OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES

Summary of the objects of the charity set out in its governing document:

Community Youth Project aims to support and educate young people, especially, but not exclusively through their leisure time activities so to develop their physical, mental and personal capacities that they may grow to full maturity as individuals and contributing members of society.

Summary of the main activities undertaken for the public benefit in relation to these objects:

Enabling young people to develop personal and social skills and high aspirations by providing advice and information through support from staff and by running informal education workshops.

Involving young people in democracy and decision making by training, supporting and enabling youth leaders members, and by encouraging young people to take an active role in their community. Promoting the social inclusion of young people

by providing a safe and trusted meeting place and opportunities to participate in positive activities, and by addressing issues of isolation by providing subsidised transport to sporting and leisure facilities.

Engaging young people in new opportunities and challenging experiences

- by providing opportunities for young people to engage in adventurous activities including residential trips to outdoor activity centres, and
- by providing opportunities for young people to experience a wide range of sporting activities.

Encouraging young people to lead healthy lifestyles

by providing regular opportunities for young people to engage in sport and exercise, and by providing young people with the advice and information to make informed lifestyle choices.

UPDATES

Recent changes at Community Youth Project consisted of:

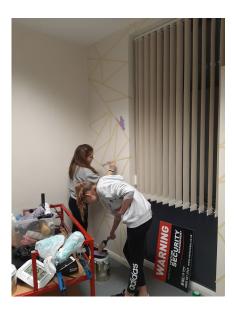
Ian Green resigned from Community Youth Project after 20 years and was replaced by Claire Austin in October.

Claire has made some initial changes, opening up the ages of the youth club by inviting 7 year olds to attend youth club sessions, following OFSTED guidance.

The Young Leaders Project has also been set up. This project is for young people aged 13 years and older who want to become a Young Leader and will require them to complete an accredited course. Funding and enrolling on an ASDAN accredited course was well advanced, but has been put on hold for the duration of the current Covid-19 emergency. When the Community Youth Project can reopen the youth club and resume delivering sessions, courses and activities, we shall do so.

The new Youth Leaders have requested their own area to relax in, as they may not always wish to participate in certain activities, although this is always highly welcomed by the younger group; this also allows the Young Leaders to take ownership of their activities by pre-planning their youth sessions with support from the youth team. The Young Leaders hub Lounge gives them their own relaxing space, allowing more informal educational discussions to take place. The young leaders have been given consent to take over the Youth Worker's office and they have begun to decorate the new area. This has led to the Youth Worker, Claire and Administrator/ Youth Support Worker Matthew to move into the reception office during February Half Term.







Summer Scheme

Our holiday scheme delivered 29 activity sessions over 6 weeks of the summer school holidays. 289 attendances were recorded.

We know from experience that taking groups of young people off the streets and engaging them in positive activities has a huge impact on the community, particularly during the summer school holidays. Giving the opportunity for young people to experience risk and adventure in a positive way helps to divert them from negative influences. Giving young people the opportunity to engage in sport and leisure activities helps to improve health, fitness, and expend their energy in a positive way.

Climbing Course

L – SE

As part of our summer holiday scheme, we delivered an accredited course in climbing.

The Climbing Course was held over 5 weeks at Reading Climbing Centre. 11 young people completed the full course and gained qualifications from the National Indoor Climbing Award Scheme.

Climbing is an adventurous activity that enables young people to experience risk and adventure in a positive way. The course enables young people to gain accreditation for their achievements, helping to build self confidence and self esteem. Some young people also found climbing as new interest that they have decide to become involved in outside of the youth club.

Youth Clubs

Delivering a safe and trusted place for young people to socialise remains at the heart of what we do. Over the course of the year in the larger space of our hall makes it possible to deliver a wider range of activities, especially indoor sports, during the Youth Club sessions. The Youth Leaders requested their own designated room.

In addition to our usual mix of competitions, crafts, sports activities we are continuing to offer varied workshops. The most recent workshops have been :

Drug education and prevention Understanding basic First Aid Health and Wellbeing

Having an informal space for young people to meet with the youth workers and youth support workers provides opportunities for advice, information, and signposting to address the often complex issues these young people face.

Community Youth Project was kindly funded by the National Lottery Community Fund to deliver the Drug education and prevention workshops,

CHAIR OF TRUSTEES' REPORT

This past year has been one of changes and challenges.

In August, Ian Green, our founding Youth Worker, moved on from CYP after nearly two decades. CYP, the communities it serves and those many who have passed through, owe him a great debt of gratitude.

Claire Austin joined us in October, as the new Youth Worker. After training in London, Claire has gained front-line experience in Germany, Newbury and Reading. Her knowledge and skills will be a great asset as we develop what we do, and how.

We have continued to benefit greatly from the support of the Greenham Trust.. The consistent aid the Trust has given CYP from its inception, as it seeks to serve the communities where we work, is in the best traditions of the Trust's founding ethos. We have also been greatly assisted by funding from the Gerard Palmer Eling Trust, the Miss W E Lawrence 1976 Charitable Settlement, the Vodafone Foundation, the J A Floyd Charitable Trust , Sovereign Housing and Newbury Town Council.

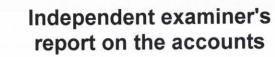
Initial steps towards modifying how we operate were being introduced early in 2020, but in February it became clear that there may be problems, and in mid-March CYP had to close down the Greenham Community Centre and radically reduce its youth work, ending all face-to-face relationships. At the time of writing, we are still under lockdown, and it is difficult to be precise as to our next steps. However, it is clear that national and local society has undergone significant upheavals, and that—perhaps more than ever—there will be a need for local youth to have safe places, constructive and beneficial activities, and professional and trained people to talk to.

The Greenham Community Centre will be reopened as soon as is permitted, to be available as a resource for private hires, for clubs and for agencies within the NHS to support local health. It gives the local community space and opportunities.

May I introduce two more trustees – Derek Peaple and Julia Jones. We shall greatly benefit from their complementary skills and strengths. They are most welcome.
