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Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 August 2020

The trustees who are also directors of the charity for the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, present their report with the financial statements of the charity for the year ended 31 August 2020. The trustees have adopted the provisions of Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019).

OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Objectives and aims

The objects of the CIO are for the public benefit:

To advance education in particular, but not limited to, through the provision of vocational education and training in the skills required for media broadcasting and communication; and

such other charitable purposes (according to the law of England and Wales) as the charity trustees see fit from time to time.

Public benefit

Following the success of the Pilot for the METS programme in the first year St John's Foundation awarded a grant to deliver the programme over three years 2018-21.

The programme identifies 9 target groups:

- 1. Students aged 11-16 in mainstream schools
- 2. Adults & Young People facing mental health challenges (e.g. depression, anxiety, low mood)
- 3. Young people aged 16 18 in education or training
- 4. Young people aged 16-23 NEET/borderline NEET
- 5. People with Autistic Spectrum Disorder (ASD)
- 6. Adults with learning disabilities
- 7. Adults in recovery from addiction
- 8. Adult job seekers

9. Training the trainer. Training professional support workers in audio studio practices to support SEN.

Media Education Training & Skills (METS) is a dynamic programme of training that targets young people, vulnerable adults and people with special educational needs (SEN). It establishes that communications and media training open life opportunities that enhance employability, health and wellbeing so that people can thrive to fulfil their potential and aspirations.

The Trust, either directly or through collaborative partnerships, provides individualised studio-based training that develop:

- Personal skills and attributes (self-esteem; confidence; interpersonal skills, flexibility; critical thinking; conscientiousness; reliability)

- General employability skills (teamwork; decision making; working to deadlines; task management; literacy and numeracy; oral presentations; IT skills; workplace routines)

- Media skills (Research; scripting; vocal communication; presentation; interviewing; editing)

All skills and experiences are transferable enhancing mental wellbeing, and, where appropriate, the employability of learners. Helping beneficiaries into a life of their choosing is the primary activity although the trust also recognises the value the society to a media literate population.

Report of the Trustees for the Year Ended 31 August 2020

ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

Charitable activities

The METS programme swiftly adapted to the new circumstances of pandemic and lockdown. The priority was to ensure the safety of everyone involved as well as the wider civic responsibility of complying with public safety. With the announcement of lockdown we suspended all training. As the Covid environment settled we used the period to build our resources for an expanded METS programme for year three of the St John's grant. Amidst the grimness of pandemic and its shocking impact on people's lives and livelihoods it is the unfortunate reality that there is greater need of the trust's services. Across society third sector organisations have really stepped up to help their fellow people during the national crisis. Our job has been to ensure that as the full scale of challenges emerge the trust is well placed to deliver solutions across mental ill health, isolation, unemployment and alcohol and drug misuse. The opportunities for us to help have been there and we have taken them. The year ends with METS operating in Bath and Chard along with the Midsomer Norton region that it was developed in.

METS is all about impacting the lives of trainees from our target groups. While we used the period of lockdown to develop the charities medium to long term capacity, we wanted to do our best in delivering the training. With over half the year affected by Covid 19 we worked to build remote training into our modus operandi. The year started with an expectation that we would exceed our target of 44 people. In the end we managed 82% of the targets for the year. A remarkable achievement in the circumstances.

In addition to the main grant from St John's the CIO secured additional funding to build capacity within METS such as empowering females with a voice, giving music production skills to 16-18 years who did not have a progression plan and developing online training methodology to support trainees shielding and in isolation. The CIO has taken on a second trainer to help meet these additional commitments.

FINANCIAL REVIEW

Reserves policy

The charity relies on donations and grants and the Trustee use all funds in line with the object of the charity. The reserves held are carried over to be used for future projects as and when they arise.

Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

I. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective I January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

Income

All income is recognised in the Statement of Financial Activities once the charity has entitlement to the funds, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably.

Expenditure

Liabilities are recognised as expenditure as soon as there is a legal or constructive obligation committing the charity to that expenditure, it is probable that a transfer of economic benefits will be required in settlement and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all cost related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with the use of resources.

Taxation

The charity is exempt from corporation tax on its charitable activities.

Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.
