TRUSTEES' REPORT (INCLUDING DIRECTORS' REPORT) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

The trustees present their report and financial statements for the year ended 31 March 2020.

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the accounting policies set out in note 1 to the financial statements and comply with the charity's memorandum and articles of association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)".

Objectives and activities

Purposes and aims

The charity is constituted as a company limited by guarantee and is therefore governed by a memorandum and articles of association. The directors of the company are also trustees of the charity.

Our charity's purposes as set out in the objects contained in the company's memorandum of association are:-

- provide and maintain a community based women's centre, by women for women, in the interests of social welfare with the objects of improving the life of women and girls.
- to relieve the distress of women and teenage girls who have experienced or are experiencing sexual abuse and sexual violence and/or domestic abuse and support all victims to access appropriate services.
- · to educate and raise awareness of these issues.
- to train to a professional standard all those that will provide services that further the purposes of the company.

The restrictions in the charity's activities imposed by its memorandum and articles of association are that the income and property shall be applied solely towards the promotion of its objects and no portion shall be paid out by way of profit and no member of the charity or its trustees shall receive any remuneration from the charity other than for services rendered or for out-of-pocket expenses.

Ensuring our work delivers our aims

We review our aims, objectives and activities each year. This review looks at what we have achieved and the outcomes of our work in the last twelve months. This review looks at the success of each project which The Women's Centre Cornwall has undertaken during that period and what benefits they have given to the women and teenage girls it had hoped to help. The review also helps us to ensure that our aims, objectives and activities remain focussed on our stated purposes and give the trustees the opportunity to consider how planned activities will contribute to the aim and objects they have set. We have referred to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing our aims and objectives and in planning our future activities.

The trustees have paid due regard to guidance issued by the Charity Commission in deciding what activities the charity should undertake.

A review of the charitable activities of The Women's Centre Cornwall over the past twelve months

The Women's Centre Cornwall provided free confidential services for women and girls, regardless of race, ethnicity, age, ability and other discriminatory factors which include providing helplines, outreach and one to one support, advocacy and counselling services, training and volunteering opportunities. This year we have

- Delivered a range of support services to victims of sexual and/or domestic violence.
- Delivered Criminal Justice Intervention Services across Cornwall, Devon and Dorset.
- Supported through our Community Engagement Project hard to reach groups in Cornwall including women with learning difficulties/disabilities and autism, from migrant communities and older women survivors of violence and abuse.
- Through our Women and Girls in The Lead Project we have commenced the roll out of the Womens Centre Cornwall across the county through a Hub and Spoke model.
- · Successfully undertaken fundraising activities.
- · Employed 35 staff.
- Trained and supported volunteers and mentors.
- · Attend numerous boards and meetings appropriate to our work and projects.
- Trained a range of other agencies.

Impact of Covid-19

In March 2020, The Women's Centre Cornwall shifted to a largely remote working operation in response to the Covid-19 pandemic. Staff, mentors, volunteers and service users adapted extraordinarily well to the changes which saw the vast majority of support continued, albeit by telephone and online platforms. Not all women have been able to access remote support. Very often this is due to childcare issues and lack of privacy but digital and telephone poverty have also been an issue. To address this, our Open service has provided mobile telephones for some women and have offered outdoor outreach visits where essential. Face-to-face support for sexual abuse and domestic violence is due to recommence on a small scale from the end of July for those women who are unable to access remote support.

Our funders have been universally supportive throughout this very challenging time and we would like to take this opportunity to thank them for their understanding and flexibility which has ensured that women have continued to receive our vital services.

The focus of our work

The charity's objects and principal activities for the year continued to be:-

- Provide and maintain a community based women's centre, by women for women, in the interests of social welfare with the objects of improving the life of women and girls.
- To relieve the distress of women and teenage girls who have experienced or are experiencing sexual abuse and sexual violence and/or domestic abuse and support all victims to access appropriate services.
- · To educate and raise awareness of these issues.
- To train to a professional standard all those that will provide services that further the purposes of the company.

Contribution of volunteers

The Womens Centre Cornwall have 45 volunteers and 22 mentors who have offered a total of 2,285 hours of support.

Who used and benefited from our services

Our Main Achievements in 2019/2020

- We supported 499 victims/survivors of Sexual Violence and Domestic Abuse.
- We supported 433 women through the Open Project.
- We Supported 65 young women and girls aged 11- 18 through the Young Empowered Women Project.
- 14 Volunteer Support Workers trained during the year with 45 supported to deliver support services.
- 14 Open Peer Mentors trained and 40 Mentees supported.
- · Help line support delivered 806 calls.
- We delivered 1,371 sessions of face-to-face sexual abuse/ domestic violence support.
- Website views to access information, support and guidance: 62,249.
- Our Community Engagement Project: trained and supported the DIVAs Group (women with learning disabilities) to provide 8 training sessions to 124 people.
- We ran and supported an International Women's Group.
- The Diva's ran workshops at the Rape Crisis National Conference.
- · We ran a Women and Learning Disability Advisory Group.
- · We initiated and ran an Older Women's Advisory Group.
- · We publicly launched our Older Women's Network and 'The Chilling Silence' Report.
- · We launched the Women and Girls in the Lead project.
- We formed the 'Peninsula Women's Alliance' with the Sunflower Women's Centre Plymouth and Resilient Women Exeter and jointly ran the Navigator Project.
- · We organized a Reclaim the Night Event and March in Truro.
- We held an International Women's Day Event for women in our local community in Bodmin.
- We delivered POWER Programme Train The Trainer courses to 4 Rape Crisis Centre across the country.
- Our spoke in Bude held a number of community fundraising events including a Christmas Craft Fayre and Coffee Clubs.
- We initiated and formed a Specialist Providers Group for the specialist third sector Sexual Violence and Domestic Abuse organisations in Cornwall.
- Our Chief Executive retired after 22 years in post and we recruited a new Chief Executive.

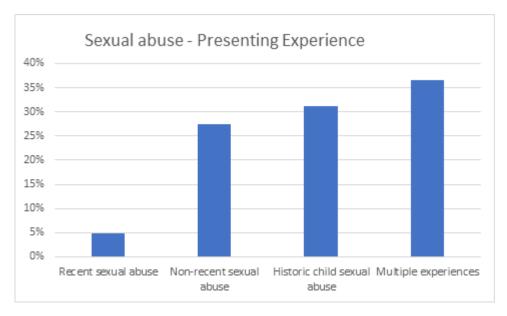

Women, girls and young women seeking support are never charged for receiving our services. We fund our services through multiple sources including grants, contracts, donations and fundraising.

Sexual Abuse Services

The majority of women who seek our support have experienced multiple forms of abuse. Historic child sexual abuse continues to be the most common form of abuse that women engaging in our service have experienced. For girls and young women, aged 11-17, help-seeking



The projects which TWCC has undertaken in the past twelve months to achieve its purposes and aims are listed below: -

- Run a Rape and Sexual Abuse Helpline and Support Service offering daily helpline and outreach services to victims and survivors of sexual violence.
- Run a Domestic Violence Helpline and Support Service offering a twice weekly helpline plus outreach services to victims and survivors of domestic violence.
- Employed five Specialised Support Workers to provide support and counselling to victims and survivors with complex needs.
- Run a Young Empowered Women's Project to offer young women specialist support and also provide a range of creative groupwork and activities.
- · Provided trauma informed bodywork sessions.
- Delivered the Open Project in partnership with Working Links Ltd/Seetec Ltd across Devon, Dorset and Cornwall providing services to women offenders and those at risk of offending including two Navigator workers.

- Provided a peer mentoring service to bring additionality to the Open work.
- Delivered the Community Engagement Project working with hard to reach groups and individuals in our local communities. In particular those with learning disabilities, migrant women and older women.
- Delivered the Women and Girls in the Lead project engaging with women and girls in their local communities to develop a Hub and Spoke model of the Women's Centre Cornwall.
- Delivered Building Better Opportunities programmes in partnership with Pluss/Positive People and Learning Partnership Cornwall/ Working Together.
- Provided training and educational events to local, regional and national organisations and agencies to raise awareness of the issues related to sexual violence and domestic violence thus promoting better provision, prevention and protection.

Reserves Policy

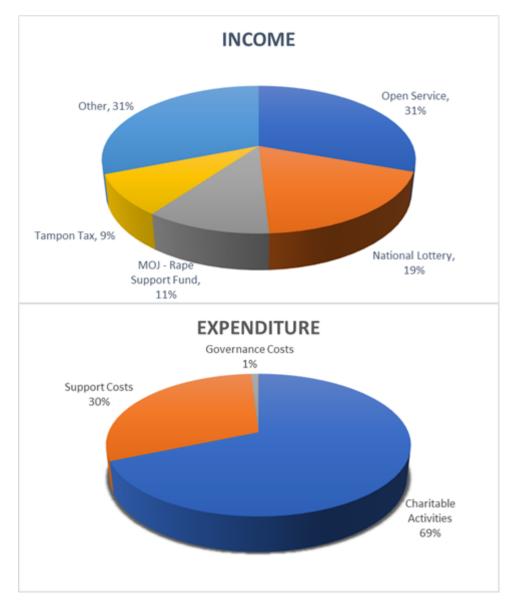
It is the policy of the charity that unrestricted funds which have not been designated for a specific use should be maintained at a level equivalent to between three and six month's expenditure. The trustees considers that reserves at this level will ensure that, in the event of a significant drop in funding, they will be able to continue the charity's current activities while consideration is given to ways in which additional funds may be raised. This level of reserves has been maintained throughout the year.

Principal fundraising sources

The principal fundraising sources for the charity are currently by way of grants from Charitable Trusts, and funding from the Ministry of Justice and DDC Community Rehabilitation Company.



Investment policy

Aside from retaining a prudent amount in reserves each year, most of the charity's funds are to be spent in the short term so there are few funds for long term investment. The reserves of the charity are placed in an interest bearing deposit account which is wholly utilised to support existing activities.

The trustees has assessed the major risks to which the charity is exposed, and are satisfied that systems are in place to mitigate exposure to the major risks.

Plans for the future

Currently TWCC receives a small amount of core funding from the Ministry of Justice through the Rape Support Fund. All the work delivered is short term project based. As the potential sources of short term funding are rapidly becoming exhausted, the need to secure long-term core funding is a priority of the charity.

Structure, governance and management

The organisation is a charitable company limited by guarantee. It was incorporated on 2 November 2001 under the Companies Act 1985 with company number 4316197 and commenced operation on 1 April 2004. It was registered as a charity with effect from 1 April 2004 with charity number 1099348, having taken over the reserves of the non incorporated charity, Women's Rape and Sexual Abuse Centre (Cornwall) (WRSAC) on that date. This charity was initially formed in 1994 with charity number 1054177. The company was established under a Memorandum of Association which established the objects and powers of the charitable company and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1. The governing document was amended to The Womens Centre Cornwall and posted on 23rd April 2018.

The directors of the company are also charity trustees for the purposes of charity law and under the company's articles are known as members of the Board of Trustees. Any trustee so appointed shall retain office only until they make up 1/3 of the longest standing trustees. At this point, they will resign at the next annual general meeting but shall then be eligible for re-election. The trustees may from time to time and at any time appoint/co-opt any female person as a trustee either to fill a vacancy that may occur or by way of addition to the trustees, provided that the prescribed maximum is not exceeded.

All members of the Board of Trustees give their time voluntarily and receive no benefits from the charity.

In an effort to maintain a broad skill mix, members of the management committee are requested to provide a list of their skills and this is updated each year.

Organisational structure

The governance of the organisation is undertaken by TWCC's Board of Trustees. Financial management is overseen by the treasurer and decisions on financial matters are made by recommendations through consultation with the Chief Executive and Finance Manager with final decisions resting with the whole Board of Trustees. The Women's Centre Cornwall has a Board of Trustees of up to twelve members who meet bimonthly and are responsible for the strategic direction and policy of the charity. At present the Board has seven members from a variety of professional backgrounds relevant to the work of the charity. The secretary also sits on the Board but has no voting rights.

Induction and training of trustees

All trustees receive a trustee handbook which includes all current policies. Trustees are given access to various in-house and online training on an ongoing basis.

Remuneration policy for key management personnel

The trustees consider the Chief Executive Officer and the Finance Manager to comprise the key management personnel of the charity.

The pay of the senior staff is reviewed annually and normally increased in accordance with average earnings. In view of the nature of the charity, the Trustees benchmark against pay levels in other similar organisations.

Public benefit

The trustees confirm that they have complied with the duty under Section 4 of the Companies Act 2006 to have due regards to the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit.

Related parties

The Women's Centre is a member of Rape Crisis England & Wales and the End Violence Against Women Coalition.

The charity sits on the local Cornwall Domestic Violence Strategic Group and the Sexual Assault Referral Centre Delivery Group. It is an active member of Cornwall Disability Forum and Cornwall Volunteer Forum.

Auditor

RRL LLP were appointed as auditor to the company and a resolution proposing that they be re-appointed will be put at a General Meeting.

Disclosure of information to auditor

Each of the trustees has confirmed that there is no information of which they are aware which is relevant to the audit, but of which the auditor is unaware. They have further confirmed that they have taken appropriate steps to identify such relevant information and to establish that the auditor is aware of such information.

Opinion

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

1 Accounting policies

Charity information

The Women's Centre Cornwall Ltd is a private company limited by guarantee incorporated in England and Wales. The registered office is Peat House, Newham Road, TRURO, Cornwall, TR1 2DP. In the event of winding up, registered members are liable to contribute a sum not exceeding £1 per member towards the debts and liabilities of the charity and the costs and expenses of winding up, or within one year after he or she ceases to be a member. At 31 March 2020 there were 92 members.

1.1 Accounting convention

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the charity's Memorandum & Articles of Association, the Companies Act 2006 and "Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)". The charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS 102.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest \mathfrak{L} .

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

1.2 Going concern

At the time of approving the financial statements, the trustees have a reasonable expectation that the charity has adequate resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future. Thus the trustees continue to adopt the going concern basis of accounting in preparing the financial statements.

1.3 Charitable funds

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees in furtherance of their charitable objectives.

Restricted funds are subject to specific conditions by donors as to how they may be used. The purposes and uses of the restricted funds are set out in the notes to the financial statements.

1.4 Incoming resources

Income is recognised when the charity is legally entitled to it after any performance conditions have been met, the amounts can be measured reliably, and it is probable that income will be received.

Cash donations are recognised on receipt. Other donations are recognised once the charity has been notified of the donation, unless performance conditions require deferral of the amount.

Legacies are recognised on receipt or otherwise if the charity has been notified of an impending distribution, the amount is known, and receipt is expected. If the amount is not known, the legacy is treated as a contingent asset.

1.5 Resources expended

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Support costs include head office salaries and overheads, and are allocated to charitable activities and funds on the basis of staff hours.

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

1.6 Tangible fixed assets

Tangible fixed assets costing over £1,000 are initially measured at cost and subsequently measured at cost or valuation, net of depreciation and any impairment losses.

Depreciation is recognised so as to write off the cost or valuation of assets less their residual values over their useful lives on the following bases:

Leasehold improvements 5% - 33% straight line Plant and equipment 25% straight line

The gain or loss arising on the disposal of an asset is determined as the difference between the sale proceeds and the carrying value of the asset, and is recognised in net income/(expenditure) for the year.

1.7 Impairment of fixed assets

At each reporting end date, the charity reviews the carrying amounts of its tangible assets to determine whether there is any indication that those assets have suffered an impairment loss. If any such indication exists, the recoverable amount of the asset is estimated in order to determine the extent of the impairment loss (if any).

1.8 Cash and cash equivalents

Cash and cash equivalents include cash in hand, deposits held at call with banks, other short-term liquid investments with original maturities of three months or less, and bank overdrafts. Bank overdrafts are shown within borrowings in current liabilities.

1.9 Financial instruments

The charity has elected to apply the provisions of Section 11 'Basic Financial Instruments' and Section 12 'Other Financial Instruments Issues' of FRS 102 to all of its financial instruments.

Financial instruments are recognised in the charity's balance sheet when the charity becomes party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Financial assets and liabilities are offset, with the net amounts presented in the financial statements, when there is a legally enforceable right to set off the recognised amounts and there is an intention to settle on a net basis or to realise the asset and settle the liability simultaneously.

Basic financial assets

Basic financial assets, which include debtors and cash and bank balances, are initially measured at transaction price including transaction costs and are subsequently carried at amortised cost using the effective interest method unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the transaction is measured at the present value of the future receipts discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial assets classified as receivable within one year are not amortised.



NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS (CONTINUED) FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31 MARCH 2020

1 Accounting policies

(Continued)

Basic financial liabilities

Basic financial liabilities, including creditors and bank loans are initially recognised at transaction price unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where the debt instrument is measured at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest. Financial liabilities classified as payable within one year are not amortised.

Debt instruments are subsequently carried at amortised cost, using the effective interest rate method.

Trade creditors are obligations to pay for goods or services that have been acquired in the ordinary course of operations from suppliers. Amounts payable are classified as current liabilities if payment is due within one year or less. If not, they are presented as non-current liabilities. Trade creditors are recognised initially at transaction price and subsequently measured at amortised cost using the effective interest method.

Derecognition of financial liabilities

Financial liabilities are derecognised when the charity's contractual obligations expire or are discharged or cancelled.

1.10 Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

1.11 Employee benefits

The cost of any unused holiday entitlement is recognised in the period in which the employee's services are received.

Termination benefits are recognised immediately as an expense when the charity is demonstrably committed to terminate the employment of an employee or to provide termination benefits.

1.12 Retirement benefits

Payments to defined contribution retirement benefit schemes are charged as an expense as they fall due.

2 Critical accounting estimates and judgements

In the application of the charity's accounting policies, the trustees are required to make judgements, estimates and assumptions about the carrying amount of assets and liabilities that are not readily apparent from other sources. The estimates and associated assumptions are based on historical experience and other factors that are considered to be relevant. Actual results may differ from these estimates.

The estimates and underlying assumptions are reviewed on an ongoing basis. Revisions to accounting estimates are recognised in the period in which the estimate is revised where the revision affects only that period, or in the period of the revision and future periods where the revision affects both current and future periods.
