Annual Report For the year ended 31st December 2019

Aim and Purpose

St. Margaret's Parochial Church Council (the PCC) has the responsibility of cooperating with the Team Rector, the Reverend Derek Arnold, together with the Team Vicar, the Reverend Roger Elkes, the Team Curate, the Reverend Sue Davies-Fletcher and the Associate Priest, the Reverend Sandra Juniper, in promoting the ecclesiastical parish, working together with our partners in the Torridge Coastal Mission Community, in the pastoral, evangelistic, social and ecumenical mission of the Church. As well as the Church itself, the PCC is also responsible for maintaining the Churchyard adjacent to the Church.

Objectives and Activities

The PCC is committed to enabling as many people as possible to worship at our church, and to become part of our parish family. When planning our activities, the PCC has considered the public benefit, and in particular the advancement of religion. Our services and worship put faith into practice through prayer and scripture, music and sacrament. We try to enable ordinary people to live out their faith as part of our parish family, through our Vision and Plan which is kept under review.

- We will nurture and sustain growth in the Christian life by teachings, prayer and proclamation of the Good News.
- We will enable existing churchgoers to be confident in their witness to the ongoing life of Jesus Christ.
- We will engage more with the local community of Northam in loving service, working with others.

To facilitate this work, it is vital that we maintain the fabric of the Church and the Churchyard.

Achievements and Performance

Worship and Prayer

The PCC is keen to offer a range of services not only on Sundays, but also during the week, that our community with find both beneficial and spiritually fulfilling. For example, Wednesday morning Services of Holy Communion and Morning Worship provide a traditional form of service similar to the main Sunday Service. Evening Prayers are continuing with The Reverend Derek and take place weekly at 5pm on Mondays.

At present there are 53 parishioners on the Church Electoral Roll, most of whom live in the Parish and 6 were removed, either because of death or moving away. The average level of Sunday attendance at the 10am Service was 30 but this number increased significantly at Easter, Harvest, Christmas and during the holiday season.

As well as our regular services, we enable our community to celebrate and thank God at the milestones of the journey through life. There have been 4 weddings and 49 funerals during the year. Those who are no longer able to come to Church are not forgotten. We have a Pastoral Care Team in conjunction with St. Mary's, Appledore and Holy Trinity, Westward Ho! and in addition, many receive Holy Communion in their homes.

Schools

Our Church supports both Northam Church of England schools with governors and in-school lessons. The Schools regularly visit the Church for activities and services. We also take part in the Open the Book scheme.

Mission and Evangelism

Helping those in need is a demonstration of our faith. The Committee raised and distributed £1,419.43 which was raised by fundraising, donations and collections and £1,000 from St. Margaret's PCC, usually known as the tithe.

Deanery Synod

Two members of the PCC (Anne Irwin and Paula Martin) sit on the Hartland Deanery Synod and are elected for 3 years; next elections are due to take place in 2020. This provides the PCC with a link with the Churches around us, and also with the Diocese as a whole. It also received reports from the General Synod. The Reverend Derek Arnold is now the Rural Dean.

Church Fabric

The state of the roof is such that St. Margaret's has been on the list of Heritage Buildings 'At Risk' for several years. Members of the Church have worked hard to raise funds for repairs and generous grant support has been obtained from the Heritage Lottery Fund, Northam Town Council and other charities. The Friends of St. Margaret's continue with their 'Sponsor a Slate' campaign to raise the balance of the money required and it was anticipated that repair work would finally start at the beginning of 2019, but due to the unavailability of the slates ,the work did not start on time.

Financial Review

Safeguarding

The PCC has complied with the duty under section 5 of the Safeguarding and Clergy Discipline Measure 2016 (duty to have regard to House of Bishops' guidance on safeguarding children and vulnerable adults). As of December 2019, the few PCC members who have not yet been on the CO and C1 courses are in the process of completing the relevant safeguarding courses.

Volunteers

The members of the PCC would like to thank all the volunteers who work so tirelessly to make our Church a lively and vibrant community. Our special thanks go to The Friends of St. Margaret's for all their hard work in supporting and promoting St. Margaret's.

Structure, Governance and Management

The method of appointment of PCC members is set out in the Church Representation Rules. The Council comprises the Team Rector or Team Vicar, the 2 Churchwardens, the 2 representatives elected to the Deanery Synod, and other members who are elected at the Annual Parochial Church Meeting, by those on the Electoral Roll. Members of the congregation are always urged to join the Electoral Roll, and to stand for election to the PCC.

The PCC members are responsible for making decisions on all matters of general concern and importance in the parish, and for all financial matters. The full PCC met six times during the year, with an average level of attendance of 81%. Given its wide responsibilities, the PCC operates through a number of sub committees, which meet between full meetings of the PCC each dealing with a particular aspect of parish life. These include the Standing Committee which is the only Committee required by law. It has the power to transact the business of the PCC between its meetings, subject to any directions given by the Council. The Worship, Mission and Outreach, Buildings and Finance Committees are the other main Committees. Each is accountable to the full PCC. There is also The Friends of St. Margaret's which organises and co-ordinates the social aspects of the Church.

Administrative Information

The Church is situated in The Square, Northam, EX39 1JL and is part of the Deanery of Hartland, in the Diocese of Exeter. The correspondence address is The Vestry, Tower Street, Northam, EX39 1JL.

The PCC is a body corporate (PCC Powers Measure 1956, and the Church Representation Rules 2006) and a Charity registered with the Charity Commission, number 1133811.

TREASURER'S ANNUAL FINANCIAL REVIEW

FOR THE YEAR ENDED 31ST DECEMBER 2019

The main concern this year was to see the start of the Roof repair project. The aim was to continue to collect donations and find organisations to donate or offer up grants to meet the costs of the project.

The plan had been for the project to start in October 2019 but unfortunately the end of the year arrived and only then did we see initial signs of activity.

With such focus on one project there has been little time or money left for general Parish activities. However, within 2019 the St Margaret's Friends played a large part in ensuring important works were done on the bells and the church tower.

Incoming Funds

I often look at how the Unrestricted Funds do each year when I make my review, because anything restricted has some form of project or is simply the movement in value of investments.

This year the Planned Giving and Gift Aid claimable came to £19,182 in comparison to £19,879 in 2018. This was due to a few deaths in the Parish of regular contributors but by the end of the year Jon Ellis had started to introduce new regular givers to the Parish. At the turn of the year into 2020 Jon also took to checking with all givers whether they would like to keep using envelopes or move to paying directly to the Parish by way of standing order. This has been a positive change and may be a way of bringing more regular giving into the Parish in the future.

The general Collections (open plate) was down from £4,379 in 2018 to £3,977 but we have to bear in mind that with our enthusiasm to collect monies for the Roof Fund will have reduced general unrestricted giving for the time being.

Income from Church Hall Lettings and from investment Dividends and Interest has stayed very similar between years. However, the income from Weddings, Funerals & Stones etc (very few weddings) was double of that in 2018 up to £14,934. Of course, we should never assume a large income from funerals and we will definitely have a hit in this area whilst the Roof Project happens throughout 2020.

All in all, the Unrestricted Income this year is up by £8,000.

Expenditure

For the second year in a row we have paid our Parish Common Fund to the Diocese.

The main cost that has increased in the year, except for the major repairs of the bells and church tower, are the Assistant Clergy costs. This is simply that there have been more people involved this year and therefore more costs incurred. These costs, of course do get paid by all Mission Community Parishes and you will see the £9,159 income received as contributions towards all of the Mission Community expenses in the Other Ordinary Income listed in the accounts.

Thank you, this year, to those who have assisted me. To Anne Irwin, Roger Guest and Jon Ellis.

I would also like to add that without the hard work of the St Margaret's Friends and their generous donations towards maintaining our church there would be more than the roof needing such major work. Thank you.

INDEPENDENT EXAMINER'S REPORT

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST DECEMBER 2019

Report to the trustees of the Parish of Northam (charity no. 1133811) on the accounts for the year ended 31 December 2019, which are set out on pages 2 to 11.

Respective responsibilities of trustees and examiner

The charity's trustees are responsible for the preparation of the accounts. The charity's trustees consider that an audit is not required for this year under section 144 of the Charities Act 2011 (the Charities Act) and that an independent examination is needed.

NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS

FOR THE YEAR ENDING 31ST DECEMBER 2019

1 BASIS OF PREPARATION

Basis of Accounting

The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with the Charity's governing document, the Charities Act 2011 and 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS102)' (as amended for accounting periods commencing from 1 January 2016). The Charity is a Public Benefit Entity as defined by FRS102.

The financial statements are prepared in sterling, which is the functional currency of the charity. Monetary amounts in these financial statements are rounded to the nearest \pounds .

The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention, modified to include investment assets at fair value. The principal accounting policies adopted are set out below.

2 ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Charity Information

The Parish of Northam is a public benefit entity and a registered charity in England and Wales and is unincorporated. The address of the principal office is:

Fund Accounting

Restricted funds represent (a) income from trusts or endowments which may be expended only on those restricted objects provided in the terms of the trust or bequest, and (b) donations or grants received for a specific object or invited by the PCC for a specific object. The funds may only be expended on the specific object for which they were given. Any balance remaining unspent at the end of each year must be carried forward as a balance on that fund. The PCC does not usually invest separately for each fund. Where there is no separate investment, interest is apportioned to individual funds on an average balance basis.

Unrestricted funds are general funds which the charity may use for its own purposes at its discretion within the scheme rules.

Income

Planned giving, collections and donations are recognized when received. Tax refunds are recognized when the incoming resource to which they relate is received. Grants and legacies are accounted for when the PCC is legally entitled to the amounts due. Dividends are accounted for when receivable, interest is accrued. All other income is recognized when it is receivable. All incoming resources are accounted for gross.

Expenditure

Grants and donations are accounted for when paid over, or when awarded, if that award creates a binding or constructive obligation on the PCC. The diocesan parish share is accounted for when paid. All other expenditure is generally recognized when a liability is incurred and is accounted for gross, irrecoverable VAT being charged against the category of resources expended for which it was incurred.

Fixed Assets

Consecrated property and moveable church furnishings

Consecrated and benefice property is not included in the accounts in accordance with s.10(2)(a) of the Charities Act 2011.

Movable church furnishings held by the vicar and churchwardens on special trust for the PCC and which require a faculty for disposal are inalienable property, listed in the church's inventory, which can be inspected (at any reasonable time). For anything acquired prior to 2007 there is insufficient cost information available and therefore such assets are not valued in the financial statements. Items acquired since 1 January 2007 have been capitalised and depreciated in the financial statements over their currently anticipated useful economic life (initially over 4 years) on a straight-line basis.

All expenditure incurred in the year on consecrated or beneficed buildings (individual items under £1,000) or on the repair of movable church furnishings acquired before 1 January 2007 is written off.

Other fixtures, fittings and office equipment

Equipment used within the church premises is depreciated on a straight-line basis over four years. Individual items of equipment with a purchase price of £1,000 or less are written off when the asset is acquired.

Investments

Investments are valued at fair value (as determined by market value) at 31 December.

Current Assets

Amounts owing to the PCC at 31 December in respect of fees, rents or other income are shown as debtors less provision for amounts that may prove uncollectable.

Short-term deposits include cash held on deposit either with the CBF Church of England Funds or on deposit at the bank.

Restricted funds may only be expended on the specific object for which they were given. Any balance remaining unspent at the end of each year must be carried forward and spent on the specific purpose for which the funds were given.

Fund transfers have occurred because monies have been moved between accounts considered to be Restricted and others considered to be Unrestricted. It relates to tax recovered being passed to the friends of St Margaret's account and an amount approved to be recategorised as Unrestricted to ease cashflows.
