

Safeguarding Report

There were no safeguarding incidents reported during 2019 in respect of St. Thomas à Becket Church or St. Matthew's Church.

In June 2019, in line with Church of England guidance, Widcombe PCC put in place procedures regarding the reporting of safeguarding serious incidents to the Charity Commission.

The Benefice is registered to use, and continues to successfully use, the DBS e-bulk system when DBS checks need to be carried out, along with Diocesan safe recruitment procedures.

As regards safeguarding training, a secure safeguarding training database was established inhouse in December 2019. This documents the names and email addresses of those who have undergone training, the level and date of their training, and the date training will need to be refreshed.



Safeguarding training must be refreshed every three years, and further details of the safeguarding training categories can be found on the Diocesan website. Anyone requiring training is asked to contact the Safeguarding Officer or church office in the first instance.

Our parish website meets national church requirements for safeguarding, including providing clear signposting arrangements and links to the Safeguarding Officer and Safeguarding Policy on the home page.

Secretary's Report

The full PCC met 7 times during the year (3 of which were online!), with an average level of attendance of 75%.

A Standing Committee meeting was held prior to each PCC meeting to set the agenda and transact business not requiring a full PCC meeting. From May 2019-October 2020, St Thomas held four baptisms, four marriages and four funerals. In addition, the Bristol branch of the German Lutheran Church continued to use St Thomas à Becket church for its monthly services as it has done for over forty years.

At St Matt's, the midweek Life hub groups, pastorates and Alpha course continued. The weekly contemporary services had varying numbers but an average through the year of 75 adults and 15 children. St Matt's held one wedding, three baptisms and one Thanksgiving services in 2019/20.

As well as regular services, St Matt's was the venue for the Widcombe Junior School Easter service, Leavers service, Harvest Festival and Christmas service for all for the staff, pupils and parents.

Christmas services within the Parish were very well attended, including Nine Lessons and Carols, Midnight Mass and Christmas Day services, Christingle service and 'Carols by Candlelight', with over 900 attending in total over the Christmas period.

The Wednesday coffee morning at St Matt's continued to grow with some babies and toddlers now attending and the Christmas Lunch was especially well attended this year offering a full Christmas meal for some 50 people with entertainment provided for by Sarena the Church Intern.



COVID-19 meant we had to move as a parish to online services, with meetings held via zoom. This was a challenge for all involved but proved to be a success. We hope all were blessed by the resources available and hope to return to a full complement of physical church services and activities as soon as is safe to do so.

St Thomas a Becket Report

St Thomas aims to be a Christian community that reaches out to the parish and beyond, to invite people to encounter God's grace and we continue in our journey to achieve this vision. We are pleased to welcome some new regular members of the congregation and were delighted that Polly, one of our adopted students, was to be married in the parish this Summer.

After stormy weather in February, Peter has done some temporary slate fixing and has put back the small window in the tower, which had been blown in. The roofer working on the St Matthew's roof has inspected the damage. He advises immediate remedial patching and a re-roof in 2-3 years time. The graveyard is now maintained by the council but in the interest of climate change and general tidiness we need to display a polite notice asking people not to leave plastic flowers and pots by the memorial slabs - and to remove dead blooms. Re growth in the bay tree and a cherry sapling in the wall, need to be removed. Internally the church is in good shape, but we need to replace the lighting strips by the choir stalls, and we would like to install a security light outside the porch before next

winter.

Due to the COVID 19 virus the church has been closed since 21 March for services and private prayer. Previously numbers at services were steady and we welcomed 4 new families to the last family service. Until the church closure there was a parish prayer meeting twice a month in the church. We look forward to a time when people can once again write their requests for prayer in the book by the font! We managed to have 3 of the planned 6 Lent course meetings, based on 'Prayer'! The study material is very good - and we plan to keep the booklets to use next Lent! The Thursday group, meeting twice monthly for Bible study and fellowship will re-start when we can...

Following a request for Evensong services, we were going to trial occasional Evensong in the summer, starting at 5pm , following on from church opening. This is now on a 'back burner' for next year!

St Thomas a Becket has a warm, friendly fellowship and we churchwardens are very grateful for the help we receive from so many in the congregation in planning and running services. In this time when so many are self-isolating, people are showing much kindness and concern for each other.

St Matt's Redevelopment Team (SMART)

April 2020

SMART is a committee that reports to the PCC. Its remit to lead on the redevelopment of St Matts. Members of SMART are Martin Geake, Tim Buckley, Peter Jones, Mark Nish, Louise Sturgess, Tony Coverdale. The St Matts wardens are also always invited to attend meetings and participate.

The redevelopment of St Matts Vestry Wing has been completed. There is now a fabulous meeting room upstairs which we have named the Keep and is accessed via the old spiral staircase. The stud wall in the arch between the church and the meeting room has been replaced with an attractive glass window in a wooden frame which brings light and life into the church space. The 1970s staircase has been removed thereby allowing a better configuration between the two rooms which serve as our Church Office.

On the retirement of Raymond Winrow, Connolly Wellingham Architects were appointed as the parish's new church architects. Their first task was to review the concept design for the redevelopment of the Parish Hall end of St Matts. They have come up with some very interesting and positive suggestions which will be shared with the church family later in the year.

Funding is now being sought for the second phase of St Matts roof repairs – the northern roof. We are hopeful of raising at least half of the required funds from grant making trusts and are being helped in this endeavour by a grants fundraiser.

Widcombe Junior School Report

Widcombe Junior School is a key stage 2 school for children ages 7 to 11. It has a two-form entry for each year group from Year 3 to Year 6 and the school serves families from the local area.

This year the staff have developed an exciting new curriculum offer which integrates learning across subjects. Children and teachers have enjoyed this way of learning and this has been enriched by a greater focus on developing the school's Christian identity. Some developments to celebrate include:

• Pupils take a lead in Worship

- Opportunities for parents to engage in worship through class assemblies and celebration assemblies
- Each Value has a Bible story linked to it, explored during Worship and links to eight key concepts made and shared along with children

• Inspiration visitors are regularly invited in to promote and provide real life examples of our core values e.g.

• Christian symbols in Worship – light candle, prayer, reflection,

• Reflection Room – refresher for new year 3s given each year and update on charter

• 5x formal Christian Services at St Matthew's Church for the school and its community

Mission support

The Widcombe Community House has existed since the beginning of 2017. A core focus has been to live as one as opposed to 4 individual parts as many young professionals sharing houses do. We've been having weekly communal meals and in the past few weeks this has increased into additional eating together in the house every weekday. We've improved our house prayer times, increasing our praying together in the mornings. We've been supportive of each other, particularly through challenging times. We undertook the Bath Soup Run for the first time in early March and are interested in doing this more regularly in the future so we can serve our community. A key focus for the next 12 months is to undertake more community outreach. The Thursday clap for the NHS has been a great opportunity to speak to our next-door neighbours and we hope to know them better.

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INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE PCC

Year Ended 31 December 2019

I report on the accounts of the PCC for the year ended 31st December 2019 which are set out on pages 2 to 4.

Respective responsibilities of PCC and examiner

The PCC consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144(2) of the Charities Act 2011 (the Act), and that an independent examination is needed.

It is my responsibility to:

examine the accounts under section 145 of the Act;

 follow the procedures laid down in the General Directions given by the Charity Commission (under section 145(5)(b) of the Act), and;

to state whether particular matters have come to my attention.

Basis of independent examiner's statement

My examination was carried out in accordance with General Directions given by the Charity Commission. An examination includes a review of the accounting records kept by the PCC and a comparison of the accounts presented with those records. It also includes consideration of any unusual items or disclosures in the accounts, and seeking explanations from the PCC concerning any such matters. The procedures undertaken do not provide all the evidence that would be required in an audit, and consequently I do not express an audit opinion on the accounts.

Independent examiner's statement

In the course of my examination, no matter has come to my attention:

proper accounting records are kept in accordance with section 130 of the Act; and

The St Thomas Restoration Fund is restricted to expenditure on the fabric of St Thomas' Church building.

The Organ Fund was donated specifically for organ repairs.

The Widcombe United Charities Fund is a separate charity (charity number 239919) and Widcombe PCC is the sole trustee. The charity is restricted to expenditure for the benefit of widows and orphans of the parish.

The Missionary Fund covers any anonymous gifts made to the church towards specific individuals and causes.

The St Matts Regeneration Fund is restricted to expenditure for the regeneration of the church roof and to the future re-ordering of the church building.
