Report of the trustees for the year ended 31 December 2019

The trustees present their annual report and financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31st December 2019. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the accounts, the Charities Act 2011 and the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard for Smaller Charities published October 2019.

Structure, governance and management

SarcoidosisUK is a registered charity, number 1063986, and is constituted under a trust deed dated 18 November 1996, as amended 29 May 1997 and 6 June 2014.

Trustee Appointment.

Trustees are appointed by member vote. All trustees are personally affected by sarcoidosis. The board of trustees regularly reviews the skills and experience of members to ensure that, as the legal and operational backbone of the charity, the board is as strong as possible.

Objectives and activities

SarcoidosisUK has four goals:

- 1. **Information**: We provide accurate and detailed information to people with sarcoidosis, their carers, healthcare professionals and anyone else personally or professionally affected by sarcoidosis.
- 2. **Support**: We provide emotional and confidential support for anyone affected by sarcoidosis in the UK.
- 3. **Research**: We raise funds and invest them into medical research focussed directly on finding a cure for sarcoidosis.
- 4. **Awareness**: We recognise the lack of understanding and awareness from both the medical profession and the general public regarding sarcoidosis. We aim to raise awareness through everything we do.

Achievements and performance

SarcoidosisUK Support Services

The SarcoidosisUK Nurse Helpline continued to go from strength to strength and had answered over 1,000 calls by the end of 2019. The SarcoidosisUK Facebook group reached 3,482 members and we now have 21 active regional support groups.

We funded another major research project

SarcoidosisUK continues to fund research in partnership with the British Lung Foundation. In 2019 we committed £60,000 to a laboratory analysis of scarring in the lungs. The aim of the research is to understand scarring mechanisms and provide evidence for what treatment approaches may be effective. We have also conducted our own research projects, for example, the SarcoidosisUK BIG Survey, a detailed collection of sarcoidosis patient demographic data. This data will be used to help inform future research priorities.

• Specialist Patient Days and Information Videos

In June 2019 we hosted the SarcoidosisUK Neurosarcoidosis Patient Day at the Royal Free Hospital in London. Over 65 patients attended and hundreds watched online as Dr Kidd, Consultant Neurosarcoidosis Specialist, spoke about the condition. We also created a number of information videos with experts Dr Athol Wells and Dr Desmond Kidd, which provide an in-depth explanation of complex and progressive sarcoidosis

and neurosarcoidosis.

• Clinical Board

In spring 2019 we formed a Clinical Board to help with SarcoidosisUK's clinically related outputs and services. There are currently 8 sarcoidosis specialists on the Board, which had its first meeting in September 2019.

• Our online presence continued to grow

In 2019 the SarcoidosisUK website recorded an average of over 35,000 unique visitors per month, compared to an average of around 20,000 per month in 2018. Our social media following has also grown significantly, allowing us to raise awareness and share our important work with a wider audience. Our Facebook page achieved 4,983 likes, compared to 3,554 in 2018.

• Plans for next year

SarcoidosisUK aims to increase fundraising and reach, in order to allow us to continue achieving our goals of funding research into a cure, offering support to people affected by sarcoidosis, providing high-quality information and raising awareness of the condition. 2020 has been an extremely challenging year, particularly for people with rare diseases. In response to the coronavirus pandemic, SarcoidosisUK has focussed on identifying and circulating specific advice for people with sarcoidosis. This has included creating a Coronavirus and Sarcoidosis FAQ and producing 7 live Q&A videos with specialists.

Legacy income

We would like to express our gratitude for the generous legacy we received during the year. Legacies are an important source of funds for us and each one helps us to achieve our goals of helping others through the work we do. Without such generous donations, our charity would not be able to fund the research we do year after year or support the many sufferers out there who look to us for help. Thank you from all of us at SarcoidosisUK.

Financial review

The Charity has been almost entirely reliant on donations from the public. In 2019, voluntary income was £209,368 (2018 - £130,067), up 61%. A grant of £7,000 was also received to assist with the costs of the SarcoidosisUK Nurse Helpline.

Direct donations from individuals resulted in income of £71,906 (2018 – £47,071) and were our largest source of funds. In addition, Just Giving resulted in income of £48,972 (2018 - £47,071) and Facebook donations produced income of £28,087 (2018 - £9,106). The charity also received a legacy of £27,000 during the year.

Expenditure in 2019 has increased to £176,169 (2018 - £161,519), up 9%. This was mainly due to an increase in fundraising expenses to £40,598 (2018 - £28,794)

Reserves policy

The trustees aim to maintain free reserves in unrestricted funds at a level which equates to approximately six months of unrestricted charitable expenditure. The trustees consider that this level will provide sufficient funds to respond to applications for grants and ensure that there are sufficient funds available to cover support and governance costs.

Notes to the accounts

1. Accounting Policies

(a) Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared under the historic cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant notes. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued October 2019 and the Charities Act 2011.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS102.

(b) Fund structure

The charity had up to 31 December 2014 a single unrestricted general fund. In 2015 it was decided that a designated fund of £180,000 be set up to fund research. The funds set aside were largely utilised by the end of 2017. In 2019, the residual balance was transferred back to the general fund.

(c) Incoming resources

All incoming resources are recognised once the charity has entitlement to the resources, it is certain that the resources will be received and the monetary value of incoming resources can be measured with sufficient reliability. Incoming resources comprise:

(d) Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as resources expended as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to the expenditure. All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category.

(e) Allocation of overhead and support costs

Where relevant, any support costs have been allocated to an appropriate charitable activity in 2019.

(f) Governance costs

Governance costs comprise all costs involving the public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice. These costs are detailed in note 5.

(g) Depreciation

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write off the assets over their estimated useful lives on the following basis:
