Activities

1. Quran Conference 2019

A Quran conference was held in 2019 in Bolton with speakers from across the globe that explored quranic narrative of ideal human being and understanding the life changing teachings, themes and the surah structure of the quran.

The scholars came from Lebanon, Morocco, Turkey and the UK. This was a historic moment as it allowed gathering of such great teachers and provided an opportunity for an audience to listen to pearls of wisdom.

The conference also provided an opportunity to award certificates in Islamic education to sisters – who had excelled in Islamic studies. This was a profound moment in the lives of these students.



2. Health & Wellbeing

A number of specific community events have been delivered across the northwest and nationally that entailed self-development and improving physical and mental wellbeing:

- Sports activities (across all ages and genders)

3. Youth engagement

We provided career advice, job help and support to those coping with mental health. We further provided mentors and life coaching support in areas covering:

- Parenthood.
- Rewiring from addictions. (Including illegal activities) as part of the Self-Purification courses we offer FREE of charge.
- Skills in embracing emotional intelligence with confidence
- Encouraging financial independence through lawful livelihoods.
- Social wellbeing through cohesive interactions virtually or physically.

4. Islamic Classes

Children classes

We aim to teach the future generation youth on becoming the best they can with best Islamic course taught by our highly qualified teachers in our various centres in Hyde, Bolton and Oldham.

Adult Classes

In our various centres adults are given the opportunity to learn the basics of Islam through our qualified teachers. This is about developing communities that are true to the message but further compassionate and cohesive communities

5. International visits

We undertook international Dawah trips to Canada, France and Italy. This provide an opportunity to spread the message of Islam and teach the course of purification and engage with a diverse

audience.

6. International Work

The building construction work of the Pakistan International Zawiyah is nearing completion. This is a great testament to the hard work of the communities involved and volunteers who have fundraised.

They showed great eagerness to support their homelands in an efficient and effective manner.

During our trips to Pakistan and other parts of the world we saw the extent to which people were

Independent examiner's report to the trustees of Muhammadiyah House of Wisdom

I report on the Financial Statements of the Charity for the year ended 31 December 2019 which are set out on pages 11 to 21.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. Notes to the Accounts

Note 1 Basis of preparation

These accounts have been prepared under the historical cost convention with items recognised at cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant note(s) to these accounts.

The accounts have been prepared in accordance with:

- the Statement of Recommended Practice: Accounting and Reporting by Charities
 preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard
 applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) issued on 16 July 2014;
- the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the United Kingdom and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102); and
- with the Charities Act 2011.

The charity constitutes a public benefit entity as defined by FRS 102.

Note 2	Accounting policies
2.1 INCOME

Tax reclaims on donations and gifts	Gift Aid receivable is included in income when there is a valid declaration from the donor. Any Gift Aid amount recovered on a donation is considered to be part of that gift and is treated as an addition to the same fund as the initial donation unless the donor or the terms of the appeal have specified otherwise.

which is the expected proceeds from sale less the expected costs of sale, and recognised in 'Income from other trading activities' with the corresponding stock recognised in the balance sheet. On its sale the value of stock is charged against 'Income from other trading activities' and the proceeds from sale are also recognised as 'Income from other trading activities'.

Goods donated for on-going use by the charity are recognised as tangible fixed assets and included in the SoFA as incoming resources when receivable.

Gifts in kind for use by the charity are included in the SoFA as income from donations when receivable.

Donated services and facilities

Donated services and facilities are included in the SOFA when received at the value of the gift to the charity provided the value of the gift can be measured reliably.

Donated services and facilities that are consumed immediately are recognised as income with an equivalent amount recognised as an expense under the appropriate heading in the SOFA.

Support costs

The charity has incurred expenditure on support costs.

Volunteer help

The value of any voluntary help received is not included in the accounts but is described in the trustees' annual report.

2.2 EXPENDITURE AND LIABILITIES

Liability recognition

Liabilities are recognised where it is more likely than not that there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to pay out resources and the amount of the obligation can be measured with reasonable certainty.

Governance and support costs

Support costs have been allocated between governance costs and other support. Governance costs comprise all costs involving public accountability of the charity and its compliance with regulation and good practice.

Support costs include central functions and have been allocated to activity cost categories on a basis consistent with the use of resources, eg allocating property costs by floor areas, or per capita, staff costs by the time spent and other costs by their usage.
