### REPORT OF THE TRUSTEES FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2019

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 30 September 2019. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

### **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### Objectives and aims

The principal objective of the organisation is to provide counselling, consultancy, training and educational services to individuals, families and professional workers to the benefit of the community.

#### Focus of our work

The experience and expertise gained from over thirty years of operations have enabled Dover Counselling Centre to respond to individuals who are experiencing emotional difficulties, or have mental health problems, through the provision of counselling, psycho-education and psychological treatment.

We provide a wide choice of high quality, psychological therapies, support services and psycho education in individual and group settings.

### Improving Access to Psychological Therapies (IAPT)

Dover Counselling Centre has been delivering an IAPT programme since 2012.

As part of the national programme we provide talking therapies in the South Kent Coast and Thanet areas, as recommended by the National Institute of Clinical Excellence (NICE). These include:

- Cognitive Behaviour Therapy
- Inter Personal Therapy
- Counselling
- Mindfulness Based Cognitive Therapy
- Guided Self Help
- Eye Movement Desensitisation and Reprocessing (EMDR)
- Employment Support
- Signposting
- Courses and workshops

#### **Employer Services**

Our Employee Counselling Service (ECS) provides dedicated professional counselling and assistance to employers and employees.

We provide full UK coverage and offer counselling for a broad range of issues including bereavement, stress, anxiety disorders, depression or any other personal issues that are affecting an employee's quality of life and work performance.

We also offer bespoke workshops and seminars, based on the specific needs of the organisation, large or small, from one hour to full days,

Dover Counselling Centre has a track record of successfully supporting individuals from a range of public, private and voluntary organisations after an incident or trauma, Not least, working with the survivors and bereaved following the Herald of Free Enterprise Ferry disaster, the Deal Barracks bombing and the London Bridge Terrorist attacks. In addition, we have trained other agencies in Disaster Awareness and Debriefing throughout the UK.

### **Community Service**

Our community service fills the gaps in the provision offered by the public and private sector and is designed to meet the needs of adults who have long term mental health problems and those facing particularly complex and difficult life situations that need longer term therapeutic work. These sessions are subsidised, and we therefore charge a minimal fee.

#### **Evaluating the services**

The extent to which clients are satisfied with the service they receive is an important outcome for Dover Counselling Centre. Client satisfaction represents a fundamental benchmark for good practice. Also, allowing clients to record their dissatisfaction, and make suggestions for improvement of services, is part of the ethical approach that DCC adopts when monitoring and evaluating its activities.

Written feedback from clients has been good and trustees were pleased to receive the following typical comments:

"I don't know how I would have got through my problems without my counsellor. She has helped me so much. I would not be here today if it wasn't for her."

"I can honestly say, whilst I understand I still have work to do, that these sessions have saved me in so many ways. I have been treated with compassion, empathy and so many "tissues". I am beyond grateful. I have tools now to move forward."

"Very helpful to be honest, I don't know what I would have done without these sessions, helped me build my confidence and my life again, thank you so much!!!"

#### Public benefit

The Trustees confirm that they have complied with their duty as prescribed in the Charities Act 2011 to have due regard to the Charity Commission's guidance on public benefit.

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Review of activities

This year has been busy and rewarding with many significant successes. For many of our clients counselling has played a considerable part in enabling them to recover and to make improvements in all areas of their lives.

### People

Following years of very little change, we have seen the highest turnover of staff/counsellors that DCC has ever experienced. Predominantly in the IAPT service, following a National review of all Kent, Sussex, and Surrey IAPT providers.

The reduction in the number of Counsellors in the service accounts for the increase in waiting times.

In May 2019 we employed our first Trainee High Intensity Therapist who attends a British Association for Behavioural and Cognitive Psychotherapies (BABCP) accedited one-year post graduate diploma training programme two days a week and undertakes supervised practice for three days a week at the centre. On graduation, the trainee will provide evidence-based Cognitive Behavioural Therapy (CBT) for adults with depression and/or any of the anxiety disorders.

Working with the Adult education CAPCAB (Counselling and Psychotherapy Central Awarding Body) we have been offering student placements for people who are undertaking training at diploma, degree, or master's level in counselling and psychotherapy. These placements are in our Community Service and enable us to offer free, long term therapy to clients who are not able to pay the subsidised fee.

I am delighted that we have appointed two new trustees this year, who were identified by personal contacts and interviewed by the undersigned and the centre's Chief Executive before formal appointment by the Board. The new trustees were briefed on DCC's activities and their role in discussions with other trustees and DCC's Chief Executive.

# Commercial work

Health and wellbeing continue to feature prominently in employers' benefits packages and it is encouraging to see more organisations offering employees help dealing with personal problems that might negatively impact their work performance, health and wellbeing.

As a charity committed to improving the mental health and wellbeing of organisations we understand the impact that the intense and demanding nature of work has on employees work life balance, energy levels and mental health - and that this in turn impacts on work effectiveness and performance.

The sectors across which we operate include Local Authorities, NHS charities and private sector, and our service delivery model is flexible to meet the budget/service mix requirements of each customer.

#### **IAPT**

DCC is commissioned by the NHS in England and to provide NICE-approved therapies for treating people with depression or anxiety.

Client satisfaction with IAPT is generally high and overall, clients are pleased with the way in which the therapy was provided as well as their relationship with their therapist. The less positive experiences tended to be related to waiting times.

### Community

During 18/19 DCC has demonstrated more than ever the need for affordable and open-ended counselling. We have seen an increase over the year in the number of clients who have sought support from our Community Service. These clients often present with acute mental health presentations and increased vulnerability that the IAPT service cannot meet.

Garden therapy - Working in partnership with Blossoms of Hope, DCC has launched a project to set up and run a therapeutic garden, to benefit people with mental health problems. It will also have space for workshops, alternative therapies and just a calm and safe place to sit and chat.

Often the simplest and first step to better wellbeing can be to talk about it. However, not everyone is comfortable with traditional therapy and sitting in a room with a Counsellor. Today, garden therapy is accepted as beneficial and effective therapeutic modality.

The garden will open to all - no experience necessary and people of any age can participate. It is our goal to use this space as a medium for reaching out to the local community.

#### **Property**

In April 2019 we moved our Folkestone services to the 4th floor of Folkestone and Hythe District council offices.

# FINANCIAL REVIEW

### Financial review

As with any charitable organisation, we need to manage and mitigate financial risks. We continually review and refine our income generation activities.

This year we set a realistic but challenging budget and continue to focus on managing our costs, a discipline which will be a key focus in the coming year.

There was a controlled increase in staffing costs as we invested further into our CBT team to compliment the other therapies we currently offer.

### Reserves policy

The Charity's reserves have been increased in the year in an effort to ensure a continuation of community services for at least six months. This would allow any outstanding community services to be completed should funding ever stop.

With careful management, DCC's income remains greater than its expenditure.

Staffing levels, management salaries and running costs continue to be reviewed regularly to ensure DCC can successfully maintain reserves at an acceptable level.

#### **FUTURE PLANS**

DCC is committed to improving mental health services in the community and for its employer organisations.

Service users continue to be at the heart of our work and will be foremost in our thoughts and actions as we go about delivering, and developing our services.

# STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Constitution

The charity is constituted under a Memorandum of Association dated 5 December 1988 and is a registered charity (number 800988).

#### Organisational structure

The charity is organised in such a way that Trustees meet regularly in order to manage its affairs whilst day to day responsibility is delegated to the management team.

#### STATEMENT OF TRUSTEES' RESPONSIBILITIES

The trustees (who are also the directors of The Dover Counselling Centre for the purposes of company law) are responsible for preparing the Report of the Trustees and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and United Kingdom Accounting Standards (United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice).

Company law requires the trustees to prepare financial statements for each financial year which give a true and fair view of the state of affairs of the charitable company and of the incoming resources and application of resources, including the income and expenditure, of the charitable company for that period. In preparing those financial statements, the trustees are required to

- select suitable accounting policies and then apply them consistently:
- observe the methods and principles in the Charity SORP;
- make judgements and estimates that are reasonable and prudent;
- prepare the financial statements on the going concern basis unless it is inappropriate to presume that the charitable company will continue in business.

The trustees are responsible for keeping proper accounting records which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the charitable company and to enable them to ensure that the financial statements comply with the Companies Act 2006. #### Opinion

#### NOTES TO THE FINANCIAL STATEMENTS FOR THE YEAR ENDED 30 SEPTEMBER 2019

#### 1. STATUTORY INFORMATION

The Dover Counselling Centre is an incorporated charity registered in England. The Charitable company's registered number, principal address and nature of operations can be found in the Report of Trustees.

The financial statements are presented in sterling which is the functional currency of the charity.

#### 2. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

#### Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Amounts recoverable on contract are based on the stage of completion of ongoing counselling cases within the AQP contracts. These have been calculated on a sessional basis.

#### Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Freehold property

- Straight line over 50 years

Fixtures and fittings

- 20% on cost

### Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

# Hire purchase and leasing commitments

Rentals paid under operating leases are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities on a straight line basis over the period of the lease.

#### Going concern

Since the balance sheet date there has been the COVID-19 pandemic. The activities of the charitable company have been affected by the "lock down" but such restrictions have not affected the going concern position of the charitable company.
