SECTION C - OBJECTIVES & ACTIVITIES

Charitable Objects

- Promote the benefit of the inhabitants of the Isle of Dogs and the surrounding area by associating together the said inhabitants and the local authorities, voluntary and other organizations in a common effort to advance education and to provide facilities in the interests of social welfare for recreation and leisure-time occupation with the object of improving the conditions of life for the said inhabitants, and
- Advance the Christian religion.

Activities

- **ABLE** continued to deliver Pre-Employment training in the community, with Cathy supporting clients to access 1-2-1 appointments and whole class workshops in job support and on-line training at Arnhem wharf School and IHCC. Some clients were referred to work path and other providers to further specific training in childcare, women in construction, NHS training, Women in Health and Social care Trainee and volunteering roles. Others have successfully gone on to employment for example, in Business Administration role for the NHS, another as a care worker, and a child minder, and TA, for whom she provided references. Cathy saw clients' confidence grow, as well as their social, economic and wellbeing flourish. She also took over the role of coordinating ESOL working in partnership with the Ideas Store, promoting and coordinating assessments for new learners, which over 30 people registered. As well as covering new conversation classes by promoting, planning and delivering classes, with 20 new diverse clients.
- Unfortunately, alternative funding was not found for CanDo (funded by Comic Relief from 2017 to January 2019) and this project was closed in January 2019.
- The **Community Parents** recruited and trained 2 cohorts of volunteers, with 23 completing the training and 6 registering for City & Guilds qualification. We continued to provide ongoing one to one support for 35 women "Getting emotional support was so helpful. As I was a single mother, she ran the extra mile for me. I appreciated this so much. She helped me to look at myself, my state of mind, she was so helpful when my sister died and when I was grieving." Our weekly rotating outreach activities at GP surgeries, hospital antenatal clinics, Asda and community events contacted 470 women. Our twice weekly exercise classes for both antenatal and postnatal women were attended by 1074, with 155 attending for the first time. We saw 80 people through the weekly drop-in sessions and 47 attended our workshops. We received 379 referrals from stakeholder agencies and 61% were referred to our group activities.
- After successful weekly classes, with over 30 regular attendees and performances in schools and at the Crossrail Roof Terrace, our **Dance** project leader left Island House in the summer to focus upon her own business and the project was closed.
- We continued to run our **Health & Wellbeing** groups in the community, which included the Isle of Dogs Voices, Island House craft club, John Tucker lunch club, Friday fitness, Wednesday walks, and gentle exercise for Somalian women at Phoenix Court and John Tucker House, along with weekly health workshops at Barkantine Hall.
- The **YOU** project ran well-funded holiday clubs and contributed to some of the Saturday Dance sessions. 79 young people attended the Easter and 53 the Summer holiday clubs with several young people who had come through the project taking leadership roles with the younger attendees. The project leader left Island House in the summer to focus upon her own business and the project was closed pending review of needs. Remaining funds are held in a restricted account and can be sued later if another youth project begins.

Activities (continued)

Public Benefit

• Our strategies and activities are developed in direct relationship to our charitable aims and meet the identifiable needs of the general public within our area of benefit.

Volunteer Contribution

 Our work has relied heavily on volunteers and we continue to have good working relationships with volunteers throughout the projects.

SECTION D - ACHIEVEMENTS & PERFORMANCE

- In **ABLE** we continued to run language sessions despite the MSG funding ending in September. Plans were made to relaunch this project in January 2020 under the new name SKILLS and focussing on digital skills and online learning. We were pleased to be accepted as a National Online Network Centre and receive funding from Canary Wharf Group for new laptops and from Good Things Foundation to run Make It Click online training from January.
- Community Parents saw staff changes once again, but the new team became a stronger, enthusiastic team made up of 80% previous Community Parent volunteers. We were pleased to be awarded a grant from Poplar Harca for £15k as a result of personal networking to expand the Community Parents workshops on local housing Estates. Running 2 recruitment drives and 2 trainings in a single year was hard work but we were pleased to see 13 complete the second round of training. Making a film with Parents 1st and being the lead in gathering volunteers, parents and stakeholders to 'star' in the film was another new experience and the film has already been useful for publicity and funding applications. We also saw the 2 Peer Support Coordinators take the lead in delivering the training for the 1st time, which was successful. We were pleased to work with Parents 1st on a Big Lottery Partnership Bid, and to increase our referrals through stakeholder engagement.
- **Dance** see above.
- As funding for **Health & Wellbeing** also ended in September, we used reserves to continue to run all the groups to the end of the year.
- YOU see above.

Funding

- All fundraising was channelled through the new Fundraising Officer, Amanda Paul, and totalled around £60,000 across the projects. Larger or longer-term grants proved elusive, but we have outstanding applications with The National Lottery to provide at least three years of funding for Community Parents.
- The Main-Stream-Grants from LBTH came to an end in September and we were unsuccessful in our application to the replacement Local Community Fund. Three projects, ABLE, H&W and YOU, were therefore left without significant funding and applications to other sources only provided small amounts. Management Committee agreed to guarantee funding from reserves for all projects and staff until 30th September 2020 and staff contracts were issued.
- We secured money from Good Things Foundation to begin weekly IT classes for a year, as a development of ABLE. Canary Wharf Group provided funding for ten new laptops which opens many new possibilities for new project developments.

Staffing

- Following the addition of Steph from Island Advice Centre to our Management Team, we were grateful to ELBA for helping us also secure the experience, skills and new perspectives of Ade, Dina and Juanita.
- All staff were encouraged to continue training and development, and over 20 courses were attended, as well as one employee beginning a general certificate in NEBOSH.
- Four members of staff left, and one began maternity leave.

Rentals

- The 5-year lease for Quaystone was finally signed and those for Island Advice Centre and Playgroup are being prepared for April 2020.
- Isle of Dogs Bangladeshi Association and Cultural Centre ended their longstanding rental of the main hall, which allowed a new Dance Class three days per week.
- We secured a new agreement for desks being rented by Working Well Trust, with whom we may partner in the future.

Premises

- Our telephony and email were upgraded through a new contract with Ethos Voice And Data and all users are now running MS Office 365 with cloud backup.
- A volunteer group from London Metropolitan University spent a day clearing the garden.
- Sadly, our application for volunteers to decorate the office was unsuccessful.
- The ground floor offices rented by Island Advice have been refurbished at our cost.
- Our three electricity contracts were transferred to the more environmental Ecotricity and both gas accounts are being transferred in January 2020.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2019

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Incoming Resources

Recognition of Incoming Resources

These are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when:

- the charity becomes entitled to the resources;
- the trustees are virtually certain they will receive the resources; and
- the monetary value can be measured with sufficient reliability

Incoming Resources with related expenditure

Where incoming resources have related expenditure (as with fundraising or contract income) the incoming resource and related expenditure are reported gross in the SOFA.

Grants and Donations

Grants and Donations are only included in the SOFA when the charity has unconditional entitlement to the resources.

Grants with performance conditions

Where the charity receives grants with conditions for its payment being a specific level of service or output to be provided, such grants are only recognised in the SOFA once the charity has provided the specified service or output.

Grants receivable without performance conditions

These are only recognised in the accounts when a commitment has been made and there are no conditions to be met relating to a grant which remain in control of the charity.

Tax reclaims on Donations and Gifts

Incoming resources from tax reclaims are included in the SOFA during the same period as the gift to which they relate.

Contractual Income and Performance Related Grants

This is only included in the SOFA once the related goods or services has been delivered.

Gifts in Kind

Gifts in kind are accounted for at a reasonable estimate of their value to the charity or the amount actually realised. Gifts in kind for sale or distribution are included in the accounts as gifts only when sold or distributed by the charity. Gifts in kind for use by the charity are included in the SOFA as incoming resources when receivable.

Donated Services and Facilities

These are only included in incoming resources (with an equivalent amount in resources expended) where the benefit to the charity is reasonably quantifiable, measurable and material. The value placed on these resources is the estimated value to the charity.

Volunteer Help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

Investment Income

This is included in the accounts when receivable.

Investment gains and losses

This included any gain or loss on the sale of investments and any gain or loss resulting from revaluing investments to market value at the end of the year.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (continued) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2019

Expenditure and liabilities

Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources.

Governance Costs

Include costs of the preparation and examination of statutory accounts, the costs of the trustees meetings and cost of any legal advice to trustees on governance or constitutional matters.

Support Costs

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of the resources, e.g. allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.

Changes in Accounting policies and previous accounts

There has been no change to the accounting policies (variation rules and methods of accounting) since last year, and no changes to the previous accounts.

Assets

Tangible fixed assets (with the exception of the land and buildings) are capitalised if they can be used for more than one year, and cost at least £500. They are valued at cost or, if gifted, at the value to the charity on receipt.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated at a rate to write off the cost at 25% p.a. on a reducing balance over their estimated useful lives, at the end of which period any remaining book value can be written off.

Investments

Investments quoted on a recognised stock exchange are valued at market value at the year end.

Basis of preparation:

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis of accounting in accordance with the Charities Act 2011 and in accordance with applicable accounting standards. In preparing the financial statements the charity follows best practice as laid down in the Statement of Recommended Practice "Accounting and Reporting by Charities" (SORP 2015).

RESTRICTED FUNDS:

Dance (DAN) - an entrepreneurial support project for our street dance tutor and including school holiday activities for young people and development of new dance leaders.

Can Do (CAN) - this is the project where we provide coordination and training for the Tower Hamlets CanDo Partnership across the borough.

Building Capabilities (BCA) - a one off grant from Big Lottery Fund to help improve our long term capacity.

Community Parents Project (CPP) - a volunteer training and peer support programme for first time pregnant mums on the Isle of Dogs called "Community Parents".

Youth Project (YOU) - a SLA with Tower Hamlets Youth Services started in October 2013, to deliver part of the LAP8 youth service programme for 13-19 year olds across the Isle of Dogs.

A.B.L.E. (Adult Basicskills Learning & Employment) - this is a 3 year contract through mainstream grants to run ESOL classes, IT courses and basic skills employment preparation training courses, run with partners at IDEA stores and the Isle of Dogs Parish Trust.

Health & Wellbeing - this is a 3 year contract through mainstream grants to run a wide range of health & wellbeing activities across the Isle of Dogs as lead partner with a range of other providers.

Millwall Park Gym - this small fund from LBTH to run activities in the park.

7. FUNDS (Continued)

"Transfer of overheads" - Funders are asked to recognise that a portion of restricted project funds are used to cover costs incurred by Island House itself in delivering the project outputs and to contribute to our central support and core charitable running costs, as detailed in the funding applications. These are shown as "transfers of overheads".

DESIGNATED FUNDS:

Repairs Fund: - A Designated Fund set aside to deal with repairs identified by the quinquennial surveyor's reports, to be added to on an annual basis by an amount identified in the budget , with actual repair costs charged to this fund. This enables property repairs to be averaged out over a number of years.

Special Purposes Legacy Fund: - A Designated Fund created from the balance of past legacies, kept to fund occasional and exceptional, non-recurring expenditure not included in the annual budget.
