REFERENCE AND ADMINISTRATIVE DETAILS

The Royal Society For the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Essex Havering & Harold Hill Branch of Campbell Clinic, <u>144 Chippenham Road</u>, <u>Romford</u>, <u>RM3 8HT</u>, is registered with the Charity Commission under charity number 240507 and is governed by the rules and regulations laid down by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals (RSPCA).

Independent examiner:

The Branch has annual turnover of less than £500,000 so does not require an audit but an independent examination. This was undertaken by Community 360, High St, Colchester CO1 1UG

National Council (Board) Trusteeship:

The Branch constitution requires seven trustees to be elected at an AGM and a minimum of four Committee members to manage the Branch, however, the committee was dissolved due to insufficient local trustee numbers in December 2017. As a result, the National RSPCA Council was asked to appoint, under the Society's Rules, temporary trustees to manage the Branch's affairs to the exclusion of any former trustees. National trustees Richard Booker, Christine Beaumont-Kerridge and Christina Tomlinson were appointed on 1st January 2018 and served throughout 2019.

Their purpose in this role is to manage the affairs of the Branch and to secure the proper application of its funds for the Branch objects until such time as the Branch is returned to the control of a local committee. As temporary officers, they all have proven experience of managing an RSPCA Branch. Christine Beaumont-Kerridge was also the Society's Regional Representative for the area and the National Society's Treasurer (both until 24 October 2019)

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

The charity is constituted as an unincorporated association. The charity operates as an autonomous Branch of the National RSPCA subject to its rules for Branches (as updated in 2012). In the normal course of business, Committee members are elected at every Annual General Meeting, from the members of the Branch, to carry on the work for the ensuing year. Candidates must receive over 50% of the votes of the members present. The elected Branch Committee can co-opt not more than three members onto the Committee until the next annual general meeting. All Committee members must have been Society members for a minimum of three months on appointment. The Committee members are trustees of the Branch and are briefed on their responsibilities as trustees prior to their acceptance of the role. The trustees hold regular meetings at which decisions are made and conveyed to the staff for actioning.

In the event that the number of local trustees falls below four at any time, the Branch is placed into National Board Trusteeship, and that is currently the case for this Branch. The Board has appointed temporary trustees, who are responsible for the day to day management and development of the Branch until it can be returned to the control of local trustees. The animal welfare work is delegated to an Animal Welfare Officer who is contracted from another branch area.

RISK MANAGEMENT

The Branch has carried out a risk assessment and identified the following risks:

- Loss of income through error or fraud
- Loss of reputation through error or fraud

- Loss of income through outside forces
- Insufficient trustees to continue
- Insufficient volunteers to fundraise
- Risk of claims against volunteers
- Risk of claims by volunteers or the public
- Adverse publicity
- Insufficient funds to help the animals that need us
- Health & Safety for staff and volunteers dealing with the most abused animals and their owners

The Branch has no employees.

AIMS AND OBJECTIVES, PUBLIC BENEFIT STATEMENT AND PRINCIPAL ACTIVITIES

The object of the charity is to promote kindness and good care, and prevent or suppress cruelty to animals by all lawful means with particular reference to the area of the Branch, in accordance with the policies of the Society. Our activities to achieve the objectives include the following:

- To provide neutering and microchipping facilities for those on low incomes. This
 work benefits those members of the public on low income by giving them financial
 help and promoting responsible pet ownership. Neutering has both behavioural
 and health benefits for the animal which in turn benefits the owner. Neutering
 also has a major impact in preventing suffering, particularly in feral cats and multicat households.
- To support the Society's Inspectorate in their work providing financial assistance and emergency accommodation for mistreated or abandoned animals, including pets whose owners suffer ill health or financial difficulties or pass away. The Society's Inspectorate, as well as providing education, information and advice, rescues animals in distress and enforces laws against the cruel mistreatment of animals in England and Wales by bringing prosecutions. This work is key to 'the prevention or suppression of cruelty' part of the RSPCA objects and promotes humane sentiments towards animals which involves moral benefit to humankind as a whole. The National Call Centre accepts complaints about animals in distress 24 hours a day, every day of the year and the public benefits by being able to call in for help when an animal is suffering, which can be very distressing for humans to witness and feel powerless to help.

• To accept stray animals for re-homing. Animals in our care receive veterinary treatment, vaccination, neutering, micro-chipping and are assessed for re-homing. This work helps to control the incidence and spread of disease and suffering through vaccination and neutering. The work benefits our local community including local authorities as it reduces the incidence of abandonment and cruelty and the public knows that we assist animals in need. Whilst we are primarily an animal charity, the service we offer pet owners who cannot assist their pets themselves in times of crisis can relieve much distress for the owner as well as the pet.

We provide many volunteering opportunities for those who wish to support our work, including fostering and fundraising opportunities. This benefits local people and companies by providing the possibility of doing work which is both compassionate and rewarding and offers experience which may assist participants in finding paid work. It is not possible to quantify the financial value of our volunteers but in 2019 we had the benefit of over 200 hours of volunteer work.

The trustees have reviewed the outcomes and achievements of our objectives and activities for the year to ensure they remain focused on our charitable aims and continue to deliver benefits to the public. We have complied with this duty under the Charities Act 2006 to have due regard to public benefit guidance published by the Commission.

Our current short term and long term aims and objectives can be summarised as follows:

Short term:

- To build the fundraising and events team in order to enable us to have presence at local events.
- To develop our fostering and re-homing network, to support the National Society.
- To develop our engagement with the community to ensure adequate homes for our animals
- To assess the future of the Campbell Clinic in negotiation with the local authority.
- To increase the number of participating vets in the C4 Free Neutering for Cats
 Scheme within the Branch area to maximise the benefit to pet owners

Long term:

 To develop a community outreach programme in order to be able to provide assistance for the most needy and abused animals.

HEALTH AND SAFETY POLICY

This policy applies to all Branch staff whether employed or volunteers. A comprehensive policy that outlines in detail the administrative arrangements for health and safety within the Branch and the procedures to be followed to minimise health and safety risks has been developed. This policy is reviewed regularly to take account of changes.

REVIEW OF ACTIVITIES AND ACHIEVEMENTS

Significant activities

The charity took into care and networked out 26 animals from the Inspectorate in 2019, ensuring that those animals with the greatest need were prioritised given our limited resources. All requests from the Inspectorate to take animals into Branch care were fulfilled.

The Branch also continued to operate its foster scheme so that vulnerable animals such as kittens and cats with significant health concerns were not kept in a cattery while waiting for a permanent home.

The branch clinic (known as the Campbell Clinic) is not currently in operation and trustees are in negotiation with the local authority regarding its future as its lease is due to expire in 2020.

Animal welfare results

During 2019, the Branch took in 34 animals (2018: 81 animals), carried out 41 home visits (2017: 26), neutered 13 Branch animals (2018: 23) and provided low cost neutering to stray cats and cats whose owners were on low income via the C4 Free Neutering for Cats Scheme.

All Inspectorate requests to take in animals in 2019 were fulfilled by the Branch.

The Branch aims to continue to provide a service to the Inspectorate and to continue to offer assistance to those animals in greatest need within the Branch area.

Financial results and review

The charity's funds are collected from membership subscriptions, re-homing, donations, legacies, grants and special fund-raising events, such as collection days.

Total income for the year was £25,888.00 and total expenditure for the year was £23,887.00 leaving a surplus/deficit of income over expenditure of £2001.00. No legacies were received by the Branch during 2019.

The provision raised in 2018 of £40,814, for repairs and renewals to the clinic, remains while the future of the building is being decided, in conjunction with the local authority.

The trustees aim to maintain a balanced budget in 2020 and will be seeking to establish a sustainable source of income by increasing fundraising capacity.

Our thanks go to all our volunteers and Head Office support staff for all their hard work. We would also like to thank all those people and local businesses who contribute to the success of the Branch and support us with volunteer time, fundraising activities, financial discounts or advertising. These include veterinary surgeries, Branch members and volunteers. Lastly we would like to thank the public for their ongoing support of the branch.

RESERVES POLICY

The Branch reserves are currently 9 months. This temporarily exceeds our policy of 3 to 6 months expenditure but this will adjust in due course, with Clinic building closure costs and investment in animal welfare. The Branch is considered a going concern.

INVESTMENT POLICY

The trustees have wide powers of investment governed and restricted by the Royal Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals Investment Act 1958.

FUTURE DEVELOPMENTS

During 2020 the trustees will continue to focus on and aim to increase effective delivery of animal welfare in the Essex Havering & Harold Hill Branch area.

The trustees will continue to develop all activities including Inspectorate support, animal rescue and re-homing, income generation and community engagement.

The trustees will establish a future plan for the Campbell Clinic by early 2020.

STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

Charity law requires the trustees of the charity to provide financial statements each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charity and the incoming resources and application of resources for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently;
- Make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- State whether applicable accounting standards and statements of recommended practice have been followed, subject to any departures disclosed and explained in the financial statements;
- Prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charity will continue in operation.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy the financial position of the charity and which enables them to ensure that the financial statements comply with The Charities Act 1993. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the charity and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

1. Accounting policies

1.1 Basis of preparation

The Animal Welfare Officer seconded to the RSPCA Essex, Havering & Harold Hill Branch is an employee of the Central West & North East London Branch of which Christine Beaumont-Kerridge is a trustee.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 DECEMBER 2019

I report on the accounts of RSPCA Essex Havering and Harold Hill Branch for the year ended 31 December 2019 which are set out on pages 8 to 13.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The Charity's Trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The Charity's Trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year (under section 144 (2) of the Charities Act 2011 (The Act) but that an independent examination is needed.
