- The Scratch Messiah to celebrate the 40th Anniversary of the organ at Emmanuel Church is on 6th July.
- The development work within the parish looking at our buildings to make them more welcoming is moving on.
- The Parish share negotiations will commence soon.
- It is hoped that we will be able to apply for a curate for 2020.
- No new hosts for the PAIS workers have come forward; in the absence of any change to this there will be no new PAIS workers in September. There is a possibility that other churches in the area may be able to assist. If there are no PAIS workers from September then more energy will need to be put into youth work and school assemblies from the congregation and ministry team.

11. Matters of general parochial interest

- The treasurer David Lomax is confident that we will meet our agreed parish share of £45,000 this year. A stipendiary minister's stipend is £45,000 and our formula-assessed parish share is approximately £60,000. This means the parish is not currently making any contribution to Church House staff etc.
- We applied for a grant to improve the toilets at Emmanuel Church Centre, but this was unsuccessful, and we cannot re-apply for another 12 months. Other sources of funding are being looked at.
- A letter has been received from the Diocese requiring more details about the proposed work at Holcombe. Vic. Fletcher is looking at this.
- Thanks were extended to Paul for his work on the #doyouknowHim? Campaign.

Emanuel Church, Holcombe Team Report 2019

The Emmanuel, Holcombe Team has formally met seven times in the past year and on numerous less formal occasions to discuss a variety of issues.

• The full Quinquennial Report was received in February and details work which should be carried out over the next five years. Much of the work can be achieved by volunteers, but some will require professional help.

• Some damaged guttering has been replaced and loose slates secured or replaced.

• Health and Safety: We have considered Health and Safety, (in particular reported accidents), at every committee meeting. Further work has been done on the Fire Risk Assessment.

• Work to the Garden of Remembrance was completed. The area was levelled and tidied. Stone chippings were laid. This has been much appreciated by those attending the plot. In addition the area around the Dowsett grave (north side) was tidied and stones laid.

• The Refurbishment to the Organ was completed early in the year. The whole cost being covered by donations and Gift Aid recovered.

• In July, the Messiah was performed jointly with Bury Choral Society. 72 people took part with 40 attending the performance late in the afternoon. We were most grateful to Bury Choral Society who waived their share of the money raised. £217 was added to church funds.

• Josephine Greenhalgh retired as cleaner. Our thanks go to Josephine for a long period of service. Fortunately Tony Bliss was willing to replace her and started in mid-July, the arrangement is working well.

• We further developed our buildings plan:

to improve the Toilet facilities, (provision of disabled access), the development of the Kitchen and Children's Areas, Destratification fans in the Nave roof to improve heating, the provision of a retractable screen to further improve audio/ visual presentations. In August we were visited by representatives of the Diocesan Advisory Committee, who were very supportive of our extensive plans, but made several suggestions. As a result Equilibrium Architects are producing updated plans. (Budget prices total £48000 - there is approximately £27000 in the fund).

• We, along with the School, recognised a need to strengthen School links. As a first step a small group of children will take part in the February 2020 Parade Service, presenting a "Puppet" show of the day's reading. In May 2020 the School will again be taking part in an 11am Service. This is in addition to the Annual Sermons Service.

• Discussions are to take place with Uniformed Groups to find ways of making the Parade service more relevant to youth.

• In an attempt to make the service more accessible to a younger congregation it was decided in November to replace the 11am Holy Communion 1662 service on the second Sunday, with Common Worship. The 8am Holy Communion on the first Sunday was unaffected and it was planned that, were appropriate, 1662 Communion could take place at 5th Sunday Services.

• At the Carol Service the Choir were augmented by the addition of seven children.

Our thanks go to the numerous people who offer their time, skills, advice and support to all the work at Emmanuel, Holcombe, we are extremely grateful.

It has been another busy year at the Centre with lots of activities and involvement of the Community as well as our regular groups that meet here weekly, fortnightly or monthly. The team have worked hard with monthly working parties both inside and out to ensure that the building is well maintained and in good order. This year as well as decorating the Church, corridor and kitchen we have also had a Fire Risk Assessment and Inspection and have been carrying out the recommendations from the report. This has included fire retarding all the curtains, sealing the doors, ensuring all fire safety equipment is monitored regularly, changing the alarm and emergency lighting, the latter of which is ongoing as we have to find over £5000 to complete this.

The active team meet on a monthly basis and work at the hall in between. Alex kindly types up and distributes our agendas and minutes and we have been delighted that Stephen has joined us for a few of our meeting and been involved with John and Alan when meeting with people concerned with the Fire Risk Inspection.

Our meetings do not just revolve around housekeeping but include our prayer link with Emmanuel Holcomb School, feedback on services and social events and so much more. If you want to have anything discussed just mention it to Jo or one of the team.

Fabric Report 2019

The general condition of all three buildings is satisfactory: where there are defects and problems they are being noted and remedied.

Emmanuel Church, Holcombe

The plans for work within the building have developed this year. Following a visit from representatives of the Diocesan Advisory Committee, we have re-thought several of our plans. We are now looking to: refurbish the kitchen; provide a Children and Family Area; upgrading the toilets; installation of Destratification fans to improve the heating system and the setting up of a projection screen at the chancel arch with additions to the audio system. Detailed plans have been drawn up.

Externally, the alterations to the Garden of Remembrance and the area around the Dowsett grave to the North of the Church have been completed.

Emmanuel Church Centre

The building and surrounding gardens are in a generally good state of repair, due in no small part to the dedicated work of volunteers.

Working parties have met several times to repaint the interior of the building. Their efforts have been much appreciated by all who use the building.

The Reflective Garden is much appreciated by our congregation and the wider community. Monthly working Parties continue to tidy, plant, cut grass and develop the area. Our thanks go to the members of the Hall Things Bright and Beautiful team and the many other people who offer plants, materials and practical help. Following a Fire Inspection and subsequent Risk Assessment quite a number of items were raised needing our attention. The remedial work identified has already started, (with thanks to volunteers who have undertaken some of this work). Unfortunately, much of the work will require professional involvement with the associated cost.

St Mary's, Hawkshaw

The church building is structurally sound with no obvious major defects, although general maintenance still needs constant attention. Health and Safety matters have been addressed and put in place during the year. Work has been undertaken with the erection of a new noticeboard and external painting.

One major job we need to consider in the future is the pointing of the boundary wall. Plans are being discussed for the refurbishment of the kitchen and the upgrading of the toilets.

General Comments

We thank everyone who works quietly behind the scenes – cleaning, washing the linen, cleaning the brass and silver, flower arranging or providing refreshments, sound and PA technicians, Deputy Wardens and last, but not least, the sidemen and women who play such an important role in welcoming people to our services.

The practical help and financial assistance of many people continues to play a major part in the care of the buildings, and our grateful thanks go to everyone who has contributed in any way.

P.C.C. Review of the Year 2019

During 2019 the PC.C met six times with an average of 14 members attending.

The P.C.C. is responsible for the election of officers, ensuring the parish meets its financial commitments to the Diocese, sanctioning spending, carrying out administration and initiating new projects and procedures. However the day-to-day roles and responsibilities in the parish are performed by the many dedicated teams of workers. The P.C.C. endeavours to keep general oversight of these various groups and activities, giving approval and support where required. Team reports are also regularly received from each worship centre, as is the Treasurer's report.

The matters addressed during 2019 included:

FINANCIAL MATTERS: During the year the Treasurer provided up-dates on the financial position of the parish. Fees for marriages and funerals were agreed, as were annual pay increases in line with inflation for our two salaried employees. The P.C.C. was pleased to learn that the 2018 parish share had been paid in full. The parish share for 2019 was £45,000. We were also advised that free-will giving had increased, but due to local bank closures we should encourage people to move to direct giving through their banks. At Hawkshaw it was proposed that the collection plate be situated at the entrance to church rather than passed round during the service.

MISSION AND OUTREACH: We took part in the Churches Together in Ramsbottom #doyouknowHim campaign which was launched at St. Paul's in January. Churches Together hosted a team of students from Capernwray Bible College and we played our part in facilitating that outreach.

The TLG (Transforming Lives for Good) initiative aims to provide lunches in the school holidays for children normally receiving free school meals, and it was agreed that the parish would explore the possibility of getting involved in this project.

Other ventures included The Springs Dance Co performing "Bread of Life" at Hawkshaw on Palm Sunday; musical encouragement given to those cycling in the Iron Man race; carol singing at various locations at Christmas. Also we enjoyed a Psalms weekend in September led by Rev. Dr. Simon Stocks which proved very enlightening.

Future projects for 2020 were discussed including the parish hosting its own team of four Capernwray students, an Experience Easter campaign, and the feasibility of setting up a Film Club followed by discussion at E.C.C.

SOCIAL EVENTS: Various fundraising and social events took place during the year. These included several items of an evangelistic nature such as the *#doyouknowHim* "Messiah from Scratch" performance, plus various other concerts, Autumn Fair, Capernwray games evening, quiz nights, garden party, bonfire and involvement in Hawkshaw gala. Ladies' evenings and Blokes' nights were also organised during the year.

HEALTH AND SAFETY/

BUILDINGS: It was decided that the new Health and Safety Policy should specify P.C.C. responsibility rather than named individuals. Other items addressed included the refurbishment of the organ and installation of a new screen at Holcombe, a plan for a new kitchen and toilets at Hawkshaw, fire safety audits, emergency lighting and alarm system at E.C.C.

SAFEGUARDING: It was agreed that we would continue to follow best practice using the most recent diocesan policy and Robert Airey was appointed Advocate of Vulnerable Adults and Children. Training was arranged during October for youth leaders.

YOUTH WORK: A parish Youth Weekend Away was organised during March and 21 young people attended. Unfortunately it was thought that we would not be able to have another Pais worker for the year 2019/20 as hosts could not be found. Therefore extra volunteers would be needed to help with Cellar.

SCHOOLS: The P.C.C. reappointed Robert Airey for a further four years as governor at Holcombe School. Ideas were also sought for ways in which the church could contribute to the 150th Anniversary celebrations of St. Mary's School in 2020. The P.C.C. also offered its congratulations to St. Mary's School who received an excellent SAMS report.

CURACY: We were pleased to learn that Vic Fletcher completed his curacy in the summer and he was re-licensed in July. We also received the good news that the parish would be getting a new fulltime curate in 2020. Ian Fleming, and his wife Layna, will be joining us following his ordination in July. It is expected they will live at the property in Fernview Drive.

PATRONAGE: Following the death of Fred Whowell we were informed by the Whowell family that they wished to relinquish their patronage of St Mary's Church. The P.C.C. discussed the possibility of passing the patronage to CPAS and a motion was unanimously agreed that CPAS should share the right of patronage with the Rector of Bury, current patron of Holcombe church. This process is still ongoing.

SOCIAL MEDIA AND

COMMUNICATION: A survey during the year looking at preferred methods of communication revealed that Facebook was most popular, and that platform is already up and running in the parish. Further discussion was planned and it was agreed by the P.C.C. that we would sign up to the Digital Charter – C of E Church for a Digital World.

SERVICE PATTERNS: The P.C.C. was advised of the change to the service pattern at Holcombe. The 1662 Communion Service at 11.00am on the second Sunday of the month was discontinued.

GRAVE SPACE: During the year requests for reservations of grave space at Hawkshaw were received and approved. A faculty was also sought in respect of memorial stones at Holcombe.

The Diocese of Manchester, the Deanery of Bury Synod Report 2019

The meetings of Synod gives representatives valuable opportunities to meet and discuss matters with members of other parishes across the deanery. Each parish is entitled to representation according to their size. Our Electoral Roll entitled us to five member, (from 2020 this will drop to four).

The Deanery Synod did not meet as often this year.

In February we met at Bury Church of England High School, where we heard from staff and pupils about the wonderful work being done at the School and why parents should choose BCEHS for a child who is a Christian. The School is always pleased to receive visits and is looking for support from the Deanery Synod.

Much of the rest of the year was devoted to: 1) Mission Action Planning (MAP) for the Deanery and 2) Fit for Mission - the planned re-organisation of deaneries in the Diocese.

1) Mission Action Planning, (M AP)

In much the same way as Parishes had been asked to submit their own MAP's, the Deanery MAP was submitted in March. Paul had headed up a small group to work on the MAP. The aim had been to find areas for working together, exploring links and relationships between parishes and to learn from and support each other effectively.

The" Diocesan Vision" is for the Diocese of Manchester to be *a* worshipping, growing and transforming Christian presence at the heart of every community.

Diocesan Priorities are:

Delivering Church, Addressing social injustice, Nurturing people, Spreading spirituality and Transforming communities.

Starting from the Diocesan vision, the following deanery priorities were identified by the MAP Working Group alongside those of the individual Parishes:

- Mission & Ministry to Children/ Young People/Schools.
- Mission & Ministry to deprivation areas in the Deanery – e.g. 'Dicky Bird' estate, Bury.
- Working together across larger church/parish groupings, including ecumenical partners.
- Developing engaged discipleship.

This would gave a working vision statement of:

Bringing the Good News of Jesus into every part of our Deanery by encouraging engaged discipleship across our churches, fostering collaboration in mission both between parishes and with ecumenical partners, and sharing resources and support for growing faith in children and young people, and areas of highest The Parish of Holcombe and Hawkshaw

deprivation and least church engagement.

What's already happening?

• Ministry to Bury Church High School, *Open the Book* ministry in schools, Messy Church, The Church in Ramsbottom – #doyouknowHim and *Shared* Lent courses – 2018 & 2019.

Areas to grow in: (with a few ideas to consider further)

Parish groupings:

Some ministry, some mission, some learning and some praying together. Working with ecumenical partners. Fluid boundaries, non-exclusive – still working with other people in a non-competitive, collaborative way. (Parish Mission Collaborations).

Children, Young people and families:

Family celebration day. Both primary & secondary school involvement. Supporting pupils' faith through educational transitions. (e.g. Bolton project). Youth celebration events. Secondary schools/College projects around social justice/mental health. Secondary schools/College chaplaincy worker?

Deepening and broadening faith:

Encouraging spiritual growth through: Study/ home/prayer groups, Developing a 'rule of life' (e.g. If I am a church member I do this: _____), Lent projects. A #doyouknowHim? in Bury for 2020?

Organisational change:

Deanery Audit – Resources, buildings; clergy and lay ministers. facilitated DMPC days on talking about deployment & buildings; Sharing resources; Employing an administrator – releasing clergy and lay to their vocations; Resourced post for the Dicky Bird estate – pioneer minister?

2) Fit for Mission

The deaneries have been consulted on proposed changes to the setup of the deaneries and at a meeting in September the proposals were outlined.

Bishop David says in a briefing paper:

"In summary, we want to move to a place where we have fewer deaneries potentially only seven. Larger deaneries will strengthen mutual support, and crucially will allow each to have an Area Dean whose full time ministry is a combination of the normal duties of that role - but across a larger number of parishes - and hands on support for those parishes in vacancy or undergoing significant change".

"No longer will Area Deans have to fit their duties on top of being full time vicar in their own parish. At a time when we are anticipating many new, younger clergy completing training and beginning parish ministry, we will have stronger support structures to equip and sustain them. Lay chairs will be able to work in small informal teams within a deanery, so that responsibilities are shared."

The proposed changes are:

• A consolidation of the current 20 deaneries into seven deaneries (see map below).


- The Bury, Rossendale and Radcliffe and Prestwich deaneries would form ONE deanery.
- A move towards a new full-time Area Dean role, (Area Dean would no longer have to balance their duties with the pressure of also running a parish), providing leadership for change and development, as well flexible parish cover.

The diocese hope to start implementing the changes in July 2020 and for them to be fully in place by January 2021.

The implications of the proposals for Bury Deanery are significant.

Safeguarding Report

Unfortunately, Safeguarding is still something that seems to be in the media every week in one way or another, and the increased use of social media and the modern online world means that children are more at risk than ever. We all have the responsibility to do what we can to keep children safe and it must always be in everyone's minds when working in the parish. Any concerns, however minor they may seem, must be documented and reported to me. It could be a small part in a puzzle that adds significantly to the bigger picture.

It has been quite a busy year in terms of DBS checks for the parish. The P.C.C. members all need to be checked now due to them being trustees, even though many are not actually directly involved with any children's groups. In addition to this, we have had several volunteers come on board to help out with the running of the Cellar youth groups at St Mary's each week. Although the thought of a DBS check is quite daunting for some people, it is very easy to do. I have found that the easiest way is to meet at the E.C.C. so that I can check the identity documents and then assist with the completion of the online application. It only takes about 15 minutes to gather the information, and in the majority of cases, the DBS is sent out within a few days.

An additional training session has been run especially for us again this year by the Diocese because we have had so many new volunteers. It is important that everyone ensures they are up to date with training and I would advise you to check the Diocesan website for dates and venues if you have not attended one of the sessions. It is a requirement that everyone repeats the course every three years.

A copy of The Parish Safeguarding Handbook has been put in each of the worship centres in the parish so that if anyone is ever in a position where they don't know what to do, or who to contact, the information and contact details are in here. This is also available on the Diocesan website and is a useful point of reference for anyone working with children and vulnerable adults so that you may always feel prepared. A disclosure could come at any time and it is incredibly important that this is handled correctly.

A yearly reminder to all group leaders, please remember that any new volunteers must be DBS checked before commencing work on a regular basis, so please contact me to arrange this at elaine.allum@btinternet.com.

As always, thank you to all our volunteers that work around the parish with both children and adults, because your care and attention can and does help to make sure we are there to provide support where needed.

SAFEGUARDING POLICY PROMOTING A SAFER CHURCH

The following policy was agreed at the Parochial Church Council (P.C.C.) meeting held on 9^{th} March 2020.

In accordance with the Church of England Safeguarding Policy our church is committed to:

- Promoting a safer environment and culture.
- Safely recruiting and supporting all those with any responsibility related to children, young people and vulnerable adults within the church.
- Responding promptly to every safeguarding concern or allegation.
- Caring pastorally for victims/survivors of abuse and other affected persons.
- Caring pastorally for those who are the subject of concerns or allegations of abuse and other affected persons.
- Responding to those that may pose a present risk to others.

The Parish will:

- Create a safe and caring place for all.
- Have a named Parish Safeguarding Officer (P.S.O.) to work with the incumbent and the P.C.C. to implement policy and procedures.
- Safely recruit, train and support all those with any responsibility for children, young people and adults to have the confidence and skills to recognise and respond to abuse.
- Ensure that there is appropriate insurance cover for all activities involving children and adults undertaken in the name of the parish.
- Display in church premises and on the Parish website the details of who to contact if there are safeguarding concerns or support needs.
- Listen to and take seriously all those who disclose abuse.
- Take steps to protect children and adults when a safeguarding concern of any kind arises, following House of Bishops guidance, including notifying the Diocesan Safeguarding Adviser (D.S.A.) and statutory agencies immediately.
- Offer support to victims/survivors of abuse regardless of the type of abuse, when or where it occurred.
- Care for and monitor any member of the church community who may pose a risk to children and adults whilst maintaining appropriate confidentiality and the safety of all parties.
- Ensure that health and safety policy, procedures and risk assessments are in place and that these are reviewed annually.
- Review the implementation of the Safeguarding Policy, Procedures and Practices at least annually.

Each person who works within this church community will agree to abide by this policy and the guidelines established by this church.

In 2019

Under the inspiring musical direction of Juan Ortuño and with Elin Rees as our organist, along with guest soloists, 72 people attended and rehearsed all day and then performed late in the afternoon to an audience of around 40 people. The event was jointly organised with Bury Choral Society. We were most grateful when the Society waived their share of the £217 raised.
- **2. Millennium Gospel Choir**: Gave an impressive, well received performance on Friday 5th April at Emmanuel Church Centre. £250 was raised.



Emmanuel Holcombe Choir

This year has again been eventful with a good number of memorable occasions. Since the organ was installed in 1979 (just!), 2019 was the 40th anniversary, and we made the most of it. The refurbishment took place shortly before I wrote last year's report, and the fund-raising for it was complete not much later, after an extremely efficient campaign run by Mike Burton. (See last year's report.) We were then able to look forward to our planned celebrations.

The first and most major of these was the 'Messiah from Scratch' on July 6th. It felt like quite a gamble: I had no idea whether we would attract enough participants to break even, given the fees for the conductor and organist, let alone make a profit. But the registrations kept trickling in – opening the mail was really exciting! – and by the first Thursday in July we had at least 60 singers. The final total was nearly 70, though a small number had to drop out at the last minute. Nonetheless, we had a choir of well over 60, and the sound we made amazed everyone.

Our conductor Juan Ortuño and our organist, Elin Rees, were both superb, and those who attended thoroughly enjoyed the day. I received comments like: 'I enjoyed every minute!' Even the weather played its part. There were suggestions that there should be a repeat before too long. I have the impression that it was particularly successful because for many people it was the fulfilment of a long cherished ambition. But it could be worthwhile to organise a similar day in, say, five years' time.

The day would have been much more difficult to organise without Jenny Burton: she stayed from start to finish, although she wasn't singing, provided refreshments, and ensured that they were available whenever they were needed.

We chose the second half of November to mark the official organ anniversary, with a special Choral Evensong, followed by 'Songs of Praise' the following week. For Choral Evensong we revived 'O thou, the central orb'. which is a wonderful anthem for a celebration. We had to work hard, but we pulled it off, to everyone's delight. It was lovely that Pat Carver, who had been dogged by ill health, managed to join us on that occasion. She was determined to sing the anthem with us. We repeated it for a larger congregation the following Sunday morning at our 'Songs of Praise', and took the opportunity to ask John Fairclough to play an organ solo for us during the service.

For a while it looked as though we might not have a children's singing group at the carol service, as two dates clashed for some of them. In the end, we managed to work round the dates, and eight children sang with us, including two younger siblings of children we already knew. They worked hard and did well. As always we are grateful to the parents for their support, without which this would not have happened.

We are pleased to have gained another alto, Sally Hilditch, who had occasionally sung with us in the past. It is particularly helpful, as health problems have again caused absences. Indeed, as I write this, I am still not allowed to put any weight on my left foot, having broken two bones in it in mid-January. But that will change fairly soon now, though I can't yet predict exactly what I will be able to do when.

As always I would like to thank all who participate in and contribute to the smooth running of the choir in a variety of ways, including friends who sing with us and / or play for services occasionally. Special mention should be made of Beryl, who found herself responsible for the choir practices and for playing for services without warning in midJanuary. I don't know what we would have done without her, and I am most grateful. Thanks are also due to John Fairclough who not only played for Choral Evensong as usual in February, but also led the final choir practice before the service, as I was out of action and Beryl was away. I am hoping that it won't be too long before I can let her have a well earned rest from being in charge, so that she can once again enjoy just singing with us.


Our Christmas Eve carol service was led by a choir, brass ensemble and organ.

Report from the E.C.C. Prayer Group

The Group continues to look for new ways in which to create and develop opportunities for reflective and meditative forms of worship.

We have continued to prepare and deliver Quiet Mornings on the 3rd Tuesday of each month (except July and December). These offer time and space for personal prayer and reflection, with theme-based words and music, presenting an opportunity for individuals to step out of the busyness of life and meet with God in their own meaningful and unique way.

During 2019 the mornings have attracted an average attendance of 19, made up of people from our own parish and several other churches in the Ramsbottom area as well as further afield. The accompanying booklets are also sent out to a growing number of people who are not able to attend for various reasons. A total of around 50 people now have access to the Quiet Morning material.



As usual, the E.C.C. was open on Good Friday for personal silent reflection, this year from 12.00 to 3.00p.m., the focus being "The Gift of a Cross", based on Meditations by Pat Marsh.

Three "Taize Prayer" services were held in 2019, two of these being on Sunday evenings in February and June, and one, for the first time, in a morning service slot in September. These have been well-received and five services have been scheduled for 2020, three in the evening and two in the morning.

A warm invitation is extended to anyone who would like to join us in any of these times of prayer and reflection.

Cellar and Youth at Hawkshaw

In March we had another successful weekend away at Yorkshire camps with 21 young people. It was a great weekend of worship, Bible teaching and outdoor activities.

The Cellar youth club continued to meet twice a week during term time for most of 2019. Unfortunately, the Monday group, for school Year 9 and above, had to stop in October as Danny Madden, who had been leading the group, moved on from his role as youth worker at Holcombe Brook Methodist church. Without a Pais team in place there weren't sufficient numbers of leaders to continue. We wish Danny well as he trains for a new career and thank him for all his work in supporting our young people through Cellar.

We have been able to recruit enough leaders to continue the Thursday group for school Years 7 and 8 (ages 11-13) without a Pais team. There are around 20 young people in attendance each week. Every session follows a similar format of games - indoor and outdoor - food and a Christian message, brought by one of the leaders or an external speaker. Since September we have been working through the Youth Alpha material. We are very grateful to all our leaders for the time and energy they give to Cellar.

During this year we have seen the older youth at Hawkshaw outgrow our Sunday



morning group. These young people (Year 10 and above) are now staying in the main service to help with reading, assisting at communion, taking charge of the audio visuals, serving coffee and teaching Sunday school. We also meet with these young people for a Bible study after school on a Friday fortnightly.

The group for ages 10-14 continues to meet together during the Sunday morning service with up to 12 young people attending. Again, we would not be able to run a Sunday morning youth group without committed leaders and, again, in this group we have felt the impact of not having a Pais team. Thank you to Mandi Tomkinson, who continues to faithfully serve in this group, and to Becky Slattery and Liz Webber who stepped up to help during the autumn term. Please pray for more leaders for the future, as Becky is currently on maternity leave, and Liz will be joining her in the summer term.

Please pray for all the young people involved; that they would know Jesus more and that their lives would be transformed by His love.

Sunday School -St Mary, Hawkshaw

Sunday School provides bible-centred teaching for children between 3 and 10 years of age during term time, when we also play games and do crafts, with the aim of helping them to come to know and love Jesus. Generally, on the first Sunday of the month we have Family Communion together in church and Sunday School takes place on the following 3 Sundays.

Currently there are about 15 children who regularly attend our Sunday School and we divide up into two separate groups. We try to keep this flexible and the age ranges in each group will vary year to year depending on numbers. Each week the first 15 minutes or so is spent in church for a short time of worship, then we walk across to the school. There are usually 3 or 4 volunteers helping, mostly on a rota basis.

During the last year both groups have been working from the Scripture Union "Light" series as a starting point for our



teaching sessions. The younger group have used the "Splash" version and the older group have loosely followed "XStream". However, we did adapt our programme to make sure we included special festivals such as Christmas, Easter, Pentecost, etc. During the Christmas Carol service the children took part in a Nativity with the help of some of the younger Pathfinders.

We continue to support a boy in Lebanon through Embrace the Middle East and children are invited to bring a bit of money each week towards this mission.


Traveller's (Adult and Toddler Group)




