Annual report 2019/20

The year ending 31 January 2020 has once again shown the great need for Borehamwood Foodbank and we have remained an important and valued part of the community. We have received amazing support from many sectors of the local community from schools, community groups, businesses, places of worship and many individuals as well as grant funding from local and national sources.

Statistics

In 2019 we gave out food packs for 3412 people. This is an increase of 7% on 2018.

It is especially concerning to note that the number of clients coming with vouchers because of low income has risen again to 54%. These are working people, many with more than one job, who just cannot make ends meet.

Benefit issues also concern many especially those transitioning to universal credit with the five week wait for funds bringing many to the point of desperation.

We continue to see the most vulnerable in our community coming to the Foodbank, those with ill health, mental health issues, homelessness or income insecurity.

People living alone make up 46% of our clients and families with two or more children account for 21%

Hertsmere Borough council remain our largest referral agency with the Job Centre, CAB, BECC (children's centre) being the next largest. We do however have 90 voucher holders from many different areas of society – schools, doctors, police, social workers, mental health teams and charities of which 35 are active refers. We are always open to work with more agencies so if you know an area of need please do contact us.

Since we opened in April 2013 we have now given out 17623 food packs, approx. 30% being to children. Each foodpack represents three days balanced diet so we have given out approx. 158,600 meals.

To meet this demand we have collected, labelled and processed 177 tonnes of store cupboard food. We also give fresh produce including bread, butter and eggs as well as a variety of goods donated by Greggs bakery and Fareshare (Tesco and Sainsbury).

We also provide toiletries.

Achievements

We have continued our fuel bank during the year and have seen the need increase especially in winter. Our 'Surviving Winter' programme seeks to give a one-off fuel grant, provide hot food at the sessions and look for ways to support those who have to choose between Heat and Eat.

Our CAB worker is now well established at each session and they are able to meet many clients at their point of need as well as making referrals for other more in-depth provision. This has helped people to get all their benefits, improve fuel provision and address issues such as homelessness and debt.

The issue of school holiday hunger is ever present and our family lunches seek to meet this need as well as the need for better social communication in families. It is most encouraging to see families sit and eat together round a table – something they often find hard to achieve at home. We also enjoy crafts and activities together and we send the family home with bags of food to help cover the rest of the holiday. We try to teach cooking skills and in our half-term lunches the family prepare their own meal.

We were also fortunate to receive grants and donations enabling us to run Slow Cooker courses and a Singles cookery session. Penny Beral our chef led these and we are very grateful for her input. We all learnt a lot and many felt more able to use cheaper ingredients and to cook from scratch.

Our training programme for volunteers continues both in house and at external courses. These improve confidence as well as knowledge.

We have begun a Client Welfare fund to help with small payments towards things such as travel to an appointment or hospital, sleeping bags etc.

We continued our collections at King's Cross station on Foodbank Friday's but we had to reduce the frequency of these as it was hard to find a sufficient team to man the stall (and being a collector with a tin is not easy).

Thank you

We have an amazing team of approx. 35 volunteers that come each week to pick up donations from our food collection points, service the warehouse or meet the clients in our distribution team. Without them we would be lost and we feel privileged to work with each and every one.

We also have a much larger team who help for events and larger collections who are equally invaluable.

Approx 20 volunteers support our family lunches and we are very grateful for them.

Numerous people unknown to us give regularly – many in the Tesco box. Without you we would not be able to function so Thank You so much.

Thank you to all the organisations and groups that give, again you are invaluable. Caritas has supported us with Core funding.

The Asda grant has enabled us to pay our CAB worker for three years.

Hertsmere council have helped with grants for maintaining the warehouse.

Tesco have helped us with the 20% monetary donation based on the weight of food you donate as well as in their blue token grant programme.

HCF have supported our winter fuel initiative

The Future

We do not unfortunately see any reduction in the need for our services so we will do all we can to maintain and grow the work to meet the need.

We are very much in need of more trustees who can give of their time and expertise to help us. Please do get in touch if this might be an area for you to consider.

Addendum

The report above covers the last financial year ending on Jan 31st 2020.

We were obviously not expecting the Covid-19 crisis to hit us and this year has seen many changes in our work but we are proud to have remained open throughout and to have met the increased needs of many of the most vulnerable in our community.

We have seen the very generous provision (locally and nationally) of both food and finance. A full report of this will be written later but we can reassure our supporters and clients that we are in a very strong position to continue our service to the community.

Financial Report

The income received during the year to 31st January 2020 was £46,236, more than double that of 2019 (£22,723). We received over three times the amount of Restricted Grants (£21,494) compared to the previous year (£6,859) which is due to the admirable perseverance of trustees grappling with the (sometimes) onerous applications. There is a small balance (£2,609) which indicates how much the grants were utilised. The provision of the CAB worker has proved invaluable to many who have been helped with benefit applications and debt management. Our family lunches have gone from strength to strength. Time and again we have been told that families are so appreciative of them. Our new fuel provision has really taken off. We have introduced a new system, which although has a cost, has enabled us to deliver fuel support (to the tune of £3,279) on a more professional level. Our funds have allowed us to continue to help alleviate the food and fuel poverty which currently shows no sign of diminishing.

There is a surplus on the Income and Expenditure Account of £2,324. We still maintain our Reserve Account at £6,000 as recommended by the Charities Commission of three months expenditure.

The cash at bank and in hand at 31st January 2020 is £28,564 (compared to 2019 £25,708).

We are deeply grateful to the generosity of people and organisations of the local and wider area; to the care of Caritas and the continuing support of Tesco's plc. We are indebted to St Teresa's Church which has continued to provide us with a location and facilities as well as much appreciated help from its congregation and clergy. We also owe huge thanks to our volunteers without whom we could not function.

Attached are the full accounts that have been independently reviewed. These accounts were unanimously approved at the meeting of Borehamwood Foodbank Trustees on 8 September 2020.

I report to the charity trustees on my examination of the accounts of the company for the year ended 31st January 2020

Responsibilities and basis of report
