetary value on the contribution from volunteers, the contribution of volunteers is not included within the income of the charity. However, the trustees value the significant contribution made to the activities of the charity by unpaid volunteers and this is described more fully in Note5.

Fixed Asset Investments

Fixed asset investments in quoted shares, traded bonds and similar investments are shown initially at cost upon acquisition and at their market value at the balance sheet date at the end of the financial period. Investment properties are not depreciated.

Fixed asset investments in unlisted equities are shown at the balance sheet date at the best estimate of their market value, where practicable. Where valuation techniques are considered unreliable or where, in the opinion of the trustees, the costs outweigh the benefits to the users of the accounts, the investment is included at cost, and a review is undertaken at each year end as to whether the asset should be written down.

All gains on fixed asset investments, whether realised or unrealised, are included in row B4 of the Statement of Financial Activities.

Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets are measured at their original cost value, or subsequent revaluation, or if donated, as described above. Cost value includes all costs expended in bringing the asset into its intended working condition.

A full year of depreciation is provided in the year of acquisition and none in the year of disposal.

Depreciation has been provided at the following rates in order to write off the assets to their anticipated residual value over their estimated useful lives.

Plant and machinery 20 % straight line New lighting system 10 % straight line

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended 31 December 2019 Accounting for capital grants and fixed asset funds.

Gifts of tangible fixed assets or grants of a capital nature, given for the purposes of acquiring specific assets to be fully utilised in the furtherance of the objects of the charity, are credited to fixed asset funds after the donated asset has been received or sums have been properly expended on the restricted purpose.

Where the terms of the gift require the charity to hold the asset on an ongoing basis for a specific purpose, then the fixed asset fund so created is categorised as a restricted fixed asset fund, and the relevant restrictions are noted in the fixed asset note 9.

Where the terms of the gift are met once the asset is acquired, so allowing the charity to use the asset on an unrestricted basis, including the right to receive the proceeds of any future sale of the asset on an unrestricted basis, then the fixed asset fund so created is categorised as a designated fixed asset fund.

When assets are acquired for the furtherance of the charity's objects, utilising the charity's own unrestricted funds, a transfer is made from unrestricted funds to a designated fixed asset fund.

Whether acquired with unrestricted or restricted funds, the asset acquired is initially shown in the balance sheet at the full cost of acquisition or subsequent revaluation.

As the related assets are depreciated, in accordance with the depreciation policy, in order to reflect the diminution in the asset, a transfer is made from the relevant fixed asset funds to either unrestricted or restricted revenue funds, as appropriate to the terms of the original gift, if any.

The effect of this policy is that the aggregate of all fixed asset funds shall equate to the net book value of fixed assets. In the first year that this policy was adopted, a transfer to fixed asset funds was made equivalent to the net book value of the assets.

Any residual liability to the donor arising from, for example, the asset's future sale, is disclosed as a contingent liability unless the event that would trigger repayment of the grant becomes probable in which case a liability for repayment is recognised.

Debtors

Debtors are measured at their recoverable amounts at the balance sheet date.

Creditors and provisions

Short term creditors are measured at transaction price (which is usually the invoice price). Loans and other financial liabilities are initially recognised at transaction price net of any transaction costs and subsequently measured at amortised cost determined using the effective interest method.

Cash and bank balances

Cash held by the charity is included at the amount actually held and counted at the year end. Bank balances, whether in credit or overdrawn, are shown at the amounts properly reconciled to the bank statements.

Leasing and hire purchase contracts and commitments

Assets held under finance leases and hire purchase contracts, which are those where substantially all the risks and rewards of ownership of the asset have passed to the company, are capitalised in the balance sheet and depreciated over their useful lives. The corresponding lease or hire purchase obligation is treated in the balance sheet as a liability.

The interest element of the rental obligations is charged to the profit and loss account over the period of the lease and represents a constant proportion of the balance of capital repayments outstanding.

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to income on a straight line basis over the lease term.

Notes to the Accounts for the year ended 31 December 2019

Pensions - defined contribution schemes

The company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions are charged to the profit and loss account as they become payable in accordance with the rules of the scheme.

Taxation note

2 Liability to taxation

The Trustees consider that the charity satisfies the tests set out in Paragraph 1 Schedule 6 of the Finance Act 2010 for UK corporation tax purposes. Accordingly, the Charity is potentially exempt from taxation in respect of income or capital gains received within categories covered by chapter 3 part 11 of the Corporation Tax Act 2010 or Section 256 of the Taxation of Chargeable Gains Act 1992, to the extent that such income or gains are applied exclusively on the specific charitable objects of the charity and for no other purpose. Value Added Tax is not recoverable by the charity, and is therefore included in the relevant costs in the Statement of Financial Activities.

Winding up or dissolution of the charity

If upon winding up or dissolution of the charity there remain any assets, after the satisfaction of all debts and liabilities, the assets represented by the accumulated fund shall be transferred to some other charitable body or bodies having similar objects to the charity.
