Structure, governance and management

Governing document

Exeter City Community Trust is a charitable company limited by guarantee, incorporated on January 15, 2007 and registered as a charity on November 14, 2007. The company is exempt under section 60 of the Companies Act 2006 from the requirement to use the word 'limited'.

The company was established under a Memorandum of Association and is governed under its Articles of Association. In the event of the company being wound up members are required to contribute an amount not exceeding £1.

The charity changed its name from Exeter City Football in the Community on January 26, 2017.

Appointment of trustees

The management of the charity is the responsibility of the trustees who are elected under the terms of the Articles of Association. Under the terms of a Service Level Agreement with Exeter City A.F.C. Limited that company is entitled to nominate a minimum of two trustees to serve on the board.

It is the responsibility of the existing trustees to formally induct and train incoming trustees about the policies of Exeter City Community Trust. The current organisation structure of the board of Exeter City Community Trust is the chair with eight other trustees. Decisions are taken at regular board meetings attended by the trustees.

Risk management

The trustees regularly review and assess the procedures and formats for risk assessment to ensure that they continue to meet the needs of the charity to fulfil its responsibilities.

Objectives and activities

The objectives of the charity are to assist in the social and physical education of children, young people and adults of all ages within Exeter and its surrounding area, through sports related activities, including football. Since the name change in 2017, we have been looking to position ourselves as a leading health and well-being charity in the South West and all of our activities look to help us achieve that objective.

The charity contributes to the community through the provision of sports-related programmes focused on social inclusion, education, health and well-being.

The charity utilises its local and national partners' resources to help design and deliver programmes which create opportunities for all participants.

The trustees are aware of their obligation to make provision for the less advantaged for whom funding is a major issue. Accordingly, the charity targets those who are perceived as socially excluded from mainstream provision by offering specially developed programmes which are accessible and affordable.

The charity ensures opportunities to participate will be open to all, regardless of age, ability, gender, race, sexual orientation or religion.

The trustees confirm that they have had regard to the guidance contained in the Charity Commission's general guidance on public benefit when reviewing the charity's aims and objectives and in planning future activities.

Activities and achieving objectives

The charity develops links with the community by inspiring people to become involved in four major areas of work:

- Multi-Sports Development and Participation engaging people in a range of sporting opportunities;
- Education encouraging lifelong learning through innovative educational courses;
- Health tackling issues to improve health and well-being; and
- Social Inclusion providing opportunities for excluded young people in deprived communities and those with special needs.

Achievements and performance

Multi-Sports Development and Participation

This section of the charity works to encourage children of all ages between three and eighteen to participate in structured, professional sports coaching and physical activity sessions run in safe and secure environments across Devon and Somerset. These sessions help to improve motivation, co-ordination, health and confidence. Projects include children's holiday clubs - both football, multi-sport and individual sports, coaching in schools via extra-curricular clubs for primary schools and satellite clubs for secondary schools and community groups. Also provided are curriculum-time PE sessions, weekly Grecian Tots clubs for three to six year olds, Grecian Kickers for 7-14s, Grecian Girls and Wild Cats (weekly girls only football clubs for 5-14s), inter- and intra- school/club tournaments and multi-sport courses. We have a primary school sports programme funded by the Premier League (called PL Primary Stars) which aims to support/up-skill teachers and to offer the children more competition opportunities, literacy, numeracy, PSHE and enterprise skills. In 2019, we hosted our first girls' residential summer camp in Taunton and now have a football training programme for all students at Queens College Taunton having previously limited this to boarders.

The Charity has successfully provided a pathway for female players into local college football academies, university teams and women's clubs. The success of this pathway has largely been down to the Girls Development Centre and introducing a women's development team playing in the Devon Women's League which further develops a pathway to the main City Women's side.

Education

Our education programmes for young people and adults aim to develop and support individuals by providing a positive educational journey. Projects delivered include NCFE Level 2 Certificate in Health and Fitness in partnership with ISCA College and a Futsal Academy which offers Level 2 Certificates & Level 3 BTEC Diplomas for 16-19 year olds, functional and life skills courses and a Foundation degree (FdA) in Football Coaching and Development delivered in partnership and registered with Exeter College. Other Education & Football Development programmes are run at Teignmouth Community School and Kings College Taunton (14-19 age group). We also run a traineeship programme called Train to Succeed for the unemployed/NEET (16-18 and 19-24 age groups) which up-skill young people with employability skills to enable them to become work-ready.

Health

Our aim is to improve health and wellbeing within our community by tackling health issues through improved knowledge and understanding. Projects include: after-school and curriculum health-awareness sessions (a project called +Sport) funded by Kinder, multiple running clubs for all abilities, over-35s Masters football and four over-55s walking football hubs. We also deliver a weekly table tennis Hub Club for juniors and adults at St James Park. We coordinate six mass-participation running events - a half marathon, a marathon, a spring warm up marathon event, a Halloween fun run and a 5K Santa run. The marathon event includes a 2-mile children's running challenge covering the last two miles of the course. Our sporting memories sessions for those over-55s who may feel socially isolated has been expanded and there are now groups who meet in Exeter, Exmouth, Tiverton and Okehampton. Through Wellbeing Exeter and the Sport England Local Delivery Pilot, we have been able to employ two new members of staff who are community physical activity organisers (a third to follow later in 2020). They help complement the work of Wellbeing Exeter by creating physical activity opportunities in targeted areas of Exeter for individuals and groups.

Social Inclusion

Working with socially excluded and disadvantaged young people living in deprived communities, we aim to improve lives through the power of sport and physical activity. Projects include an inclusion programme, PL Kicks, which is a multi-sport activity delivered in areas of high need in Exeter and East Devon, these areas are often linked to low socio-economic status. Our disability football project offers a huge range of physical, social and mental wellbeing benefits. Activities, which are funded through Devon County Council and the Northbrook Community Trust include Ability Counts, junior disability holiday courses, Down's syndrome football opportunities, sessions for deaf participants and weekly Power-Chair football sessions which has enabled us to set up an Exeter City Power-Chair team competing in a South West league. Through the Wembley National Stadium Trust, we have secured two years extra funding for our Every Player Counts programme.

We operate a dedicated girls' Player Development Centre for under 10s, 12s, 14s and 16s which feeds into the Exeter College Women's Football Academy and the Exeter City Women's teams all of which are delivered by ourselves.

NCS (National Citizen Service), the government funded and driven initiative, has become embedded in the Social Inclusion arm of the Charity with nearly 400 young people graduating through the programme in summer 2019 and a further 30 in the Autumn. In addition, an NCS residential course was run in conjunction with Exeter College Public Service Faculty providing an induction to the college for 60 students.

As part of our inclusive programme of activities, we work alongside a group of footballers from the LGBTQ+ community offering support, advice and guidance. We help the committee to coordinate the Isca Apollo team and set up friendly affiliated football matches.

We also run projects with HMP Exeter and Channings Wood through workshops in leadership and mentoring with the aim of reducing reoffending.

Plans for the future

The charity will continue to deliver inclusive health, sports and physical activity related projects which provide educational inclusion opportunities for children, young people and adults. Through our business development role, we have been able to engage with our community/business partners and obtain invaluable sponsorship. We continue to expand the charity's database to include all who benefit from the charity, as well as those who buy services from or contribute to the charity in terms of funding, goodwill or volunteer hours.

Our marketing strategy to develop the ECCT brand name has enabled us to increase recognition and understanding of the charity and its activities to better promote the diverse nature and spread of services offered. In 2019, this culminated in a highly successful fundraising event at Powderham Castle and we were delighted when our hosts for the night, the Earl and Countess of Devon, agreed to become patrons of our Charity. We were also proud to be chosen as the Lord Mayor of Exeter's charity of the year for 2019/20.

We deliver sports development and commercial usage of the facilities on behalf of Exeter College at their Exwick Sports Hub and Sports Hall/Gym and the charity continues to investigate opportunities to obtain new facilities within the greater Exeter area which would allow it to expand its activities outside of its traditional Exeter city centre base.

A new project is a prison-based partnership developed with a national Twinning Project foundation headed up by David Dein, ex-vice chairman of Arsenal which pairs football club charities with their local prison. Three eight-week projects were planned but have had to be put on hold for the time being.

Plans for the future (continued)

There is also a programme for young people aged 10-17 who are in or are in danger of becoming part of the criminal justice system. We are heading up a Devon based project as part of a national scheme run by sixteen local authorities. The aim is to improve attendance at school, attitude, confidence, leadership, volunteering as well as physical objectives.

As a result of funding from the European Social Fund, we have been able to set up an employability programme for those long term unemployed between 40- mid 60s called Positive Prospect. This looks to provide work placement opportunities and ICT skills.

Inevitably, the impact of Covid 19 has put many of the Charity's plans for 2020/21 on hold and we are still assessing the long-term impact on the Charity and its users. We have combined with Exeter City Council through their Exeter Community Wellbeing campaign to help support the local community through delivering prescriptions, food parcels, activity packs as well as collecting and delivering shopping for those who are vulnerable and self-isolating. Of importance post pandemic will be for the Charity to concentrate on community cohesion, mental health issues, vulnerable children, employment/NEET programmes and virtual delivery.

Our NCS programme has had to adapt this summer because of the pandemic but we still intend to deliver some social action programmes in a safe environment as well as a mainstream programme in October. In addition, we will be working with Exeter College to deliver three programmes to public service, outdoor education, travel and tourist and Futsal students in September. We have accessed £24,000 to deliver a project to tackle loneliness for the over 70s. This will be done though making outbound phone calls, online social connections, support by post, 'garden gate' conversations and delivery through NCS and will be a joint venture with our football club.

Throughout the pandemic, we have ensured that the monitoring of the Charity's cash flow has been a priority and we have been very grateful to the government for its furlough scheme and also the continuing support of the EFL, the Premier League and our other sponsors. While the future remains uncertain, the Charity remains in good financial shape and will be able to continue supporting our local community throughout this crisis.

Financial review

The net incoming resources for the period were £58,016 (2019: £46,264) resulting in accumulated funds carried forward of £444,409, of which £397,539 (2019: £331,645) are unrestricted funds. At current activity levels unrestricted funds represent approximately 4.0 months (2019: 3.4 months) of operating costs, and the trustees will continue their efforts to build up unrestricted funds in accordance with the charity's reserves policy (see below) in order that the Trust's increasing range of activities, both in terms of scope and geographical coverage, are supported by a strong financial base.

Reserves policy

The trustees continue to monitor the percentage of operating costs which should be retained as unrestricted reserves to cover eventualities such as short term cash flow problems or the sudden loss of a funding source to ensure the charity can continue to run efficiently and maintain its programme of activities. To this end, the trustees aim to have six months operating costs in reserve when practicable, at 31 January 2020 the charity's free reserves amounted to £384,739.

Notes to the Financial Statements

Year ended 31 January 2020

1. General information

The charity is a public benefit entity and a private company limited by guarantee, registered in England and Wales and a registered charity in England and Wales. The address of the registered office is St James Park, Stadium Way, Exeter, Devon, EX4 6PX, UK.

2. Statement of compliance

These financial statements have been prepared in compliance with FRS 102, 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and the Republic of Ireland', the Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (Charities SORP (FRS 102)) and the Companies Act 2006.

3. Accounting policies

Basis of preparation

The financial statements have been prepared on the historical cost basis, as modified by the revaluation of certain financial assets and liabilities and investment properties measured at fair value through income or expenditure.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the entity.

Going concern

There are no material uncertainties about the charity's ability to continue.

Judgements and key sources of estimation uncertainty

The preparation of the financial statements requires management to make judgements, estimates and assumptions that affect the amounts reported. These estimates and judgements are continually reviewed and are based on experience and other factors, including expectations of future events that are believed to be reasonable under the circumstances. We confirm that there are no significant estimates and judgements.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds are available for use at the discretion of the trustees to further any of the charity's purposes.

Restricted funds are subjected to restrictions on their expenditure declared by the donor or through the terms of an appeal, and fall into one of two sub-classes: restricted income funds or endowment funds.

3. Accounting policies (continued)

Incoming resources

All income is included in the statement of financial activities when entitlement has passed to the charity, it is probable that the economic benefits associated with the transaction will flow to the charity and the amount can be reliably measured. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- income from donations or grants is recognised when there is evidence of entitlement to the gift, receipt is probable and its amount can be measured reliably.
- income from contracts for the supply of services is recognised with the delivery of the contracted service. This is classified as unrestricted funds unless there is a contractual requirement for it to be spent on a particular purpose and returned if unspent, in which case it may be regarded as restricted.

Resources expended

Expenditure is recognised on an accruals basis as a liability is incurred. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is classified under headings of the statement of financial activities to which it relates:

- expenditure on charitable activities includes all costs incurred by a charity in undertaking activities that further its charitable aims for the benefit of its beneficiaries, including those support costs and costs relating to the governance of the charity apportioned to charitable activities.

All costs are allocated to expenditure categories reflecting the use of the resource. Direct costs attributable to a single activity are allocated directly to that activity. Shared costs are apprortioned between the activities they contribute to on a reasonable, justifiable and consistent basis.

Tangible assets

Tangible assets are initially recorded at cost, and subsequently stated at cost less any accumulated depreciation and impairment losses. Any tangible assets carried at revalued amounts are recorded at the fair value at the date of revaluation less any subsequent accumulated depreciation and subsequent accumulated impairment losses.

An increase in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of a revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, unless it reverses a charge for impairment that has previously been recognised as expenditure within the statement of financial activities. A decrease in the carrying amount of an asset as a result of revaluation, is recognised in other recognised gains and losses, except to which it offsets any previous revaluation gain, in which case the loss is shown within other recognised gains and losses on the statement of financial activities.

Depreciation

Depreciation is calculated so as to write off the cost or valuation of an asset, less its residual value, over the useful economic life of that asset as follows:

Plant and machinery

25% straight line

Fixtures and fittings

25% straight line

Motor vehicles

25% straight line

Equipment

15% straight line

Impairment of fixed assets

A review for indicators of impairment is carried out at each reporting date, with the recoverable amount being estimated where such indicators exist. Where the carrying value exceeds the recoverable amount, the asset is impaired accordingly. Prior impairments are also reviewed for possible reversal at each reporting date.

For the purposes of impairment testing, when it is not possible to estimate the recoverable amount of an individual asset, an estimate is made of the recoverable amount of the cash-generating unit to which the asset belongs. The cash-generating unit is the smallest identifiable group of assets that includes the asset and generates cash inflows that largely independent of the cash inflows from other assets or groups of assets.

For impairment testing of goodwill, the goodwill acquired in a business combination is, from the acquisition date, allocated to each of the cash-generating units that are expected to benefit from the synergies of the combination, irrespective of whether other assets or liabilities of the charity are assigned to those units.

Financial instruments

A financial asset or a financial liability is recognised only when the entity becomes a party to the contractual provisions of the instrument.

Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at the amount receivable or paable including any related transaction costs, unless the arrangement constitutes a financing transaction, where it is recognised at the present value of the future payments discounted at a market rate of interest for a similar debt instrument.

Current assets and current liabilities are subsequently measured at the cash or other consideration expected to be paid or received and not discounted.

Financial assets that are measured at cost or amortised cost are reviewed for objective evidence of impairment at the end of each reporting date. If there is objective evidence of impairment, an impairment loss is recognised under the appropriate heading in the statement of financial activities in which the initial gain was recognised.

Any reversals of impairment are recognised immediately, to the extent that the reversal does not result in a carrying amount of the financial asset that exceeds what the carrying amount would have been had the impairment not previously been recognised.

Defined contribution plans

Contributions to defined contribution plans are recognised as an expense in the period in which the related service is provided. Prepaid contributions are recognised as an asset to the extent that the prepayment will lead to a reduction in future payments or a cash refund.

When contributions are not expected to be settled wholly within 12 months of the end of the reporting date in which the employees render the related service, the liability is measured on a discounted present value basis. The unwinding of the discount is recognised as an expense in the period in which it arises.

4. Limited by guarantee

The trust is a company limited by guarantee and has no share capital. In the event of the charity being wound up the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1.

Every Player Counts

Funding for the development of disability football.

C Fraser Memorial Fund

Funding received in memory of Catherine Fraser to support an annual girls' football tournament.

Fundraising - Prostate Cancer UK

A fundraising tournament for Prostate Cancer UK, also promoting awareness of prostate cancer.

Get on Track

A programme funded by Sports England and delivered in partnership with Active Devon aiming to get NEET young people back to work by giving them the opportunity to be mentored by world class athletes with knowledge and experience of facing adversity and overcoming the odds to succeed.

Active Communities

An initiative using sport as a pathway into education, training and employment.

Get Active Exeter

A project aiming to make Exeter the most active city in the South West by encouraging working aged adults and their families to embed physical activity into daily routines.

Exeter Sports Fund

A joint initiative in partnership with Exeter City Council, Active Devon and the Exeter Express and Echo to fund grants every quarter to individuals and clubs involved in sport in the Exeter area.

Traineeships

Funding to give young people aged 16 to 18 the opportunity to gain work experience and learn new skills, offering career progression paths within a sport and leisure environment.
