## **OBJECTIVES AND ACTIVITIES**

### Objectives and aims

The objectives of the charity are to advance the Christian religion by the provision of a house of retreat, primarily but not exclusively for members of the Church of England who are resident in the Dioceses of Newcastle and Durham, which may also be used for any other charitable purpose which, in the opinion of the trustees, will maintain and strengthen the religious and educational life of its users.

#### Public benefit

Shepherds Dene Retreat House is a grade two listed building set in 27 acres of land comprising formal garden, woodlands and fields. It is open throughout the year to any who wish to come for a time of spiritual refreshment, relaxation and education. Members of the public are welcome to walk in the grounds and many local residents choose to do so. As a Church of England Retreat House, Shepherds Dene welcomes guests and visitors of all faiths and none.

The house has a chapel, a prayer house and other quiet places, both inside and out. There is also a programme of events mainly, though not exclusively, centred on the Christian faith. These range from guided retreats and meditations to wider cultural and artistic expression. The house holds exhibitions of artwork, which are open to the public. There are events involving music, flower arranging, guided visits to sites of historic and spiritual significance and walks in the beautiful surrounding countryside.

Shepherds Dene offers a hardship fund to enable people with limited income to access our facilities and the house is also used for community events. Shepherds Dene is closely linked to the local village community and has been involved in supporting events in that community, along with other local charities. The retreat house provides opportunities for local educational organisations to use our grounds and premises for developing life skills for people with significant learning disabilities. Shepherds Dene also offers opportunities to individuals who wish to volunteer in the house and grounds and to groups of volunteers, who wish to be involved in team-building days in the grounds.

#### ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Charitable activities

Shepherds Dene was well used for most of the year by church groups and community groups, with single occupancy figures around 57%. Around two thirds of guests are church or religious groups, both Church of England and other denominations. The remaining third come from a wide range of social, educational, community, public sector, cultural and work groups.

Guests principally come from the North East of England and from the dioceses of Newcastle and Durham in particular, but many guests come from further afield as well as a number of guests who stay on personal retreats and quiet days. Shepherds Dene is being used increasingly for writing retreats, both by groups of writers of fiction and by doctorate students from universities.

Shepherds Dene's own programme of events and retreats has continued to be popular, often following a traditional retreat pattern but also involving other activities such as the Art Week when guests use the grounds to develop their painting skills within a context of prayer and reflection.

The Friends of Shepherds Dene have continued to provide invaluable support on projects in the grounds and the house and the restoration of the rockery is continuing.

The major building project completed this year was the restoration of the lift - a vital facility for guests with mobility problems to access the first floor. The project was completed successfully with generous grant assistance from the Newcastle Church of England Institute Trust in Newcastle Diocese, the Diocese of Durham and from the Allchurches Trust. The project was completed in the Spring, on time and on budget.

## ACHIEVEMENT AND PERFORMANCE

#### Organisation

There have been four meetings of the trustees during the year with meetings as required by the Programme Committee.

#### Staffing

It has been another year of change with regard to staffing: the principal change being the resignation of the Warden, Jane Easterby who left her post at the end of April in order to become an ordained minister in the Diocese of Durham. A farewell meal was held by the trustees to recognise her significant contribution to the House over the five years of her tenure.

The trustees decided at their meeting in March that rather than move to appoint a successor to Jane Easterby straightaway there would instead be a period of ' interim governance' in order to give a short time for reflection about the post and the needs of the House beforehand. It was with this in mind that Mr Philip Davies, appointed trustee at the end of 2018 by the Diocese of Durham, and recently retired Chapter Clerk (Administrator) of Durham Cathedral should be asked to provide oversight of the running of the House as Interim Warden for this period. Mr Davies undertook to do this work on the basis of three days a week and therefore resigned his trusteeship in order to do so.

During the Summer, a recruitment process took place to appoint a Director (the trustees agreeing to change the name from Warden to better reflect the nature of the duties) and despite receiving a number of good applications, and offering the post, the successful candidate decided on reflection that the timing was not right and declined the offer. Mr Davies agreed to continue as Interim Warden until a further recruitment process could take place.

On the recommendation of the Interim Warden, a part time Administrative Assistant was appointed to provide additional support in the general administration of the House.

The trustees have yet to appoint another part-time cook and are continuing to use agency chefs to cover holidays and one weekend each month.

## FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### **Review of Business**

Grant support from the Diocese of Newcastle was maintained at £5,000, however the Diocese of Durham made a grant of £10,000 towards the lift refurbishment and unfortunately was not able to make a grant towards operational costs.

Income from bookings showed a small decline over 2018. Staffing and other costs including food increased in line with the cost of living generally. The cost of electricity increased by 10% when the two year contract with Yorkshire Power and Gas came to an end. Advertising costs were incurred over the recruitment process for the post of Director.

Expenditure was incurred on replacing the central heating boiler in the cottage, on a new water pump for the cellar and on commissioning from an Architect an access audit report on the House and gardens in order to ensure that the needs of guests with mobility or other difficulties can be properly managed. The report has a number of recommendations which the trustees will consider and put in place an implementation plan as soon as possible.

Prices for residential and non-residential groups were increased compared to 2018.

#### **Review of transactions and Financial Position**

Income for the year was £379,691 (2018: £364,673). Income from lettings was £337,103 (2018: £324,569). Outgoings were £374,942 (2018: £356,530), within which, staffing costs were £199,214. A net operating profit of £4,749 was made (compared to a net surplus of £8,143 in 2018).

#### FINANCIAL REVIEW

#### Reserves policy

It is the trustees' policy to maintain free reserves at a minimum of three months' operating expenditure. At 31 December 2019 the amount available in the Trust's unrestricted fund, excluding the capital of the property, was £41,394.

#### STRUCTURE, GOVERNANCE AND MANAGEMENT

#### Governing document

The charity is controlled by its governing document, a deed of trust, and constitutes a limited company, limited by guarantee, as defined by the Companies Act 2006.

#### Charity constitution

The charity is governed by a Charity Commission scheme dated 17 May 2011 and is registered with the Charity Commission under number 1138224-1.

#### Trustees

The trustees who served the charity during the period are listed on page 1. In March, the Archdeacon of Durham, the Ven. Ian Jagger resigned as ex officio trustee on his retirement as Archdeacon. At the year end, that vacancy was still to be filled.

The new Archdeacon of Northumberland, The Venerable Mark Wroe, took his place as an ex officio trustee representing the Diocese of Newcastle and Mr Alistair Jenkins was appointed as a trustee on 5 June.

Canon Bob Hopper resigned his trusteeship at the end of December.

As mentioned above, Philip Davies joined the board of Trustees on 1st March as a nominee of the Durham Diocesan Board of Finance but resigned on 24 April in order to become Interim Warden. It is intended that Mr Davies will be re-appointed as a trustee once the new Director is in post.

#### Method of election of Trustees

Under the Charity Commission scheme the Newcastle Diocesan Society is the custodian trustee of the charity. Shepherds Dene is the sole corporate trustee of the charity and the constitution of the corporate trustee specifies that its directors and trustees shall include:

- 1. The Bishop of Durham (or his nominee);
- 2. The Bishop of Newcastle (or his nominee);

3. The Archdeacon of Northumberland or such other archdeacon from his diocese as he may choose to nominate from time to time;

4. The Archdeacon of Durham or such other archdeacon from his diocese as he may choose to nominate from time to time;

5. Two nominees of the Newcastle Diocesan Board of Finance;

6. Two nominees of the Durham Diocesan Board of Finance.

In addition, those trustees may appoint up to 2 other trustees.

#### Key management remuneration

The Trustees/Directors of Shepherds Dene receive no salaries, expenses or other emoluments, for the work that they undertake on behalf of the Retreat House. The role of Warden/Director is a salaried post of full time employment, with responsibility for the strategic development, financial performance and promotion of Shepherd's Dene Retreat House and its programmes. The Warden also has responsibility for the management, welfare and development of staff and volunteers of Shepherds Dene, the care and wellbeing of guests, the maintenance of the fabric of house and gardens and the management of the financial resources. No accommodation is provided for the Warden/Director, unlike most other retreat houses.

#### Investment powers

The charity's governing document permits wide powers of investment. The trustees generally follow the ethical investment policy of the Central Board of Finance of the Church of England.

#### **Related charities**

The charity is part of the work of Newcastle and Durham Diocese, and is related to other charities established for the furtherance of that work.

## Independent examiner's report to the trustees of Shepherds Dene (incorporating the Stirling Newall Trust) ('the Company')

I report to the charity trustees on my examination of the accounts of the Company for the year ended 31 December 2019.

#### Responsibilities and basis of report

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES

#### Basis of preparing the financial statements

The financial statements of the charitable company, which is a public benefit entity under FRS 102, have been prepared in accordance with the Charities SORP (FRS 102) 'Accounting and Reporting by Charities: Statement of Recommended Practice applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland (FRS 102) (effective 1 January 2019)', Financial Reporting Standard 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland' and the Companies Act 2006. The financial statements have been prepared under the historical cost convention.

The financial statements have been prepared on a going concern basis on the grounds that current and future sources of funding or support will be more than adequate for the charity's needs. The trustees have considered a period of 12 months from the balance sheet date and consider no further disclosures relating to the charity's ability to continue as a going concern need to be made.

Shepherds Dene meets the definition of a public benefit entity entry under FRS 102. Assets and liabilities are initially recognised at historical cost or transaction value unless otherwise stated in the relevant accounting policy note(s).

The financial accounts are prepared in Sterling (£).

#### Significant estimates and judgements

The preparation of the financial statements requires the trustees to make judgements and estimates. The main areas where such judgements and estimates are made are in respect of depreciation of tangible fixed assets.

The company has applied the following accounting policies:

#### Financial reporting standard 102 - reduced disclosure exemptions

The charitable company has taken advantage of the following disclosure exemptions in preparing these financial statements, as permitted by FRS 102 'The Financial Reporting Standard applicable in the UK and Republic of Ireland':

• the requirements of Section 7 Statement of Cash Flows.

#### Income

All incoming resources are included in the Statement of Financial Activities (SOFA) when the charity is entitled to the income and the amount can be quantified with reasonable accuracy. The following specific policies are applied to particular categories of income:

- Voluntary income received by way of grants, donations and gifts is included in full in the Statement of Financial Activities when receivable. Grants, where entitlement is not conditional on the delivery of a specific performance by the charity, are recognised when the charity becomes unconditionally entitled to the grant.

- Incoming resources from grants, where related to performance and specific deliverables, are accounted for as the charity earns the right to consideration by its performance.

#### Expenditure

All expenditure is accounted for on an accruals basis and has been classified under headings that aggregate all costs related to the category. Where costs cannot be directly attributed to particular headings they have been allocated to activities on a basis consistent with use of the resources. Expenditure includes any VAT which cannot be fully recovered, and is reported as part of the expenditure to which it relates:

- Costs of generating funds comprise the costs associated with attracting voluntary income.

#### 1. ACCOUNTING POLICIES - continued

#### Expenditure

- Charitable expenditure comprises those costs incurred by the charity in the delivery of its activities and services for its beneficiaries. It includes both costs that can be allocated directly to such activities and those costs of an indirect nature necessary to support them.

#### Tangible fixed assets

Depreciation is provided at the following annual rates in order to write off each asset over its estimated useful life.

Kitchen & catering equipment	<ul> <li>Straight line over 15 years</li> </ul>
Fixtures and fittings	<ul> <li>Straight line over 5 years</li> </ul>

#### Stocks

Stocks are valued at the lower of cost and net realisable value, after making due allowance for obsolete and slow moving items.

#### Taxation

As a charity, the company is exempt from tax on income and gains to the extent that these are applied to charitable objects. No tax charges have arisen in the charity.

#### Fund accounting

Unrestricted funds can be used in accordance with the charitable objectives at the discretion of the trustees.

Restricted funds can only be used for particular restricted purposes within the objects of the charity. Restrictions arise when specified by the donor or when funds are raised for particular restricted purposes.

Further explanation of the nature and purpose of each fund is included in the notes to the financial statements.

#### Pension costs and other post-retirement benefits

The charitable company operates a defined contribution pension scheme. Contributions payable to the charitable company's pension scheme are charged to the Statement of Financial Activities in the period to which they relate.

#### Cash at bank and in hand

Cash at bank and cash in hand includes cash and short term highly liquid investments with a short maturity of three months or less from the date of acquisition or opening of the deposit or similar account.

#### Creditors and provisions

Creditors and provisions are recognised where the charity has a present obligation resulting from a past event that will probably result in the transfer of funds to a third party and the amount due to settle the obligation can be measured or estimated reliably. Creditors and provisions are normally recognised at their settlement amount after allowing for any trade discounts due.
