Structure, Governance, and Management

Governing document

North Yorkshire Music Therapy Centre was established by a constitution on 14 December 1989 and amended on 28 November 1996 and again on 1 February 2000.

Trustees' role and selection

The Trustees of the charity are responsible for managing risk in relation to the activities and structure of the charity. The different aspects of the work of the charity are regularly reviewed at Trustee meetings, and wherever possible, control systems are established to mitigate any identified risks. New Trustees are appointed by agreement of the existing trustees.

Operational management of the charity

The operation of the charity is organised by the Director of Music Therapy, who oversees the use of other therapists and volunteers, to deliver the services provided; this work is supported by the Office Manager.

Financial risk assessment

- 1. Our existing commitments for salaries and associated costs are not covered by our funds from therapy fees and grants. There is therefore a significant fundraising target to achieve each year. The Trustees and staff are committed to assisting with applications to Charitable Trusts, Award bodies etc, and to supporting a variety of fund-raising activities.
- 2. The long-term ill health of any employee will put the charity at risk both in terms of finances and of reputation. In the light of the stressful nature of the work, the Trustees have reviewed the process of risk assessment carried out by the therapists to ensure that sufficient emphasis is placed on identifying and mitigating risk to health, particularly mental health. Each therapist is responsible for maintaining a manageable and varied work load and is provided with regular clinical supervision.
- 3. The investments of the charity will be managed by Mark Calvert of HKA (FS) Ltd, York who will act on behalf of the charity's Trustees to ensure proper management of the funds.
- 4. In the event of the charity winding up its activities due to a lack of funds, all remaining assets will be donated to another Music Therapy charity with the prior agreement of the Charity Commissioners. Every effort would be made to find therapists for existing clients.

Public Benefit Statement

The trustees confirm that the charity has complied with the duty in section 17 of the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the public benefit guidance published by the Charity Commission. This report illustrates how the charity delivers public benefit.

Main activities

The charity's work primarily consists of the clinical provision of music therapy and the promotion of the relevance of that therapy to health and well-being.

Provision

During the year, the Director of Music Therapy, a professional HPC-registered therapist, has provided music therapy sessions to a variety of client groups and individuals; she has also engaged other, self-employed, therapists to ensure that people receive music therapy if requested. Much of the clinical therapy is delivered at three special schools in North Yorkshire, where the effects are monitored closely and reported to parents and staff at the schools. The children receiving benefit suffer from a range of disabilities, including autism, multiple and severe disability, and developmental delay. A total of 538 individual sessions and 141 group sessions were provided in 2019.

Therapy has also been given to adults in their homes, and in residential care home settings. An important development in clinical activity has been provision of group sessions for clients of Next Steps, a local Mental Health Resource Centre. In addition, the Director has provided significant training for staff and musicians working in special schools and for carers of mental health clients.

Promotion

Information is made available to families, individuals and referring agencies about the benefits of music therapy and how it can be accessed through the charity. The therapist has given talks and organised workshops for local referring groups and interested community groups, and participates in a network of professional arts therapists in the region.

Another significant area of work is in promoting music therapy as a career for music students; the Director has given lectures at Huddersfield and Leeds Universities, and the charity has provided training placements for students, with appropriate supervision.

We continue to be in touch with Professor Helen Odell-Miller who is Head of the Cambridge Institute for Music Therapy Research and a patron of the charity; this contact provides us with first-hand information on current thinking and potential developments in the field of music therapy.

Other points of note

- 1. An important milestone was reached in 2019, the 30th anniversary of the charity's registration with the Charity Commission, when we finally achieved the ambitions of the 2015-18 development plan. Of particular significance was the establishment of a new Centre, by moving into larger premises with the space in which to organise a wide range of new activities and to contribute to the well-being of the local community.
- 2. Financial support:- we are grateful to the Troutsdale Trust, the W W Spooner Charitable Trust, the Charles and Elise Sykes Trust, and Jessie's Fund for support with 'Music, My Voice' projects with children and young people in schools. We would also thank the W W Spooner Charitable Trust, the Scarborough Academy of Music, Ryedale Choral Union, Soanes Poultry, and the Provincial Grand Lodge of Markmaster Masons Benevolent Fund for generous contributions to our unrestricted funds.
- 3. Community Support for NYMTC:- We are grateful to our many generous supporters through the year, particularly the 'Friends' of the North Yorkshire Music Therapy Centre, new and old, who support our events and help us so generously with regular donations.

Financial review

The charity results show an overall deficit of receipts over payments of £13,992 (2018: £19,559) and this was after the charity sold part of its investment portfolio which raised £40,000 to assist the charity's cashflow (2018: Nil). If you remove the £40,000 receipt from the results the deficit is £53,992 (2018: £19,559).

The charity moved to a new larger rented office in the year and this move increased the charity's rental and related service and maintenance expenses by £24,949 from those incurred in 2018. This is the main reason the charity has reported an increased deficit. We had budgeted for a significant deficit due to the move, with associated one-off costs in adapting the space for our needs in addition to the higher rent. The new premises will allow us to conduct a much higher level of community-based activity in future years, with associated opportunities for grant applications and other fund-raising activities.

The deficit is split between unrestricted funds with a deficit of £14,181 and restricted funds with a surplus of £189. The charity also had £6,128 of unrestricted receipts owed to it at 31 December 2019 and the value of the investment portfolio had a market value of £134,364 at 31 December 2019.

The trustees have set up a finance sub-committee and are taking external advice on how to increase its income in order that it can move towards a breakeven position in 2020.
