We started the year, as always, with the ambition of surpassing our successes of the previous 12 months. As the year headed to a close, we had achieved that goal and were ready to celebrate our achievements just as COVID-19 arrived.

Our plans were put on hold and in true East End fashion we responded with passion, determination and most recognisably, resilience. Within 48 hours of lockdown we had launched our Emergency Fund and just days later we were providing much needed financial support to local charities serving our most vulnerable residents.

I am delighted with what we have achieved and I would like to pay tribute to our donors, volunteers and key workers delivering essential community services. Our success is a result of a huge community effort. We can all be extremely proud of our achievements. In the first three months of 2020/21 we distributed over £630,000 that reached thousands of residents experiencing hardship. The fund will continue to run throughout the year, adapting to emerging community needs, as there is still much more to do.

The East End will pull through, as it always does, but the virus has shone a spotlight on a number of acute issues – loneliness, mental health, digital exclusion and food poverty among others. With a recession and concerns about the sustainability of local authority funding, our communities will need our support more than ever.

COVID-19 aside, in 2019/20 EECF once again awarded its highest level of grants to date, and with new donors we began tackling emerging issues like holiday hunger and mental health. We also recruited new trustees to strengthen the board, met with leading City institutions in a joint event with Bank of England Governor Mark Carney, to highlight the extreme levels of deprivation that exist on their doorstep, and celebrated the honour of EECF receiving the Queens Award for Voluntary Service.

I should also record my own gratitude and that of the Board for our wonderful team of staff led by Tracey Walsh. They have been fantastic working through the crisis and ensuring that our response was fast and effective.

Overall it was another busy and productive year in which we met some of our biggest ever challenges, and again demonstrated the power and relevance of community foundations and local giving.

With the UK's highest levels of child and pensioner poverty existing here in the East End, not surprisingly, the onset of Coronavirus at the end our financial year exacerbated these issues. Although social needs locally are broad, and as a community foundation we will support these areas as best we can, we will have to concentrate our efforts on key issues if we are to effectively tackle the growing needs of the most vulnerable young people and elders locally.

As we move forward, we will continue to fulfil our potential and champion the vital work of small charities and voluntary organisations reaching those most in need of support. Although the coming years are likely to be more challenging than originally anticipated, I am confident we will achieve a great deal. Year after year we have exceeded the achievements of the previous 12 months and I expect the coming years to be no different.

Holiday time can be difficult for young people. With 1 in 4 children in the East End living in poverty, many experience heightened levels of food poverty, issues around personal safety and isolation.

Using our own funds and working with a range of donors we have been funding a comprehensive range of positive holiday provision for thousands of young people in the East End.

With investment of £158,000, our funding has supported more than 3,000 young people. From playschemes to accredited training on offer, our grantees provided essential childcare and enrichment activities to keep local children and young people safe and engaged during the school holidays.

Case Study

Hugely grateful as always for your partnership in this work - without your funding and support we wouldn't have been able to do this! The knock-on effect for the youth club from September is palpable. As already mentioned, the additional funding for free food was most welcome and complimented the holiday scheme through our lunch breaks and additional activities, we were able to leverage. Being able to provide our 20 young leaders with breakfast gave the day a positive start, ensuring we were able to check in properly and that they had energy. We were also able to give 50 children a free lunch throughout the summer scheme, and after the scheme was finished we ran an extra 5 afternoons with a free lunch and a fun activity, making a real difference to local families in a time when there is little provision for children.

TACKLING POVERTY FUND

The London Borough of Tower Hamlets' Tackling Poverty Fund was established to support the Council's mayoral priority of addressing deprivation across the borough. Although it invests heavily in the community and the root causes of poverty it recognised that more needed to be done. The Mayor was keen to unlock potentially valuable new approaches to tackling poverty and established the Tackling Poverty Fund to test new ideas.

The aim of this programme was to identify and fund innovative pilot projects led by the voluntary and community sector that enhanced and complimented the work already being undertaken by the Council's Tackling Poverty Team.

Successful projects were categorised against key themes of the tackling poverty fund; digital inclusion, food poverty, money management, employment and overall poverty issues.

Case Study

A very simple concept, set up as a partnership between three primary schools, required a small investment to pilot a clothes bank and support sessions for parents. Here's what they said:

"In children who have received full, new school uniform, we have seen increased self-esteem, improved attitudes towards learning and school and their friendship groups have grown.

For those parents who have received support, some have burst into tears, everyone has commented on the relief they felt being able to dress their child in full school uniform and how much they appreciate that their child would be warm this winter and probably next. Also, that they felt the financial burden had been lifted.

Our coffee afternoons and information sessions have helped on a variety of levels and having covered topics including, saving money, emotional wellbeing, making meals go further, domestic violence and positive changes. The afternoons and workshops have provided a safe and welcoming environment for mainly mothers to come and feel included – lessening social isolation. The sessions have highlighted other issues within families that schools may not have been aware of, such as domestic violence and financial abuse."

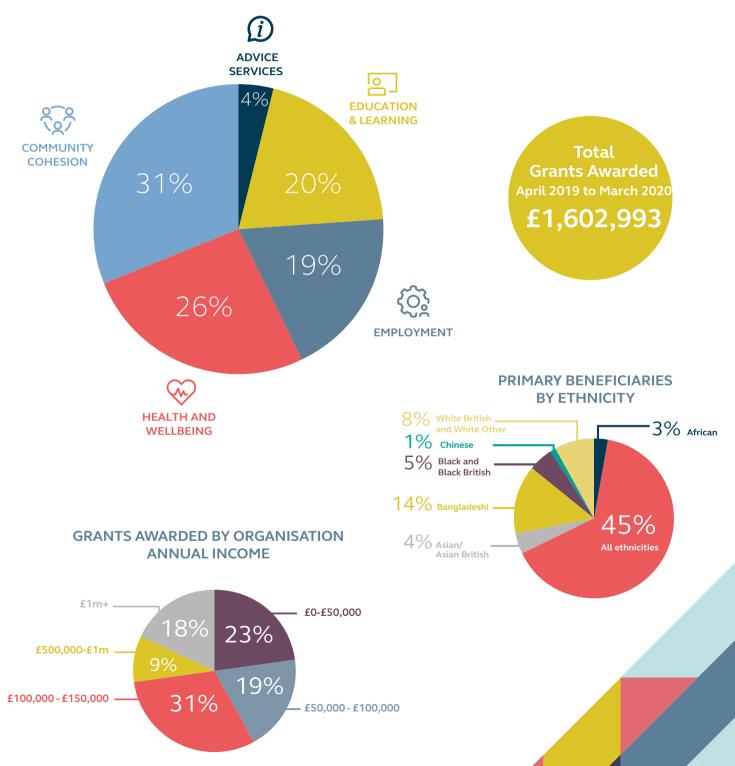

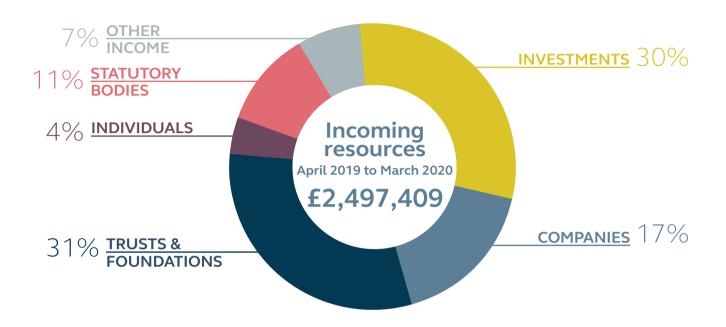

Chairman's Report

We started the year, as always, with the ambition of surpassing our successes of the previous 12 months. As the year headed to a close, we had achieved that goal and were ready to celebrate our successes just as COVID-19 arrived.

Our plans were put on hold and in true East End fashion we responded with passion, determination and most recognisably, resilience. Our East End Emergency Fund was launched within 48 hours of lockdown and just days later we were providing much needed financial support to local charities serving our most vulnerable residents.

I am delighted with what we have achieved, and I would like to pay tribute to our donors and the volunteers and key workers delivering essential community services. Our success is a result of a huge community effort. We can all be extremely proud of our achievements. In just three months we distributed over £630,000 through the emergency fund and this is benefiting more than 20,000 residents experiencing hardship. The fund will continue to run throughout the year, adapting to emerging community needs, as there is still much more to do.

The East End will pull through, as it always does, but the virus has shone a spotlight on a number of acute issues – loneliness, mental health concerns, digital exclusion and food poverty among others. With a recession and concerns about the sustainability of local authority funding, our communities will need our support more than ever.

COVID-19 aside, in 2019/20 EECF once again awarded its highest level of grants to date, and with new donors we began tackling emerging issues like holiday hunger and mental health. We also recruited new trustees to strengthen the board, met with leading City institutions in a joint event with Bank of England Governor Mark Carney to highlight the extreme levels of deprivation that exists on their doorstep, and celebrated the honour of EECF receiving the Queens Award for Voluntary Service.

I should also record my own gratitude and that of the Board for our wonderful team of staff led by Tracey Walsh. They have been fantastic working through the crisis and ensuring that our response was fast and effective.

Overall it was another busy and productive year in which we met some of our biggest ever challenges, and again demonstrated the power and relevance of community foundations and local giving.

Trustees' Report

The East End Community Foundation (EECF) has been advising and co-ordinating charitable giving for 30 years. Our purpose is to promote the relief of poverty and we do this by staying abreast of social needs locally and advising, matching and administering charitable donations on behalf of individuals, companies and statutory bodies committed to supporting those most in need in Tower Hamlets, Hackney, Newham and the City of London.

As a grant maker in our own right we have excellent knowledge of the charitable sector across East London and we are uniquely connected to its people and challenges. Our experience and expertise provide us with a thorough understanding of the causes and solutions to tackling poverty, and our services are tailored to meet the specific requirements of both the community and our fund holders.

As an advisor, we are dedicated to ensuring our fund holders and donors get the most from their charitable investments, educating them on local issues and bring them closer to the causes they are seeking to support.

Our experienced staff team provide fund holders and donors with a comprehensive service of support, including advice on effective charitable giving in the East End through to full management of their funds. Throughout the process donors have full control of decision making.

Governance

The East End Community Foundation (EECF) is a registered charity (No. 1147789) and company limited by guarantee (8104415). It was incorporated on 13th June 2012 and became operational on 1st October 2012, as a result of a merger between the Isle of Dogs Community Foundation (IDCF) and St Katharine & Shadwell Trust (SKST). The Trustees, who are also Directors of the charitable company, present their report and audited financial statements for the year ending 31st March 2020. In presenting this report the Trustees have complied with the Statement of Recommended Practice, Accounting and Reporting by Charities (FRS102) the Charities' SORP, the Companies Act 2006 and applicable United Kingdom Generally Accepted Accounting Practice.

The Board of Trustees may consist of no more than 15 Trustees or no fewer than 9 (excluding co-optees). Trustees are appointed from the membership, based on the skill set required by the Foundation, and EECF seeks to possess a Board that has equal representation from three of the four classes of membership eligible to hold a seat: Business, Statutory and Voluntary and well as members from the Individual class.

The Articles state that Trustees can serve a term of 3 years before having to stand for re-election. Trustees who have served 3 consecutive terms shall not serve for a further term commencing earlier than the end of the Annual General Meeting following that at which he/she retired from office.

The Board may co-opt up to 5 further individuals who bring specific skills not already represented on the Board. Further expertise is also brought in the form of 'contributors'. These individuals support specific aspects of EECF's work and their involvement is generally confined to a committee. Neither co-optees or contributors have voting rights.

Board of Trustees

For the purposes of the Companies Act 2006, the Board of Trustees is regarded as the Board of Directors of the company.

EECF has a formal trustee induction process that includes receipt of a trustee handbook, a one to one meeting with the Chief Executive and where appropriate this is followed by a further meeting prior to their first Board meeting.

No remuneration or expenses were paid to Trustees or co-optees during the year. All declarations of interest are held on a formal register and Trustees must raise these, where relevant, at Board and Committee meetings. In those cases, this is recorded in the meeting minutes and Trustees are excluded from the associated discussion and decision-making process.

Management

The day to day running of the charity is delegated to the Chief Executive, Tracey Walsh, and her staff. The Board is responsible for setting strategies and policies for the charity and ensuring that these are implemented. Staff Remuneration

Staff salaries are set in line with other community foundations and similar sized charitable organisations. All staff, including key management personnel, are eligible for an annual increase of 2% subject to meeting a specific grade as part of EECF's appraisal process.

Risk Management

Through the work of the Finance & Administration Committee, the Trustees identified and reviewed the major risks to which the charity is exposed and have established systems to mitigate those risks. EECF's most significant potential risk relates to a drop in value of its endowment, leading to a loss of income, which would materialise as a reduction in grant making and income for overheads. In addressing this issue, the charity regularly reviews its investment strategy and has a positive relationship with its investment managers, details of which are listed on Page 2. Further, EECF has been looking at ways to diversify its income stream and broaden its fund holder base.

Investment Strategy

All three investment managers (Sarasin, CCLA and Investec) engaged in regular communication with the Head of Finance & Operations and the Finance & Administration Committee to discuss performance and investment strategy as well as providing quarterly performance reports. In addition to the experience of Committee members, EECF also benefits from independent pro-bono guidance from Mark Sherlock of Hermes Investment Management who helpfully compares our investment managers' performance and translates their reports for the non-finance trustees.

Although much of 2019/20 resulted in positive returns for EECF, the decision to reduce our equity weighting in 2018 meant that we were not as adversely affected by the financial market crash in the final quarter of the year. Discussions with our fund managers and a review of our position led to the Board agreeing more to make any changes at this time but to keep this under close review.

Having a medium-risk approach to investments saw an income return of £754k for the year.

Reserves Policy

The Reserves Policy states that EECF aims to keep a minimum reserve of £640k of unrestricted funds to enable it to deliver a grants programme addressing social needs across its area of benefit, to meet the associated administrative costs of grant making and having core staff focused on donor development. At 31 March 2020, EECF had total resources of £23.3m of which £21.8m was for designated or restricted purposes and/or forms part of the permanent endowment funds. The unrestricted balance of the funds amounted to £1.5m which is sufficient to meet the reserves policy requirement.

Designated funds of £4.2m remain to support any shortfall in our annual grant making budget (£576k), to offer an endowment match incentive programme (£655k) and to directly invest in property as a means of diversifying our income stream (£3m).

Equal Opportunities

EECF is committed to a policy of equal opportunities in the selection, training, career development and promotion of all people, regardless of gender, marital status, race, colour, religion, disability or sexual orientation. The charity encourages people with a disability to participate fully in organisational activities, consistent with their ability, so that they can maximise the use of their knowledge, experience and skills in the charity's work.

Grant Making

Grants are awarded to registered charities, voluntary and community groups and other not for profit organisations that have their own constitution and bank account and are based within or delivering services directly benefiting residents within Tower Hamlets, Hackney, Newham and City of London.

As a Community Foundation our mission is to support grassroots activities and, as such, our grants programme has been designed to do just that. Grants of up to £800 for one-off items of expenditure, e.g. equipment, social activities, training for small community organisations through to grants of up to £25,000 for larger organisations delivering quality initiatives that meet our priority themes of Education and Learning, Employment and Community Wellbeing. However, a broader range of activities are also funded. EECF has various application forms based on the value and purpose of grants being sought and monitoring requirements also reflect the level of award, i.e. small grant requests have a simplified application form and monitoring requirements in comparison to larger grants.

Grants are awarded from EECF's own financial resources as well as from funds that we manage on behalf of third parties. Full details of all grant awards and the donors that supported them during the period are listed in Note 6 of these accounts.

Other Charitable Activity

As a philanthropy advisor, EECF is focused on understanding the community's needs and directing donor funds to the charitable organisations best placed to deliver. In addition to community investment in the area through grant making, EECF provides a 'Funding Plus+' offer that supports the voluntary sector with capacity building activities including sourcing corporate volunteers and workshops on funding opportunity and guidance on how to submit quality funding applications.

EECF also directly delivers a small number of initiatives for the benefit of the community that include our award-winning baby bank for families on low incomes, social activities for elders as a means of reducing isolation and employment-related programmes for job seekers. This work is led by our Community Engagement Manager.

Aims and Objectives for the Public Benefit

EECF exists and operates for the public benefit. Through its grant making and co-ordination of charitable giving locally it works to reduce inequality and reduce poverty within its geographical remit.

The formal objective of EECF, as set out in the Memorandum and Articles of Association, is to promote the relief of poverty and sickness of persons within the London Boroughs of Tower Hamlets, Hackney, Newham and City of London.

The Board is satisfied that all current programmes, both grant making and our other charitable activities meet the requirement of providing public benefit as defined by the Charity Commission.

In 2019/20 EECF committed to focusing its efforts on achieving the following:

- Increase our grant making by 5% per annum, resulting in a distribution target of £1,102,500
- Increasing new business to ensure community needs are being met
- Appoint a development partner to progress plans for our freehold in Poplar to provide quality sports and housing for the local community as well as a permanent home for EECF
- Continue to recruit trustees to strengthen the Board
- Raise our profile through improved marketing and communications, including a new website
- Undergo an organisation review to ensure staffing requirements meet our needs
- Have a new business three year business plan agreed

Review of the period

2019/20 was another extremely busy and productive year for the Foundation, and the onset of a global health crisis at the year-end heightened our workload, purpose and relevance locally.

Throughout the year our investment in local communities contributed to personal transformational change for many local people experiencing hardship and inequality, and we continued to review our own grant programmes and working practices to improve our impact and reach.

In the twelve months to 31 March 2020, EECF received 501 funding requests totalling £3,765,503. We awarded 192 grants totalling £1,602,993 based on budget availability to support a wide range of social needs. Our smaller awards were broadranging but we focused our larger grants on initiatives addressing employment, education and learning, community wellbeing and inclusion and positive holiday provision for children and young people.

Offering bespoke grant management support, we administered 19 funds during the year for various long-standing fund holders including Allen & Overy, The Home Office, Societe Generale UK Foundation, St George Plc, Get Living London, Poplar HARCA and TD Securities. During the period we also launched 3 new grant programmes on behalf of Tower Hamlets Council and Uber.

Income for the period to 31 March 2020 totalled £2.497m (2019:£2.015m) against which total expenditure of £2.391m (2019: £1,740m) was incurred, in line with budget.

All Board and Committee meetings went ahead as scheduled and trustees and supporters remained actively engaged.

EECF's business plan covers a three year period to March 2020 with clear criteria to guide the work of the charity. Our key objectives and plans are set out on the previous page, with detail provided below.

Grant Making

During the past year EECF has managed 19 grant funds and distributed over £1,159,017 in grants ranging from £200 up to £25,000. As in previous years we have awarded funding to a diverse range of not-for-profit organisations serving our vibrant community here in the East End.

Here at EECF we embrace the diversity of our community and the ability that only local grassroots community organisation can have in identifying and reaching those most in need of support.

EECF has actively sought to encourage potential donors to establish charitable funds to improve their impact and reach across East London, as well as collaboration between existing donors where possible.

Our message of working together for greater impact has not always been embraced but those with charitable giving budgets, in part due to them choosing to support national rather than local causes. However, at the end of the financial year, in light of the Covid-19 crisis, things appeared to change when we launched our emergency response grant programme.

We hope that the willingness to work together through our Emergency Fund is not just a short term response and that business donors begin to understand the benefits of working in collaboration to achieve meaningful change at a local level.

Business Development

Canary Wharf and the City of London are considered the UK's economic powerhouses and the area is also home to high earning residents and employees. Despite this, the East End of London suffers from extremely high levels of deprivation, adversely affecting children and elders. Unfortunately, these needs, and the localised approach needed to effectively address them are often overlooked by those with the ability to give in favour of high profile national charities.

To significantly improve our impact and achieve meaningful long term change for the communities we serve, EECF is committed to challenging the approach of donors to seek a more collaborative approach to community investment locally.

Starting with an event hosted by the Bank of England, EECF and Mark Carney highlighted the high levels of hardship that exists and the need to support the communities on their doorstep. This was then followed by a series of one-to-one meetings with those businesses to develop the conversation, understand their charitable giving priorities and consider how they might align with local needs.

At this time the UK was put in lockdown in response to the world health pandemic and our emergency response fund was launched, offering an opportunity for businesses to engage and adopt a hyper local focus. In 2020/21 EECF will seek to build upon this work.

Develop plans for our freehold property in Poplar

This has continued to be a slow moving initiative, hindered by local authority planning processes. Despite the many imposed delays our site was marketed by CBRE in the summer of 2019 to potential development partners and we received a positive response. A series of shortlisting meetings followed in the Autumn until a shortlist of three bidders was reached. Presentations from those parties was planned but lockdown meant they were delayed. Early in 2020/21 our agent confirmed that all shortlisted bidders were able and keen to progress, and as a result a meeting for EECF to receive formal presentations has been scheduled for late June 2020.

Staff and Trustee Recruitment

We operated for much of the year under-resourced due to staff departures and delayed appointments. Capacity was added to the team and key areas of work by utilising short-term consultancy appointments and our expert bank of freelance grant assessors to ensure there was no negative impact on productivity.

Trustees recruitment did not dominate our agenda, but time was spent inducting and working alongside those trustees appointed in late 2018/19. Although trustee vacancies will be recruited for in the year ahead, overall EECF has an effective, committed and cohesive board of trustees.

Profile Raising

Although EECF achieves a huge amount for the benefit of the community, we have been guilty of operating 'below the radar'. To address this EECF appointed an agency to add capacity and provide expertise and guidance and to help promote our 30 year anniversary.

This work has been helpful in considering how we market ourselves to various potential donor audiences and has focused on social media and more recently on engaging influencers with a strong connection to the East End. With an increased social media presence and website, we are heading in the right direction, but recognise there is much to do. In light of this, in March 2020 EECF's Board committed funding to create a dedicated in-house resource to lead this work.

Organisation Review

As part of the business planning process EECF reviewed and considered its staffing structure and roles within it. In March 2020 changes were agreed along with a budget for implementation. At the start of 2020/21 the new structure has been implement and recruitment is underway. As an interim measure agencies and consultants are filling gaps on specific areas of work to ensure we maintain momentum and continue to move forward at pace.

Business Plan

Although a new business plan was not available by the year end, a review of the current plan suggested no significant changes are required. To guide our work the current plan was extended for a year along with a multi-year budget and revised staff structure. Work on a new multi-year business plan will be completed by March 2021 and will reflect the decisions taken at strategic planning workshops proposed for the year ahead.

Plans for the future

In 2020/21 EECF will focus its efforts on achieving the following:

- Increase our grant making by 5% on 2019/20, resulting in a distribution target of £1.2m
- . In addition, we anticipate distributing more than £800k through our emergency response fund
- Hold a series of learning events with grantees and funders to understand changing community needs as a result of the COVID-19
- Build on the success of our East End Emergency Fund by engaging new and existing donors to ensure local community needs are being addressed
- Appoint a development partner for our freehold property in Poplar in order to provide quality sports and housing for the local community as well as a permanent home for EECF
- Strengthen our trustees board with the aim of making it more reflective of our diverse community
- Make staff appointments in line with the new staff structure
- Raise our profile through improved marketing and communications, including a strong case for support
- · Have a new business plan agreed

Statement of Trustees' Responsibilities

The Trustees are responsible for preparing the Trustees' Report and the financial statements in accordance with applicable law and regulations.

Opinion

1 Accounting policies

a) Basis of preparation

EECF is a registered charity, limited by guarantee, in the United Kingdom. In the event of the charity being wound up, the liability in respect of the guarantee is limited to £1 per member of the charity. The address of the registered office is given in the charity information on page 2 of these financial statements. The nature of the charity's operation and principal activities are to promote the relief of poverty and sickness of persons within the London Boroughs of Tower Hamlets, Hackney, Newham and City of London. The financial statements have been prepared in accordance with Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019) - (Charities SORP), the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) and the Companies Act 2006.

Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy or note.

b) Public benefit entity

The charitable company meets the definition of a public benefit entity under FRS 102.

c) Going concern

The trustees has considered the working capital requirements of the company, including an assessment of the potential of the COVID-19 outbreak.

The trustees believes that the company has adequate financial resources to continue in operational existence for the foreseeable future and meet it's liabilities and obligations as they fall due for the next twelve months. The trustees consider that there are no material uncertainties about the charitable company's ability to continue as a going concern.

The trustees do not consider that there are any sources of estimation uncertainty at the reporting date that have a significant risk of causing a material adjustment to the carrying amounts of assets and liabilities within the next reporting period.

d) Income

Income is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the income have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and that the amount can be measured reliably.

Income from government and other grants, whether 'capital' grants or 'revenue' grants, is recognised when the charity has entitlement to the funds, any performance conditions attached to the grants have been met, it is probable that the income will be received and the amount can be measured reliably and is not deferred.

For legacies, entitlement is taken as the earlier of the date on which either: the charity is aware that probate has been granted, the estate has been finalised and notification has been made by the executor(s) to the charity that a distribution will be made, or when a distribution is received from the estate. Receipt of a legacy, in whole or in part, is only considered probable when the amount can be measured reliably and the charity has been notified of the executor's intention to make a distribution. Where legacies have been notified to the charity, or the charity is aware of the granting of probate, and the criteria for income recognition have not been met, then the legacy is a treated as a contingent asset and disclosed if material.

Income received in advance of the provision of a specified service is deferred until the criteria for income recognition are met.

e) Donations of gifts, services and facilities

Donated professional services and donated facilities are recognised as income when the charity has control over the item or received the service, any conditions associated with the donation have been met, the receipt of economic benefit from the use by the charity of the item is probable and that economic benefit can be measured reliably. In accordance with the Charities SORP, volunteer time is not recognised.

On receipt, donated gifts, professional services and donated facilities are recognised on the basis of the value of the gift to the charity which is the amount the charity would have been willing to pay to obtain services or facilities of equivalent economic benefit on the open market; a corresponding amount is then recognised in expenditure in the same period.

f) Interest receivable

Interest on funds held on deposit is included when receivable and the amount can be measured reliably by the charity; this is normally upon notification of the interest paid or payable by the bank.

g) Gift Aid

Gift Aid is recovered by EECF and third parties on behalf of EECF, on donations from UK taxpayers and is recognised in the accounts when it is received.

Notes to the financial statements

For the year ended 31 March 2020

1 Accounting policies (continued)

h) Fund accounting

Restricted funds are to be used for specific purposes as laid down by the donor. Expenditure which meets these criteria is charged to the fund.

Unrestricted funds are donations and other incoming resources received or generated for the charitable purposes. Designated funds are unrestricted funds earmarked by the trustees for particular purposes.

i) Expenditure and irrecoverable VAT

Expenditure is recognised once there is a legal or constructive obligation to make a payment to a third party, it is probable that settlement will be required and the amount of the obligation can be measured reliably. Expenditure is classified under the following activity headings:

- Raising funds relate to the costs incurred by the charitable company in inducing third parties to make voluntary contributions to it, as well as the cost of any activities with a fundraising purpose.
- Charitable activities includes the costs of delivering services and activities undertaken to further the purposes of the charity and their associated support costs, as well as the payment of grants. Expenditure on multi-year grants is recognised in full when the grant is agreed, with any installment payments shown as creditors until paid.

Irrecoverable VAT is charged as a cost against the activity for which the expenditure was incurred.

j) Allocation of support costs

Resources expended are allocated to the particular activity where the cost relates directly to that activity. However, the cost of overall direction and administration of each activity, comprising the salary and overhead costs of the central function, is apportioned based on staff time, of the amount attributable to each activity.

Where information about the aims, objectives and projects of the charity is provided to potential beneficiaries, the costs associated with this publicity are allocated to charitable expenditure.

Where such information about the aims, objectives and projects of the charity is also provided to potential donors, activity costs are apportioned between fundraising and charitable activities on the basis of area of literature occupied by each activity.

k) Operating leases

Rental charges are charged on a straight line basis over the term of the lease.

I) Tangible fixed assets

Items of equipment are capitalised where the purchase price exceeds £500. Depreciation costs are allocated to activities on the basis of the use of the related assets in those activities. Assets are reviewed for impairment if circumstances indicate their carrying value may exceed their net realisable value and value in use.

Depreciation is provided at rates calculated to write down the cost of each asset to its estimated residual value over its expected useful life. The depreciation rates in use are as follows:

Office equipment

over 4 years

Computer equipment

over 4 years

m) Listed investments

Investments are a form of basic financial instrument and are initially recognised at their transaction value and subsequently measured at their fair value as at the balance sheet date using the closing quoted market price. Any change in fair value will be recognised in the statement of financial activities. The charity does not acquire put options, derivatives or other complex financial instruments.

n) Debtors

Trade and other debtors are recognised at the settlement amount due after any trade discount offered. Prepayments are valued at the amount prepaid net of any trade discounts due.

1 Accounting policies (continued)

Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account. Cash balances exclude any funds held on behalf of service users.

p) Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.

The charity only has financial assets and financial liabilities of a kind that qualify as basic financial instruments. Basic financial instruments are initially recognised at transaction value and subsequently measured at their settlement value.

Pensions

The charity provides an auto enrolment pension scheme to staff and contributions are accounted for when they arise.

Purposes of restricted funds

Isle of Dogs Grants Chest. Income from the LDDC Community Grants and the LDDC Education & Training endowments are used to form this fund along with individual donations.

Tower Hamlets Grants Chest. Income from the Employment & Training and Grassroots Tower Hamlets endowments, along with donations from Berwin Cave Leighton Paisner (BCLP) and Quartet Community Foundation are used to form this fund.

Fund for Hackney. Income from EECF's Community First and Grassroots Hackney endowments, and other small donations for Hackney form this fund.

Newham Giving. Income from EECF's Community First and Grassroots Newham endowments, Berwin Cave Leighton & Paisner (BCLP), Northern Trust and other individual donations are used to form this fund.

Philanthropy Club. Income from the Philanthropy Club members to benefit the local community. 50% of annual donation is committed to the Club's endowment.

Grassroots City. Income from the Grassroots City Endowment Fund is available to fund provision that benefits the local community in the City area of London.

Millwall Park. Income from the Millwall Park Endowment Fund is available to fund provision that benefits the local community in the Millwall Park area on the Isle of Dogs (Tower Hamlets).

Purposes of restricted funds (continued)

Poplar Harca Grants and Arts Chest. Poplar Harca's fund is used to deliver a grants programme in the Tower Hamlets wards of Poplar, Lansbury, Mile End, Bromley South and Bromley North.

Study Support Weekends. The income is generated from various parties including TD Securities and smaller donations. The fund is open to secondary schools in Tower Hamlets and Newham.

Income from the Evening Standard Dispossessed Fund is changeable and directed by the Evening Standard.

Allen & Overy Fund. This fund supports activities within Tower Hamlets and Hackney.

Isle of Dogs **Summer Programme**. This long standing programme is funded through the income raised by runners awarded a London Marathon Golden Bond place.

London Dock Community Fund - St George. The developer established this fund to support community activities close its development in Wapping, Tower Hamlets. The Fund specifically supports the wards of St Katharine's & Wapping and Shadwell.

20 Fenchurch Street Legacy Fund. This fund was established by the 20 Fenchurch Street Partnership and is a vehicle for the buildings tenants and service providers to support projects in the boroughs of Tower Hamlets, Hackney and Newham. The current focus is on addressing unemployment.

Inspiring Communities. East End Community Foundation is distributing funding on behalf of Get Living London to support the local communities around East Village, E20.

Tampon Tax. A fund that covers EECF area of benefit and can be used to support organisations dedicated to supporting the needs of young girls and women.

TD Securities. Funds the Study Support Weekends, for charities identified by its staff and Newham Giving.

Vital Grants. Established by EECF from its unrestricted resources to address community cohesion in Tower Hamlets as identified by the community survey undertaken as part of our Vital Signs research.

Societe Generale UK Foundation Fund. Established to support young people of Tower Hamlets, Newham and Hackney, improving their educational development, through sport, arts or cultural activities and improving literacy.

Sponsorship Fund. Established by EECF to sponsor local events or initiatives with a strong East End focus or connection that may not naturally fit our typical grant criteria.

S106. This fund is made up of two programmes; Millennium Quarter (MQ) and Riverside South (RS). The fund has been established with LBTH and is ring-fenced to activities serving residents on the Isle of Dogs (MQ) and the Isle of Dogs and South Poplar (RS).

Millwall Park Capital Project. This fund was established using income from the Millwall Park Endowment and is designated for a planned capital project in the park.

#iwill/YSA. This fund was established by the Office for Civil Society and Big Lottery Fund to support youth social action.

Elders Fund. Support elders activities in Tower Hamlets. Income is from the Elders Endowment, provided by an anonymous donor.

Purposes of designated funds

Grant Making - funds set aside by the trustees to top up the grant making funds.

Endowment Building Incentive - funds set aside by the trustees to build new endowment funds and match funds donated from outside organisations for endowments.

Capital Investment - funds set aside for future capital investment by the charity.

The London Docklands Development Corporation, as part of its de-designation transferred the freeholds of numerous properties in the area occupied on long leases at nominal rent. The duty as freeholder is to ensure that the properties continue to be used for community benefit. The opportunity for EECF to financially benefit from these properties remains remote or subject to many contingent matters prior to valuation, therefore no amounts are included in these financial statements. The exception to this is the Workhouse site at Poplar that is on a short term lease and is an area deemed for redevelopment. EECF has a professional team of advisors and haing developed a brief they marketed the redevelopment opportunity for this site in the summar of 2019. Applicants were shortlisted but presentations were delayed due to COVID-19. Presentations were finally arranged for June 2020 and an appointment is expected to be made by the Autumn. At that time the value of the site will be clear and the asset can added to our balance sheet.
