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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 March 2020

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 March 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The aim of the charity is to relieve sickness, poor health and disability and to promote optimal healing and physical and mental wellbeing through the provision, study and research of integrative medicine, which we define to be a combination of practices and methods of complementary and alternative medicine with conventional biomedicine and functional medicine by:

- 1) Offering integrative medicine treatments to sufferers of Myalgic Encephalomyelitis (ME) and Chronic Fatigue Syndrome (CFS) and in due course to sufferers of other serious and chronic illnesses.
- 2) Researching the most effective evidence based interventions for ME/CFS and other chronic illnesses in order to further develop the effectiveness of our integrative medicine approach.
- 3) Raising awareness of the role of integrative medicine in optimal healing for sufferers of ME/CFS and other chronic illnesses.
- 4) Promoting best practice of integrative medicine and patient care.

Significant activities

Established in 2004, The Optimum Health Clinic is an award wining ME/CFS clinic, with patients in over 35 countries. We describe our approach as 'Integrative Medicine' which is a combination of practices and methods of complementary and alternative medicine with conventional biomedicine and functional medicine.

We offer nutrition support using both functional medicine and conventional biomedicine tests to support our recommendations combined with a range of psychology treatments to support patients to better manage their own recovery from ME/CFS.

The aims of our approach to Integrative Medicine are to:

- Combine the best of conventional biomedicine with complementary and alternative (CAM) medicine interventions
- Focus on the relationship between practitioner and patient
- Research and innovate the most effective evidence based interventions for optimal healing and wellbeing.

Volunteers

A big thank for all our volunteers that generously donate their time this year.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

Our primary current objective is to provide evidence based results to demonstrate the effectiveness of an integrative medicine approach to treating chronic fatigue/myalgic encephalomyelitis and related conditions. In the last year we have made important progress with our RCT project, which included gaining NHS ethics approval. However, we are currently facing significant fundraising challenges to continue this project, and are currently exploring what the best path forward for this project might be.

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Fundraising activities

Our total income decreased by 9.7% to £41,970 and with expenditure of £32,382 we had a net surplus for the year of £9,588.

The breakdown of our £41,970 of income was as follows:

- £37,947 came from the Clinic's trading company
- £885 came from the Clinic's meditation course
- £60 from various gift aid agencies and individual donors
- fundraising income of £3,078

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Investment policy and objectives

Our objective is to maximise funds for research both through profits made in our trading arm and fundraising direct. Our sole objective is to invest in research which serves our mission.

Reserves policy

We have not thus far enjoyed sufficient cash flow to enable us to implement a reserves policy. The trustees' objective is to implement such a policy as soon as practicable. We believe that maintaining a level of unrestricted funds equivalent to three months of salary costs would be a sensible first step.

FUTURE PLANS

We plan to initiate our RCT in the coming year, subject to current COVID-19 restrictions being lifted. This research will take a further 2-3 years to complete, but is a critical next step in further expanding the evidence base for our approach. This research is a highly ambitious project, but it has the potential to significantly change perceptions of the approach we offer, and ultimately to unlock NHS funding for treatment. With our previous macro-economic study demonstrating that ME/CFS costs the UK £3.3bn a year, this work is more important than ever.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

Recruitment and appointment of new trustees

All trustees give their time voluntarily and received no benefits from the Charity. Any expenses reclaimed from the Charity are set out in the notes to the accounts.

Trustees have been recruited from our patients and ex-patient community. Our Chairman and one of our Trustees have been patients of the Clinic and have fully recovered from ME/CFS. The daughter of our third Trustee also has ME/CFS and is a patient of the Clinic.

STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

Organisational structure

There are two sub committees that are established by the Board and all operate according to clearly defined terms of reference. The committees hold delegated authorities, act as a resource to the Chief Executive and make recommendations. They are made up of staff, practitioners and trustees.

The Research and Medicine Committee meets quarterly to:

- agree research priorities that serve our mission;
- set the direction of research projects;
- review progress against agreed objectives;
- agree action and priorities for the coming quarter;

The Risk Committee meets annually to:

- review all the risks in the Risk Register, and identify any new or emerging risks;
- review the weightings applied to each risk in terms of both impact and likelihood of occurrence;
- review the heat map:
- agree specific controls and actions required to more effectively manage the risks.

The board meets quarterly to review the work of the Research and Medicine committee and to review whether there are any changes to our Risk Register. Research and Medicine, Risk management and conflicts of interest are standing items on our board meeting agendas.

Decision making

Day to day management of the organisation is shared by the Chief Executive of the Clinic and his management team (Director of Nutrition, Director of Psychology and Director of Finance and Operations)

Performance management of the organisation has three components:

- monthly performance reviews by the Chief Executive
- monthly performance reviews between the Chair and the Chief Executive
- quarterly performance reviews by the Board, including reporting against agreed objectives

Chief Executive

Our Chief Executive of The Optimum Health Clinic, Alex Howard, is responsible for the day to day operations of the Clinic.

Alex set up the Clinic in 2004 having himself suffered from ME/CFS for 7 years and fully recovered from it. Alex's commitment has was to create a clinic to help and support ME/CFS sufferers building on all the lessons he learned from having healed himselffully.

Alex realised that in order to carry out research to develop ever more effective evidence based on interventions for the treatment of ME/CFS, we needed to become a charity in order to be able to fundraise directly. Accordingly, Alex set up the Charity and gifted the Clinic to the Charity on 1st April 2013.

1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2015)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
