The bankers are: The Royal Bank of Scotland, Salisbury and the Central Board of Finance of the Church of England, London. The independent examiner is Mrs N A Halls of Fletcher & Partners, Chartered Accountants, Salisbury.

Day-to-day management of PCC business is the responsibility of the Rector (The Reverend Kelvin Inglis), Churchwardens (Mrs Fi Green and Mr Michael Humphreys) as members of the PCC and the Parish Manager Mrs M Browning

Structure, Governance and Management

The PCC is a body corporate established by the Church of England and operates under the Parochial Church Council (Powers) Measure 1956. The PCC is a registered charity number 1133882.

The Salisbury St Thomas and St Edmund Charities, which distribute the donations from The John Fricker Charity and administer the Richard Earlsman charities, are treated as being independent and not part of the PCC accounts.

The method of appointment of PCC members is governed by and set out in the Church Representation Rules 2006. All eligible members of the congregation are encouraged to register on the Church Electoral Roll and stand for election to the PCC. Training is provided from diocesan resources for new office holders.

The work of the PCC is supported by ten sub-committees that report to the PCC and make recommendations as appropriate. The Rector is an ex-officio member of all committees. Membership of sub-committees, other than the Standing Committee (the only sub-committee required by Church Representation Rules) may be drawn from the PCC and others on the Church Electoral Roll.

- Standing Committee provides oversight and transacts the day-to-day business of the PCC between its meetings, subject to any directions given by the PCC. Its membership consists of the Rector, Vice-Chairman, Churchwardens, Deputy Churchwardens, Parish Manager, licensed clergy and Treasurer. Standing Committee meets fortnightly.
- Adult Christian Education Team promotes life-long Christian learning amongst adults.
- Children and Young People Team -coordinate worship for children and young people
- Churchwarden Team assists and supports the Church wardens
- Community Engagement Team promotes social responsibility locally, nationally and internationally
- Fabric Team responsible for the internal and external fabric and fittings of the church and churchyard and of St Thomas's House.
- Finance Team monitors budgeting, cash flow and stewardship and prepares the Annual Report & Accounts
- Pastoral Team facilitates the pastoral work of the parish
- Staffing Team has been established to manage the HR requirements of the Parish and includes the Safeguarding Officer in accordance with Diocesan guidelines.
- Worship Team provides a forum for consultation and feedback on matters of liturgy, worship and music.

The potential major risks to which the PCC is exposed include financial, security of assets and failure to meet statutory and legal requirements.

Aim and Purpose

The primary object of the PCC is to co-operate with the Rector in promoting in the parish the whole mission of the Church, pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical.

Objectives and Activities for the public benefit

The PCC is committed to enabling as many people as possible to worship at our church and to become part of our parish community at St. Thomas & St Edmund. The PCC maintains an overview of worship throughout the parish. Our services and worship put faith into practice through prayer and scripture, music and sacrament.

When planning our activities for the year, we have considered the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit and, in particular, the supplementary guidance on charities for the advancement of religion. In particular, we try to enable ordinary people to live out their faith as part of our parish community through:

- Worship and prayer; learning about the Gospel; and developing their knowledge and trust in Jesus.
- Provision of pastoral care for people living in the parish.
- Missionary and outreach work.

To facilitate this work it is important that we maintain the fabric of the Church of St. Thomas and St Thomas's House.

The trustees confirm that they have complied with their duty to have due regard to the guidance on public benefit published by the Charity Commission in exercising their powers or duties.

Review of Achievements and Performance in the year

There are 229 (309 in 2018) names on the Church Electoral Roll, of whom 170 (247 in 2018) live outside the parish.

Looking back on 2019, three features of a busy year stand out: Charter Sunday, Fundraising, and Works.

St. Thomas's is committed to a journey of lifelong discipleship and our adult education team works hard to provide a varied programme of opportunities to learn and grow in faith and confidence. Bible Study groups, Contemplative Community group, Faith group, Lent groups, Prayer group are examples of the opportunities available. Care and Connect group encourages older people to meet for coffee, prayer and a hot lunch on a monthly basis. Transport is provided if needed. Tommy's Toddlers meets younger members of the congregation on a Tuesday afternoon in term time.

* Charter Sunday in 2019 took place on the eve of the first anniversary of 'the incident' which brought Salisbury such unwelcome attention around the world. This meant that as the media returned to see how things were, there was a positive story to tell about our civic traditions and community life. St Thomas's featured strongly in this.

Much work has taken place to renovate the organ but owing to tragic circumstances work has been slower than expected. A temporary arrangement has ensured that our musical tradition is unhindered. Meanwhile the grand piano purchased in 2017 has been much appreciated and has attracted some gifted performers.

* The efforts of the Appeal Fundraising Committee - under the auspices of the Guild - in 2019 were extraordinary, including an antiques fair, murder mystery play, cycle ride, autumn fayre and auction of promises. That we have achieved so much is down to much generosity but also the labours of those who organised these events. The Fabric Committee has devoted much of its time to preparing for the works which continued in 2019 prior to major work in January 2020.

* Scaffolding went up in August and all the high level works were completed before Remembrance Sunday including works to the clerestory, the dramatic cleaning and renovation of the Doom, the cleaning of walls and ceiling, new lighting, new children's area, the re-siting of the Eyre stones and the cleaning of the Eyre monument.

Visitors to the parish have included Bishop Nicholas with Ruth Wilde of Inclusive Church for a seminar on sexuality in February, the Archdeacon of Sarum in March to award Aldhelm Certificates, Jeffrey John to speak in May, and Angela Tilby to preach on Christ the King in November to mark the completion of the Doom renovation. Bishop Nicholas returned the same day to chair hustings for December's general election.

The Lent Lunches this year were notable for thoughtful contributions from members of the congregation about their life and faith. On Good Friday, the Cathedral joined with us to hold a family service at St Thomas's. The choir led the services at Canterbury Cathedral on the second Sunday of Easter and witnessed a remarkable act of love from members of the Muslim community there. The bounds of the parish were beaten by a small group of walkers in May. St Thomas's once more sponsored the young entrepreneur award at the Chamber of Commerce business awards. In the days leading up to Armed Forces Weekend in June, St Thomas's hosted a magnificent display of hundreds of embroidered Flags of Thanks arranged by Neil Stace, the 'sewing soldier', for Alabaré.

Other events through the year included the Shrove Tuesday Pancake Race, many concerts including one by Melvyn Tan as part of the Salisbury Festival, a west African meal for Christian Aid, a harvest lunch and a retreat at Hilfield. Four of our young people were admitted as communicant members of the church under our Children in Communion policy in February and in November Abbie was confirmed at the Cathedral.

In February, we said farewell to Dominic Thornton who served us well in his title post and has now moved with his young family to Old Basing in Winchester diocese where his wife Heather is vicar.

Our life at St Thomas's is considerably enhanced by the contribution of a team of clergy who, it should be remembered, serve as volunteers. We are grateful for all they do to Wendy Cooper as an associate priest, Bruce Duncan, Alan Gill and Ann Philp, joined more recently by Tom Clammer, Robert Prance and Jim Greasley. On Maundy Thursday, Selina Deacon was licensed an associate priest in the parish by the Bishop of Ramsbury.

In July, Jonathan Plows left us to take up a full-time post as priest in charge of the churches of the Wylye and Till Valley parishes. Over 12 years as an ordained minister in the parish his contribution has been immense. He has involved himself in every aspect of our shared life with energy, enthusiasm and kindness. That St Thomas's is so involved in the life of the city is due in no small part to Jonathan's hard work. It is good to know that he is thriving in his new ministry.

Our ecumenical links, partnerships with external agencies and chaplaincies to local organisations continue to extend our outreach into the community. The Christmas Tree Festival was again well organized and a very successful week. Over 16,000 attended. As a result, Care Home Volunteers and Family Counselling Trust (Wiltshire), each benefitted to the tune of £5,750.

Your parochial church council has continued to serve with great commitment in complex times. Recently it has conducted an experiment in dividing into working groups to undertake areas of its work in more detail. We shall report back on how this goes.

Meanwhile our prayer always is that, in all that we do, may God's purposes be served and may God's glory be known.

St Thomas's seeks to nurture a strong sense of belonging and the many groups and activities contribute to this.

Developments after the year end

This report was completed during 2020 when activities at St Thomas's were much curtailed, as at every other church, by the Government's Covid 19 measures. There was no public act of worship in the church for the 15 Sundays between 15 March and 5 July. Worship moved online and has continued to do so while public worship continues in a highly restricted form. All social, cultural and fundraising activities remain suspended and there have been no baptisms, weddings of funerals for six months.

Financial Review - 2019

The PCC's total income was £456,736 compared with £322,280 in 2018. Total expenditure amounted to £465,125 (2018: £338,047). There was therefore a net overall deficit of £8,389, before changes in the value of investments, which can be analysed as a deficit of £5,083 in the Restricted Funds and a deficit of £3,306 in Unrestricted Funds. The value of unrestricted fund investments increased by £2,998 during the year. Over the year, therefore, the PCC's resources decreased by a total of £5,391.

The total funds at the year-end amounted to \pounds 919,454. \pounds 140,855 of assets were held for restricted purposes, leaving \pounds 778,599 for general purposes, of which \pounds 261,263 is represented by St Thomas's House.

The total income of the Guild of St Thomas and St Edmund, a subsidiary of the PCC, for the year to 31 December 2019 was £158,551. The expenditure, including £186,372 grants made to the PCC, amounted to £197,657. The deficit for the year was therefore £39,106. The total net assets of the subsidiary at 31 December 2019 were £12,513. The total gross income of the charity and its subsidiary was below the statutory threshold for preparing consolidated accounts, no consolidated accounts were therefore prepared. The £186,372 grants received from the subsidiary were included in PCC's income for the year.

Reserves Policy

It is the PCC policy to maintain a balance of funds sufficient to ensure its ability to maintain expenditure at the current levels for a minimum of six months and use the balance of any funds held to finance repairs and improvements to the church, its properties and other assets in a way that will enhance the work of the church.

Volunteers

We would like to thank all the volunteers who work so hard to make our church the lively and vibrant community it is.

STATEMENT OF PCC RESPONSIBILITIES

The PCC as trustees are responsible for preparing the trustees' annual report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom generally accepted accounting practice (UK GAAP)). Charity law in England and Wales requires the members of the PCC (Trustees) to prepare financial statements for each financial year, which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the PCC and of the surplus or deficit of the PCC for that period.

In preparing these accounts, the Trustees are required to:

- Select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently.
- Observe the methods and principles in the Charities SORP
- Make judgments and estimates that are reasonable and prudent.
- Follow applicable accounting standards, subject to any material departures disclosed and explained in the accounts
- Prepare the accounts on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the PCC will continue to operate.

The Trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the PCC and enable them to ensure that the accounts comply with the provisions of the Charities Act 2011 and the Church Accounting Regulations 2006. They are also responsible for safeguarding the assets of the PCC and hence for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT TO THE PAROCHIAL CHURCH COUNCIL OF THE PARISH OF SALISBURY ST THOMAS AND ST EDMUND

I report to the trustees on my examination of the financial statements of the Salisbury St Thomas and St Edmund PCC (the charity) for the year ended 31 December 2019, which are set out on pages 7 to 19.

Responsibilities and basis of report

As trustees of the charity, and members of the PCC, you are responsible for the preparation of the financial statements in accordance with the requirements of the Charities Act 2011 ("the Act").

I report in respect of my examination of the charity's financial statements carried out under section 145 of the 2011 Act, and in carrying out my examination I have followed all the applicable Directions given by the Charity Commissioners under section 145(5)(b) of the 2011 Act.

Independent examiner's statement

The PCC's gross income exceeded £250,000 and I confirm that I am qualified to undertake the examination by being a member of the Institute of Chartered Accountants in England and Wales.

I have completed my examination. I confirm that no material matters have come to my attention in connection with the examination giving me cause to believe that in any material respect:

- (1) accounting records were not kept in respect of the charity as required by section 130 of the 2011 Act; or
- (2) the financial statements do not accord with those records; or
- (3) the financial statements do not comply with the applicable requirements concerning the form and content of accounts set out in the Charities (Accounts and Reports) Regulations 2008 other than any requirement that the accounts give a "true and fair view" which is not a matter considered as part of an independent examination.

I have no concerns and have come across no other matters in connection with the examination to which attention should be drawn in this report in order to enable a proper understanding of the financial statements to be reached.

I. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

a. Basis of accounting

The accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts. The accounts include all the funds for which the PCC is legally responsible; moneys whose use is subject to specific trusts are shown as restricted funds.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Church Accounting Regulations 2006, the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) effective from 1 January 2019, the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Charities Act 2011.

The PCC constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102. Its governing documents are the Church of England's "Parochial Church Councils (Powers) Measure 1956" and the "Church Representation Rules". The registered office is St Thomas's House, St Thomas's Square, Salisbury SPI IBA.

The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the PCC's ability to continue as a going concern. In this assessment the trustees have considered the impact of COVID-19. The most significant area of judgement that affects items in the accounts is to do with estimating the residual value of St Thomas's House (see note If).

b. Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are general funds that are available for use at the PCC's discretion in furtherance of the objectives of the charity.

Designated funds are generally unrestricted funds set aside at the discretion of the PCC for specific purposes. Restricted funds are those donated for use in a particular area or for specific purposes, the use of which is restricted to that area or purpose.

c. Income

Income is recognised once the PCC has entitlement to the income, there is sufficient certainty of receipt and so it is probable that the income will be received, and the amount of income receivable can be measured reliably. Planned giving, collections and similar donations are recognised when received. Income tax recoverable on Gift Aid donations is recognised when the donation is recognised. Grants are accounted for when the PCC is entitled to the use of the resources, their ultimate receipt is considered probable and the amounts due are reliably quantifiable. Legacies are included when the PCC is advised by the personal representative of an estate, that payment will be made and the amount involved can be quantified. Dividends are accounted for when declared receivable, interest as receivable. Rental income is recognised when earned. The value of any voluntary help is not included in the accounts but is described in the annual report. Donated goods are recognised as income when the charity has entitlement to the items, economic benefits will flow to the charity from them and their fair value can be measured reliably.

d. Expenditure

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Missionary and charitable giving is accounted for when paid over, or when awarded, if that award creates a binding or constructive obligation on the PCC. The diocesan parish share expected to be paid over is accounted for when due.

e. Support costs and their allocation

Support costs are those central functions that assist the work of the PCC but do not directly relate to charitable activities. Support costs include office staff and other costs, and governance costs. Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the PCC and its compliance with regulation and good practice. Total support costs have been allocated between cost of raising funds and expenditure on charitable activities. The bases on which support costs have been allocated are set out in note 12.

f. Tangible fixed assets

Consecrated and benefice property is not included in the accounts in accordance with section 10 (2)(a) and (c) of the Charities Act 2011. Moveable church furnishings held by the rector and churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal are inalienable property, listed in the church's inventory.

Freehold Properties

No depreciation is provided on St Thomas's House as the estimated residual value of the property is not less than its carrying value and the remaining useful life of the asset currently exceeds 50 years.

Other fixtures, fittings and office equipment

Equipment used within the church premises is capitalised at cost and depreciated on a straight line basis over between 10 and 30 years. Individual items of equipment with a purchase price of $\pounds 2,000$ or less are written off when the asset is acquired.

g. Fixed asset investments

Investments are stated at market value at 31 December and the gains or losses arising in the year are credited or debited to the funds in which the investments are held. Any gain or loss on revaluation or sale is taken to the Statement of Financial Activities.

ACCOUNTING POLICIES (continued) I.

h. Debtors

Debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid after taking account of any trade discounts due.

i. Creditors

Creditors are recognised where the PCC has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors are recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

j. Short term deposits

Include cash held on deposit with the CBF Church of England Funds.

k. Non consolidation of subsidiary

The total gross income of the charity and its subsidiary, The Guild of St Thomas and St Edmund, is below the statutory threshold for preparing consolidated accounts. The PCC has therefore not prepared consolidated accounts. The results and reserves of the subsidiary are disclosed in Note 28.

2. RELATED PARTY TRANSACTIONS AND KEY MANAGEMENT PERSONNEL

In 2019 no trustee was paid any remuneration or received any other benefits from an employment as a trustee (2018 £0). In 2019 two trustees, U Schwarting and R Lewis, were paid a total of £3,712 (2018 - £4,670) as assistant organist and verger. In 2019 no trustee claimed any trustees' expenses (2018 - £nil). (In 2018 PCC awarded two grants for books for further study of £500 each to two trustees D Thornton and W Cooper.) In 2019 the PCC met expenses of three clergy who were also trustees K Inglis, W Cooper and J Plows (2018 four clergy - K Inglis, D Thornton, W Cooper and J Plows). These are included under the heading Clergy Expenses on page 12.

In 2019 The Guild of St Thomas and St Edmund (a subsidiary of the PCC) made grants of £186,372 (2018 - £8,591) to the PCC. At 31 December 2019 the subsidiary owed the PCC £34. (At 31 December 2018 the PCC owed £7,197 to the subsidiary).

The charity considers its key management personnel comprise the Trustees.

24. CONTRACTUAL COMMITMENTS

The PCC had contractual commitments of \pounds 249,156 for delivery of altar, benches, bookcases, chairs and dais/staging after the year end. Included in this amount is \pounds 111,378 paid by the PCC as deposits before the year end (included in Prepayments - see Note 18).

25. CONTINGENT ASSET

Before the year end the charity was notified of a legacy the exact value of which was not known at the year end as the charity's interest in the estate was residual.

26. POST BALANCE SHEET EVENTS

After the year end the charity submitted two applications for grants to Listed Places of Worship and was awarded \pounds 41,190. Also after the year end the Guild of St Thomas and St Edmund awarded the PCC grants totalling \pounds 26,053.

The impact of COVID-19 is considered to be a non-adjusting post balance sheet event. The Trustees do not believe there is any financial impact to the Financial Statements as at 31 December 2019 as a result of this subsequent event. The trustees have considered the financial risks associated with COVID-19. The trustees are satisfied that the PCC will be able to continue its activities for the foreseeable future and that no material uncertainty exists over the entity's ability to continue as a going concern.

27. VOLUNTEERS

The PCC relies on the help of 187 general volunteers who give their time to St Thomas's in numerous ways - including cleaning, bellringing, helping in various ways during services, helping with children's groups and groups for the elderly, singing in the choir, serving coffee, as PCC members and as Lay Pastoral Assistants. The value of general volunteers' time is not recognised in the accounts.

28. SUBSIDIARY UNDERTAKING

The Guild of St Thomas and St Edmund is a charitable company limited by guarantee. (The liability of its members is limited to a sum not exceeding £10, being the amount that each member undertakes to contribute to the assets of The Guild of St Thomas and St Edmund in the event of its being wound up while he, she or it is a member or within one year after he, she or it ceases to be a member.) The Guild of St Thomas and St Edmund is controlled under an agreement by The Parochial Church Council of the Parish of Salisbury St Thomas and St Edmund. The Parochial Church Council of the Parish of Salisbury St Thomas and St Edmund. The Parochial Church Council of the Parish of Salisbury St Thomas and St Edmund ("parent") is the sole beneficiary of The Guild of St Thomas and St Edmund ("subsidiary"), whose charitable objectives are to preserve and protect for the public benefit the Parish Church of St Thomas, Salisbury and the monuments, fittings, fixture, organ, stained glass, furniture, ornaments and chattels of such church and its churchyard and burial ground. The subsidiary was incorporated on 27 February 2018 (Company number 11227325) and registered with Charity Commission on 8 November 2018 (Charity number 1180618). The total income of the subsidiary for the year to 31 December 2019 was £158,551 (2018: £87,577). The deficit for the year was £39,106 (2018: surplus of £51,619). The net assets at 31 December 2019 were £12,513 (31 December 2018: £51,619).
